[^1]-It is not difficult to see that the slightest items of expense in the selling of the necessaries of life are looked after and held in check with even greater care in the large consuming tentres than in lie producing districts. Such items go lar in either making a success or failure of many new enterprises. Mr. Hirrison Watson, curator of the Canadian section of the Limperial Institute, London, Eng., Lats forwarded the following information, supplied by one of the largest retailers of dairy products in England, for the benefit of Canadian shippers: "With reference to butter put up in cardboard boxes, I beg to say the package was a most excellent one, very neat and nice, but as a commercial speculation 1 doubt its answering. 'lhe trade prefer to put up their butter in their own packages, and in many cases make use of the box as an advertisement. Boxes are ouly used when customers carry the article trom where purchased, and the great portion of butter in and about London is delivered without any box. Ihe competition of the present day is so severe that the trade have to study every little expense. There is no better system of packing butter in the loondon market than that of a square box, containing 56 pounds, and care shoukd be taken that at least $501 / 2$ pounds should be put in the box to avoid claims for short weight." Mr. Watson also reports that a London lirm is willing to take up a bigh-elass trade in Canadian baccon.
-'The stock, fixtures, book debts, etc.; of the insolvent firm ol Glover \& Brais, Montreal, were disposed of by auction on the 27th ult. The wholesale stock, valued at \$77,000 , was sold at 67 cents in the dollar. Stock and fixtures of the retail store, value, $\$ 21,000$, were sold at 47 eents in the dollar. Book debts and bills receivable, amounting to $\$ 34,000$, brought $583 / 4$ cents in the dollar.
-Ät Crambrook, B.C., the general store firm of Maggs \& Hughes, has assigned. The business was started March, '00, the former being previously with the liudson Bay Company.

Bxeell passed away after being $\mathbf{5 0}$ years in business. Ile wats well-known and highly respeeted. -Work on the various new enterprises at Sanit Ste. Marie, Ont., is progressing rapidly. In common with the drawback encountered by many firms in the past year the delay in ubtaining strucluzal iron was accountable for much loss of time, but this has been overcome. A visitor from the "Soo," in 'loronto, recently stated that the reduction works will be partly completed by June 1, when a portion of them at least will be immediately utilized in the


 smelting of copper and niekel. When completed this mill will hande one thousand tons of ore per day and employ 1,500 men. The ralway enterprises of the company are progressing equally rapidy. Jen miles of the line connecting the great Helen iron mine at Mielipicoten with the Q.l.S. at Missumbic are now completed, while the whole forty miles will be finished by April. 1. The company has also commenced the construction of the Algoma Central Rativay from the Saull to Missanibe, where 700 men are now at work. This mumber will be inereased by 2,000 by April 1. Jt is stated there is some difficulty in getting workmen. The Ontario Govermment will be asked to cooperate in obtaining imnigration for the purpose of getting workmen and settlers for the Algoma district. Special efforts will he made to obatin setters from the British Isles, as Euglish-speaking men are preferred. Men are needed now in the eonstruction work, and will be needed later in the mills, but in aldition to that famers are wanted. At present humdreds of enrloads of farmers' produce are imported into the district annually for consumption as food. When the population is increased by many thousands of artisans, ats it will soon be, the need will be much greater, and any settlers who go on lunds there will be asssured of a grood price for all products.

## BEET SUGAR INDUSTRY.

The encouragement given the proposed new beet sugat industry in Canada as referred to in a recent issue has been productive of benefit in so fur as getting the matter into nore practical shape. A number of those interested in the industry at a recent mecting in 'loronto elected the following officers: I'resident, John Parry, Dunnville, Ont., First VicePresident, Dr. Meltaughlin, ex-NL.P.P., Bowmanvile; Second Trice-President, V. T3. Freeman, Wiarton; Third Vice-l'resident, A. Tilshie, Mount Forest; Fourth Vice-Iresident, W: S. Caron, Aylmer; Secretary-'I'reasurer, D. It. Price, Aylmer; Excutive Committee, the above ofthcers and Mayor Smith, of Chathara, Hugh Bain, Joronto; E. R. Blow, Whitby; Mayor Ramsay, Dumville; Mayor McCallom, Welland; Ceorge E. Bristol, Hamilton; Harvey O. Kennedy, Wiarton; Johin A. Auld, M.P.P., Amherstburg; D. W. Stenvurt, Mount Eorest; E. IV. Rathbun, Descronto. A deputation of orev 100 from the convention waited upon the Cabinet and asked for the granting of a bounty of one cent a pound for five years, on all beet sugar made in the province. All the members of the Cabinet were present, as well as a harge number of the members of the regislature. The deputation was introduced by Mayor Parry of Dunville, white in addition arguments were given by Mr. Memullen of Watertown, N.L.; Dr. Motaughln, Bowmaville; Mir. Lugh Blain, Toronto; Ar. W. S. Caron, Aylmer; Mayor Smith, of Chatham, Mr. Freeman of Wiarton, and others.

