



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

The above Comparative Statement is so far satisfactory as shewing an increase in the voluntary contributions of this year over last, but on the other hand it must be borne in mind that this surplus is mainly to be attributed to the munificent anonymous contribution of \$500.00 to the Mission Fund at Cacouna Church, and an equally liberal donation of \$500.00 from the late Edward Burstall, Esq., apportioned as follows, at his request:

The attention of the Clergy is again drawn to the absolute necessity of transmitting their annual contributions to the Treasurer before 31st December.

#### MISSION FUND.

In referring the Society for an account of Missionary work to the Report of the Diocesan Board, it will be seen that an increase of \$912 has been handed to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board from the Mission Fund during the past year, thus reducing the deficit of the Board from \$1376.66 to \$341.

It is gratifying to learn that there has been an increase in the voluntary subscriptions of \$690.95. The Board would remind Churchmen that this Fund is the only channel whence aid can be drawn for the opening of new missions. The grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the mission assessments are fixed, and it is only by drawing from the Mission Fund, unless a special grant be made from the General Fund, that deficiencies in the already occupied fields of labour can be made good and new stations entered upon. Mission fields are ever presenting themselves. The Board therefore trust that during the current year an effort will be made to place this Fund in such a position as to enable the Board to engage in a work so important to the well-being of the Church in this widely scattered diocese. It is with great satisfaction the Board learn that their suggestion in last year's report in reference to the duty of assisting in conveying the Gospel to heathen lands has borne fruit.

During the visit of that great missionary of our Church, Bishop Selwyn, a meeting was held under the auspices of the Society, and the proceeds, amounting to \$65.15, together with the offertory at an early celebration of the Holy Communion on St. Simon and St. Jude's Day, at St. Peter's Chapel, amounting to \$6.50, has been transmitted to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, towards the support of its

Indian Mission on this continent.

The Board trust that this good beginning may bear more fruit during the present year.

#### WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The amount of voluntary contributions to this Fund, for the past year, is considerably in advance of that of the previous year.

The claims upon this Fund have fortunately fallen short of the amount of voluntary contributions, whilst the annual interest arising from the Capital reaches, according to the

last statement, \$1851.83.

During the past year the opinion of the eminent Actuary, A. G. Ramsay, Esq., has been obtained relative to the two points submitted to him last January. But inasmuch as his recommendation involves an alteration of the By-law, the matter

has been referred to the Church Society.

The Treasurer reports that the following clergymen have qualified themselves during the past year as participants in the benefits of the Fund,—Reverend Messrs. Kemp, King, Plees, Lyster, Ker, Von Iffland, Vial, Thompson, Smith, Ross, Short, Fothergill, Merrick, Burrage, Woolryche and Riopel.

#### PENSION FUND.

It is gratifying to notice a slight increase in the receipts during the past year. At the same time the Board must state

that this Fund has not yet received that measure of support which it is entitled to in consideration of its important bearing upon the well-being of the Diocese.

It again seems necessary to remind churchmen that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel has thrown upon ourselves the responsibility of providing pensions in future for the Clergy.

The Board are of opinion that if the Clergy would bring this subject prominently before their people, either by sermons or otherwise, a manifest increase in the Fund would be the result.

#### ENDOWMENT FUND.

A list of the Rural Endowment Funds of the Diocese, to which no addition has been made during the past year, will be found in the Clergy Trust Fund account, with the exception of that for Nicolet, which appears in the accounts of the Treasurer of the Society.

The sales of 1871, although comparing favorably with those of 1870, are still below those of 1869 and 1868, and the Board fear there is very little hope of improvement until the usefulness of the Depository can be extended by bringing in other publications than those of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, which are in many instances unsuited to the wants and habits of colonial life. The Board are much indebted to the Secretary-Treasurer, C. Judge, Esq., for his very valuable services.

## ABSTRACT OF PROCEEDINGS OF CENTRAL BOARD DURING THE YEAR 1871.

JANUARY.—Report of Land Committee adopted. Claims of the widow and children of the Rev. R. G. Ward on the W. & O. Fund were allowed. Outfits of \$50 each granted to two clergymen out of the General Fund. Grant of \$100 to East Frampton Parsonage.

Resolved,—That the Education Committee hold quarterly meetings, and report missions where schools might with advantage be established.

February.—Resolved,—That the Parsonage at Melbourne be transferred to the Bishop in Trust. The usual allowance to the Chaplain at Grosse Isle was placed at the Bishop's disposal.

MARCH.—The thanks of the Society were tendered to the Bishop of Maine and Rev. J. Carmichael for their assistance at the anniversary meeting.

April.—The Secretary was instructed to notify the Clergy that the subscriptions to the W. & O. Fand will be due on 1st day of May.

MAY.—Committee appointed to secure a Treasurer. Letter to the Church-wardens of Waterville relative to Church property.

November.—Investment authorized in Hamilton Debentures to the amount of \$9000. The Education Committee stated that \$275 would be required to enable them to meet their engagements. A grant of \$247.93 was made out of the Special Fund. The subject of granting a pension to the widow of the late Rev. J. Torrance was deferred. A grant of \$100 on the usual conditions was made to the Magog Mission Church. Treasurer's statement was received.

#### REPORT

OF THE

#### ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION

OF THE

INCORPORATED CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC,

For the year ending December 10, 1871.

A review of the work of the Church in connection with this Association presents several features of a pleasing and prosperous character, which call for our gratitude to the giver of all good things, without whose blessing our best efforts will

be wanting in success.

On comparing the amounts raised within the District one year with another since 1851, the year in which a division of our Church property was made with the then newly formed Diocese of Montreal, we find a steady and gradual increase. which, in 1871, assumes an amount beyond the most sanguing expectations of the Church's best friends. In 1851 the total amount raised within the District for all church purposes was \$550.72. The amount for missionary purposes alone for 1871 exceeds \$3000, all of which has been raised within the limits of this Association. This sum has reference to the missionary wants of the Church, and comprises the assessment, proceeds of sermons, and missionary meetings and donations, and is entirely independent of those local efforts which have been made towards the building and repairing of churches and parsonages, some statistical report of which your Secretary had hoped to be able to compile, but in the absence of the detailed information in the Parochial reports, he has been precluded from this pleasurable but arduous duty. If, however, we can be permitted to hope these outlays equal those of 1870, then we may put down to the credit of the District for all Church purposes a sum exceeding \$8000. This statement cannot but be highly gratifying to the members of this Association, inasmuch as it proves how much can be accomplished by a systematic organization, where the penny of the poor and the pound of the rich become amalgamated into one great fund.

Another index of the prosperity which has attended the work of the Church in this District, is to be found in self-sustentation.

The Mission of Richmond and Melbourne ceases, at the close of the year, to be any longer a recipient of aid from the Diocesan Board, the people of this mission assume the responsibility of sustaining for the future the ministrations of the Church amongst themselves. Add to this the spirit manifested by the people of Compton to contribute the whole of the clergymen's salary when they were last required by the Board to raise their assessment, and we find additional evidence of the Church's advancement. These are omens for good, and may well cheer less privileged missions which are still under the fostering care of the Diocesan Board, and raise the hopes of the waste places of the district which have hitherto, in vain, asked for assistance. Your Committee find in the measure of success which has attended the operations of this association cause for thankfulness and hope. Thankfulness that our work begun in faith, with at first but small encouragement, has prospered beyond our expectation,—hope that in the provision which is made for the religious instruction of our people, each anniversary will find that we are keeping pace with the Church's wants and recognizing our responsibilities. The more our people become acquainted with the actual wants and necessities of the Church the more liberally will they bestow a portion of their means to meet them, and this involves the duty on all the members of the Association of taking an active part in acquiring and in disseminating that information which will have the happy result of building up the Church of God.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## DIOCESAN BOARD

FOR 1871.

At the close of the last Annual Report of the Diocesan Board to the Church Society, an estimate of the Revenue and Expenditure for the year just passed was appended, which exhibited a deficit of \$925.

In the Report presented to the Diocesan Synod in the month of June last, that estimate was corrected so as to increase the deficiency to \$1398. And the endeavour was made to draw the attention of members of the Church throughout the Diocese to the special need of largely increasing their contributions to the Mission Fund of the Church Society, that being almost the only source of revenue from which aid could be hoped for to wipe out the deficiency.

Your Board is glad to be able to report that the income from that fund has been so much larger than usual that the estimated deficiency has been reduced to \$341.94, the Mission Fund having aided the Board to the extent of \$912 more than was estimated. But it must be borne in mind that this sum includes an anonymous thank-offering of \$500, a source of revenue which obviously cannot be counted upon to assist us in future emergencies.

