War News. Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M. AWAITING FRENCH GOVERNMENT'S ADVICE.

PARIS, Jan. 5. The Central Powers are reported by the Lauzanne Gazette to be preparing a second note to the Entente, enumerating the precise conditions of peace, says a Geneva despatch to the Temps.

BARCELONA, Spain, Jan. 5. The German Consul-General here issued notice requesting all youths of 16 years and over to register at the Consulate in view of the prospect of soon being called to the colors.

LONDON, Jan. 5. King Charles is expected to visit Budapest next week to meet the leaders of all Hungarian parties in special audience for the purpose of forming a Hungarian cabinet in which German influences will be lessened, says a Budapest despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co., forwarded by way of Amsterdam. The new plan includes the retirement of Premier Tisza, says the despatch.

LONDON, Jan. 5. A British official communication issued to-night says: "Early this morning a hostile raiding party succeeded in entering our lines south of Loos. Heavy fighting ensued, and the enemy were speedily driven out, leaving a number of dead in our trenches. Some of our men are missing. We successfully exploded a mine early last night north of Givenchy. Artillery activity has been heavy in a number of places along our front. Successful bombardments of the enemy trenches has been carried out by us at Oppy, Lesbœufs and in the neighborhood of Hill 160 there was considerable aerial activity yesterday. Successful work was carried out by our airplanes in conjunction with our artillery. Two of our machines are missing.

LONDON, Jan. 5. Premier Lloyd George and Viscount Milner, members of the British War Council, with official advisers have arrived in Rome, says an official statement issued to-night, to participate with the French and Italian Govern-

THE PEACE TERMS.

LONDON, Jan. 5. The peace terms of the Teutonic Allies, which Count Andrassy, former Hungarian Premier, is reported to have said the Entente could learn from President Wilson, are believed in diplomatic quarters to consist of the generalization which Germany and Austria-Hungary communicated to the Pope and presumably to the American authorities. The Pope expressed to the German and Austrian Emperors his hopes that the terms would be moderate and acceptable. The Emperors responded that it was their purpose to formulate moderate terms. The reports that the reply of the Entente to President Wilson's peace note would contain a statement of terms, is now known to refer to a similar general statement of conditions, which, while somewhat more specific than the generalizations in the speech of Premier Lloyd George and in the Entente's reply to Germany, does not mention specifically by name the countries on behalf of which damages and restitution of territory are to be asked.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. The State Department late to-day authorized the statement that President Wilson was not contemplating sending another peace note.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. By a strict party vote of 41 to 27, the Senate to-day agreed to the motion of Senator Hitchcock to proceed with the formal consideration of his resolution, endorsing President Wilson's peace note. The vote makes the resolution the regular business of the Senate. Senator Gallinger, minority leader, after a conference with the Republican Senators submitted as a substitute, that the Senate U.S. in the interest of humanity and civilization expresses sincere hope that a just and permanent peace between the warring nations of Europe may be consummated at an early date and approve of all proper efforts to secure that end. Senator Gallinger's substitute for Hitchcock's resolution was rejected by the Senate by a vote of 27 to 35.

BERLIN, Jan. 5. Braila, Roumania's chief commercial city, has been captured by the Germans and Bulgarians, according to an official announcement made this evening.

PARIS, Jan. 5. The approval of President Wilson's request for a statement of peace terms from the European belligerents, was voted on to-night by the Senate, at the conclusion of three days of stirring debate. Action came with dramatic suddenness when the Democratic leaders decided to accept a form of resolution that would not commit the Senate to an endorsement of the whole of the President's note. Ten representatives of the Progressive group joined the majority, making the vote 48 to 17.

LONDON, Jan. 5. It is officially announced that the new war loan will be issued on Jan. 11.

LONDON, Jan. 5. The Greek Government is ready to discuss other demands made by the Allies. It has been determined not to declare war on the Entente, but to submit passively to all coercion, relying upon ultimate recognition by the Powers that the blockade is an unjust punishment.

FRANCE, has returned to its home port, says an official statement issued here to-day.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. American Minister Vopicka will be taken away from Bucharest as requested by the German Government, although he will still be accredited as American Minister to Roumania, Serbia and Bulgaria. The German Government cited incidents which it alleged were unneutral toward the Central Powers and favoured Roumania. With the Dutch Minister he undertook the protection of Entente subjects when Germany's armies took the Roumanian capital.

PARIS, Jan. 5. A Havas despatch from Brest reports the sinking of the Norwegian steamer Odds, 1,101 tons gross, by a submarine. The crew was saved. A cable from Cartagena, Spain, says the sinking of the steamer San Leandro, announced yesterday, created a profound impression throughout Spain. Presumably the vessel was sunk by a submarine. The crew composed of residents of Cartagena, was saved.

LONDON, Jan. 5. Lloyds Shipping Agency to-day announced that the Greek steamer Teropina had been torpedoed and sunk and 25 men of the crew landed. The vessel measured 3,015 tons gross. The Norwegian steamer Helgoy is also believed sunk.

TOKIO, Jan. 5. Three hundred persons were killed and many injured in a disastrous earthquake at Central Formosa, according to special despatches from Talhooko, capital of Formosa. It is estimated that 1,000 houses were destroyed, and that the City of Nante has been damaged extensively by fire.

Newfoundland Scotch Cured Herring.

The sale of some seventeen barrels of first-packed Newfoundland herring in the New York market during the last week at \$14 per barrel practically establishes the market for this pack in this market. Lot shipments are expected to arrive in this city on the steamer Florizel, due to arrive next Thursday. It is probable that there will be several hundred packages, and that the market will be well supplied. The herring appear to be firm in their ideas as to price. Some lots are expected to bring up to \$16 and even \$18, if the quality is as described. The market is practically cleared of spring herring at present, the stock remaining being largely of carry-over pack, which is held in strong hands. This stock is bringing up to \$15 in this market at present, while the average price of Newfoundland Scotch-cured herring varies between \$10 and \$12. There is a fair demand in evidence at this time, but jobbers and dealers are taking on light orders pending the arrival of new pack goods. There is every indication of an active demand for this grade of herring during the remainder of the winter, especially among dealers of the East Side, who are awaiting anxiously the arrival of autumn-caught fish. The supply is not expected to be large this year, according to those who have recently returned from Newfoundland, for the fishery has been disappointing. Stocks are held in few hands at producing centers and will come to few operators in this city. Higher prices are likely, according to well-informed operators, who are to handle supplies of the fall and winter catch.—Fishing Gazette.