The speakers represented that a graduated bounty beginning at one cent a pound was necessany for a period of five years, to give the industry a stant, as for some time after beginning it would be necessury to spend considerable money in educating the lamers on beet culture. Dre Wiley, chemist in the U.S. Department of Agriculture, wats quoted as saying luat Canada, and not the United States, was the centre of the hect sugar belt of the continent. In answer to a question be the Premier, Mre Blan statel he thought the price of sugar in Ontario wonld be lowered to the eonsumers if the beet sugar indusiry were encouraged here. The adrantages of the by-product of pulp as a cattle food were also emphasized. The Premier promised to cons:der the mattor. "Ihe meeting in the morning passed the following resolution: "Ihis convention is of the opinion that the Provincial Government should grant a bounty for the encouragement of the bect sugur industry."

## DEDAMPMCENTAT' SILORE DECISTON

The Supreme Court of alissouri U.S., has decided in farour of departmental stores in an action taken in the summer of ' 99 with a view to making such stores pay heavy licenses. This will, in all probmbility, end the discussion of imposing restraints on departmental stores in the united States for the present. The following view was taken by the Court: "Tf the selling of the diflerent articles emmernted in any one of the groups desiguated by the act is innocent and harmess when pursued separately as a business, how does if become harmfin mind dangerons merely becouse the articles in two or more, classes or groups designated in the act become mited for sale under one unit of management?
"If the terms life, liberty, and property, as used in the constifution, are 'representative terms, and cover every right to which a member of the body politic is entitled under the law, and that within this comprehensive scope are embraced the right to buy and sell as others may: and to pursue such honest ealling, vocation, or business as the citizen may choose, suljeet only to such restraints on the imposition of such burdens as may be required or imposed for the general grood, and, if 'due process of law,' is to be defined as 'the law of the land,' designed to protect and preserve the rights of the citizen agninst arbitrary legislation, as well as against arbitrary executive or judicial action, then 'due process of law' is denied when any particular person of a class or of the community is singled out for the imposition of burdenss not imposed upon and to be borne by all of the elass, or of the community at large, unless the imposition, or restraint, be based upon existing distinetions that differentiate the particular individuals or the class to be affected, from the body of the community, and this question as to whether the persons thus designater constitute it natural or a reasonable class depends upon facts which the court passing upon the validity or invalidity of the legislation must determine upon.

VICTORY ON MAJUBA HILL DAY. JムADYSMITH RELIEYED.

The surrender of General Cronje on the $2 \gamma$ th February is one of those historic events which was so dramatic as to strike and impress the inagination with a force beyond its mere importance. There is indeed no record of a crushing blow having been given on a certain day by one power to another, and, on the amniversary of that day the blow heing returned-with interest. On the 27 th Februmry, 1881, a small British army was annihilated by the Boers on the upper slopes and erest of Majuba Hill. On the 27 th February, 1900, the Boer General, Cronje, with 4:7 officers, and his whole army, survendered unconditionally to a British force, after frightful slaughter in the trap they had been driven nto. Roberts and Kitchener had perfect confidence in their having put the Boer army where escape was impossible, and where reinforcenents could not reach without also being entrapped. To attack men in so hopeless a position seemed more like a battuc than war. As General Cronje, with characteristic contempt for human life, not only refused to surrender, but kept up a vain but dangerous fire at his captors, General Roberts had no option but to return the fire in order to compel his captive to lay down his arms. At day-break on Majuba Hill Day, which for 1.9 yenrs was the Boers' annual Thanksgiving Day, a force made up of British regulars and Canadiuns secured a position close to the Bocr lint. This proved the crisis, as, on their appeanance the Boer Genemen sont a message into the British camp announcing his surender without conditions. The usual formalities at once followed, the sword of General Cronje wis handed to Tord Roberts, and the British flag flonted over a camp occupied by some 4,000 , ilisarmed and disheartenen Boers. This vietory adds another fenther to each of the alrendy richly-adorned eaps of Gencrals Roberts and Kitchener. It scts a large army liree to co-operate with the forces under General Buller, by whose combined action Ladysmith is certain to be relieved. The result of this will be, the addition of a turther 10,000 or 12,000 men to the British army in Natal. Whether General Joubert will make a stand against so powerful a combination has yelt to be seen. But, from present appearances, he will either have to fight or surrender, but most likely, he will have to take each course in succession. The bravery shown by Canadian troops in this war have won the highest encomiums of the Generals in commanid. Lord Roherts speaks in one message of their "conspicnous gallantry." In the British Fouse of Commons, and in the House of Lords, the allusion to Canadians in the message read elicited loud cheers. In all the chief cities
of Great Britain there have been public demonstrations of pride in Canadian loyalty, and most enthusiastic tributes paid to the courage of Canadian soldiers. Every British home "gentle and simple," palace and cot, has rung with praises of this Dominion and its gallant sons. Leading journals are calling for some Imperial monument of unrivalled magnificence being erected in honour of Canada, Australia and New Zealand, whose help of the Empire in time of need is Reclared to have done more to consolidate the British Empire than all the netions of statesmen ever accomplished or could ever hope to achieve. Joln Bull, with all his faults, is not "An ab-sent-minded beggar." The best he has will not be too good for Canadians.
In view of the opinion having been expressed by some that the war will create an ineradicable fend between British and Dutch, it is well to remember that about lwo centuries ago a : Dutch army marched throngh the south of England, entered London, and helped in putting a Dutcloman on the British throne. Their descendants have become Britoms in the fullest sense. On the streets of this city also there are eminent citizens who remember their Dutch ancestry with pride, than whom the Queen has no more loyal subjects. England will lift the Boers to her own high plane of civilization, then, in good time, will transform them into ardent friends of the British Tmpire.
Since writing above the news has arrived of Ladysmith having been relieved. General Buller is admitted by German, Trench and other European critics of proBoer sympathies, to have had one of the hardest tasks ever undertaken by a military force. His triumph is thrilling the whole Empire with joy. Its moral effect will be incalculably favourable to the prestige of British arms. "Lord Buller of Ladysmith," is the title we prediet he will soon wear and honour.