The following abstract of the Revenue Account for the past year is submitted, from which it may be seen what a heavy strain has been put upon the resources of the Board, and how impossible it would have been to maintain the existing operations except for that increased assistance from your Society, which your Board venture the hope may not be without a parallel during the present year.

It will be seen that we begin the year with a debtor's balance of nearly \$350. This is very much to be regretted, not only on account of the actual amount of burden upon the resources of the current year, but also because it prevents the Board from making any addition to the Sustentation Fund of the Diocese, created, as we are all aware, to provide for the time when the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel wilk finally withdraw all aid from the Diocese. It is, however, the unavoidable result of a heavier expenditure than was anticipated at the beginning of the year, \$1,155 more having been paid for Clergymen's stipends than was calculated upon.

The engagements into which the missions had entered three years ago, terminating with the close of the year 1871, the question of forming new agreements for increased amounts for a period of two years has largely occupied the attention of your Board since the month of March last.

All the missions have not yet brought their negotiations to a close, but sufficient information can be supplied to warrant the statement that the various congregations throughout the Diocese are, upon the whole, shewing themselves more and more alive to the duty of maintaining, at their own cost, those ministrations which were provided for them all too long without calling for any sacrifice in return.

The wardens of 47 congregations have either signed, or undertaken to sign, forms of agreement for a total assessment of \$6,613,—an increase over the previous year of \$1,191. Six congregations remain, who are still treating with the Board, from whom an assessment of at least \$1,035,—an increase of \$43,—is safely to be expected. This raises the total assessment to \$7,648, and \$1,234 increase, to which a further addition of \$100 is virtually made by the determina-

tion of the people of Melbourne to maintain their elergyman

in future without extraneous aid.

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The whole sum for which the missions—then 25 in number—were assessed in 1868, was \$4,106. The total assessment for the year 1872, levied upon the same missions, is \$6,442,—an increase of \$2,336, or 54 per cent in four years. It is, however, to be regretted that an accumulation of arrears, amounting to \$1,576, are now chargeable against the various missions of the Diocese.

That under the peculiar circumstances of this Diocese, so large an increase in the local contributions has been made within that period, is matter for congratulation, and should be interpreted as a most favorable angury for the future.

When we know, too, that one mission, (Compton,) has raised its assessment at once from \$200 to \$500, that we have one mission contributing \$550, another \$450, and another \$400, whilst there are many others who, within a few years, have more than doubled their assessments, we may reasonably expect the time to be approaching when each year will diminish the list of old missions now receiving aid from the Board.

It is also a subject of satisfaction that within the last four years seven missions, not previously in connection with the Board, have been indebted to it for the ministrations of the Church. There were nine in all, but the missions of Stanstead and Hereford—two of those most recently placed on the list—not being able to see their way for the present to accept the terms upon which your Board could consent to continue its assistance, are not now of the number.

It will be readily believed that the strongest desire of the Diocesan Board, as the agents of a missionary society, is to extend the ministrations of the Gospel into new and promising fields, and that it is with the utmost reluctance that any applications for aid are weighed in the cold balance of prudence. But notwithstanding the increased assessments for 1872, and the undiminished grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the financial position of your Board is such,—as will be seen from the estimate appended,—that the very greatest care must, for the future, be exercised before increasing its obligations.

The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel makes no grant to this Diocese (which is the general rule) for more than one year at a time, and that grant we are explicitly told, depends upon its resources received, not during the year in which the grant is paid, not even in the year in which the grant is voted, but on its resources received the year

before. When it has the money in hand, then it makes its grants, but not before. Your Board, unable to imitate so sound a policy, has been hitherto compelled not only to vote grants before having the money to pay them, but also actually to pay them in some instances in anticipation of its resources.

This is obviously wrong, and your Board would arge that some remedy be applied to a state of things so plainly liable

to lead to very serious evils.

Last year your Society made a grant of \$1000 to the Diocesan Board, to be distributed as a Bonus to the Clergy serving under the Board. That amount was paid to the Clergy in the same porportion as the grant made the previous year. Should the funds of the Society again justify a repetition of the favour, your Board do not hesitate to urge it earnestly as a small measure of relief to an inadequately paid ministry.

The following appointments were made by the Lord Bishop and concurred in by the Board during the past year:

In the month of January, the Rev. J. Boydell, to the mission of Bury.

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In the month of March, the Rev. E. A. W. King, to the mission of Durham.

In the month of November, the Rev. T. L. Richardson, to the mission of Conticook.

The following clergymen resigned their charges during the past year:

The Rev. J. F. Carr, on his appointment to a charge in the Diorese of Fredericton.

The Rev. T. L. Ball, on his appointment to a charge in the Diocese of Huron.

The Rev. J. Foster, on his appointment to the Rectory of Three Rivers.

#### EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF MISSIONARIES.

#### MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

This mission is about 70 miles long. It consists of six Islands. Some of these are peculiarly connected by sandy beaches, varying from a few yards to about a mile in width. Along these beaches the Missionary can sometimes travel to his different churches when the way is not too much endangered by quick-sands and openings made by the sea beating across the beachy ridge. For the most part, however, he is obliged to visit his churches by boat. From this circumstance his visits must be irregular, owing to his dependence on the wind and weather. Two of these Islands-Bryon and Entryare altogether disconnected from the others, and consequently are visited by water only.

The churches are built on the connected islands—one is at Amhurst, one at Grindstone and the third at Grosse Isle. By land they are about 30 miles apart. Two of these churches —the one at Grindstone and the one at Amhurst—were built through the generosity of Admiral Coffin, the proprietor of the Islands. They are completed, and are certainly beautiful little churches. The Rev. John Walters spent no pains to accomplish what good taste and architecture could effect. Carpeting and matting are provided. A splendid set of Communion vessels were also given by the Admiral. The two Churches are two gems amid a surrounding desolation.

The Church at Grosse Isle, as far as it is built, was erected by the inhabitants themselves. A great deal yet remains to be done towards its completion, but service can be held in it during the warm summer months. We hope that, by the grace of God, some kind friends will be raised up to assist in

providing it with what is yet necessary.

The Parsonage is built on Grindstone Island, the most central part of the Mission. It was erected at the expense of Admiral Coffin, and by him comfortably furnished. There is also a glebe of 100 acres of land attached to the Parsonage. Of this about 10 acres are cleared and fit for cultivation. Altogether the people have every reason to be thankful to Admiral Coffin for his munificence.

The Protestants on their part are beginning to value the sacrifices made for them both by Admiral Coffin and the Church Society. They are always ready to give their time and labour to the benefit of the Church. Money, also, they will gladly give when procurable. But they are poor. Provisions are very dear and their fish is very cheap. They have large families to clothe and feed and small means with which to provide for them. Still they have begun to contribute to the Diocesan Board towards the payment of their Clergyman's salary. They have also undertaken to build, this winter, a boat for the Mission. Up to the present they have themselves in turn willingly supplied the means to convey me by water from one Island to another. Thinking, however, that it would be more to the Clergyman's convenience to have a boat at his disposal for any occasion, they have offered to build one. It must be remembered that a boat in this Mission is as indispensable as a horse to an inland Missionary.

There is, therefore, every evidence that the services of our Church are valued by the inhabitants of these Islands. Though some of them are professedly Preshyterians and Baptists, yet when called upon they all will give a helping hand. A whole Baptist family was, last summer, baptized into the Church.

Amherst.--In this Island we have only five families. The church was built more especially for the fishermen who frequent these shores during the fishing season. Service. however, is held in the Church in the winter as well as in the summer. The morning and afternoon prayers are well attended. and the children seem to enjoy the Sunday-school. There have been four baptisms since my arrival.

Grindstone.—As the Missionary resides on this Island the services are more frequent in this church than in the others. There are about six weeks in the autumn, and as many in the spring, when it is almost impossible to travel to the other islands. In the fall it is almost always blowing a gale of wind, and in the spring the ice-never very safe, even in the midst of the winter-will neither support a horse or allow the passage of a boat. The people of this island have, therefore, their two services and their Sunday-school on about half the Sundays in the year. Here the families number 10; in most cases large, including many children. From this circumstance we have endeavored to establish a school. A grant of \$50 per annum to the teacher from the Colonial and Continental Church Society was procured for us by the kindness of the Bishop.

His Lordship procured, besides, a grant of \$40 towards the erection of a school-house. With this assistance and the kind interest taken in us by Dr. Miles, we are enabled to open a school. A teacher has just come, and we hope, by the blessing of God, much good will result from his teaching. In this island six have been baptized, two married.

one buried.

