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
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
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

# MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

TAKEN IN THE

Weslegan Methodist Church, Sydenham Street,

#### IN THE

## CITY OF KINGSTON, ONTARIO,

JUNE, 1862

At nine o'clock, a.m., on WEDNESDAY, June 3rd, the Conference met. The Rev. JAMES ELLIOTT, President for 1867, in the Chair. After the usual devotional exercises, the Conference proceeded to organize.

The retiring Secretary, Rev. JAMES GRAY, called for the names of the Ministers and Preachers who had been appointed to attend the Conference. Two hundred and fifty were reported from the several Districts; one hundred and eighty of whom answered to their names.

The Rev. WM. MORLEY PUNSHON, M. A., President for the ensuing year, was introduced to the Conference, and took the Chair.

The Conference then proceeded to elect a Secretary, and the Rev. CHARLES LAVELL, M. A., was chosen.

Who was born in Strabano, in the North of Ireland, in 1798, and who died in Montreal, February 20, 1358, aged 70 years.

He was converted in early life, and connecting himself with the Primitive Wesleyan Society in Ireland, he was called into the ministry of that Society in his native land. He emigrated to Canada in 1842, joined the Wesleyan Church in Canada East, and subsequently removed to Canada West, where he laboured as a diligent and zuccessful minister of Jesus Christ.

Domestic trials led him to seek a superannuated relation to the Conference, in 1864, at which time he took up his residence in Wellington Square.

Bro her Graham's religious life was one of joyons trust in God. He ' upproved himself as the minister of God, by pureness, by

#### SCALE OF ALLOWANCE TO SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS, AND THE WIDOWS OF MINISTERS WHO HAVE DIED IN THE WORE.

1. Every Superannuated Minister who shall have travelled effectively fifteen years shall receive \$128 00 per annum, and from fifteen years and upwards shall receive \$8 00 per annum for each year of effective service.

2. Every Superannusted Minister who shall have travelled ELEVEN years, and less than fifteen years, shall receive \$128 00 per annum for four years.

3. Every Superannuated Minister who shall have travelled EIGHT years, and less than eleven years, shall receive \$80 00 per annum for four years.

4. Any Minister who may locate and enter into secular business, and subsequently be received into the Conference, shall not be allowed any claim for services during his first period of labour.

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5. It shall be competent for the Board, upon the recommendation of the Conference, to commute with such Ministers as may become Superannuated from causes which do not disqualify them for active business, by paying them such sums as may be deemed equitable, instead of allowing such to become permanent claimants upon the Superannuated Ministers' Fung.

6. Ministers who retire temporarily from the work, on account of ill health or accident, while they receive from the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, according to their years of service, shall not be precluded from receiving aid to such amount as the Conference may recommend from the Contingent or Missionary Fund, as they may have been engaged in regular or mission work.

7. The widows of deceased Ministers shall be allowed two-thirds of the amount appropriated to their husbands, according to the foregoing scale, except: Such widows as are ten years younger than their husbands, and were married after their husbands were fiftyfive years of age, or after they were superannuated. These shall have no claims except by the recommendation of the Board, and ~. the entire discretion of the Conference.

Provided always, that when the claims upon the Superannuated Ministers' Fund for any year shall be more than the income of such year, each claimant shall receive a per centage in proportion to his or her claims, to the full amount only of the current income.

8. Any Minister who shall be expelled from the Conference, or shall hereafter leave the effective work for other employment, or to labor in other countries, shall thereby forfeit to the Superannuated Ministers' Fund the amount which he may have paid into it.

#### COMMITTEES REPORT.

The children to be provided for the present Conference ;eas amount to 817, and although 20 have gone off the Fund by age, and 11 have been removed by death, the number of births makes as increase of 29 claimants over the former year. It is gratifying to know that the increase in membership for the past year, on Circuits paying into this Fund, is nearly sufficient to meet the claims of these additional children. It will however be seen by the Treasurer's Report that the balance on band, amounting to \$619–47, has been consumed in liquidating the claims of the past year, making it necessary, unless the tax per member is increased, to reduce the amount of claim for each child the present year; therefore—

Resolved,....That the rate per member for this year be 35 cents, and that \$24 50 be the amount payable by the Fund for each child.