The messages heard most cloarly are those spoken showly and distinctly in the nirlinary tmene of ennversation with a person clace at hamo. The teleghone is a very couricous intermediary betiveen spenkers, it
objects to messages spoken with noise and irritation. If speakers would remember this there would be fewer complaints of indislinctisess. We advise speakers through a 'phone to keep cool, to utter their words slowly and quietly. Subscribers would also aid in the accurate transmission of mesenges were they to bear in mind, that the Hello! girl is only anxious to carry out their wishes as rapidity and as aceurately as possible.

## BRIISTH AND AMERTCAN IRADE MWHPODS.

Betwen the methods alopted severally by the British and the dinericans to attract trade there is one marked "listinction." When a Yankee sees any new anticle of foreign mandaeture his first thought is how could that - be made in the siates so as to sell at a much lower price. When a Britisher sees any new article, his first thought is, how could it be improved in materials, workmanship, or design; consideration of price being quite a secondary matter. The ideal of one is, chempness, of the other, yuality: Both these fentures are attractive to trade. To the production of low-priced groods the United States and Germany each owe their manulacturing sucecss. Tho the maintenance of high qualities in her manfachures Great Britain is largely indebted for her vast industries. American and German mantfacturers have realized more than their British rivals how cnormons is the demand for low-priced goods.

There are numerois articles only intended for temporary service. To put good materials and costly workmanship inlo them is waste, justi as it would be to use silk for wrapping up groceries. T! things that perish rapidly in the using need ouly be equal to their temporary service. Recently we had need of an article to assist us in a tisk that occupied only is few hours. We found one of British make, for which $\$ 1.25$ was asked. It wals perfect of its kind, it was made to last for years. One of American make was ofiered at 90 cents, quite inferior to the British, hut :mply good enough for our sequirements. Now this article is in ilemand for short service, the Americans having canght on to this have put a cheap one in the market, the British have gone on making it strong enough to hatio in constant, use for a life time, without providing a second quality for ocensional, temporary we. 'This devotion to excellence of cuality by British manumeturers has given a chance to their foreign competitors that has been utilized to the builiting up of a large trade. Had the old eountiry makers leying equally ready to cater for whatever lastes were so prevalent, as to be creating it demand for cheiper classes of goods, they might have enlarged their ontput and checked the expansion ol: their loreign tivals' trade. 'lake, for instance, silver-plated wares, the Americans have adopted Thglish palterus, but they meet the popular fiucy for chenp, showy grods loy turning fhem out with the slight-. est coating of silver, almost thin enougl to be rubbed off: with in linger, like the bloom on a peach. The demand for cheap silver-phated groods is so large and so continuous as to sustain cxtensive estiolishments. Why should not Tritish makers cater for both markets, by making gooils to meet the popular call for cheapness, as well as as those required by buycus who are willing to pay for a higher quality: Tlliey can do this with eminent success even beating the Germans at their own game, when they try. Goods are on sale in this city mate in Englanil by speciar request to cut. out clocap Germin goods. Those
"made in Germany" are simply "not in it" compared with those made in England, so far as quality is concemed, and the English goods are cheaper, as well as far more serviceable. British manufacturers will find it to their advantage to recognize their being so general a demand for low-priced goods. Of their ability to supply these in successful competition with Germans or Americans, now British Goods have a rebate of 25 per cent. on Customs duties, we are perfectly confident. They may pity our tastes, but why should they deelinc cater to them, if thereloy money can be made:

Ihe company a considerable time ago, saw the desirability : of avoiding, as it wore, putling all its eggs in one basket, or, placing all its resources in one class of loans. The opportwities for placing money oi collatcrals of stocks, bonds, and debentures are much more limited than are those lor lending on mortgage securities. I'he field is indeed so limited and the competition of the banks so effective, that it would be unreasomble to cxpect other loan companies to model their business on the plan adopted by the Home Savings and Joan Co. It is a tribute to the foresight of its management that; it stepped in when the opportunity arose to secure a good share of the collateral lom business, and the shrewilness to recognize the strength given to in financial institution by having a large amount of assets readily convertible into cash. 'The profits from short time loans on stocks, bonds and secmilies of that class are not as large as on mortgages laving several years to rum, but, there are contingent risks associated with the latter husiness which not infrequently destroy all its profit and anvantages. Ilis som will, we trust, bring home even higher honour to himself and country. We deeply regret the absence brom the meeting of the President, Sir Frank Similh, than whom Canada has un more estimable son, nor one more universally beloved by all classes.

Bufore une cent of che assets of the abore ustate was available lor the creditors, to whom they equitably belonged, there was 59 cents on the dollar spent on legal proceedings, no less than 88.10 being paid as " costs of "prointing curators," and " $\$ 110.15$, costs of examining the msulyent!' 'I'he estate was in a bad enough condition under the best of winding-up arrangementis, but, as our correspondent's letter says, it was outrageous that two-thirds of the value of the estate should be spent betore the creditors had a chance to get a cent. A wisely framed Lusolvency ict would have enabled the above estate to be wound up at one-third of the cost.