Grosse-Isle.—This island is occupied exclusively by mem bers of the Church of England. It contains 14 families. Unfortunately, these families are very much scattered, some are five or six miles distant from the church. They are also so situated that it is difficult for them to ascertain the arrival of the Minister. Still they attend well the services, and seem eager for the Word of God. They live almost exclusively by fishing. They are very industrious, and noted for their good behaviour. They have done what they could for their church, and are still exerting themselves all they can to complete it. But I am afraid their means will not meet their wishes. grant from some kind friend would be most acceptable. They are also very much in want of a school. Our only hope to receive this is in the generosity of societies and friends. In these families there have been nine baptisms, six marriages and two deaths.

Entry Island.—Here there are five families, all Protestants. This island I have visited three times since my arrival. It is about nine miles from the other islands, sometimes cut off from the other islands all winter, and not always very accessible in summer. Here there is no church. I have baptized three, married two, buried one. The last was a woman, said

to have been 106 years of age.

Bryon Island.—This is the furthest island towards the northeast. It is in the open sea, about nine miles from the nearest land. It is cut off from the other islands during the six winter months. Here there are four families resident, all Protestants. This island I have visited three times since my arrival. I have baptized ten and barried one. The latter was

the first settler of the island.

Under the missionary's charge in these islands there are, therefore, altogether 38 families, besides seven newly-married couples. The population is increasing rapidly, and adding to the church. A very important part of the missionary's work, therefore, is to educate these children for a Christian career. Schools and sound teachers are needed in the different islands. An English gentleman with sound church principles and a christian heart is scenred for Grindstone Island. For this we are deeply grateful to a kind Providence. We hope that before many years the other islands will have their schools and their teachers supplied. We pray for it, and let churchmen with means throw in their super-abundance.

#### RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

It is with no ordinary feelings of thankfulness to Almighty God that I begin by saying that this is the last report which the Church Society will receive from this mission; not because we think of ceasing our efforts in behalf of the Society, but because at the close of this year we cease to be a mission and

become a self-sustaining parish.

The mission of Richmond and Melbourne was founded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in 1830; we have thus been indebted for exactly 42 years to the selfdenial and love of others for the supply of the means of grace. For the first 32 of those years, little or no progress was made towards self-support. Down to 1862 the missionary received his entire salary from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, i.e., £100 stg. a year. During the latter portion of that period some trifling addition was made to the clergyman's stipend from voluntary contributions; but there being then no organization in the Diocese for securing the regular payment of what was so promised, those contributions did not amount to much in themselves, and told very little, if anything, upon the growth of the mission towards self-sustentation. In 1863, with the action of the Diocesan Board, that growth began. And now, with the New Year of 1872, we throw away our crutches and begin to walk alone. We bid our kind friends, who have so long and so forbearingly helped us, a grateful farewell, resolved (1 trust 1 am justified in saying this of all my parishioners) to show that gratitude by exhibiting in the future the same missionary zeal for the welfare of others which our kind Christian friends in England and in Quebec have so long exhibited towards us.

The congregation of St. Ann's, which now takes upon itself the entire responsibility of the support of the Rector of Richmond and Melbourne, has been a year in its enlarged church, and finds it satisfactory. The church seats comfortably 400 persons, and the internal arrangements are decent and suitable to the worship of Almighty God. The outside of the church has just been painted, Mr. Foster having stirred up his fellow-churchmen to the good work, by offering to bear one-fourth of the entire cost. The money to meet this generous offer was at once collected by two zealous ladies, Miss Wray and Miss Brooke. It is proposed to paint the inside next summer. Two new sheds for the shelter of the horses are now in course of creetion in the precincts of St. Ann's. And, finally, the debt which remained upon the

church after the enlargement, has, through the untiring exertions of our excellent senior warden, Mr. Wray, been

wiped out.

The congregations during the past year have been uniformly large, and there has been a steady increase in the number of communicants The Sunday-school continues to show the results of the quiet, uniform, unwearied work of the teachers. The clergy themselves superintend all the Sunday-schools. A class of 24 was confirmed at St. Ann's last Ascension Day. Of these, six were, immediately previous to their confirmation, baptized by the Bishop. Of the 24 confirmed, three were the first-fruits of the service at the Silver school-house; three were from Windsor; the remainder belonged to St. Ann's. The Holy Communion was administered on the occasion, and all the newly confirmed, except two, partook of it. Other classes from probably all the stations will be ready for confirmation this next spring. One thing more I wish to record with special thankfulness. The congregations on Thanksgiving Day, both in St. John's and St. Ann's, were as large as on Sundays, and, which is still more thankworthy, the number of communicants as large. On the whole, this has been the most encouraging year in the history of St. Ann's during my incumbency, for which, I hope, we all do fell as we ought, thankful to Him to whose mercy and blessing it is due.

The congregation of St. John's, Melbourne, the charge of which I have handed over in a large measure to my colleague, the Rev. Isaae Thompson, is growing perceptibly in vigorous church-life. Of their own accord, without any suggestion, the vestry increased their assessment last Easter sixty-six per cent, and their dues are paid with unfailing punctuality. The congregations have certainly been larger than ever; the number of communicants has increased; and the Sunday-school is, I think, on the whole, the best among the five in the mission—In fact, we have a body of lay-helpers, both male and female, in that congregation upon whom we can always rely; although it would be both ungenerous and unjust not to add that the same holds good of all my congregations.

Hence, under God, our prosperity.

The service in the Silver school-house has, as I have said, borne its first fruits in the open uniting with the church by confirmation and Holy Communion of one of the principal families in the neighbourhood, and by the baptism, confirmation and admission to Holy Communion of the head of another family. Both the congregation and the sunday-school keep up their numbers and interest. We are looking forward to the erection there of a small church-edifice ere long, the need

of which, for the more devout celebration of divine worship, and especially for the administration of the Holy Communion, is felt more and more. This congregation is not assessed, but it presented its pastor again this year with a purse of nearly

\$40, accompanied by an affectionate address.

Brompton and Windsor may now be looked upon as a new mission, placed for the present under the wing of the Mission of Melbourne. The Diocesan Board, I rejoice to say, has assumed to a certain extent the charge of the mission in these two important townships. Each of these places has a service every Sunday, and each a Sunday-school, Mr. Thompson serving them three Sundays and I the fourth. This makes the Sunday, especially to my colleague, very laborious; but his work is a work of love and is cheerfully given. The congregations in both townships are quite equal to our expectations, the Sunday-school in Brompton one of the most promising we have. We have been much cheered by the accession to the staff of our teachers in Brompton of a gentleman on the spot, who has taken up the work with a zeal and in a liberal and loving spirit, which is quite refreshing. We were ready to put up the frame of our Church in Brompton this fall, but failed to find workmen; everything, however, is in readiness to push on the work in the spring.

In Windsor, where, at first, we were led to suppose there were not six church families, we have, by diligent visiting, discovered twenty-five. Of these nine are old residents,—three of them are living from four to six miles back on Hardwood Hill; two, four or five miles back in Goshen; one, four miles on the Richmond Road, and the remaining three in the village. The rest are chiefly work-people attached to the Paper and Powder Mills, mostly emigrants of late from England. The attendance on Divine Service is steadily increasing. The Sunday-school, which is large, languishes for want of more teachers. On the whole the prospects in Windsor are much more encouraging than we dared to hope for a year ago.

Finally, my colleague and myself desire gratefully to acknowledge the uniform kindness which has been extended to us personally in every part of our extensive mission, and which makes our service to be a labour of love.

#### MAGOG.

I am happy to be able to record a growing interest as shown by the people of this mission in the Church and her work, so much so that I am confident our position and prospects were never better here than at present.

For the last twelve months we have been able to worship in our Church building, and although it is at present unplastered and unpainted, yet it is a decided improvement upon our meetings in the cold and cheerless school-house.

Our Church has cost us so far the sum of \$1,600, every cent of this has been paid out of monies collected in the

mission, and in some of our large cities and towns. I am thankful to state that we have money in hand towards the plastering whenever we can find suitable weather for the work. We hope, nevertheless, in the meantime, to be able to heat the building sufficiently to attract the people to our service.

My Sunday-school, the only one in the place, shews decided signs of progress, and the children seem quite interested in the work, which makes it all the more pleasing to the teacher.