Resolved,-That the REV. J. C. SLATER be continued as General Treasurer, and the REV. J. H. STARR as General Secretary.

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Report of Committee appointed at the Hamilton Conference to consider the recommendation of the Children's Fund Committee in regard to the claims of the Children of Superannuated Ministers.

The Committee composed of Revs. Dr. Wood, R. Jones, J. Douse, S. Rose, and J. C. Slater, met in Toronto, on the 4th September, 1867.

The Committee have c...refully considered the question submitted to their judgment, that is to say, the propriety of continuing the payment of the claims of Superannuated Ministers Children out of the Children's Fund—which practice is alleged by the Children's Fund Committee to be a departure from the original intention of the Fund, and therefore irregular and unconstitutional.

Having ascertained that the resolution of the Kingston Convention, which originated the Fund, and which was adopted by the Quarterly Official Boards, requires "that a fund be established for equalizing the support of Preachers' children upon the principle adopted by the English Conference;" and that the practice of that body has always been to provide for the children of Experimented Ministers out of their Children's Fund; and further, that the practice has been sanctioned by the declaratory resolution of the Conference, to be found in the Minutes of 1858, and set forth in the Discipline of 1859, and has been the usage of the Connexion for many years past, the Committee are of the opinion that the claims of the children of Superannuated Preachers are a regular and legitimate charge upon the Children's Fund, and recommend that they be paid as usual.

## **EEPORT**

#### OF THE

## SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR 1868.

Your Committee are happy in being able to come before the Conference with tidings of cheer from our Sunday Schools in every part of our extended work.

The statistical returns are fuller than in former years, and show most gratifying progress in almost every particular. The schedules report an increase of 89 schools; but it is believed the net gain does not exceed 50, and that the remaining 39 should have appeared in the returns of last year. The increase in the staff of Teachers is 698, and of Scholars 3,126. There is also an itcrease of 705 Scholars meeting in class. The amount raised for Missionary and Sunday School purposes is \$17,358 05, an

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increase of about \$2,500 over the previous year. There is only one particular in which a decrease is observable, namely, in the number of Teachers who are not members of our Church.

Your Committee observe with pleasure that the Book-Steward, acting on the recommendation of the last Conference, has commenced the publication of a monthly paper for Sunday School Teachers. They are convinced that it is well calculated to supply a long-felt want, and that both as regards the character of the publication itself, and the wants of our Sunday School work, it is entitled to the confidence and support of the Ministers and Teachers throughout the entire Connexion. Your Committee trust, therefore, that "THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BANNER" will obtain such a circulation as will insure it: Janent publication.

Your Committee regret that there has not been a larger increase in the circulation of the SUNDAY SCHOOL ADVOCATF, and they are convinced that the chief hindrance is its price, which, especially on the poorer Circuits and Missions, prevents it from competing with cheaper publications of the same class. From several Districts representations of this kind have been received, and many Ministers have declared their inability to extend the circulation of the ADVOCATE while cheaper publications are in the field. Your Committee would therefore most earnestly recommend that the SUNDAY SCHOOL ADVOCATE be issued in future at the uniform rate of twenty-five cents per copy, where not less than ten cepies are taken.