It is one oll the most senseless of notions to suppose that trade can be carried on without credit being extended by merchants to customers. Had such an idea prevailed in carly timus this country would have remained undevcloped, as indeed would have every now civilized country. Lredit, for trade purposes, is equivalent to capital. Indeed where there is no credit there is no capital, for the forces which uecessitate and develop credit are esssential to the sale and profitable employment of capital, the two are as intimately corrclated as a dynamo and electric power.
I'o object to a wise Insolvency Act because it might tend to develop the credit system is analogous to objecting to the growth of tood products because of the dangers of gluttony, The most effectual restraint upou what evils arise from the mis-use of credit would be a good Insolvency Act, by which dishonest traders would be kept in lear of the law, and their assets would be expeditiously, equitably and economically distributed among the creditors. Where no Insolvency Act is in loree, credit is grossly abused, it is secured by the grossest frauds, and honest merchants are exposed to the mutrammelled and unpunishable depredations of a class of men who use credit for the same purposes as are the tools of a burglar:

## MCYCIT CONDITIONS AND PROSPECIS.

Tin the "Contemporary Review" for Jamary is in artiele on the condition and prospects of the bicyele industry. 'The opening sentence is, "We who are about to dic, salute you," a phrase, as our readers know, used by the doomed in the Coliscum, in the days when men fought with bensts, human and otherwise, to make sport for a Roman holiday erowd. The witer is well known in the bicycle world as an authority on all that pertains to that machine. He appears to lave become satiated with the enjoyments derivable from a rike. and is now looking forward to the joys of a now sensation." Jis riews are, however, worth considering by makcers and riders of bicyeles.

He denounces racing as having developed a standard style of bike which he condemns with ummensured severity. An eminent member of the Cyole lingineers' Tu-
stitute said at one of its recent meetings, "ILhe racing cycle has been and is the curse of the trade." Racing certainly has been productive of strong prejudices against the use of bikes, owing to the Irequency of accideats caused to riders and pedestrians." It has done harm also by a type of machine having become the standard in which comitort to the user, salety and wearing qualities are sacrificed to ensure mere speed. A bicycle indeed, in the minds of a large number of those who own one, is a machine for trausporting a person from nowhere in particular to some other indefinite point in the shortost possible time. In the judgment of cycle eugineers there has not been the slightest practical improvement made in bikes by those who have devoted their skill to pertecting them as racing machines, while they have sacrificed features more permanently attractive and valuable. What has been clone is much as though those who breed horses for the sadule, had taken up the busiuess of furmishing race horses instead of good steady roadsters, adapted for riding with comfort and salety and with all the speed required lor practical purposes. No sane man gallops at full speed through streets, as is done by bikers in this city.
I'he writer is especially severe in condemuing the free wheel, which he regards as, "an absurdity, being dangerous, complicated, useless, and nothing wure than au ubsolete lad." As he has ridden wheels of almost every make, in tours extending all over Burope, as well as throughout the United Kingdom, his judgment carries exceptional weight: He also condemus the general adoption of a standard pattern for bikes. This, he compares to there being a standard pattern lor clothes, regardless of men's sizes and variations in figure. Every rider ought, he says, to be measured for his bike and have it fitted to suit. I'his, we suppose, would create a bicycle industry akin to that of the "semi-ready". clothing stores. We doubt the feasibility of this arrangement. A more natural analogy is that between sizes of horses and bikes, Every man who rides horseback, as far as possible, secures a steed and saddle best adapted to his weight and form, the variations, however, are limited to a few standard sizes. If we are not mistaken this obstains also with bikes, as certainly there are several patterus of both wheels and saddles, and adjustments can be made to suit the convenience of different classes of riders. But the writer is justified in condenning the tendency to cater so exclusively to the tastes of those who wish to use a bike for racing. This is a morbid fancy that must prove ephemeral and while it lasts be prejudicial to the bicycle industry. Bicycle racing has already sacrificed scores of lives, laned hundreds of victims, led numbers to abandon thoir wheels, and deterred thousands from adopting them.
We do not share the writer's views as to the bike being "about to die," by being displaced by self-propelled wheels, or motor bikes. There is no sign whatever of any such change being at hand. Such machines would cost so much more than an ordinary wheel as to be re stricted to a very limited number of users. The bike is here to stay, but, it wil have to be more generally valued for its utility and less as a racing machine, if it is to retain and increas its popularity. 'The "roadster" bike, easy to ride, comfortable in the saddle, not readily put out of order, more substantially constructed, and less liable to the freaks of fashion, will be the machine of the future. For bicycles of this class, moderate in price,
the demand will long be sufficient to maintain an extensive trade.

