**C.P.R. WILL SOON BE
DOUBLE-TRACKED FROM
ATLANTIC TO PACIFIC**

Three Million Dollars Has Been Spent on Double-Tracking One Bridge

One of the many gigantic works which the Canadian Pacific Railway is carrying out at the present moment is that connected with the double-tracking of the bridge which crosses the St. Lawrence River at Lachine, Que. Today, the work is going forward with all speed, and it is expected that in the course of a week or two the double-tracking will be completed on both the down-stream side and the up-stream side to the point where the longest spans are to be placed, which will replace the present cantilever patterns spans. The Canadian Pacific Railway in carrying out this work is continuing its policy of double-tracking throughout its entire system, and it is anticipated that before many years the country will boast of a double track along the C. P. R. from St. John to Vancouver. It was prior to July 1910, when the C. P. R. came to the conclusion that the time had arrived to carry out the work of double-tracking the Lachine bridge, and the important approach to Montreal from the United States, and its New York connections, largely owing to the enormous increase in traffic, and the contracts were let to the Foundation Co., Ltd., and the Dominion Bridge Company. The cost of the improvement will absorb three millions of dollars.

The work in the vicinity of the Lachine bridge not only includes the argument or double-tracking of the structure across the St. Lawrence but three other bridges are to be double-tracked approaching the main bridge while the bridge across the Lachine Canal will in the near future have to undergo the same fate. This is a big job, but it is understood that the appropriation has not yet been made, and several matters are to be settled before the work can be started. It is interesting to note that in the new bridge here are no less than 8,000,000 pounds of steel. The eight-foot beams run 110,000 pounds, the 12-foot beams 240,000 pounds, the 24-foot beams 480,000 pounds, the 36-foot beams 720,000 pounds, and the 48-foot beams 960,000 pounds. Starting from the island side of the bridge it widens out at the seventh pier from 35 feet from centre to centre of trusses to 50 feet at the eleventh pier and continues from that point to the end.

**WORKMEN MUST NOT
DRINK IS EDICT OF
SOCIALISTS**

Vorwärts, Organ of German Socialist Party, Advocate of Temperance

Berlin July 21.—Workmen, give up schnapps! is the bold command issued by the Socialists of Germany in "Vorwärts," the organ of the Social Democratic party. The working men, however, are in a quandary. A great sacrifice is demanded of them and they are puzzled to know whether their political convictions are strong enough to warrant them withstanding the temptation of drinking little glasses of burning, comforting spirit. For this is not a temperance movement, proclaimed and preached on religious or moral grounds. It is a move in the political game. The government drive back to the country distillers of brandy part of the excise duty, and the dose is known as the "love-gift." The Socialists disapprove of this concession to country squires, and in 1903 they issued a manifesto from Leipzig urging their followers to abstain from schnapps, and thus to beat their enemies to part of their gain. And now the "love-gift" is greatly reduced in order to give the government £7,500,000 a year to spend on building new battleships. All the more reason for not drinking, say the Socialists. Hence their appeal to the workmen: "Make it known everywhere, in village and city, that whoever drinks schnapps ruins his health and helps his worst enemies, the Prussian Junker."

It is impossible to feel very sanguine about the success of this appeal. The Russian Socialists made a similar move some years ago, and implored the working classes to give up vodka. They were not martyrs and heroes. Vodka they must have to make them forget the miseries of life, and in the same way Hans in Germany requires a "drop of comfort" and is not in the least likely, manifestos of Socialist committees or not, to renounce the deadly stuff.

**RATIO OF CITIES' AREAS TO THEIR POPULATION
IS COMPARED BY FINANCIAL POST**

Statistics Cited for Canadian Towns and Cities; an Important Consideration in Investments in Real Estate

LARGE AREA, SMALL POPULATION, MEANS BORROWING

Eastern Cities Compare Favorably in Ratio of Population to Area With the Large Cities of the United States

THE ratio of the area of a city or town to its population is worthy of consideration in investing in city or town real estate. In buying real estate in our western cities and towns this question is especially important. An area out of all proportion to its population means a straggling—not compact—municipality. It means that an unnecessary amount of borrowing for municipal improvements will have to be done, and that the extension of these improvements, such as pavements, water, sewerage and lighting systems, will have to be made more rapidly, than in the case of solidly built-up city or town, in many cases, perhaps, to serve a much smaller population. Where there is a large area, the demand for inside property will not be so great as if the limits were fixed in accordance with the size and importance of the place. Consequently an investment in such a city would not prove as good as where the area was proportionate to the population and where the greatest number possible could be served by the least possible expenditure on municipal works.

