#### AN INTERESTING RELIC.

A 12-Foot Log That Formed a Portion of a Beaver Dam. Mr. John Langstaff brought into The World office yesterday a log which for over 100 years has formed a portion of an ancient beaver dam.

The dam was built in the Don, near where Vocas and the state of the state o

where Yonge-street crosses that stream at Thornhill, long before the city of Toronto was thought of. Mr. Langstaff gives this interesting story of the old

dam:

"Old settlers have told me that the beaver dam existed in 1794. In 1801 John Lyons built, a dam to secure power for a sawmill. The back water submerged the beaver dam completely. The saw mill changed hands several times and in 1878 a big freshet washed away the dam, but left the work of the beavers intact and showing above the water. In May of this year the floods caused by the heavy rains carried away part of the beaver dam, and part of this log,12 feet long, was carried down. I sawed a portion of it off and this is it. It was undoubtedly cut by the beavers, and the pointed ends show their peculiar method of felling trees."

Terrible Sufferings of the Peary Expedition. New York Sept, 18.—A special from St. John's, Newfoundland, says: The inner history, of the Peary expedition is coming to light. The members of the expedition endured great privations. They were compelled to eat walrus food and burn part of their house for fuel.

A tidal wave in Falcon harbor last october swept away a large part of the expedition with the intended to use for fuel, having special stoves to burn it. Part of this stock afterwards was recovered, but the supply of oil was exhausted in March, the worst period of the Arctic winter. From that time until August the cooking and eating had to be done with walrus and easi blubbers.

The discomfort of this was accentuated by the condition of Anniversary Lodge, the house in which the expedition wintered. It was totally unfit for a habitation. 