## THE PROPOSAL NO DAM JHE NLAGARA RITER.

Following the feur that the Chicago drainage canal will have the enect of lowering the surface of all the great lakes below Laike Superior to the dijury of the trade of ath cithes boruering on them, comes a propused remedy from parties interested in the spending of public mones. 'the duea originated in Washington, it is omly-and shm-ply-to make a dam across the Niagara river somenthere above the falls and below Lake brie. 'ritere cam be no doubt that the Chicago drainage canal will have an appreciable ellect in drawing ofl much of the water that lieretolore has passed down the st. Lawrence; to what extent it will be telt remains to be proven. No doult a dam abore the fialls would keep the water of all the lake: above it at the present levels. That, however, would be at the expense of Lake Untario and all the St. Lawrence river down to Quebec.
from natural causes the volume of water coming from the great lakes has been less of late years tham lormerly and no artalicial construction that would still further lessen it could possibly be tolexated on both sides of the international waters below the fouls. Such a dam as that proposed could not fail to be injurious. If the dain is made high enough, after it is completed, to raise the water to its present level, there would, tor some yoars, in all probability, be no water passing over it, into Lake Untario below it. The idea camot seriously be entertajned. If it could, lortunately, for all the interests concerned, Canadian legislation would be required to give it ellect. One halif of the width of the waterway where it is proposed to make the dam is within the jurisdiction of this Dominion. No government or parliament of this country is ever likely to give authority for such a work to be done. Canada has too much money invested in our canal system to jeopardize it by allowing the natural supply of water to be diverted or tampered with, within our own limits.

It is not at all likely that the scheme will ever get buyond newspaper articles and will soon-like many other visionary projects-be consigned to oblivion. It is only a lew yoars ago that a lively newspaper discussion was going on about a dam across the Straits of Belle Lsle. 'What scheme was intended to prevent the llow of the ice and cold water from the Arctic regions into the Gulf of st. Lawrence, and so change the climate of Eastern Canada most beneficially. The proposal never had the slightest chance of being carried into eflect; it cnded in newspaper discussion. The project was a harmess one, the same, however, camnot be said of the one now proposed.. Compared with its proposed predecessor at the Straits of Belle Isle, it is only a small affair, but il carried out it would be injurious to Canadian interests. After: the: discusssion has rum its course the proposed scheme will probably lollow in the wake of the other big dam audi be forgotten.

## FRAUIDULENTI INSOLVENTS.

Our attention has been drawn to two highly scandalous cases of fraudulent insolvencies. They go to show the crying need of an Act under which a check would be
put upon proceedings of that character, and punislment inflicted upon those who delje the law. About three montlss ago, a change was made in the partnership of a city firm. At the time of the change is was announced that the firm had a surplus. When a new parther enters a firm there is a presumption that, at least, the business is solvent, as men do not usually go aboard a ship that is known to to sinking. At a meetiog of ereditors held. last week the estate wals declared unable to pay a dividend. The old books were lound to have been destroyed and a new set writion up, some of the entries in Which were incapable of explanation. Where the surphus had gone, and with it assels equal to the whole of: the liabilities existing when it wis declared to exist, was also a mystery not cleared up to the creditors. How a surplus, which was said to exist in December, could have been converted into a much larger deficit in february, will probably never lee explained. If, nowever, we had a good Insolvency det, the matier would be probed to the core, and in delaulti of a satislactory explanation the traders involved would lind themselves prohibited from engaging in hasiness, and probably be placed where business is not transacted:
Another case was that of an castern merchant who, about a year ago, dechared that his altairs showed a very handsone surplus, more, indeed, han were his total liabilities." Last weel Uhis prosjerous and well to do trader of: a year ago endeavourcil to buy goods in this city. A few days alterwards he became insolvent and ofrered his ereditors :bout one-thind of their clams in settlemont. Here again a surpus hail ramished and given place to a defieit, in regarel to the eanse ol' which change, $n \mathrm{om}$ sithinctory explanations wete offered. "had the insolvent, succeeled in his eftort to secure goods that shortage would have been correpondingly increased. Buth the above cases onght to be juidicially investigated: It can hardly be doufted that, in etel of them sueh a crime was committed, as, in the interests of trade, calls for exposure and purishnent.

## HA'l'S.

The arerage mam is nore particular in buying a hat than in buying a suit of clothes. He knows the suit will lit him, il his tailor is corred, buti, a fit, while extremely necessary in a hat, is not all the bnyer is looking for. This being the vase a fraction of an ineh difference in the leaf or erown makess the late cither desimble or unbecoming to the wearer; so much so that in the case of the latier, not only is the head ill-itressed, but its erowning indmence reaches to the shoes, and absorbing, to more or less extent, the mind of the wearer, it influences the man, his business and his triends.
?lhe styles of soft hats lior the coming season are but litite changed compared with last year. Perhaps they may be suid to be a litile smarer. The tendency of the round crown to the stife hat is to a tower make, rethening to the style of some live years ago. .. Tmporters are experisencing an active demand for spring and summer goods. Ithe manafachuress whotecepted orders at the values of November and December last are finding nituch difliculty in completing siepl without a loss owing to the contimed advance of mar material. In most cases they disposed of their stooks, which were hought low at the market tate, and when these alre exhated, are obliged to ask the current advance. Under these circuinstimocs
buyers will. be compelled to pay fifteen to twenty per cent. adrance on all fur, wool and straw hats of fresh manufacture: While the turn over in quautity has not shown this far a large increase the quality price makes a material difference.
In regard to lurs, the adrance is all along the line, and is very heary, especially in tine goods. As a result dealers will require to pay a large advance on next season's requirements.