Realizing the importance of this factor in real estate buying, the Post has endeavored to get the necessary information from as many Canadian cities and towns as possible. The result of our inquiries, nearly all of which were municipal offices, less than one-half revealing, is the following tabulation, wherein is given the population, in descending order of magnitude, the area in acres within city or town limits, the population per acre, the approximate area in acres still vacant and suitable for subdivision, including, in some instances, the vacant area within the limits, and the approximate area in acres outside the limits of fifty-two Canadian municipalities. The population in the majority of places is that given in the recent city assessment department census. A few are conservative estimates by municipal officers. In only a few cases have we reverted to the Dominion census figures.

The total population of these fifty-two municipalities is 2,148,775; the area, 28,975 acres. This gives an average population of 1.2 persons to the acre. However, as an interesting fact, however, there is no significant difference in any service in choosing the proper place for real estate investment, cities and towns must be considered individually. Moose Jaw stands as the most densely populated city, with 22.9 persons to the acre. Toronto has 22.4; Ottawa, 19.1; Montreal, 18.4; Westmount, 18.2; and Fernie 16.6. Montreal would rank higher if the present population could have been given. The comparison is made using the Dominion census figures. The above figures compare well with the population per acre in several of the United States' largest cities. FOR CLEAN CITY GOVERNMENT

A movement has been started looking to the organization of what is to be known as the "Progressive Municipal League", the object of which, as announced by its promoters, is to assist in procuring clean and efficient city government.

If the objects mentioned, are alone aimed at, such an organization might accomplish a great deal of good for the people of Calgary. Recent events have made it quite clear that a re-organization of the municipal administration, if not a complete housecleaning at the city hall, is very much needed.

The report of the investigation committee and developments which have followed have left no room in the minds of thoughtful people who are not biased by sentiments of friendship or other influences, for any conclusion other than that there has been in the present administration of the business of the city, much of incompetence, more of inattention, slackness and want of organization if nothing worse, and that thereby there has been much wastefulness in the expenditure of the people's money.

It is not enough to say that the members of the administration are good fellows, well meaning and conscientious; all that may be conceded and we might go further and say they are men who are successful in the various callings to which their lives have been dedicated and yet it might be possible that they should lack the genius for administrative necessary to the efficient and successful direction of affairs so complicated and so large as those involved in the business of a city like Calgary.

It need not be recited that the great corporations of the continent choose men to direct their affairs with an eye solely to their ability to administer. The facts as to whether they are good fellows or not, whether or not they are well meaning and conscientious on general principles, is rarely taken into account. It may not be too broad a statement to say that it is never done if the individual can demonstrate that he has the qualifications to fit him for the handling of the affairs to be intrusted to him, a little better than any other available. These men are then placed in charge of the business and are told that it is results that are expected of them, not excuses. And on that basis for the conduct of the business of the big corporations, it is that we seldom hear of a great industrial or financial concern being managed inefficiently. As to whether they are honest and conscientious in their characters, holding them to a strict business account will take care of that.

There is no good reason why the business of a city could not be managed on just as strict a business basis and if it were done we should hear less of appointments to responsible positions of persons for no other reason than influence or favoritism and very much less of wastefulness of the people's money.

As The Albertan understands it, the object of the proposed Progressive Municipal League is to approximate in the management of the business of the city, the results usually obtained in the conduct of the affairs of the big corporation. If its aim is realized, even in considerable measure, the bringing of it into being will have been justified.

To attain the largest measure of success in achieving its aim, however, the league must necessarily have some high ideals and it must live up to them. One of those ideals must be the absolute elimination of partizanship. If the league be not only non-partizan in name but in actual reality that which it accomplishes on behalf of the people of Calgary who pay the taxes will not be of large account.

