

BIG FIRE IN JERSEY CITY. the saltpetre plant of the Richardson Themical Company, leaped beyond control of the fire forces of two cities to the plant of the American Sugar Refinery Company and then encompassed and destroyed several smaller houses which included most of the buildings in an entire block, raged for four hours before the firemen demillions of dollars but could not be closely estimated. Fifteen persons, ser ously injured or burned, scores of others cut by glass blown out over half a mile radius by a series of explosions, and 900 families made homeless, was the toll of the Jersey City fire. In the rear section of the American Sugar Refinery building, the fire has burst beyond control of the fire fighters and is forcing them to retreat. The walls at the rear of the building are beginning to cave and the flames thus released are expected to carry across the street to the main warehouse of Colgate & Co., which is filled with soap and other highly inflammable substances. Should the warehouse become ignited it is predicted the entire Colgate plant will be destroyed. The plants of the Vulcan Iron Works Co., and of the Manhattan Electric Supply Co., are menaced. The firemen are hampered by low pressure.

In high-grade watches the bearings of the entire watch movement are jewelled. The best grade jewels are made of sapphires or rubies, the cheaper grade of garnet, and the lowest grade of ordinary rock crystal. There are from seven to twenty-three points of jewels in a watch, and unless they are all of good quality and fit the wheel pivots perfectly the watch will be a poor timekeeper even if it does run.



#### Women as Political Agents

London, Eng.-The Daily Mail has an interesting article on the Woman Election Agent. If, as is said, elections are not won or lost by candidates, but by their agents, what are women doing in the latter and vital capacity? They are progressing. In 1922 there apepar to have been only two women election agents. Last November there were several, and one may assume that their ranks will be doubled, if not trebled during the present campaign. Moreover, there are now at least six women holding permanent posts as chief agents. One notable feature is that up to the present, almost without exception, their employers have been men. Women candidates seem to have

preferred men agents. A first calss agent is born, not made and in many instances may be described as being "born into the work.' Thus one woman agent of the day comes of a family of agents, while another is the daughter of a former M.P. It is essential, however, that the agent must have that political prescience, or sixth sense, which will enable her to foresee the trend of things. Here woman's natural intuition is very valuable, but it must be harnessed and disciplined to business habits and she must know her constituency in every phase. She must also have an intimate knowledge of election laws, and the law of libel. She arranges for committee rooms, canvassing tours, chairmen, supporting speakers, reception of deputations, the useful employment of an army of paid and voluntary helpers, and "literature inspired" communications to the press, hecklers, motor and other conveyances, and a thousand and one other things. While keeping a sharp eye on the enemy's camp for weak spots or illegalities, she must be very careful that there are none in her own. After the battle she must see that all accounts are rendered and passed within the statutory period. Her fee for an election ranges from a few pounds to fifty. So far women agents have done very well. Nevertheless it is a highly specialised and intricate job. Experience can be gained as canvasser, office worker, committee woman, poster artist, copy writer, heckler, research or reference clerk, and so on. Municipal elections afford excel-

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO. (H. F. SHORTIS)

Article V. February 2nd, 1832, was a day well worth recording. At 8 a.m., the schr. Jane, 82 tons, () wned by Mr. William Parsons, was launched at Bear's

At Carbonear about the same hour, a fine new brig, of 122 tons, the property of Mr. George Forward, was launched in the presence of a large number of spectators. Suitable accommodations had previously been erected for the ladies. At the moment of her leaving the stocks a band of music which was on board began to play "God Save The King." At the same time she was christened "King William the Fourth." The "King William." as she was usually called, went to the ice that spring in command of Captain Taylor, but she only captured 300 seals. However, Cant. Taylor. made two foreign voyages in her the same year, so that she was undoubtedly a staunch vessel and a smart sailer. Two launches in one day is not an every day occurrence, but this was only a beginning. 

