

BOMBARDMENT OF VLADIVOSTOCK

The Japanese Admiral Recounts Action of Last Sunday Afternoon.

Tokio, March 11.—The full report of Vice Admiral Kemimura, who commands the second Japanese squadron, mands the second Japanese squadron, says:

"As prearranged, we reached the east entrance to Vladivostock on the morning of March 6th through a frozen sea. The enemy's ships were not seen outside the harbor. We approached the batteries on the northeast coast from a point beyond the range of the batteries on the Baiysan promontory and Bosphorus strait. After bombarding the inner harbor forty minutes from 1.50 oclock in the afternoon, we retired. I believe the bombardment effected considerable damage.

PINGYANG ON THE YALU.

The announcement that, after doing some scouting south of the Yalu, the Russians have recrossed that river into Manchurie, seems to discredit the story of a few days ago that their army had advanced to Pingyang—a story which we doubted at the time. The explanation probably lies in a confusion of the names of the city of Pingyang and the province of Pingyang. The moment the Russians crossed the Yalu they were in the province of Pingyang, but the city of that name was still a hundred miles to the south. It is true that just before the outbreak of the war the Japanese government directed all its citizens in the northern part of that country to move southward at least as far as Wonsan. Friendly Help **Annual Meeting**

Financial Statement and Sec retary's Report Prove Interesting Reading.

Presidents' Report Shows Asso. ciation Did Good Work During Year.

(From Sunday's Daily.)

The ninth annual meeting of the Friendly Help Association was held in the City hall yesterday at 2:30, there being a good attendance. The president's address was as follows:

With a record of nine years' successful work, the Friendly Help Association needs no words in a president's address either to explain its objects or to solicit the sympathy and support of the public. The organization and methods are acknowledged to be satisfactory, and while there is no large increase of work to record, the committee is thankful to be able to show a good account at this, its minth annual meeting.

is thankful to be able to show a good account at this, its minth annual meeting.

The treasurer's report, while it is most satisfactory, might show a larger balance. There is never any money in hand—it is a case of spending as soon as we receive, and while we have never been unable to meet our expenses, we sometimes have to lessen the amount of orders for lack of money. The grant made by the city amounts almost to the same, but a large addition to the receipts might be made if some of our friends would send an annual subscription to the general funds as well as in response to the special appeal that is made at Christmas time.

Another increase of income would be available if more people would interest themselves by taking a collecting card or by contributing to those who have them. We have a few young friends who materially help in this way, and we wish others would follow their example. Ten children collecting from ten people ten cents a month would enable us to add largely to our orders for groceries and fuel.

We have now to make it a rule not to give any help to single men, only because the funds are limited; often when out of work these men need assistance as much as those who have homes of their own.

There is still a need of more workers; to undertake a district means systematic and regular visiting. No relief is given without the recommendation of the lady in charge of the district, and if she is not acquainted with the people under her care, it means that those who need assistance would often remain unknown. There are a number of people here, as everywhere, who will not ask for help and yet need it sonely. Only by the regular calling of the district visitor, where she can show herself friendly and interested, can those who, without having their names published, have been helped in their hour of need.

There is also a work waiting to be done in the regular visiting of the cabins in the city. For some time it was

For some time it was done most successfully, but now only a few cases are looked after which come especially under our notice, and a visitor in charge of a large district has not the time to give to this work.

The usual annual appeal is now made to housekeepers who before long will be employed in turning out their homes for spring cleaning. Every kind of article of furniture, as well as clothing for men, women and children, will be thankfully received, and may be sent to the rooms on Monday, Wednesday or Friday between the hours of 11

Many and varied are the opportunities for "friendly helping," which although they cannot be described in a report, show quite clearly the usefulness of such an organization. While fully appreciating the willing work of all our helpers, we feel we must especially acknowledge that of our indefatigable treasurer, who is really the mainspring of the association. Keeping the accounts is the easiest part of her work; the time that she spends in interviews with provincial and civic authorities in making arrangements of every kind—in receiving and giving orders—in correspondence and telephones, make as feel we owe a special debt of gratitude to Miss Lawson, which it is impossible to express in words. Her work is a labor of love and one that is thoroughly appreciated by us all.

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