Another rule the league must lay down for itself if it expects to work any great amount of good, is that it must not be permitted to be manipulated in the interests of any particular candidate or candidates.

political sentiments of their authors. An opinion that can be regarded as strictly independent or non-partizan, will therefore be of interest. The Grain Growers' Guide is published in the interest of an organization which is composed of men of both parties and is therefore, essentially non-partizan. Here is the view of The Guide concerning the Saskatchewan result:

Wider markets and lower prices on the necessities of life are of vital importance to the West. This question is one which spells either success or failure to thousands of farmers. No free people will tolerate being bottled up and robbed on both ends of their business for the benefit of a few men who enjoy special privileges. The tariff walls must go down.

ST. ANDREW'S HAS HAD A PROSPEROUS YEAR

The First Anniversary of the Church is Most Fittingly Celebrated

Rev. W. J. Clark of Montreal Talks of Things That Gold Cannot Purchase

The first anniversary of the opening of St. Andrew's Church was fittingly and tastefully decorated with plants celebrated yesterday. The auditorium and cut flowers. The choir was in splendid form, and in addition the well rendered anthems, brimmed to excellent soloists "With All Your Heart" by Mr. John Melkie, and "Abide With Me," by Mrs. Aylott Martry, leader of the choir.

The special preacher for the day was the Rev. W. J. Clark, D. D., of Montreal. His sermons were much enjoyed. He is a sane practical thinker, and expresses himself in a calm, forceful manner, in language that is clear and exceedingly well chosen.

At the morning service his theme was "Things That Gold Cannot Buy," based on Job 23: 15-21 cannot be gotten for gold. Dr. Clark indicated graphically many of the things you cannot get without gold. Most of material advantages have always been much sought after in every nation and country. Comfort, health, luxury, power, friends, social position, and most of things which are always to be had by those who have money, are things that are not to be had by those who have no money.

The "wisdom" of the text, which Dr. Clark defined as Godliness, rather than practical expediency or intellectual power, is another great possession which gold cannot buy. For inward power and outward effect there is nothing greater than this attainment. It includes the more religious quality described in Old Testament language as "the fear of God," and the deeply important moral character that expresses itself in "departing from evil."

St. Andrew's enters upon another year with a congregation that is rapidly filling the large new church, and a field of usefulness that is constantly enlarging. In six years it has grown to a membership of over 350, with a revenue sufficient to meet the needs of the varied activities of an institutional church, and it aims at giving a thousand dollars to the general work of the denomination this year in home and foreign fields of service.

IN A WAR ON PLAGUE

U.S. Officers Battle With Rats at All Seaports

Plague Fighters at Work - Seventy men and four officers are fighting the plague in Porto Rico, and twenty-five men and five officers are guarding the exits of the island that the disease may not be carried to the United States.