Our eongregations, too, are decidedly improving in numbers. I am now the only resident minister in Magog. The present is the Church's opportunity, and it rests with the Diocesan Board to say whether the Church work so favourably begun here shall go on prospering and winning its way amongst the inhabitants of the place, or lose its present hold and good prospects. If a judicious policy be observed, then the Church will take root firmly in what has hitherto proved to be an unkindly soil. If the work is too hastily overtaxed, the Church interests will be crushed here.

The people of Magog have agreed to pay for a resident minister \$150 per annum, for a non-resident minister I think they would scarcely contribute a cent, at least this is their present state of feeling upon the subject.

We have been unable to do anything this year for objects outside the mission. Our assessments, Church building, harmonium, &c, have kept the people, who are all very poor, pretty well drained.

#### SHIPTON AND TINGWICK.

The missionary work in these two townships continues to be harmoniously and, I trust, effectively pursued.

During the past twelve months the usual Sunday and special services have been uninterruptedly rendered. The congregations have been, if anything, on the increase.

Pastoral visiting has been systematically and conscientiously attended to; and it gives me great pleasure and comfort to add that in all quarters I am received with

unaffected cordiality.

Special pains are taken with the Sunday-schools; the children at Tingwick are catechized for twenty minutes in the presence of the congregation, while in Danville the class is instructed for half an hour before the people assemble. In both places the children are trained to familiarize themselves with the sweet and simple tunes of Hymns, Ancient and Modern.

Since the 1st January, the Registers show, for Tingwick, eight baptisms and one marriage; for Shipton, ten baptisms,

six burials and three marriages.

Our new Church at Tingwick was opened for Divine Service on the festival of the Circumcision, and was an occasion of reverent rejoicing to us all. We found ourselves transplanted from a small dilapidated district school-house to a neat, wellfinished little Church, furnished with everything requisite to conduct the services with deceney and order. The building holds one hundred persons very comfortably; the average congregation being between seventy-five and eighty. As far as the building itself is concerned, it is ready for consecration, but we do not wish to send for the Bishop till the surroundings are finished. The large substantial horse-shed is still incomplete, and the fencing has yet to be put up. I understand these matters are to be attended to without further delay. It'is also gratifying to announce that no debts have been incurred. There is one thing we want, that is a bell. Who will immortalize his name and present the vacant chamber in the steeple with a suitable and melodious occupant?

With regard to Danville Church, we do a little to it every year. We have lately painted the jettee, or jet, which, strange to say, had been left unpainted for eight years, and oak-stained the doors, inside and outside, besides placing suitable matting on the floor. Our next effort will be either to ceil the roof with pine boards oiled, or lath and plaster it. I hope to be able to report this next year, as having been accomplished. I should like to see a horse-shed put up, as the situation is particularly exposed; this matter, however, belongs to the farmers. That the poor horses should be protected from the winter blast and the scorching sun, as well as from drenching rain, seems so reasonable that it is a subject to me of continual surprise that the shed was not

built contemporaneously with the Church.

#### LEEDS.

This mission is one in which, from the nature of things, the Church can make but little progress, few, if any, but what are attached to some religious body. We do not expect, therefore, to gather in from without, as in some other parts of the Diocese, where, perhaps, more than onehalf of the community are outside the pale of all religious communities. In the Township of Broughton, Churchpeople are emigrating as fast as they can, and their places are being taken up by French-Canadians. Our people are none of them very rich—many quite poor—some almost destitute. The people appear to prize the services, and are very attentive and devout. They give also according to their means, quite as liberally as the people in other missions, and being, for the most part, from the old country, (Ireland,) they have a claim as children of the Church which, I trust, will not be lost sight of. I have little to tell, except the ordinary routine of services, visits to the sick and whole, as opportunity serve and occasion requires. I have held 120 Sunday services and 34 week day services -- have had 22 public and 12 private celebrations of the Holy Communion. We have a Sunday-school at St. James's Church, Leeds, with about 25 scholars and 3 teachers. We have just procured a small library for the use of the children.

I tried public catechising in St. Mark's Church, Lambie's Mills, at afternoon service during Lent. Only a few attended. They do not like to stand up before the congregation.

During Lent we held a week of special services in St. James's Church with sermons and addresses, in which I was ably assisted by the Revd. II. Roe, who kindly came from Melbourne for that purpose. The Revds. J. Thompson and C. B. Washer also rendered help. The effect was good. Some who were disposed to waver were confirmed in their attachment to the Church, and glad to find that, if they desired more spiritual food, they need not go from their own Church to find it. I believe that several were deeply impressed with the sense of the need of inward as well as outward religion. I trust that these impressions will not be as the morning cloud and early dew.

We have been able to do more for the Church Society this year than was done last year. The aggregate amount of collections and subscriptions, (as the returns show,) \$52.23. The sums raised for local Church purposes have been large,—including \$112.50 for an organ for St. Mark's Church, Lambie's Mills, the total amount raised for all Church pur-

poses within the year being \$379.73. I may add that I feel much indebted to the young ladies who acted as collectors for the Church Society.

Of St. Peter's Church, Cookshire, 1 am thankful to be able to say the attendance during the past year has been larger and more regular than during any period of my ministry,—there has been also a considerable increase in the younger communicants.

The mission of Eaton, of which Cookshire is the centre, has for many years been overrun by dissent, and, with the exception of the congregation of St. Peter's, the church has been unable to establish any regular congregations,—this has led me to devote my spare time to two newly opened settlements principally peopled by English, Irish and Norwegian families.

During the past year I have held thirty services and travelled nine hundred miles out of the limits of my own mission, to supply these people with the ministrations of the Church. At one place we have no church, and our services are held in a Methodist chapel, a privilege conceded to the Church of England, for subscriptions from some of her members towards its erection. At another place still more remote and quite in the bush, a small church has been erected by the aid of the Church Society, the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and outside contributions. Hitherto our services have been held in a barn or a log-house. These people appear to prize very highly the few advantages of religious instruction another them. Upon the last occasion of my doing duty

there, I found a log-house well filled with people seated upon rough boards, with their prayer books, and my heart was rejoiced to hear every person taking a part in the service.

#### DRUMMOND VILLE.

The great event of the past year in this parish is that of the establishment of our Endowment Fund. The late Miss Sheppard's bequest, towards this purpose, of the noble sum of \$2,000, was noticed in last year's report. To this have since been added the sum of \$200, contributed by the people of the parish, and the further sums of \$200, given by R. Hamilton, Esq., and of \$150 granted by the Church Society to meet the people's contribution.

In other respects, Church-work seems to proceed fairly.

The great difficulty, in so scattered a community, is that of getting the people together for any profitable purpose. There is so much ground to be gone over, and the amount of work done seems discouragingly small in proportion. Yet I have every reason to be thankful for the general success that seems to have attended my exertions.

I may observe that we have established a Parochial Council. It consists of four members. The parish was divided for the purpose into four districts, one delegate to be chosen from each district, and to be resident therein. The object of the Council is to assist the Clergyman and Churchwardens by their counsel and advice. Its members are elected at the vestry meeting,—to hold office during one year, and to meet (summoned by the Clergyman) at least once every three months.

Services at Parish Church,—Sundays, morning and evening, chief Holidays, Advent and Lent, week-day services.

Sunday Schools, 4,—two of which, at distances of 6 and 4 miles, I attend alternately, combining them with mission services. Public catechising, one in each month, at special afternoon services in Parish Church, to which the children of all the Sunday-schools are brought together, being provided with house accommodation and refreshments between the services.

Holy Communion,—First Sunday in month, Christmas. Easter and Whit-Sunday.

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#### OUDSWELL,

The work of the Church in this mission has been carried on during the year with but little interruption, except that

arising from illness of the Incumbent.

The attendance at headquarters and all outlying stations has been satisfactory, except South Ham. Indeed, the continued influx of the French and the standstill character of the English-speaking population, with the disposition to emigrate, will be disastrous to the mission if it does not profit by some of the schemes that are astir to promote immigration. The tables of questions put by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel with reference to immigration have been carefully answered and duly forwarded.

When, in addition to the fact of there having been only a very few families who called themselves church-people when this mission was first formed, and the consequent missionary character of the Church's work, we consider its isolated position, its small population, its distance from market, the untoward roads by which it is reached and the paralyzing effect of the credit and barter systems, it will readily appear that this mission is one of the most weak and struggling in the

diocese.

As exaggerated views are entertained of the material resources of this mission by some, the Incumbent invites careful inquiry into the substantial correctness of his statements. The assessment roll and the long catalogue of encumbered farms unfortunately attest too well the condition of things.

The people are, notwithstanding, willing to do what they can for church ministrations,—but not able to do as much as

missions whose resources are as three or four to one.

