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





Empire's War Memorials

By LT.-COL, T. NANGLE in the June B.E.S.L. Monthly "Our Empire." From the North Sea to Switzerland the Western Front is marked by many morials, but none are more striking or grip the imagination more than those erected to the memory of the Newfoundland Contingent. The majority of the memorials are either crosses or chelisks and seem to be long more to the Grande Place they are erected. Newfoundland, in memorating the battle exploits of her sons, has broken away from the traditional form and adopted a most original and unique scheme

At Beaumont Hamel the Don Government purchased eighty-four war-time condition. This area comprises the famous "Y" Ravine, the German lines, No-Man's Land, the British trench system, Hawthorn Ridge No. 2, "Y" Ravine and Hunter's Cemeteries, while just outside the boundary is the mine crater, and behind the ridge lies Knichtsbridge Cemetery. This was the line of advance followed by the Newfoundland Contingent in their gallant attack on July 1st, 1916. So many were left on that field whose bodies were never recovered that the Newfoundland Government decided to purchase the whole area and make it a Memorial

On the highest point in this area a huge mound of granite and clay has been raised to look like a natural hilltop. This has been planted with stunted spruce, mountain ash, silver birch, mosses and ferns, all brought from Newfoundland, Surmounting this mound on an outcrop of granite stands a collossal caribou, the emblem of the Contingent, bugling his bat tle challenge. Mr. Basil Gotto, of Twyford, Hants, who is responsible for the sculpturing of the caribou, designed the antlers from a head sho by Selous

From the base of the caribou or obtains a splendid view of the coun try, from Hebuterne in the north round to Bapaume, and Le Transloy ridges in the east to Villers-Breton neux in the south: the main places of interest being indicated by arrows The Park also contains the 51st High land Division memorial unveiled by Marshal Foch last September, and the 29th Division memorial, of which the Newfoundland Contingent formed a unit. Dug-outs have been preserved and trenches cleared out and reverted and some thirty thousand trees have been successfully transplanted from

Newfoundland. The park has been designed and the memorial erected by Mr. R. H. K Cochius, landscape architect, who spent many years in Newfoundland and Canada, and has been working at the park for more than three years





TWO TUNNEL-BORING PARTIES

A record engineering feat reached its climax recently, when the workmen of Messrs. William Muirhead, MacDonald Wilson and Co., Ltd., the contractors, who since December have been boring under the Thamas at a depth of 80 ft, between Barking Creek and Woolwich Arsenal, completed the excavation of a tunnel 3,000ft. longabout 21/2 times the width of the river at London Bridge.

The tunnel will ultimately carry lines of cable connecting the new London County Power Station, recently opened by the King, with Kent. The experience gained in its construction will be most valuable to the Ministry of Transport in connection with their project for tunnelling the river farther down to connect the arterial roads of Essex and Kent.

For the first time in engineering history, the boring through the chalk has been carried out in compressed air at a pressure of 40 b. to the square inch. 