From a number of Districts resolutions and suggestions have been received, strongly recommending the appointment of a General Sunday School Agent. While fully

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intlly recognizing the importance of such an agency, your Committee cannot conceal the fact that, as yet, we have no connexional Sunday School organization which an agent might represent, nor any available fund from which he could be paid  $\cdot$  nevertheless they are strongly of the opinion that by organizing a Connexional Sunday School Union, and by bringing the matter prominently before our people during the present year, the nucleus of a fund, at least, might be formed, which would justify the Conference, at its next session, in sending an agent into the field

Your Committee are glad to know that during the past year several District Sunday School Conventions have been held with encouraging results. They would therefore recommend the holding of similar Conventions on every District, where practicable, during the coming year,

The limits of this Report forbid your Committee enlarging upon other topics of interest which have been before them; but in view of the facts already presented, -- in view of promoting the purity of our Sunday School Literature,in view of the fact that our future as a Church will in no small degree depend upon the religious training of the youth of our congregations, they respectfully submit that the time has come when our Sunday Schools should be organized on the connexional principle, as a distinct department of our work, under the control of the Conference, and receiving that careful consideration from year to year which so important a matter demands. Your Committee trust, therefore, that the Constitution of the Wesleyan Sunday School Union, which has been revised by order of the last Conference, and which, in its amended form, will be presented in connection with this Report, will not only receive

the sanction of this Conference, but that some method will be adopted for carrying its provisions into immediate and effective operation.

#### CONSTITUTION

#### OF THE

SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION OF THE WESLEYAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

#### ARTICLE I.

The title of this Association shall be "THE SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada."

#### ARTICLE II.

The object of this Society shall be to promote the cause of Sabbath Schools in connection with the Wesleyan Methodist Church; and thus by a careful religious training of those who may be brought within its influence, seek to advance the interests of the Redeemer's Kingdom in the earth.

#### ARTICLE III.

The payment of fifty cents annually shall constitute a member; and the payment of ten dollars at one time a member for life; and

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the payment of twenty-five dollars at one time shall constitute a Director for life. Provided that no person shall exercise the functions of a Director who is not a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

#### ARTICLE IV.

In order to effectually carry out the object of this Society, each District shall constitute a Branch of the Union, and shall hold its Anniversary on the evening of the first day of the May District Meeting. The District Committee shall consist of the Ministers and Preachers, Directors and Life Members, and one lay Representative from each Sabbath School within the boundaries of the District, and shall be entitled to elect its own Chairman and Secretary, and one Director of the Association, in addition to any Life Directors within the bounds of the District.

#### ARTICLE V.

In order to promote the objects of this Association, it is recommended that a collection for Sunday School purposes shall be made once a year at each Sunday School in the several Circuits or Missions, and all funds so collected shall be sent to the Financial Secretary for the District, by whom the same shall be transmitted to the General Treasurer. This Collection shall be made in the month of October.

#### ARTICLE VL.

The Board of Management shall consist of a President, (who shall be President of the Conference for the time being,) five Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, the Life Directors, and the Directors elected by the District Branch Societies. At all meetings of the Board, ten members shall form a quorum.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the meeting of Conference, and on the second evening of the session of that body, when practicable, when the Secretary shall submit the Annual Report of the Board, and the Treasurer exhibit a certified statement of the accounts; and the election of officers for the ensuing year take place.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

No alteration of, or addition to, this Constitution shall be valid until the same has passed the Annual Meeting, and received the sanction of the Conference.

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### CONSTITUTION FOR A SINGLE SCHOOL.

#### ARTICLE I.

This Society shall be called the —— Wesleyan Sunday School Society, auxiliary to the Sunday School Union of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

#### ARTICLE II.

The object of this Society shall be to sustain a Sabbath School at \_\_\_\_\_\_.

#### ARTICLE III.

The payment of \_\_\_\_\_\_ cents annually shall constitute a member ; and the payment of five dollars at one time, a member for life.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the Officers, Teachers, and Visitors, together with the Circuit Ministers and Preachers. who shall be members, *ex-officio*; the Superintendent of the Circuit being Chairman.

#### ARTICLE V.

The Officers of this Society shall be a Superintendent, (and, if deemed necessary, an Assistant Superintendent,) Secretary, Treasurer, and Librarian.

#### ARTICLE VI.

Teachers and Visitors may be nominated by the Superintendent on their entering the School, and elected by the Committee of Management one month subsequently.