The usual missionary meetings were held last winter, at which telling speeches were made by the Rev. II. Roe, Mr. Stuart and W. E. Hamilton, Esq. These meetings, if

regularly and zealously maintained, are calculated to do much good, particularly in country missions, where the means of information are few.

During the summer we have erected on the church grounds a building which is ultimately to serve for a parsonage. It is now occupied by a Church model school, and we hope to make it very serviceable to the mission for a considerable term of years. It is of wood, well painted, of tasteful appearance, commodious, and second to none in the Eastern Townships in the way of internal furnishing, -maps, diagrams and other educational appliances.

I cannot report as I should wish about the important matter of Sunday schools. It is a very difficult thing, indeed, to maintain all the Sunday-schools that are needed in so widely scattered a population as this mission. The difficulty is two-fold,—first, that of finding teachers of sufficient learning and zeal to carry on the work, and second, that of raising cash as it is needed to procure the necessary question books and general reading, without which Sunday-schools cannot prosper. Other difficulties abound, but only those which are common to other places.

The Church is in a good state of repair, with most efficient arming apparatus. The burying-ground enclosure is old, warming apparatus. and will have to be rebuilt soon.

Upon the whole, comparing the up-hill work and the many difficulties of the past with the present, we have reason to thank God and take conrage. Appended is a financial statement of the mission for the year; -Also a list of the annual subscribers to the Church Society.

#### DURHAM.

The Rev. J. F. Carr, M.A., was succeeded by the Rev. Ernest King at the end of April. This report, therefore, covers only the period from the end of the second week after Easter to the first Sunday in Advent—just 31 weeks.

The missionary work done during that time is briefly set forth as follows.

Regular Services on the Lord's Day	
Extra Sunday services	79
Thanksgiving and other week days	17
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Or on an average more than 4 a week.

This high average is greatly due to the efforts of George Thornloe, Esq., Divinity Student of Bishop's College, Lennox-ville, who for nine Sundays during his summer vacation gratuitously rendered appreciated assistance as a lay-reader (under the Bishop's sanction.)

Through the kindly tendered help of clergymen in priest's orders, the Holy Communion has been administered (at different parts of the mission in turn) 7 times publicly and once in private.

The parochial visits have been 612.

Divine service is held at regular intervals in two churches, one town-hall and one school-house, and at three other school-houses occasionally.

Through the assistance of lay-helpers, four Sunday-schools and four choirs are kept up.

A pic-nic for the children came off in September.

The offertory has been established at South Durham, and a collection is taken up as a rule wherever services are held.

The present incumbent found a considerable debt standing against all three of the chief congregations in the mission: L'Avenir, \$67; South Durham, for new church, \$700 or \$800; Upper Durham, for organ, \$78; and for new church, about \$1,400; making an aggregate debt of at least \$2,200.

Through the unfortunate employment of an irresponsible contractor to whom both churches were let, neither is yet finished, although both were to have been ready for use more than a year ago. Even now, before the one at South Durham can be completed, an additional sum of about \$500 will have to be raised.

This state of things seriously retards the healthy development of missionary work, but the difficulties and discouragements attending it are being met by the people with active cheerfulness and hope.

It is confidently believed that next year's report will speak of much having been accomplished throughout the mission.

The debt of \$67 against L'Avenir is of old standing in favor of Mr. George Atkinson.

He, with characteristic generosity, has volunteered to renounce all claim upon the building if an effort is made by the congregation to make it more church-like. For this object money is now being collected.

The people of L'Avenir have, moreover, raised their assess-

ment from \$40 to \$100 for the next 2 years.

### BURY.

Having been appointed to this mission in March, 1871, my

report must be brief, and in some respects imperfect.

Through the exertions of my predecessor, the Rev. Mr. Richardson, I found, ready to hand, a large and well attended Sunday-school in the Village Church, (St. Paul's,) a source of comfort to the Pastor, as well, I trust, as profit to the children, who are, as a rule, diligent, attentive and eager to excel.

I have been enabled, through the devotion and energy of a member of the congregation, Mr. Joseph Clark, to establish

another Sunday-school distant three miles from the village Church, where upon an average of 25 to 30 children are, so far as I can judge, making steady progress in the attainment

of Christian and Church principles.

At Tingwick the Sunday-school is under the superintendence of Colonel Fitzgerald, a valuable ally, and who, as an authorized lay reader, conducts Divine Service on alternate Sundays with myself, thus enabling all at this station to enjoy the privilege of a regular weekly service.

I have also endeavored to establish a week-day bible class in Brookbury, of which I hope to be able to write better

things in the future.

A pleasing feature in the record of the past year was the re-union of the several Sunday-schools to recuperate mind and body in the enjoyment of those innocent sports so well beloved by youth, and this enjoyment was greatly heightened by the presence of their former beloved Pastor, Mr. Richardson, who took advantage of the occasion to instil into their hearts one more lesson of love. I am now engaged in forming confirmation classes, and I trust that at an early period a goodly number may be prepared, thoughtfully and intelligently, and prayerfully, to renew their baptismal vow.

In a pecuniary, as in a religious point of view, there still remains much to be done, but I trust that that co-operation on the part of the people which has been already evidenced will continue to increase and burn with a more steady flame. United in action as in faith, we recognize in practice as in

principle, the great truth that we are one in Him who is the head of all.

#### NORTH INVERNESS.

The retrospect of the closing year as regards affairs of the mission is decidedly encouraging. We have made such progress, that, humbly speaking, was hardly to have been expected. When I entered upon the work of the place in January there was considerable discussion as to the site of a parsonage and church, and for a time there seemed little prospect of either. But now we have to thank God that the situation of the parsonage was determined by vote of the Vestry, and that the house is furnished completely. We have to acknowledge, as we do gladly, the munificent help of Chas. King, Esq., of Lyster, and his sons. The Mission is greatly indebted to Mr. Chas. King for his indefatigable exertions. Nor must I omit to express our gratitude to certain members of the Hamilton family for generous assistance. The church members in the neighbourhood, too, have given and done what they could, which; in some instances, was very great, in proportion to their means.

With respect to the proposed Church, I hope in my next

report to show progress in that direction likewise.

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The Diocesan Board of Missions has assessed the mission at two hundred dollars for the next two years, being a rise of eighty dollars. This sum is considered by those who know the capabilities of the mission excessive. But I do not think it is; indeed, if the practice of calling upon the people to do their best to support the ministrations of the Church had been adopted earlier we should have been paying considerably more at this period. It is too common for certain willing members of the church to be allowed to pay the assessment, which should be borne by all. We have gone, however, on the principle of every man paying, and every one according to the condition of his temporal affairs. And it affords me the greatest pleasure to report that there is not one member who has been called upon who does not subscribe, and this in cases where the family is very poor. Moreover, in consequence of a tour of the parish, in company with the Wardens, I am able to say that, with proper management, the people will not be behindhand in testifying to their loyalty to the church of their fathers in a more substantial manner even than at present.

It will be seen by our statement of the amount raised for various funds of the Church Society, that we are not standing still nor going backward. I hope we shall collect a larger sum next year, when the machinery for the purpose will be in better working order. Certain ladies and gentlemen have kindly consented to act as collectors. Their success has not been so great as might be, on account, I fear, of a little prejudice. But I trust, ere long, this will

wear away.

The services of the Church are carried on regularly. We have morning service at St. Stephen's Church, and evening service at a school-house four and a balf miles distant, where a site has been given for a church. There are three monthly district services for those who, for some reason or other, cannot attend at either of the two centres on Sunday, when, the

weather permitting, the congregations are full.

I regret that I cannot report so favourably of the Sunday-school. An attempt was made to keep one going during the summer months, but as I had to teach it altogether myself it did not work well, my strength occasionally being insufficient. There is much need here of efficient lay-help. By next spring, when the school begins again, I hope to have teachers ready to take the work in hand.

#### COMPTON.

I took charge of this mission in November, 1870. My reception here was friendly. After a fortnight I called a meeting of the parishioners, and stated to them the conditions on which the Society would continue its grant. The conditions were accepted. The two hundred dollars advanced by

the Board to the late Missionary were immediately refunded, and the annual assessment (\$200) towards my stipend cheerfully subscribed. Since then matters have gone on progressing. Independently of two services every Sunday in St. James's, there is held (in same building,) a weekly Thursday evening service, with a choir practice afterwards. At each of the services there is an offertory. Occasional services are also held.

Two Sunday-schools have been organized, and are carried on during the whole year. Number of names on books,

sixty-six; average attendance, forty-two.