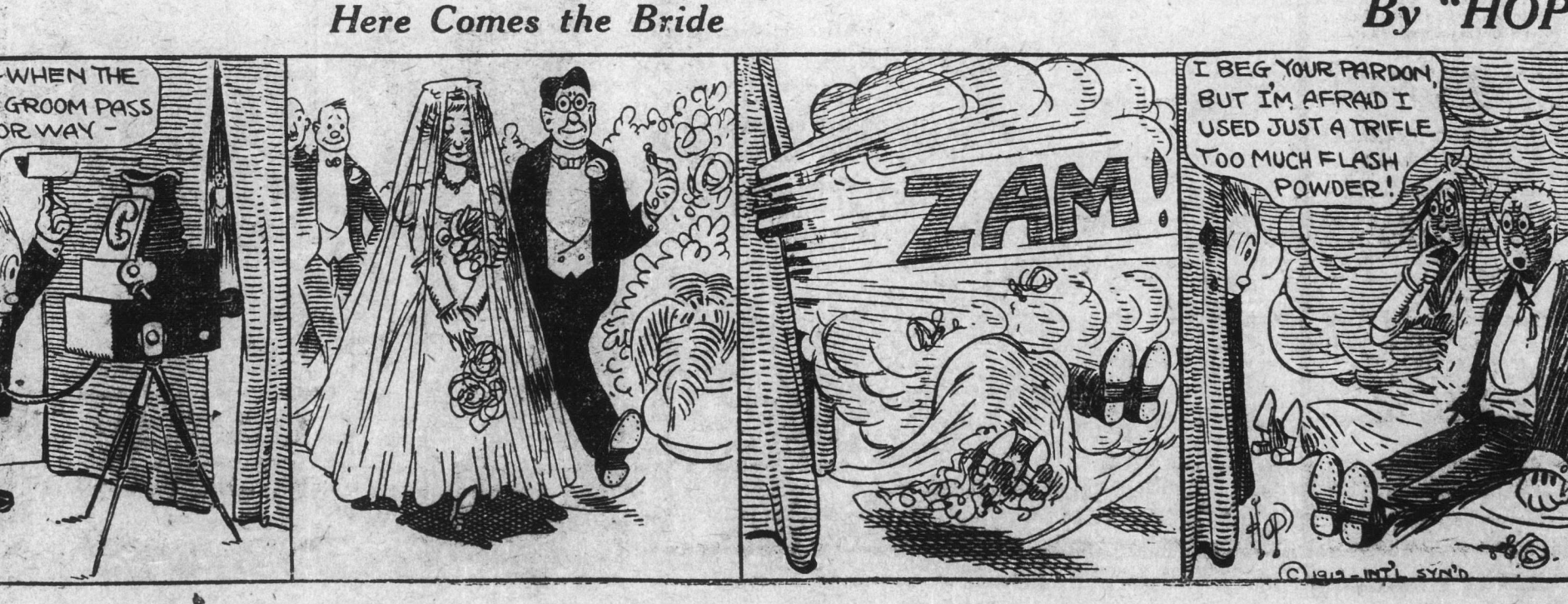

THE MARKETS

POWER RETAINS A STRONG HOLD IN MONTREAL

Went to New High Ground, But Big Turnover Reduced Its Net Gain

Tramway Also Feature; Market Strong but Leisurely and Not Much Trading

Montreal, July 20.—Saturday's market in listed securities was a leisurely affair, without any of the sensational features which had characterized it throughout the greater part of the week. The stock market was dull and, although trading became somewhat more active in the last hour, the business for the session footed up only a little over 2,000 shares.

Not changes for the day were small and irregular, with the undertone of the market continuing strong.

Montreal Power retained its leadership and gave a display of quiet strength, selling within a 1/4 of its high price of the previous day and 1/4 at the close, showing a gain of 1 point on the day. Shawinigan, on the other hand, was weaker, declining 1/2 point to 151 1/2, and 151 being bid at the close, as compared with 152 1/2 on Friday.

Richelleu was next in price to Power but developed only a range of 1/4 of a point on a turnover of about 500 shares.

Detroit was quiet between 74 and 73. Canadian car reacted one point to 88, and Toronto was 4 lower.

Spanish river common was stronger with a gain of one point to 61, and that price bid at the close.

Canadian Power advanced one point to 98, but the bid of the advance was lost at the close.

Montreal cottons moved up 1/2 point to 59 1/2, and closed strong at 57 1/2 bid. Unlisted securities made up for lack of turnover of 2,000 shares was productive of a net gain of only 1/4. A few shares of tramway common, changed hands at 105, and no stock was offered to the bid of 104 1/2 at the close. Wayagamac common rose 1/2 points to 40 and closed 39 1/2, while the bonds made a gain of 3/4 points to 79, closing at the top.

As compared with a turnover for the morning in the regular market of 9,510 shares, 1,390 mining shares and 4,566 bonds, the listed clearing house and 4,760 bonds.

Winnipeg Markets Flat

Winnipeg, July 20.—The wheat market today was as dull and slow as it had been previous to the war news scare. Options opened 1/4 lower for July and 1/2 lower for October.

The closing prices were: Minneapolis, 1/4 lower for July, September 1 1/2, and December 1/2 lower. Chicago closed 1/4 to 1 1/2 lower and weak in tone. Coarse grains were steady, corn unchanged to 1/2 lower, and oats 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher.

Continental cables were erratic, while Liverpool cables were low. The Winnipeg cash demand was quiet for all grades, while offerings were more liberal and export inquiry quiet. Receipts were very light, only 175 cars delivered in sight for inspection. Cash grades were: Wheat 5,000 bushels, oats 9,000.

GENERAL RISE IN PRICES

Quotations on Pending Orders Withdrawn to That End, It is Said

New York Exchange Dull and Heavy; Some of Firmness Lost; Leaders Sagged

New York, July 20.—Heaviness and dullness attended today's two-hour session on the stock exchange. The list seemed to have lost some of its recent firm underlines, several of the standard issues reflecting a degree of pressure. Steel shares were inclined to sag, but no more so than such other leaders as Reading, Union Pacific, and Amalgamated copper.