#### ARTICLE VII.

Regular meetings of the Committee of Management shall be held on the \_\_\_\_\_\_ of \_\_\_\_\_ month, for the transaction of such business as relates to the interests of the Society and School, at which the following order shall be observed :--\_\_\_\_\_

1. Singing and prayer; 2. Calling roll; 3. Reading Minutes; 4. Unfinished business; 5. Reports from Committees; 6. Reports from Superintendent; 7. Reports from Treasurer; 8. Reports from Librarian; 9. Reports from Visitors; 10. Reports from Teachers; 11. Miscellaneous.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

At all meetings for business, --- members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX.

Special Meetings of the Committee of Management may be called by the Superintendent, or any three of the members.

#### ARTICLE X.

The Annual Meeting of this Society shall be held in the month of in each and every year, when the Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be submitted, and the election of Officers for the ensuing year take place.

#### ARTICLE XI.

All appointments to office shall be subject to the approval of the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission.

#### ARTICLE XII.

No person shall be permitted to retain his situation, as Officer or Teacher, whose moral character, or religious opinions, shall render him in the opinion of the Committee, or the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission, unfit for such situation.

## REPORT

#### OF THE

## TREASURERS OF VICTORIA COLLEGE.

The Treasurers in presenting their Annual Report to the Board for 1867, and through it to the Conference, while deeply regretting some things, would nevertheless record their devout gratitude to the Giver of all good for the measure of success granted to the institution during the past year. The number of students in all the departments, including the Grammar School, is considerably in excess of any previous year, being 417. The arrangements made at the beginning of the year with the Trustees of the Cobourg Grammar School, to affiliate that School with the College, have fully met the expectations of parties concerned, and should no untoward circumstances occur to

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
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
prevent the continuance of the affiliation, we may reasonably expect results in the future still more encouraging. The carrying out of these arrangements has been the means of resuscitating the Grammar School, and thus giving a larger number of young men an opportunity of preparing for matriculation in the University, who, probably, would not have done so had it not been for these arrangements. They have, as was expected, increased the number in attendance, and lessened the expenses. In these particulars we regard the affiliation as a complete success. From tuition fees in the Faculty of Arts we have received very little assistance, as all who enter the University in that Faculty do so upon paid up scholarships. We also regret that so small an amount has been obtained from subscriptions and notes which were reported last year as being due. Every one in arrears has been written to during the year, and payment earnestly urged in every way likely to insure success; also, the good offices of the Chairmen of Districts have been solicited in accordance with a resolution of the Conference Special Committee, passed last November; and yet the returns, as you may see from the balance sheet, are far from being satisfactory. However, the amount collected, small as it is, has assisted us in some measure to carry out the recommendation which we made in our report last year, and which was accepted by the annual meeting, viz., to use the balance of the subscriptions when collected to defray working expenses, and thus render it unnecessary to run an account at the bank on the strength of obtaining the accustomed Parliamentary Grant. By acting upon this recommendation-as may be seen by the balance sheet-our bank liabilities are only \$553 55, compared with \$4,384 last year. And should the annual grant be continued, or

an equivalent be given for it by the Legislature from some fund at its disposal, and the balance still due on subscriptions be collected and used as recommended-towards paying working expenses-then the institution will be put into a position, with respect to its finances, far more favorable than it has occupied for several years. The Treasurers will then have the grant to begin the year's operations with, instead of its being used up before the work of the year is entered upon; but if this balance should not be paid, and the Government be allowed to carry out the policy respecting Denominational Colleges of which they have given notice, then very serious embarrassment will be the inevitable result: to prevent which, the friends of the University and of the Wesleyan Methodist Church will have to unite in some plan to raise, at least for a time, until the question is settled, a sufficient amount to make up for even the temporary loss of the assistance which we have been receiving for the last 25 years from the Provincial Funds. Unless something of this kind is done we will be compelled, after all that has been done, to shut up the halls of the University, and succumb to a calamity too painful to Agreeably with a resolution passed at the contemplate. last Annual Meeting, the Treasurers have, during the year, prepared a full and, we trust, correct report of all paid up subscriptions and donations given at different periods for the relief of the University, with a brief account of the origin and progress of the attempts made at different times to put the institution in circumstances which would relieve those to whom the management of its affairs have been committed from painful anxiety respecting its efficiency and continued success. From the report here referred to, it may be seen that a very large majority of our members and

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adherents have given us no assistance to wipe out the late heavy debt. There is from some Circuits not a name except that of the Superintendent; others having a membership of several hundreds, with numerous adherents, are represented by some half dozen names.