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Several communicants have been added, making the present number fifty-five. I do not include in this number persons who, though nominal communicants, have never communicated at my hands, nor at any others, for years past. There are unfortunately, several of these in my mission.

During the year I have baptized three adults and twentysix infants. I have had three marriages and six burials.

The reading-desk and pulpit in St. James's Church have been remodelled; the harmonium removed from the gallery into

the chancel, and the singing very greatly improved.

Early in the spring I was invited by M. H. Cochrane, Esq., of Hillhurst, to hold a fortnightly Sunday afternoon service on his property for the special benefit of those of his employées and others in that neighborhood who cannot, or will not, come to the village to Church. I readily acceded to the request, without asking or, in the least, expecting remuneration—only too thankful to find a new opening through which I might advance the cause of Christ's Church. But Mr. Cochrane insisted that I should receive all collections taken up at that service. And, more than that, he generously pays me, on his own account, for this duty, the sum of \$50 per annum. Not only at St. James's Church, but at this service also Mr. Cochrane and family are regular and punctual attendants.

One of the two Sunday-schools I have alluded to is at Hill-hurst. The school was first started by Miss Cochrane and Miss Massman, and is carried on through the praiseworthy efforts of these two young ladies. The Hillhurst service has been suspended for some weeks, owing to the bad condition of the old school-house, another place is being creeted, and it is hoped will be ready for use by Christmas. The Sunday-school is carried on, being held in Mr. Cochrane's house.

By one and all the members of my flock the greatest kindness, cordiality and respect have been shown to me. The most generous liberality has also been extended to myself and

family. I have specially to thank Messrs, Cochrane, Kendrick, Kellam and Randal, and Mrs. Paige, Anson Bliss,

Moore and Glines for repeated acts of kindness.

At Easter the congregation presented Mrs. Dinzey with an offering amounting to \$41. Soon after a fine cow, purchased for \$50, was presented to the parson by his flock. For this acceptable gift I am chiefly indebted to Mrs. Paige and Mrs. Anson Bliss.

A. W. Kendrick, Esq., from the very first, placed a horse and conveyance at my disposal for Sunday use, and, indeed, for any time I might need them, free of cost and trouble. He

has, otherwise, been most liberal in his offerings.

S. Randal, Esq., Church-warden at the time of my arrival, received me at the station and most hospitably entertained me at his house for five weeks, until Mrs. Dinzey could join me, . His kindness did not cease when I left his house.

M. H. Cochrane, Esq., is ever finding excuses for making me the recipient of his generosity. During the year, on various pretences, he has presented me with offerings in money amounting to one hundred dollars, and this over and above his liberal assessment subscription. Besides, he has sent me provisions of various kinds, fully equal in value to above named amount.

I am aware that these kind friends require no public acknowledgment of their liberality to me,—and perhaps will not feel over-pleased that I should thank them through the Society's published report, but I cannot refrain from telling it to the Church,—and in this I am only following the

example of the great apostle.

During my stay at Mr. Randal's, the parronage was made more comfortable for my reception by the addition of two dormer-windows. It was, also, freshly painted within, and all the rooms newly hung with paper, and things otherwise put to rights, (so far as the advanced state of the season admitted,) at a cost of at least one hundred dollars. A large hall stove was also purchased and presented to the parsonage. In the spring, other repairs and additions were made at a cost of about the same amount. The work was seen to by the Church-wardens, M. Blossom, Esq., and Dr. Parke. I must here thank these gentlemen for their courtesy to me, and kind attention to my suggestions in matters connected with the parish.

The intelligence of the Diocesan Board's intention to increase the assessment of this mission from \$200 per annum to \$500, was a severe shock to my nervous system. I called my people together and told them of the decision of the Board,

and urged them to submit. I think that several of them would have been thankful for an abatement of the Board's demand, but only one proposed to ask for such, while another bravely declared we had better pay the whole six hundred, but I thought the Board would rather pay the one hundred dollars, and retain our pleasant acquaintance. It is certainly very gratifying to me to see the readiness of the congregation to contribute all that is asked of them towards their clergyman's support,—and it is all the more gratifying, as they deem the screw rather too tightly applied in this instance.

It must not be supposed that there are no difficulties to contend against in this mission. I have met with no active opposition, but there is a degree of indifference to religion, on the part of a few in this village, and many in the surrounding neighbourhood, that is hardly credible. Nothing is impossible with God. He can at any time bring light out of darkness, but, humanly speaking, there is more hope of the conversion of savage heathen, than of men who, knowing nothing, caring for nothing in the way of religion, are nevertheless supremely contented with themselves, with their prospects here and in the world beyond. I sincerely hope that in my next report I may be able to write more hopefully of this class. The past year I have spent chiefly in viewing the land, this year, with God's help. I hope to reclaim some portions of it into the vineyard of the Church.

I did not ask for private subscriptions to Church Society. I desired my people to give what they had to give through the offertory, not letting either hand know what the other did. The result, for a first attempt, is not unsatisfactory, but I hope next year we shall do even better.

#### MALBAIE.

In presenting my report for the eighteen months during which I have been stationed here, I have to explain that in consequence of the unsatisfactory answers to the appeals which I made on behalf of the objects connected with the Society, I was ashamed to publish them last December, but I am happy to say there are indications of an awakening to a sense of the obligations and duties of this mission, after a period of inactivity.

The public services of the Church are well attended, and a feeling of interest in Church matters is generally manifested.

I have met with a generous response this year to appeals on behalf of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Bible Society, but not such as I expected to the Mission Fund, for the antiquated objection that we had enough to do at home. I have also brought forward the subject of an endowment, but in this matter nothing, as yet, has been done.

The Church this winter is lighted for evening service, and

more thoroughly heated.

Alterations, much needed, in the arrangements of the seats

are held over for the spring.

It is resolved to get out wood this winter for a steeple. We have in hand the proceeds of a concert last winter, \$23, towards a bell. Our services have been much enlivened and improved by the introduction of two harmoniums, the one at Malbaic, a beautiful instrument presented by our friends in Jersey. The increased assessment will, I think, be cheerfully subscribed.

At one Station, Corner of the Beach, a large building is being erected, two thirds of which is to be fitted up for service, and the other part as a school room.

This amongst 11 families entails no slight expense, besides labour, but it is cheerfully borne.

There have been many cases of sickness amongst us, and

consequently numerous calls on my time.

Last winter was very trying to us, owing to the draughty condition and exposed position of the Parsonage, but this I trust will soon be somewhat remedied by the addition of double windows. Having been built of unseasoned timber it is almost impossible to make it air tight.

But for much discomfort the kindness of the congregation has well compensated. The personal attentions which we have received have been both numerous and valuable.

But most important of all, I trust there is a more general impression gaining ground of the necessity of observing the fourth commandment, which, in connection with the fisheries, it has too long been the custom to ignore and set aside at pleasure.

In proportion as this conviction extends and is acted upon, may we hope for more spiritual life amongst us. When we have prepared ourselves for the reception of the Spirit we may look for its effusion.

In conclusion, I must bear testimony and record my obligations to our worthy Church-wardens and collectors for their ready and valuable assistance.

#### ACTON.

As heretofore, the mission of Upton, Diocese of Montreal, has been under my charge, as well as that of Acton.

This year the usual services of the Church have been sustained regularly in alternate order, morning in one Church, and evening in the other, and the Holy Communion has been celebrated in both once a month.

It is a matter of thankfulness on my part to my Heavenly Father, that through His goodness, neither siekness or accident has compelled me to vacate my post in one single instance, as Sunday after Sunday passed by. There is one subject connected with the work of this mission, which requires to be referred to. It is placed in a very peculiar position with respect to our erring brethren of the Church of Rome. More than nine-tenths of the inhabitants of Acton are French Canadiaus, and belong to that ereed. Many are here perceiving the anomaly of their Church's dogmas, and preferring to lay hold

of Christ alone as the way of salvation.

Under these circumstances, it occurred to me that reading part of the service in French and preaching an extempore French sermon, these might be led to embrace the glorious Church to which we belong, and thus Christ would be glorified the more in this part of His vineyard. My surmises did not disappoint me; ever since last winter. I have carried on that arrangement with success. At Easter it was a joyful sight to see 4 French Canadians partake of the Holy Communion, and at the next celebration in the following month, 2 more. These 6 are a sure pledge of God's blessing. Not a Sunday passes without having from 6 to 16 French present at the Church service. As it is, my presence is only half of the day in each Church, now how much more would it further this work, had I only the mission of Acton under my charge; then the services might be held in the forenoon and evening wholly in English, and in the afternoon, wholly in French. Would that the Board of Missions might give this mission proportionately as it grants to other missions, that is, taking into consideration the amount raised on an average per family and the number of Church services with which they are privileged! I am sure the \$600 required for clergyman's salary would be provided. This year, the amount of money raised for all church purposes in the mission was And as the number of families, including all Protestant denominations, is twenty-six, it gives \$21.21 per family. Last year the average amount was \$19.57, showing an increase of \$1.64. The amount received from the offertory was \$16.65 ahove what was received last year, a clear index of improvement in the attendance on public worship.

