



#### Spelling By Sound

The simplified spelling board of the United States has had another sion and recommends a change in the orthography of some one to be adopted. No one can doubt the educational object which the reformers have in view, but their work if extended and gradually adopted will result in another confusion in the polyglot language of the English

It is really too bad that the orthography of the language is so complex that a large proportion of the time of the average boy or girl at school is of necessity devoted to the study of spelling, and it is a matter for further regret that there are so few, comparatively speaking, who acquire proficiency in the art. Yet no effective remedy has ever been suggested Phonetic spelling, while it might lessen the difficulty in one department, would more than double it in

The English language abounds in dialects. Let spelling by sound become general and we would soon have as many different forms of written language as there are varieties of pronounciations, and what was written by one class would be as Greek to another. Besides this the literature of the present day would become as unintilligible to the masses as the books printed in the old English period. No one could read them without at least some degree of special training.

Ex-President Roosevelt is an enthusiastic advocate of spelling reform. When he was in the White House he attempted to introduce simplified spelling into the state documents and records but the members of congress promptly sat down on the proposition. Spelling reform like everything else designed in the in the interests of human progress, meets with serious opposition at the outset, but unfortunately for the hopes of the promoters the points against it appear to be well taken.



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

#### NOTE AND COMMENT.

Two thousand four hundred farmers went to school on their farms in North Dakota during 1912. The pupils ranged in age from 10-yearold boys to gray-headed men. They studied scientific agriculture under the direction of a faculty of thirty farmer experts. Fifty thousand dollars was spent by the North Dakota Better Farming Association during the last year in an effort to give the farmers of that state practical lessons in scientic farming.

To find out what is in your seed grain, handpick a couple of quarts of it some evening. Spread out thinly on a table, and, with a knife, separate the weed seeds and other grains from the sample of barley, or oats or wheat, as the case may be. The man who does that will find a larger percentage of impurities than he dreamed of, and will never after have any difficulty in accepting the botanist's assurance that the chess plants in his fall wheat have sprung from unsuspected chess seeds in the grain he sowed. The chess is hardy and when the wheat kills out it survives, stools, occupies the ground, and multiplies enormously. Sow absolutely clean seed in clean land and you will never have chess.

#### Revision of Marriage Act

Toronto, April 3.—The Ontario Government has introduced their proposal toward the revision and improvement of the Provincial Marriage Act, and as expected several of the clauses are of a drastic and far-reaching nature.

Foremost in interest and importance is the clause which ordains that for three successive weeks immediately preceding

the clanse which ordains that for three successive weeks immediately preceding the application for the marriage license, the notice of its approach be published in a local publication. In the case neither of the parties had for the preceding 15 days lived there, the license would be issued on the affidavit of one of the parties stating that this regulation had been complied with.



#### WAR ON SPARROWS.

Dainty Dishes winds From the Common Little Bird.

The fiat has gone forth at last. We must "tick off" the far too numerous sparrows somehow or anyhow, and we must eat them as "sparrows on toast," in pies, etc.

in pies, etc.

Two or three years ago it was stated that farmers of the Golden West had taken a leaf out of the French bon vivant's book. Lately, sparrow pies have become quite the correct thing in London, although on some hotel and restaurant menus they pass under a different name. Some diners-out have pronounced the sparrow's breast to be as palatable as that of the much-prized quail.

Sparrow catching has, for the mo-

ment, found employment for a great number of men and boys, who supply an ever-open market. But the fashion of sparrow fare may not last as long as some suppose.

Then is the "spadger" doomed? Its

name has not yet appeared in any Birds' Protection Act schedule, and some critics imagine that our last littile lot of respect for the "Bible bird" has gone, seeing that even local auth-ority in agricultural districts has been obliged to cope with the nuisance.

There are farmers and garden who readily admit that the black-listed

sparrow has something standing to his credit because he annexes many injurious insects and well-seeds. Up to the present there is hardly a perceptible diminution in fields and farmyards of the ravenous hordes, notwithstanding that sparrow and rat clubs are in many parts of the king-dom busy accounting for thousands of

heads each year.

Very good-pies may be made all the year round from sparrows, though we concede that Autumnal sparrows from the harvest fields are fattest and

For one pie let the inspired cook take twenty sparrows, cut the skin near the thighs, and, without defeathnear the thighs, and, without defeathering, pull it over the body and head. Each bird is "drawn," the head and back cut off, and split down the breast; for, as with rooks, sparrow flesh is bitter near the backbone. You have then got merely the breasts, which choice morsels place in a stew jar, with thin slices of beefsteak and jar, with thin slices of beetsteak and some water, adding pepper and salt. Cook gently until tender, then lay steak around the pie-dish. Make second layer with the breasts and slice of hard-boiled egg alternately, and

prace a strip of bacon atop each to keep it moist. Add stock to fill the dish, cover with a pork-pie crust, and bake in a moderate oven.

The rough, unsightly pieces may be put aside to use at once.

#### Ireland To-day

Perhaps the most striking evidence of the change in the relationship of Ireland to the other divisions of the United Kingdom has been provided by the special Irish number of The London Times, published on St. Patrick's Day. While it is, of course, impossible to endow a newspaper with a seperate individuality, apart from the person or persons who control its policy for the time being, the attitude of the great London daily is a significant sign of the times. This special Irish supplement is wholly sympathetic in its tone, and is pervaded by a sentiment that can only be regarded as the presage of a new era in the history of the United Kingdom.

That a change has come over the whole condition of Ireland is undoubted, and has nowhere been better revealed than in the marked decrease in the volume of emigration. With the reassertion of the national spirit has come a marked improvement in agriculture and industry, which is not wholly attributable to the improved political outlook. Behind the demand for a greater measure of Home Rule there has been a real awakening to the necessity for internal development. Towards that end both public and private measures and organizations have contributed.

Within the opening years of the twentieth century many instrumentalities have been established for the encouragement of Irish agriculture and manufactures. What has been already done, The Times says, ounts truly to an almost incredible revolution; nor is the work entirely finished." While agriculture and its various subsidiaries, such as horse, cattle and pig raising, have been highly profitable, the expansion in manufactures has been still more encouraging. This material advancement has been accompanied by a remarkable resurrection of the literary and artistic spirit of Ireland. In Wales a similar recrudescence of national sentiment is observable, and the resultant social and intellectual revival may well furnish the inspiration that will add a new page in the great volume of human history.