Notwithstanding this, the princely subscriptions of a few noble friends, with the paid up subscriptions of 230 of the Ministers of the Connexion, added to the smaller offerings of those who responded to the call made upon them to pay as well as to subscribe, have been sufficient to free our noble University from a heavy debt, on which an embarrassing amount of interest had to be paid.

With respect to the future we would have no fears, were it not for the threatened change in the educational policy of the Government. Should that change take place, and our people not come to the rescue with an endowment of at least \$100,000, or an equivalent for the present Government grant, or an annual subscription or collection sufficient to meet annual expenses, we must shut up the Institution, however reluctant we may be to do so, and abandon an enterprise so auspiciously commenced by our fathers some thirty-six years ago. It is an encouraging fact that the interest taken by our people in higher education, for the youth of this Dominion, is increasing every year; but it is doubtful whether it is yet sufficiently intensified to make them willing to forego their just claim upon the Legislature and Government of the Province for assistance, and depend entirely upon private resources for a sufficient amount to pay an efficient staff of Professors, and furnish the facilities necessary to give the much desired University education.

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In closing this Report, the Treasurers would express a hope that the Board and Conference may adopt such measures as will enlist the sympathy and secure the cooperation of all who are interested in the higher and proper education of our youth, and save Victoria College from the disastrous effects of having her pecuniary resources crippled. Until the result of the contemplated appeal to the country is known, a sufficient sum in some way or other must be provided to keep the income of the College from being less than it is at present, or, as we have before intimated, the . work of giving our youth a University education, as far as we are concerned, must cease for the present.

Resolved,—That we strongly disapprove of the practice of encouraging or allowing places to be opened on the Sabbath, in the vicinity of our Camp-Meetings, for the sale of groceries or provisions of any kind; and we would recommend our brethren to discountenance such places, and, if need be, to carry out mildly, but firmly, the existing enactments of the civil law against them.

### Preachers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers who have travelled four years are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion, and their ordination, are thereby deferred.

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## Relating to the Book Room.

*Resolved*,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward, at or before the Meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—That in the case of any Minister or Preacher who is indebted the amount of \$100 to the Bock Roem, the Book Steward shall be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of any connexional funds on which that brother may have a claim, to the amount of not more than 25 per cent. of his claim annually, until his debt is paid; and that a like proportion prevail when the indebtedness is larger than the sum named.

Resolved,—That the brethren indebted to the Book Room, they not being claimants on the connexional funds, be required to settle all overdue accounts, and pay the same within two years:

### Candidates' Trial Sermon.

Resolved,—'The': this Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion of the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such candidate to the Confarence;

Resolved, --- That the British Conference be respectfully requested to appoint the Rev. WILLIAM M. PUNSHON, M.A., President of this Conference for 1869; and believing that his continued labors amongst us would be of great value to

Resolved,—That the Educational Fund collection be suspended for the present year, and that a collection in aid of the annual expenditure of Victoria College be taken up instead thereof.

# BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1867,

### TO THE

### ADDRESS OF THE W.M. CONFERENCE IN CANADA, 1867.

### REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHBEN,-

It is with feelings of unmingled satisfaction that we receive your Address. We rejoice greatly in the success which continues to attend your manifold labours, and especially in the sure ground of hope that the enlargement of your borders, now reported, is the pledge of yet more abundant increase in years to come. We note with joy, for instance, the hold which Liethodism is taking of the young people of Canada, as evinced by the number of Undergraduates in Victoria University, and of pupils in the Female College. As a Church, you have done well in making provision for the education and culture of the sons

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that we be success ours, and largement yet more with joy, ag of the er of Unils in the o well in the sons and daughters of intelligent Methodists. It is worth much to have the moulding of the mind, and the direction of the taste and studies, of our young people; and the Church which secures this advantage goes far to bespeak for herself a prosperous future. And whilst you are thus providing specifically for the Christian culture of the middle and upper classes in College and University, you establish and multiply Sunday Schools for the religious instruction, on the Lord's day, of the children of the poor. In the statistics elating to your Sabbath Schools, there are two things which excite our grateful satisfaction: the number of scholars who meet in class, and the number of volumes in the libraries. We infer from them that the policy of your Sunday Schools is directed by men of broad intelligence and earnest godliness. As a rule, if our senior scholars leave the Sunday School undecided for the Lord Jesus, their conversion in after years is most uncertain, and, as a matter of fact, rarely occurs. Too much importance, therefore, cannot be attached to the salvation of our scholars, and their voluntary association with the people of God whilst they are scholars ; and your sustained and prayerful efforts to secure these objects will doubtless be owned, in yet larger measure, by the favour and blessings of Him who is "the Head over all things to the Church." We cherish a strong confidence that in all your educational institutions, you will continue to train up the children and youth of your societies and congregations in the doctrines, privileges, and duties of the Christian religion ; and that, whilst so doing, God, even our own God, will cause you to "joy before Him according to the joy in harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide the spoil."

We are thankful to note further that, both among the new settlements and Indian tribes, your Missionary work has been marked by unabated progress. We look at this fact in the light of your godly care for the young people who are growing up in your midst, and we rejoice. It is only as we are at once conservative and aggressive, that the true end of our existence as a Church can be reached. If, on the one hand, we seek to enlarge our borders, but, at the same time, fail to preserve to Methodism her own children, the power of extension is impaired, and a collapse is imminent. If, on the other hand, we care only to keep and cherish those already under our influence, we close against ourselves a field of labour which calls into exercise the noblest feelings of the "new man," and furnishes a sphere for the manifestation of the loftiest Christian heroism; and we forfeit, moreover, the crowning benediction of Him who: came "to seek and to save that which was lost." In our children we "have a goodly heritage," which, by all means, and at any cost, we must keep and cultivate. It is amongst Churches which are aggressive in their genius and organization, that "the light of the moon" may become "as the light of the sun, and the light of the sun sevenfold, as the light of seven days." In both departments of service you have the promise of a God who keepeth covenant. Not only has he said,-" I will pour water on him that is thirsty, and floods upon the dry ground ;" but also, "I will pour My Spirit upon thy seed, and my blessing upon thine offspring." In your past history and present condition we mark the fulfillment of these promises. A succession of faithful men, offering themselves for the work and office of the Christian ministry, represents the rich and abiding

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benediction of the Most High upon your Church. Every candidate for ordination is the result of much labour crowned by the blessing of God. To make one true Minister requires a combination of circumstances and influences, —of privileges offered and opportunities embraced. Such a man is the fruit of Divine grace, and of a providence equally Divine, working together to this end; and no stronger proof of the presence and power of Christ in a Church can be desired than the forthcoming, from year to year, of young men who prove themselves "able Ministers of the New Testament." We rejoice exceedingly that, in your Church, the bright succession continues to run on, and we pray that Methodism in Canada may "not want a man to stand be fore" the Lord "forever."