In fact, the market showed a tendency to sag much from neglect or indifference by the professional element as from any other cause.

General news was meagre, but most favorable. One of the largest steel corporations' subsidiaries issued notice of a dollar per ton advance next week in wire and allied products, while makers of wrought-iron pipe were reported to have withdrawn quotations on pending orders preliminary to a general rise in prices. There were also the week-end statements of the mercantile agencies, confirming other statements bespeaking increasing optimism in trade.

Week-end covering by shorts held corn comparatively steady until late in the day when values sagged on account of rains in Nebraska, where drought complaints had been heard. Cash grades were only in fair demand.

Wet weather in harvest sections helped the price of oats, the greater part of the time. So did the fact that the last of the stock of oats in public elevators here had been shipped out. Nevertheless, the market weakened in the end with other grains.

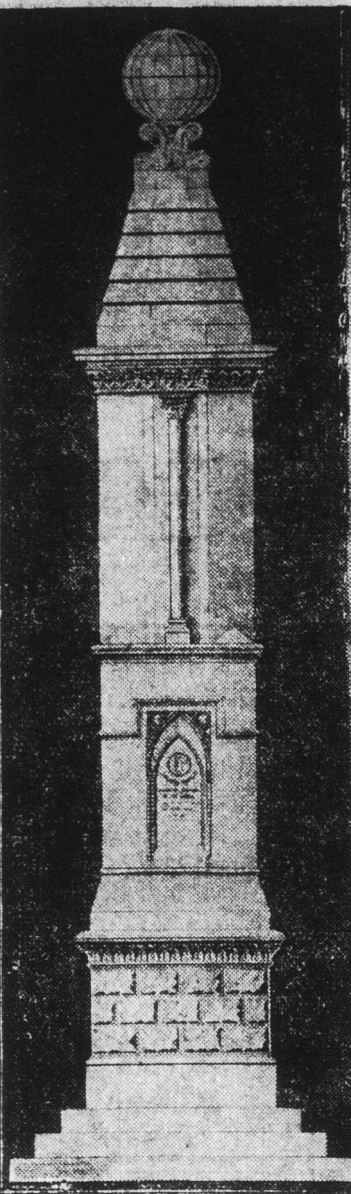

JUNE BANK STATEMENT

During the month of June the banks increased their reserve to \$101,031,186, namely by \$182,338. The amount of bank notes in circulation June 29 was \$162,011,044 or \$192,515 more than on the 31st. On the other hand the average amount of Dominion notes held by the banks shows a shrinkage of \$1,846,490. Current account deposits are returned at \$373,500,159, a net decrease 25 at \$201,317,887. The banks liabilities during the month of \$3,698,928. Savings deposits in the banks, however, increased by \$4,023,343, standing on June were increased by \$15,334,939 and the assets by \$26,274,411. The amount of loan on call in Canada on stocks and bonds at the end of June was \$48,701,885, an increase of \$396,998 call loans by Canadian banks amounting to the sum of \$170,569,812, an increase of \$4,787,076. A significant sign of confidence in the business situation and outlook is the increase of \$11,457,539 in current loans, which at the close of the month stood at \$484,940,089. Comparison of the return for last month with the statement for June, 1911, shows that the banks in the 12 months increased their paid-up capital by \$11,423,231. Their reserves were increased by \$4,827,474. Their note circulation by \$13,392,149, their call loans in Canada by \$7,134,687, their call loans abroad by \$22,704,412 and their current loans in Canada by \$11,070,776. During the year also, current deposits in the banks increased by \$63,785,335 and savings deposits by \$66,450,133.

TORONTO EXCHANGE CLOSED

Toronto, Ont., July 20.—All the local stock exchanges were closed today on account of the funeral of the late R. A. Smith.

CONSOLS IMPROVED

London, July 20.—There was a slight improvement in consols today, but the international situation is considered serious since the war trouble really approached the Dardanelles. It is believed among shipping men that the matter is approaching a point when it will have to be stopped.

Money was steady today, but there is a new bid in for more funds on the European industrial investment account. All stocks were steadier, though actual trading was light. United States securities moved irregularly through changes were not material.

