The defendant appealed yesterday and their lordships quashed the conviction on the following grounds: (1) That Robertson had offered to support his wife if she returned to him; (2) that the proper place for a wife is at her husband's side, and the husband is not bound to support her unless she lives with him; (3) that a citizen of the United States cannot be sued in Canada for non-support of his wife.