During the last year the hand of our God has also been upon us for good. A mighty impulse was given to the faith and hope of the astembled Ministers by a conversation on the state of the work of God, which took place on one of the early days of the last Conference. On returning to. his Circuit, the cry went up to heaven from the heart and lips of many a Minister, "Save now, I beseech Thee, O Lord; I beseech Thee, send now prosperity." Amongst preachers and people there was felt a quickened sense of individual responsibility; and it was not long before, in several places, "prayer was made without ceasing of the Church unto God," for the immediate outpouring of the Special efforts were put forth, not only to reach Spirit. "them that are without," but also to win for Christ the unconverted in our Sabbath Schools and congregations. In many of our Circuits a great work of God soon appeared. The ordinary means of grace were made the channels of

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awakening and converting power. In some instances, the influence of the Holy Spirit was so plenteous and pervasive, that the routine of Sabbath School instruction merged into a prayer-meeting, and scores of young persons sought and found redemption through the blood of Christ, even the forgiveness of sins, In other Circuits the hand of God was seen in the gathering together of men and women who had not been wont to attend the house of praver. To these the glorious Gospel has come with the force and freshness of a new revelation of "good tidings of great joy;" and in the change wrought in the heart and life of such as these, we have recognized an illustration of the words of Christ: "The kingdom of heaven is like unto treasure hid in a field, the which when a man hath found, he hideth, and for joy thereof goeth and selleth all that he hath, and buyeth that field."

Our net increase upon the year is 5,887; but in a Church numbering 337,070 members, probably not fewer than 15,000 die yearly. We conclude, therefore, that during the last twelve months more than 20,000 persons have been gathered out of the world, and are now "written among the living in Jerusalem." "Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things." It is not, however, our purpose to convey the idea that we are content with the progress made during the past year. Whilst we are devoutly thankful, we are very far from being satisfied. Our facilities for usefulness are ever increasing. There are the new congregations assembling in the commodious chapels recently erected, and there are the dense populations to which we have gained access by means of our Home Mission Agency; not to mention the 556,502 children and young

These circumstances, viewed in connection with promises which are "exceedingly great and precious," warrant us in looking for an increase far beyond any which it has yet been our privilege to record. It is our desire and hope that, in every Circuit, we and our people may "know the gift of God," and, in his appointed way, "wait for the promise of the Father," until the Spirit be poured upon us from on high, and "the wilderness be a fruitful field, and the fruitful field be counted for a forest."

We have much pleasure in acceding to your request, in appointing the Rev. W. Morley Punshon, A.M., the President of your next Annual Conference, and hope that he may be able to arrange previously to visit various places in your Connexion, greatly to the advantage of our common Master's cause.

We have pleasure in also appointing as Co-Delegate the Rev. Lachlan Taylor, D.D., according to your request.

We commend you and your work afresh to the blessing of our common Lord.

### REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETFIERN,-

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We acknowledge with heartfelt thankfulness your parental and most instructive and encouraging address. While its statements afford us grateful satisfaction, its suggestive counsels will, we trust, prompt us and our congregations to still more devout and energetic industry in those varied labours for the up-building of believers, the education and training of youth, and the conversion of sinners, which constitute the vocation and duties of the Church of Christ.

We rejoice with you in your enjoyment of perfect peace and great prosperity as a Church. We will not repeat the statistics of our last year's address; but we are humbly thankful to be able to say, that throughout all our societies and congregations there is not a ripple of agitation; there is truly the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace; and in every department of our work—in our Circuits, Missions, University, Colleges, Sabbath Schools, in spiritual prosperity, numbers, and Connexional Funds, there has been a larger increase than even during the preceding year. In our last address to you, while we gave a statistical summary of the progress of our work, we expressed our humbling and painful searchings of heart that our agencies and labours had not heen more successful, and the renewal of our covenant en-

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less your address. , its sugcongregain those ducation rs, which Christ. ect peace epeat the ly thankand conis truly in every Univerosperity, a larger our last y of the nd pains had not lant engagements with our Divine Master, and with each other, to pray with and for each other, whenever we might meet, before parting, as far as possible; to talk and pray with others, whenever practicable, in regard to their soul's salvation; to seek a deeper baptism of the Holy Spirit, that we might be at all times enlightened, empowered, and anointed for every part of our great work, and find it our meat and our drink to be instant in season and out of season, always abounding in the work of the Lord; looking for the fullness of the blessing in our own souls, and in our congregations.