UNITED STATES OUGHT TO ARBITRATE CANAL DISPUTE

Daily News, the Principal Organ of the Asquith Government, Says That is the Only Way to Dispose of It

London, July 21.—In an editorial on the Panama Canal bill, the Daily News, the principal ministerial organ, says that apparently the United States Senate means to pass the bill without heed of the British government's protest, adding:

"Perhaps the senators think that in its present form the bill makes no distinction, but it certainly could stand very diverse interpretations. That, however, is not a satisfactory attitude for if the senators do not wish to discriminate, surely they ought to make their intention as clear in the bill as possible.

"It is more probable that they think congress has the right to discriminate under the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. That is not the British view, and we have a difference of opinion as to the meaning of the international agreement.

"There is only one permissible way to dispose of this conflict, and that is by arbitration. Neither America nor Great Britain wishes to violate any engagement, and both countries are anxious to carry out its agreement in the spirit and in the letter where there is a difference of opinion as to its true character.

"The obvious solution is to submit the issue to an impartial judge.

"That course should be taken if the bill as it leaves congress turns out to be in conflict with the British view bearing on the Hay-Pauncefote treaty."

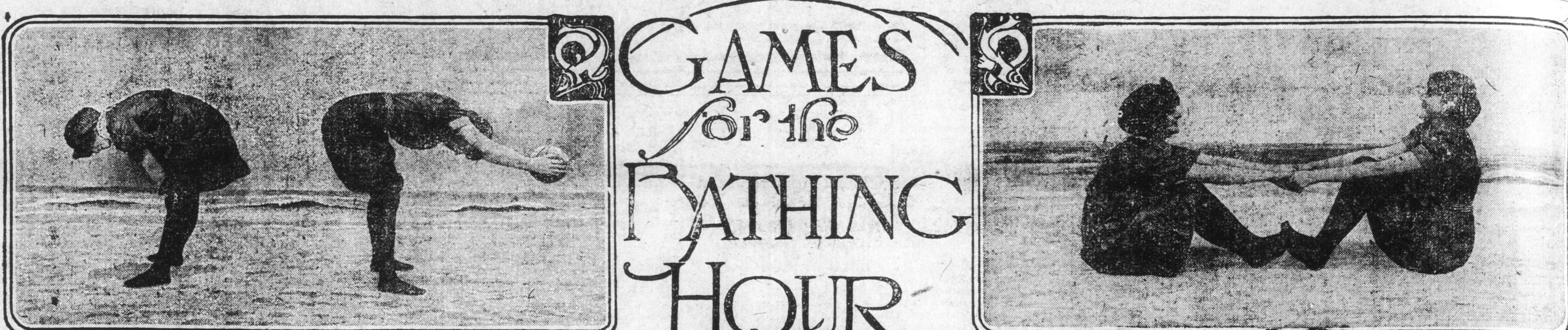

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WINNIPEG FIRE LOSS CLOSE TO MILLION, MOSTLY COVERED BY INSURANCE

Theory Advanced Was Caused by Tramps Throwing Down Lighted Matches

Mobs Known to Have Slept in Sheds Near Scene of the Greatest Loss

Water Pressure Said to Have Been Inadequate or Loss Much Less.

Winnipeg, July 21.—Exactly how much damage was done by the fire in the street yesterday morning will not be known for several days.

"I should think that the total loss will be something like a million dollars," said Mr. Champlin, of Messrs. Champlin and White, last night.

"My belief is that if the water pressure had been adequate our building would have been saved.

"I am sure that the fire did not start in our building, because when I got on the scene our premises was intact, as far as I could see.

"I would not be at all surprised if the fire was caused by tramps throwing down lighted matches, as I know they sleep in sheds about the city.

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DELAY ADOPTION OF TYPE OF THE SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT, IS ADVICE

Commission to Examine Regina System Would See First, What Effect Frost Has

Plant Apparently Adequate and Satisfactory if Freezing Does Not Affect It

Also Inspected Saskatoon Filtration System, Which is Highly Praised

Mayor Mitchell and the Other Members of Commission Return from Trip

That it would be well for Calgary to wait and watch the operation of the Regina sewage disposal system this winter before adopting one of that type, is the opinion of the party including Mayor Mitchell, City Engineer Child and Alderman McDougall, who inspected the plant at the Saskatchewan capital.