## NEW YORK'S RAPID TRANSTI PROBLEM.

l:or over quarter of a century the city of New York has been endeavouring to solve the problem of how to secure more rapid transit for its population, which, from the peculiar topography of the city, can only extend in one direction, that is northward. Surface street railways were hopelessly insufficient from the beginuing. The elevated railways were established with the expecta tion of their becoming a satisfactory solution of the importunt problem. In a measure these elevated railways were a sucess in relieving the pressure of travel at certain hours of the day. The unsightimess of these constructions and the many inconveniences atitending their location on principal thoroughiares, have cansed them to be looked upon with such general disliavour that the citizens Jooked forward for some other form of reliel.

Somo twelve years ago the iden was started to construct an midergromel railway from the Battery, at the extreme lower ened of the city to the Harlen river. The project seemed surromded with dilliculties. The iden, however, was popular, and an'attempt to eommence it made, hut under such crude management that the scheme failed. Whe seed, however, had been sown and a hiapid Thainsit Commission, indepentent of municipal control in its mamagement, inas appointed by the State Legislatime. ditter a long struggle against powerful aikerse jufluences a contrate has been amarded for the rapid tramsit undergromd tunnel from the City Hall to Spayter Duyvil, which is nenly thirteen miles trom the contre of the city, besides branches to the various districts on the East river side.
'Ihe tunnol will be large enough to permit the ruming on four lines of tracks and afford space for gas pipes, telegroph, telephone, and other tubes for wires, from the privilege to use which the city will derive a revenue. The contractor, Mr. J. B. McDonald, is to receure $\$ 35,000,000$ corporation boinds, having fifty years to run, as the work progresses. But, under the terms of the contract, he has to provide interest for them, and a sinking fund of. an amnual amount that, at the end of filty years, when the city's bonds fall due, will cover then, after which term the whole property and system in comection with this rapid transit system will fall to the ownership of the aity of New York.

The guarantees given by the contractor' to ensure the fulfilinent of what he las undertaken, appear ample to seeure the end amed at. Fe has strong men behind him. When the contract was signed on Saturday last he deposited am aceepted cheque lor $\$ 1,000,000$ as security for the completion of the rond within the stipulated time of Hive jears This cheque was accompanied by bonds to the anount of $\$ 6,000,000$, given by scraral guarante companies. These securities are intended to guarantec that, 1st, all the conditions shall be complied Withe ensuring the payinent of the sinking
fund which is to provide for the payment of the $\$ 35,000,000$ city bonds with the interest upon them, and 2nd, the running of the road under the regulations stipulated in the contract, and 3 rd , that at the end of fifty years the whole work will be delivered over to the city free and clear of all incumbrances and in working order.

This is an immense munioipal undertaking which if successful, as it is most likely to be, will be remarkable from the fact that the problem of rapid transit in that great city will have been solved without any cost to the citizens, who, at the end of the fifty years, will be the owners of the whole property. The commissioners for this work, who were appointed by the State Liegislature, independent of municipal control, atpear to have made an excellent and judicious arrangement. That it will be carried out there can scarcely be any doubt. The contractor has the backing of strong and astute financinl men who must have scen their way clear to make a sulbstantial profit out of such an extended contract before advancing, and becoming responsible for so many millions of dollars. The work is to be commenced within thirty days after the signing of the contract and as it is clearly to the interest of the contractor and his supporters to push on the work, in order to get revenne, it. will doubtless be completed within the stipulated time.

The intention is to extend the tumnel from the City Hall and pass under the Fast river to Brooklyn so as to bring the whole of Long Jsland into connection with the system of rapid transit. That will surely follow unless rival interests have sufficient influence with the city aldermen, who will have a say in the matter, which may retard, if not prevent, so reasonable an extension of facilities for the movements of the vast population of the great city of New York.

## Meetings, Reporis, \&c.

## BRITISH 'AMERTCA ASSURANGE COMPANY.

The sixty-sixth annual mecting of the Shareholders of this Company was held at its offices in Toronto, at noon on Fridna, the 23rd February.

The President, Hon. Geo. A. Con, ocoupied the chair, and Mr. P. F. Sims, who was appointed to act as Secretary, read the following

## ANNUAT, REPORT.

The Directors have plensure in presenting the sixty-sixth Annual Report, embracing the financin? statements of the Company to the 31st December, 1899.
There has been a satisfactory growth in the premium income for the yenr in both the fire and marine branches. The Canadian fire business has shown exceptionally favorable results, and there has been in moderate profit on the marine business written during the year. In the United States, however, this company has, in common with all others doing business there, suffered from the unusually henry fire losses that have occurred in several of the larger cities.
The net profit on the vear's transactions ( $\$ 62,038.89$ ) has been sufficient to pay the usual half-yearly dividends at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum, and, after writing off an mount to cover depreciation in office furniture and securities, to provide for an addition of nearly $\$ 7,000$ to the Reserve Fund, which now amounts to $\$ 577,687.04$. The reserve to cover the estimated liability on unexpired policies has been increased to meet the additional amount at risk, and is more than an ample provision, nccording to the Company's experiences, to meet losses that will necrue ripon policies in force at the end of the year.
In view of the increased business of the Company and the contemplated enlargement of its field of operations, the Di-
rectors deem the present an opportune time to increase the capital stock; as contemplated in its act of incorporation, to $\$ 1,000,000$. A by-law will be submitted to the meeting to authorize the issue of $\$ 250,000$ additional stock, to be allotted pro rata to present shareholders at a premium of '15' per cent.