Our little church has been sadly in want of an altar cloth; now, however, we are provided with an excellent one, which, with a carpet for the chancel, was purchased with a sum of money given as a thank-offering, especially for that purpose, by a member of the congregation. The chancel still needs chairs, but we hope in God's good time to be supplied with them also.

Our Sunday-school has been well attended and has been provided with the children's paper of Sunday teaching, published under the sanction of the Lord Bishop of Toronto. This ensures system in teaching and regularity in attendance, for each scholar is supplied with a copy each Sunday, containing the lessons to be learnt for the following Sunday. It will do incalculable good in country parts, where at times it is difficult to obtain proper teachers, and the consequence is that the scholars are fed with a desultory sort of teaching. These papers, however, are filled with proper questions, precluding all irregular instructions.

The future prospects of the Church in this locality are good. Last year there was only a possibility of the R., D. and A. Railway, passing this way so as to form a junction with the Shefford and Waterloo Railway; now that possibility has matured into certainty, as the deed of contract has been signed and the contractor has even engaged rooms for his staff of engineers in one of our hotels; so that, by the end of next July, we may expect to see railway trains in full operation between Sorel and Actonvale. This, no doubt, will improve the condition of the Church, and we may be enabled

to complete our building, erected for the service of God, and have it consecrated.

We have great hopes also of having an Endowment Fund invested for the good of the Mission, before the close of

another year.

May the God of all grace prosper our small congregation, as He has done heretofore, and the fruits of our increase will surely redound to his glory by bringing forth good works as well as gratitude on our part.

#### CHIGOTAC.

I will begin my report by stating what my Registers, &c.. tell of my work. During the past year, I have had 38 Baptisms, 4 Marriages and 13 Burials, in addition to which I have held 180 services and 20 public celebrations of the Holy Communion. I have also visited the people in sickness and in health. In a mission like mine, with 3 churches and a school-house in which to hold services, and long distances to travel, this work involves a great amount of driving about. So the services, visiting, attending to my horse, &c., when at home, my duties as Chairman of School-Commissioner, and my studies have all combined to keep me from feeling the

painful burden of having nothing to do.

I have many reasons to believe that my labours have not been in vain. Things are far from being what they ought to be but then there has been progress and improvement, even if slow. And the knowledge of that Gospel which has been so powerful and so great in its effects in the world, may do more here yet. I sometimes wish I could have a brother Clergyman to put before my people the great truths and facts of religion, so that they might learn from having truth set before them in different ways by different preachers, just as it is given us to have different accounts of our Lord's life from different writers. If the people are not what they ought to be, I yet have the satisfaction of thinking that they would be worse without the ministrations of religion, which they certainly value. I often, too, think of a suggestion I saw made to the effect that we have to think of evil prevented, as well as of good accomplished.

During the past year I, on the recommendation of the Warden of St. Augustine's, received from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge a grant to the amount of £4 sterling for my Mission. I thought it a suitable opportunity

to introduce a Hymn Book into the Mission. So I took the grant in Hymn Books. And now those treasures are in the hands of the people. I hope bearing good fruit. I cannot tell how grateful I felt both to the Warden of St. Augustine's for his recommendation, and to the Venerable Society for its grant.

#### CAPE COVE.

Since my last report no change has taken place in the affairs of this Mission. During the past year, Sunday and daily schools have flourished, and the attendance at Divine Service and the Holy Communion has been quite equal to that of former years. The assessment levied by the Board of Missions has been fully paid up, for which credit is due not only to the readiness of the people in meeting the assessment punctually, but also to the energy and zeal of our Churchwardens, more especially of the senior Warden. Thomas Savage, Esq., to whose kindness and liberality as well as interest in the well-being of the Mission, we all owe a debt of gratitude.

Our Sunday-school here was well attended during the summer months, sixty pupils and six teachers having been frequently present. Towards the fall the attendance became smaller, owing to the badness of the roads and the distance many of the children were obliged to walk. In winter we are obliged for these reasons, to discontinue the school. At Percé and L'Anse au-bean-fils the Sunday-schools were also in operation with an attendance of about twelve at each.

St. James's Church had a narrow escape in July, when, during a remarkably severe thunder storm, the lightning struck the spire and shattered one of the main posts of the tower, permanently weakening that part of the building. Besides this, however, and the breaking of a few boards and some glass, no further harm was done, for which we were all thankful. The weather-worn and somewhat crazy condition of the tower did not warrant our renewing the shattered post, which could not have been accomplished without great expense, but it has been secured in a temporary manner, and the other damages have also been repaired.

At Percé there has been some improvement in Church music made during the past year, and an excellent chamber organ has been acquired by the congregation, chiefly through the energy of Mr. E. Romeril, one of Messrs. Robin's Agents.

who not only exerted himself in collecting funds for the purchase of the instrument, but was also a liberal contributor. The promptness with which the greater part of the price of the instrument, \$150, was contributed by the small congre-

gation of St. Paul's, is very much to their credit.

I am glad to notice the continued kindness of my people, and to acknowledge gratefully an Easter Gift from Cape Cove of \$44, and one from Percé of \$16. I gladly mention also the gift of a valuable gold watch from the congregation of Cape Cove, presented to me in September, with a most affectionate but too flattering address, by Messrs. Savage, Balleine, Romeril, Ramon, Baker and Lenfestey, in the name of a large number of the congregation. I think, and I say it with gratitude to Him without whose blessing all our efforts are powerless, that the prospects of the Mission are more encouraging than they have ever been. There is neither division nor dissent amongst us; The children are all being trained up in the principles of our Church, and learn from an early age to take an interest in her services. In our schools, Sunday and daily, Holy Scripture and the Church Catechism are regularly taught, and the result of this training can already be seen in our orderly congregations in which the young people and the children form a large proportion.

## WILLIAM GORE LYSTER.

#### VALCARTIER.

I took charge of this mission on the 15th day of February last past, and was formally and solemuly inducted by the Bishop on the second Sunday of Lent following, in presence of a large and seemingly devout congregation, which service impressed me, at the time, as an augury of coming peace and mutual fellowship in carrying on the work of the church. I am thankful to add that my hope, so auspiciously begun, has not since failed to be realized. Both in attendance at the Parish Church, and in the devout worship of the congregation, a warm interest has been maintained since that day.

Hitherto we have had, regularly, morning service at the Parish Church, and a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion. The latter is not so numerously attended as the

congregation should warrant.

I have had an afternoon service monthly and consecutively at three outposts in this Parish, also at the little (now decaying) church in the adjoining Parish of St. Catherine. As this little church is, by road, about twelve miles distant from the

church of Valcartier, I must interchange, occasionally, the morning and afternoon services hereafter, as they seldom, if ever, come from St. Catherine's to the church of Valcartier, at

which they congregate from the other out-posts.

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I regret to say that, from a want of lay assistance, I have not been able to carry out my plan of Sunday-schools, so much needed, and I am yet unable to devise a scheme to meet this want, as the day schools afford no privilege, and the distant and scattered localities of the children render it difficult otherwise to reach them. Something must be done to overreach this difficulty.

#### GASPÉ BASIN.

The services at the two Churches in my Mission have been

regularly held during the past year.

St. Paul's Church.—The congregation was augmented during the summer months, owing to an influx of visitors to Gaspé Basin. During the remainder of the year the attendance at St. Paul's has been about the average. The ordinary congregation is composed of seventeen families and a few of the sailors belonging to the vessels employed in the fish and lumber trade of the Port of Gaspé.

The small number of Pew-holders, together with the fact that the larger portion of the assessment is derived from a very few members of the Vestry, influenced the Church-wardens and Clergyman in their opinion as to the union of the Missions of Sandy Beach and Gaspé Basin, which was advised by the Diocesan Board. One strong self-supporting Mission with three Churches within a short distance of each other was felt to be preferable to two Missions struggling for an existence.

But the congregation accept with pleasure the arrangement which for the coming year gives them their usual services.

I am happy to be able to state that the Sunday-school at the Basin has been re-organized. For a time it was closed, owing to the old teachers having left the Mission and the great difficulty experienced in replacing them.