It appears that the principal drawback to the operation of the Regina sewage disposal plant is likely to be the effect of frost, in the opinion of those who inspected it.

Apparently the only objection to the method is the length of time necessary for the treatment of the sewage. It appears to us that frost is likely to cause trouble in this operation as the building that houses the machinery is not frost proof and covering a large area of ground, to make it frost proof would necessitate a large, substantial, and costly building.

High Praise for Saskatoon Filter. The sewage disposal system at Saskatoon is the best in the province, according to the report of the commission.

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ASQUITH RECIPIENT OF ANOTHER OVATION; THE SUFFRAGETTES APPEAR, ARE QUELLED

Great Crowds Welcome Premier in Dublin; Declares Will Send Home Rule Bill to House of Lords by Christmas; Says the End is in Sight

DUBLIN, July 21.—Premier Asquith Friday was the recipient of another ovation at the hands of the Dublinites. Both inside and outside the Theatre Royal where he made an address, Mr. Asquith, who was accompanied by his wife, was greeted by enormous crowds who repeated the welcome they gave him last night.

John Redmond, the leader of the Nationalists, in introducing the premier to his auditors, said that such a reception never hitherto had been accorded to any cabinet minister and never again would be until Mr. Asquith came to Dublin attending the king to open an Irish parliament.

Mr. Asquith's speech was interrupted at times by male and female suffragettes, several of whom were violently ejected from the theatre. While matters were proceeding smoothly inside the theatre, things were happening outside. The suffragette demonstration was in full blast when the police set upon the demonstrators and for a few minutes it looked as if a full sized riot, but it was soon quelled.

The suffragettes were thoroughly frightened by the onslaught of the police and were glad to seek refuge in the streets and in the vacant lots adjacent.

MISSIONARY'S ADVENTURES

There are no saloons, no grog shops, no billiard tables and only one hotel in a population of some 16,000 people, the streets are always quiet. Brigham Young, not at all a bad looking man, not only received him hospitably, but invited him to take the morning service in his own tabernacle adding: "You may have my chair and choose your own hymns. You may say what you like and do what you please."

And so probably, on the only occasion in the history of the Tabernacle, an Anglican clergyman preached to the assembly of Mormons with 3,000 people before him and behind him the "apostles" and "elders." The incident, however, prepared the way for the advent of Anglican missionaries into the district.

Dr. Sheepsheads' openmindedness in matters of belief is revealed in his remark on this occasion that in many lands, among various nationalities and creeds, he has always found that "if people have a good sound conscience and try genuinely and heartily to do up to what they believe they become nice and good people, even though their code of belief be deficient and even in some respects quite erroneous."

INDIA FOR THE CROWN

George V. Would Not Take Gems from Princes for His Durbar Crown

(By La Marquise de Fontenay) According to official reports just received, it is India, and not the British treasury, which has paid the cost of the crown jewels of the British crown, made in London for the king to wear at the durbar of Delhi. There is a curious story in connection with this crown, which is now lodged, along with the other crown jewels, in the tower of London. It seems that when the king's voyage to India was first projected a movement was started for the presentation to the king-emperor at the durbar of an imperial crown, the jewels of which were to be contributed by the following states and princes:

It was proposed that the native princes should each provide some gem from their treasury, and that the crown should be made of gold and silver, and that the native prince could come in with a monetary subscription, which would provide a reasonable imperial crown. The mover of the scheme was the Maharaja, Sir Pradyot Tagore, representative of the great land-holding classes of Bengal, and belonging to an ancient family.

It met with the greatest enthusiasm, one prince, pre-eminent for his joy, being anxious to give the king his "off his own hat"—I mean the Nizam of Hyderabad, who has probably the finest and most numerous jewels of any Indian ruler. But King George discouraged the plan, and at his instance the movement was quietly stopped.

Who Won Waterloo? Visitors to the British Museum and Germans are somewhat puzzled to find at St. James a handsome monument, inscribed as follows: To the immortal memory of the famous day of June 20, 1815, on which, by the resolution and activity of the Belgians and their famous General William Frederick George Prince of Waterloo, a terrible conflict on the Plains of Waterloo, when the battalions of the French had been routed on every side, the peace of the world was secured.