SUMIMARY OF FINANCLAL STATEMENTI.


The President, in moving the adoption of the report, said that it was gratifying to be able to refer to the satisfactory growth during the year in the income of the Company, which, after deducting amounts paid for reiusurance, showed net premium receipts of upwards of one and a half million dollars. The most encouraging features in connection with the past year's transactions were the steady and continued growth of the Canadian fire busmess, and the very moderate losses which have been sustained in the Dominion. While the general experience of compmies doing business in this country had been favorable, owing to the fire losses liaving been considerably below the average of preceding years, the experience of this Company had been exeeptionally so. From reports of the business in Canada that have been published, it appears that the average ratio of losses to premiums of all companies reporting to the Dominion Government had been 56 per cent. The Tritish America was 43 per eent. In the United States, on the other hand, the general experience, as well as that of this Company, had been much less satisfactory, the fire loss having been far in cxcess of those of average years, and the loss resulting from the Company's operations in that field had-materially reduced the total profit of the year. In the marine branch, he was pleased to say that the results of the past year had been such as to justify the action of the Directors in contimuing the business of this depnrtment, notwithstanding the adverse experience of previous years, and so far as can he judged from the present, outlook as to rates and gelieral conditions of marine underwriting, the prospects for the present year appeared encouraging in this hranch. The President also referred to the establishment of business connections at points beyond the limits of Canada and the United States, where favorable openings might present theanselves.
The lleport was adopted, and a by-lnw was passed providing tor an incrase of capital stock of the Company to one million dollars, by the allotment of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars new stock to shareholders in the proportion of one share to every three shares held by them.

The Annual Report and Statement were then presented.
The Directors beg to submit the Twenty-first Annual Report, with accompanying Financial Statements, duly audited, showing the result of the Company's business for the year ended 31st December, 1899, and its position on that day.
Whe sume difficulty in obtaining safe Mortgage Loans on City of 'loronto property at paying rates, referred to in last year's Report, was experienced this year. Rates of interest obtainable on loans on collaterals ruled low during the marlier part of the year, but gradually improved.
After paying and providing lor two half-yearly dividends, at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, and paying all expenses, including salaries, printing, advertising, auditors' fees and all commissions on loans, and providing for Directors' compensation, there remained a balance of $\$ 10,482.82$. Of this sum $\$ 9,000$ is added to the Contingent Account, and the remainder, $\$ 1,482.52$, placed at the credit of Profit and lioss Aecount.
The Reserve Fund stands at $\$ 200,000$, being equal to the Pricl-up Capital, and the Contingent Account is $\$ 45,000$.
Deposits increased $\$ 97,000$. Loans on Collaterals increased $\$ 236,000$, and Mortgage Loans decreased $\$ 142,000$.
The Shareholders will be asked to consider and sanction a By-Law passed by the Directors for an inerease of the Capital Stock of the Company from Two Million Dollars to 'l'wo Million Five ITundred Thousand Dollars. This new Stock to be issucd from time to time should an increase in the business of the Company render such necessary.

We are favoured with the Auditor-General's Report for 1509 , also with the same in 20 divisions, the hint we gave some time ago having been taken to issue this report in sections. The U. S. Cormmissioner of Labour has our thanks for bound volume No. 1 of his interesting reports, which are admirable specimens of statistical work. Mr. F. A. Betts, Tnsurance Commissioner of Connecticut, has obliged us with Parts 1 and 2 of his 33rd Annual Report. The New York Bankers' Magazine for Tebruary is up to the usual high standard of this publication. It contains an elaborate schedule showing the condition of the Trust companies of the State of New York, also articles on "Great Banks and their influence on the Money Market," "IThe Senate plani for refunding the Delbt," and other financial topics of interest, with a full and well arranged mass of statistical details relating to monetary affairs. The monthly reports' of the Department of Trade and Commerce come regularly.

## BE. WISE TN TTME.

-The merchants doing business in the Western mining centres, often envied by some who see only the glittering side of trade, are not without their share of business wor-
ries and probable disapplointments. A Rossland, B.C., dispatel states that in riew of the existing troubles in some of the mines some sixty merchants issued the following announcement: "We, the undersigned merchants, and others, doing business in the City of Rossland, in view of the partial, closing down of the mines, and realizing that in the event of a general strike or lockout of the miners in the Rossland camp, we should not be able to continue the system of credit now in rogue, have agreed and do hereby give notice that should such a calamity as foreshadowed occur, we shall entirely discontinue giving creclit to any one whomsfoever, and shall sell nothing but for spot cash. We are impelled to this action solely with a view to selfprotection, we might also say self-preservation, and because we have been advised by the banks doing business in Rossland and by the wholesalers that we would not receive from them such credit and accommodation as would enable us to carry on our business on the same lines as at present. We shall regret if the necessity arises to take this step, but we feel that it is better for us to make this intimation now rather than after the possible event."