St. James's Church.—This congregation shows a disposition to increase steadily. The assessment has been nearly doubled within the last three years. It was \$80, it is now \$150.

The services are more hearty and the attendance good, although almost half the people labor under the disadvantage

of having to cross a Bay, a mile wide.

The Church-wardens have adopted a very good plan for making collections to meet assessment, &c. They have divided this portion of the Mission into districts and have chosen a collector in each. The collectors are called upon to report quarterly to the Wardens, a prough them the Wardens are in constant communication with the people.

The school at the Basin is again in operation, after having

been closed for some months for want of a teacher.

There is no regular school in the North-west district, but a private school is kept in the L'Anse-aux-Cousins settlement at an expenditure which is a hardship to the few families there.

The South-west school is about to be divided into two districts. The Roman Catholic population have notified the Commissioner of their intention to dissent, so the great obstacle in the Mission to receiving aid from Church of England Educational Societies will be removed.

The Township of York is still in want of schools, so also is

the North-west.

The whole mission contains 242 adult members of the Church of England, and 353 children under 14 years of age.

#### SANDY BEACH.

In sending you the annual report of this Mission, I can but say that nothing striking or peculiar, in its circumstances or

position, calls forth special attention.

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Through the good hand of our God upon us we have been permitted to pass the year in quietness and peace, attending calmly to the ordinary avocations and business which, in course, presented themselves. That, we are forcibly reminded, is no small blessing, when the whole land is still ringing with the wail of tens of thousands, who have lost their all, through the terrible—the unutterably tenrful—destructiveness of consuming fire. The Lord's sore judgments have been all around us, but, through His mercy, they have not touched us. May his goodness lead us to renewed repentance

and more complete obedience.

The minds of our people were, for some time, greatly exercised and depressed by the intelligence that the Diocesan Board intended joining this Mission to that of Gaspe Basin, and giving both to the charge of one Missionary. To this they were strongly opposed, as they believed that the Diocesan Board was pledged to continue the undivided services of a clergyman amongst them, because they had complied, and were still ready to comply, with all requisitions of the Board to the utmost of their ability. Upon their urgent remonstrance and representation the Board came to the determination to continue their elergyman to them for two years longer, upon condition of the Mission paying to the Board \$300 per annum, to which they at once consented, and so the matter now stands.

Through God's goodness, I have been enabled to keep up the usual services in the Mission, and they have been, as heretofore, well attended. Some have been, during the year, summoned by the Great Master to appear in his immediate presence, and have passed away in peace, leaving us every reason to hope that they sleep in Jesus, and will, when He

descends in judgment, appear with Him in glory.

The contributions for Church purposes have been, on the whole, about the same as those of last year, viz:

There have been 4 Marriages; 16 Baptisms; 9 Burials.

Our Endowment Fund is slowly accumulating; a small legacy of \$38.39 has this year been added to it. In process of time it may fulfil the hope with which it was commenced, and enable the Mission to be self-supporting, but it is long to wait, the people are very poor and it can increase but slowly. Had it been begun years ago, as it might have been, how different had been our present position, but regrets are vain.

I am full of fears as to the results which will ensue when all extraneous aid shall be withdrawn, some Missions will have to be abandoned, and much good now being done will cease and come to nought, not wholly, indeed, but comparatively. Some of the seed sown will still grow, and bear fruit, even when it ceases to be watered and tended as it is now, but we cannot expect that aid from abroad should be forever continued, since so many other portions of the fields and vineyard of the Lord's inheritance are white for the harvest, and ripe for the vintage, and the labourers must needs be sent

forth.

A deep, a biding sense of gratitude for the many gifts already showered upon us, should be the sentiment uppermost in the minds of Canadian Churchmen towards the Soeiety for the Propagation of the Gospel, and though its fostering care of us must soon cease, never can we regard it as other than our mother, tender and beloved.

I may conclude this retrospect of the year with the words of the Psalmist "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all

His benefits."

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#### ST. SYLVESTER.

Your missionary's endeavor throughout the past year has been to render three services on each Sunday.

Much time and labor has been expended in endeavoring to place the various schools of the mission in a satisfactory con-

The importance of schools cannot be over-rated, especially when the field of labor is occupied by a travelling missionary.

The Church Society has rendered much valuable aid in keeping schools open in different parts of the mission.

In consequence of certain adverse circumstances, it has been found impossible to maintain the schools in St. Patrick's, St. Margaret's and St. Catherine's.

Your missionary regrets that he has not yet been enabled to start schools at St. George's and Cumberland Mills. The people live at such great distances from each other that it is very difficult to found schools at which all may attend. As long as members of the church were employed on the St. Francis in the gold mines, divine service was regularly held in the village and at the mines, through the noble exertions of Mr. Pope, acting under the Bishop's authority, as lay-reader.

Your missionary can hardly find words to express the deep regret he feels at the removal of Mr. Pope from the district. Mrs. Pope also was ever ready to go in and out amongst the

people and cheer them on with kind words.

St. Giles.—We have here a good school and able teacher, but in consequence of some of the inhabitants refusing to pay the necessary school dues, your missionary is often placed in

much difficulty.

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St. Sylvester.—A new parsonage is very much required. Some kind friends have contributed towards this desirable object, but they are not of the mission. There appears a most unwilling mind on the part of some of the parishioners to undertake this duty or any other that would beautify the residence of their elergyman.

St. Patrick's.—The small congregation in this place has increased since divine service has been regularly held once every Lord's Day. Your missionary hopes that during the coming year the parishioners, one and all, will assist to the uttermest of their power the good work of the Church

amongst them.

The record of the past year is one on which both the clergyman and congregation must look with much satisfaction. Besides the necessary repairs which have been made to the Church, the interior has been greatly improved by a new altar cloth, chancel rails, and carpet for the chancel, as well as other additions, giving an air of brightness and comfort which are certainly no hindrances to devotion.

We have also to congratulate ourselves on the acquisition of a new organ of great compass and sweetness of tone, adding

much to the beauty and efficiency of our service.

The free and open pew system which was adopted last year has not disappointed us. The first year it was tried with a guarantee fund to supplement anticipated deficiencies, which, it is needless to say, were realized. Last Easter Monday, it was resolved to do away with all guarantees and to trust entirely to the weekly offerings, and so far the results are satisfactory. The attendance, especially at the evening services, has greatly increased, and there is a marked improvement in the offertory at the morning service. It does not, indeed, as yet come up to the necessary standard, but I think we have every reason to believe that in a short time we shall find, when the annual accounts are made up, instead of deficiency, a surplus, and that the free-will offerings of earnest worshippers made on the first day of the week, in accordance with the apostolic injunction, is the true mode of maintaining the services of our God in the sanctuary.

#### SHERBROOKE.

I have to report that nothing of an unusual character has

## FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and bequeath to "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebee," incorporated by a Statate of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum of (or Shares of Stock in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Met of Incorporation and none other.

II. A bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specified purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italies say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,

Towards the support of missionaries and clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

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Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the church in the mission of (or at ) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the incumbent and church-wardens of the church in the said mission, (or at )

Or,

As the commencement of an endowment for the church of St. in the mission of (or at ) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or.

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebee, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto the "Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 171, all and singular, &c. [Describe the real estate clearly.] To have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

Same as in No.3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. A Devise to the Society of a Site for Church, &c.

Same as No. 2, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows;—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say; upon trust to hold the same for ever hereafter, as and for the place and site of a Church, and Church-yard, and Burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the places adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purpose, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

FOR THE PENSION FUND, on one of the Sundays in Advent.


The attention of applicants for grants is particularly directed to the following rules.

- 1. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.
- 2. That grants be payable when the amount shall be sufficient to free the property from debt; or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent of the value of the property or building, when finished.
- 3. That the Treasurer, when transmitting the amount of any grant of money, made by this Society, to any parish or mission in the diocese, shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such parish or mission, and one or both of the church-wardens.
- 4. That in all eases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the

duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular-vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

- 5. That with the exception of grants to aid in building churches, when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.
- 6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of any church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been approved of by the Bishop.
- 7. That no grant shall be made to any parish, mission, or station, in which at least one sermon shall not have been preached, and from which the subscription shall not have been sent in, during the year.
- 8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary at least a fortnight before the next meeting of the Central Board.
- 9. That no application for aid in repairing either churches or parsonages be entertained for the future; as the Central Board conceive it to be the duty of congregations to keep all their church property in good repair.
- 10. Clergymen desirous of participating in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are required to pay their annual contributions before the first May in each year.