Also at tended to the landing of twenty head of cattle from the Sable I. The cattle were all landed in good condition, and were taken away immediately afterward by Mr. Halliday. I attended Very Best Canadian Butter. the sale at the Abattoir Company. All the cattle were sold. The horse reported by a lady in the East End, has been examined by Dr. Bishop, who says the horse is unfit for labor. The owner has consented to have it humanely put to death. I have had several complaints about cattle being out at night, which have been attended to Three horses have been taken off the street for lameness. There are complaints coming continuously, about dogs being out at night time, annoying residents in the streets. There are quite a number of horses lame in the city from natural causes, and this can scarcely be avoided. A report was received from a lady in Sudbury St., about a dog which is homeless. I referred it to Mr. Robbins, the Impounder, who is looking after unlicensed dogs. I have attended to all calls and have done my best to relieve all suffering beasts. I call upon all owners of dry cattle in the woods to have their beasts rounded up and housed, as the season is too cold for animals to be out in the weather. #### Alcohol and Man

CAUSES OF DRUNKENNESS.

The Action of Alcohol on Man. By E. H. Starling. With Essays by R. Hutchison, Sir F. W. Mott, and R. Pearl. (London: Longman's, Green & Co., 1923; pp. vii, and 292. Price, 12s. 6d. net.)

There are four classes of causes. according to Professor E. H. Starling. as stated in his exhaustive study of "The Action of Alcohol on Man." which lead to drunkenness or to the immoderate use of alcoholic liquors. First comes fashion, which is gradually losing its influence in this direction. A state of inebrity nowadays carries discredit with it. The second cause is ignorance. "The pleasant subjective effects of alcohol have caused it to be endowed, in popular tradition, with all sorts of beneficial qualities which it does not possess." Better education will abolish these views. Thirdly, alcoholism may be due to economic causes. "If a man or woman in virtue of his or her environment is forced to lead the life of a beast, he may seek to avoid the horrible reality of everyday existence by recourse to the numbing effects of alcohol. The number of such individuals is probably only small, but it is the duty of the community to see that no human being is condemned to such an environment." The fourth group is of a different order, and is not, like the three mentioned, capable of removal by improvement in education and social conditions. The causes at work here are inherent nervous defects, which render those who suffer from them anti-social. These people are natural drunkards, and in the absence of alcohol would probably show their degenerate tendencies in some other direction. If left to itself this class would tend to disappear in a few generations, but the whole trend of modern legislation

#### tends to give it an artificial protec-Food and Poison.

The greater part of Professor Starling's book is devoted to a history of alcohol in the human body from its ingestion to its elimination, and its influence on the various functions of the body. His clearness of exposition makes his work interesting even to those who have no special knowledge of physiology. Alcohol, within certain limits is a food, and a food with distinct advantages over other foods. It is easily absorbable, and when absorbed undergoes almost complete combustion in the body. There is less waste, for instance, of alcohol in the body than of fat or

protem. As regards the action of alcohol on the nervous system, it is not, as it is comomnly believed, a stimulant, but a depressant. And its order of action is interesting. It acts first on the highest centres, diminishing their control over the lower, and thereby increasing the activity of the latter. It is because of this greater activity of the lower centres that the false appearance of stimulation is created. In its further action alcohol paralyses the various nervous centres in order from above downward, lastly affecting those on which life is dependent. Those developed latest in the order of evolution are destroyed first, while those of long racial history are most persistent to attack. In this respect poisoning by alcohol presents a close resemblance to many forms of insanity.

#### The Verdict.

Though Professor Starling does not shrink from giving us an accurate account of the evils produced by the abuse of alcohol, to most of the accusations brought against its moderate use he charges for a verdict of "not guilty." He tells us that a study of the evidence has convinced him "that in a civilized community such as ours the abolition of all alcoholic beverages from among our midst, even if carried out by universal consent, would be a mistake and contrary to the permanent interest of the race. If it were enforced by legislation against the wishes and convictions of a large proportion of the members of the community, it would te little short of a calamity."



Numbering 1,696, last month's defaults compare with 1,306 in September, while the liabilities rose from \$34,296,276 to \$36,098,804. In point of number, the October failures increased about 30 per cent. over those of September, which marked the low level this year, and the indebtedness was heavier by 5 per cent.