## AMERICAN PIG IRON PRODUCTION.

-The American Iron and Steel Association reports that lhe total United States production of pig iron in 1800 was $13,620,703$ gross tons, against $11,773,934$ tons, in 1898, an increase of $1,846,760$ tons, or nearly 16 per cent. In 1808 there was made $2,121,254^{\circ}$ tons more than in 1897, and in 1895 $2,788,020$ tons more than in 1894 . The protuction in the second half of 1890 was more than a million tons greater than in the first half. The stocks which were unsold in the hands of manufacturers or their agents on December 31 st, 1899, amounted to 63,429 tons, against 291,233 tons on December 31st, 1895. The consumption of pig iron in 1899 considerably excecded the year's total production. The total supply was as follows: Production, 13,620,703 tons; unsold stocks on January 1st, 1899, including warrant stocks, 415,333 tons; imporis, about 37,000 tons; total sup: ply, $14,073,036$ tons. Deducting about 230,000 tons exported and (is, 309 tons of unsold stock on December 31st, 1899 , gives us 13,774,727 ions as the approximate consumption for the year. The whole number of furnaces in blast on Decomber 31st, 1899, was 289, against 240 on June 30th, 1890, and 202 on December 31st, 1898, Of the production of Bessemer pig iron, Penusylvania furnished $4,473,403$ tons; Olio $1,532,965$ tons; Illinois, $1,330,169$ tons; the balance of 546,151 tons coming from six other States. Of the basic pig, 738,bios tons were made in Pennsylvania; 160,093 tons in Maryland, Virginia and Alabama; 80,382 tons in Ohio and Missouri.

-A Greenwood, B.C., despatch states another important consolidation of two 'Boundary Creek mining companies is in process of consummation. . Toronto capitalists were behind the new company. The idea of consolidating the two mines has been on the tapis for some time. It is proposed to use the main shaft of the Braidon $\&$ Golden Crown Company for the output of the two properties. Both mines are developed by shaft to a depth of 300 feet. ., Within, the past three weeks the Winnipeg mine has slipped nine carloads of ore to the Trail smelter, the returns from the entire shipments have been most satisfactory. A fraction over $\$ 20$ to the ton was the net profits. By the cousolidation of the :companies both properties can be worked on a much more economical and profitable scale.

- 'lhe large increase in cotton mills throughout the Southern States within the past year or two has caused considerable change in labor. A New Orleans paper discussing the situation says: "Ihé rapid"increase in the number of new cotton mills in North Carolina has had its expected effect, and that State 'is now consuming all its cotton at home instead of exporting it 'to 'England' or New' Jagland to be manufactured into eloth abroad. All those in the centre of the State are idle, and it is ouly at Wiluington, which exports cotton for the neighboring States of Georgia and south Carolina, that the compresses have any work to do. The Buropean cotwai buyers also have no longer anythinitg to do in North Carolipa and have been cilled off and sent to the neighboring Stales-there is no cotton, for them to buy in North Carolina. But while these minor industries have suffered North Carolima as a whole has been greatly benefited by the change. The farmers aro getting a great deal nore for their cotton than they ever received before; and cotton in its manufuctured state is worth four or more times as much as in the staple. During next season the North Carolina mills will have to import some cotton to keep runing at full foree; but it will lative no dilliculty in getting all its needs from the neighboring State of South Carolina, North Carolina has set a gooil eximple to the other southern states in the solution of the cotton problem - an example which we are glad to see they are following." four new cotton mills lave just been set on foot in South Carolina. 'l'he surrender of General Cronje, with what remained of his army, and the relief of Ladysmith, this week within four days of each other, are events of supreme importance. 'Their effect on the money market has been discountel, and, as we said dast week, markefs fluctuate far more under bad uews than good. The general effect will be to give a steadier tone, less anxity will prevail, confidence has had two good doses of tonic pick-me-up, that will brace the system. What next and -next? as was asked at a more serious crisis, is the question of the day. A sudden peace we do not expect, but any more British reverses of any moment are unlikely to oceur. That General Buller has won will give universal satisfaction, except to the Boers and their triends, that the honours of the war have fallen so largely to Canadians will be of material benefit to this country. 'Whe proposul to grant a provincial subsidy to a private English company, which intends to establish a packing house at Quebec, is being strongly opposd by those engaged in the produce trade in this city. It would be an outrage to grant public money to enable it to compete with our own merchants. The plea that a packing factory would enable farmers to realize higher prices is too diaphanous to impose upon business men. Local money rates remain as last weels.

-ane heary advance in all kinds of lamber and wooden ware of late should draw more attention to the preservaLion of Camadian timber which is each year being recognized in a greater degree as the future source of supplies for the continent. At it recent meeting of the Candian Tustitute, Poronto, Al.r. .I. A. DuIt, li.A., of the Sehool of lemelical Science, read an interesting paper on "limber Testing." He poiuted
out the importance of caring for the vist timber wealth of the province. Thure were two distinct objects for which experiments miglit be made upon industrial materials; the one, caued the seientific, was tor the single purpose of employing the material with properties of the material; the other, ealled the commereinl, was for the purpose of employing thematerial with greater economy and skill in works for
the advantage of man. The commercial experiments were applications of the scientific, and their value was in propoition to the progress of the latter. The scientific investigations required $\Omega$ large expenditure of time and money, and were beyond the resources of the private individual. They were of benefit to the whole community, and it was clearly the duty of the Goveriment to make provision for that department of


[^4]scientific work. 'The relative clecline in the industries of Great Britain was an example of the lailure to recognize this daty and responsibility. The rien Province of Ontario had been receiring for many years about one million
dollars per year from timber dues, but had expended only a few thousand dollars of all this money on the science of forest production, and not one dollar on the economic manufacture and use of wood products.