Those covenant engagements we have endeavored to keep, though with many short-comings and imperfections; and the Lord of the husbandry has granted us already, from our seeds of tears and toils, to reap in joy a harvest of unprecedented success. In no one year have our people erected so many commodious places of worship, most of them free from debt, and none of them with embarrassing debt; in no one year have all our funds been so liberally sustained; and for many years there has not been so large an increase of members, while the disciplinary conditions of membership have been faithfully maintained.

Glory be to the Father, to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost, that our churches have thus had rest throughout the land, and have been edified; and walking in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, have been multiplied. We thank God and take courage,—aided by 19 newly ordained ministers, and 29 preachers received on trial, and with a membership of upwards of sixty thousand. We conpecrate ourselves afresh to our blessed Lord and Master, and pledge ourselves to each other anew in the one glorious work of spreading scriptural holiness over this land.

To the religious instruction of all the children of our church we can not attach too much importance, or bestow too nuch attention and labour, knowing that the Divine promise appertains to our offspring as abundantly as to ourselves, and that upon us devolves the duty and the responsibility of applying and perpetuating the blessings of that promise.

Our Female College at Hamilton is pursuing its noble work with undiminished success in the higher education of the daughters of our people ; and the University of Victoria College continues to multiply the bestowments of corresponding benefits upon their scns, rendering, at the same time, service to our ministry, by the superior education of many of our young men. We purpose the present year, by the Divine blessing, to make a general effort for the more efficient and permanent endowment of Victoria College, and the establishment of a Divinity Chair, in order to secure more systematic and thorough theological training for our future Ministry.

To promote these important undertakings, as well as for the best interests of our Church and country at large, we believe that the residence and labours of our President, the Rev. WILLIAM MORLEY PUNSHON, A.M., would be of very great value. We thank you sincerely for his appointment ; and we would respectfully and earnestly solicit your kindness in permitting him to reside and labour in Canada, at least for a term of years, subject, in the mean time, to the jurisdiction of the Canadian Conference. Thousands of people of all classes amongst us, as well as ourselves, have been greatly edified and delighted by his powerful addresses and ministrations, which, we doubt not, will be the instrument of much good. In his private intercourse, as well as in his

Very dear Fathers and Brethren, we are one with you, not only as a Church, in faith, discipline, and worship, but one with you in loyalty and in earnest purpose to be faithful to all the trust committed to us by God, as transmitted to us from our Fathers.

### REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

Your welcome address, with cheering tidings of peace and prosperity, greatly refreshed our spirits.

We have hailed with unspeakable pleasure, as an expression of good will and fraternal sympathy, the presence of the Rev. Dr. Taylor and the Rev. Wm Stephenson-Their eloquent and graphic details of your widely extended and glorious toil, of earnest and successful Oircuit work, educational enterprise, missionary effort, consolidation in populous centres, and expansion in remote districts, have been listened to with profound and grateful interest.

We have in our own Conference and Connexion one hundred and forty-four Ministers, including Supernumeraries and Preachers on probation; fourteen thousand eight hundred and seventy-three persons in Church membership, with seventeen hundred on trial; nearly fifteen thousand children in our Sabbath Schools, with seventy-one thousand five hundred and ninety-three estimated attendants upon public worship. Though preliminary negotiations for proposed ecclesiastical union have failed for the present, we rejoice to know that existing obstacles are temporary, and cherish the hope that such an organization may be speedily and successfully inaugurated.

We cannot at this crisis in the history of our country but feel a deep interest in public movements and political changes; but, while striving to meet and to fulfill avgmented

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country political mented responsibilities, which such a transition period involves, we do not forget that our great mission is to spread Scriptural holiness, and that the pressing need of the present time is the revival of earnest Christianity.

In the spirit of patriotism and of piety, for the weal of our country and the welfare of Zion, remembering your interests in common with our own, we fervently invoke that blessing without which all human agency is worthless.

"And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us; and establish Thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish Thou it."

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN,---

We have listened with delight to your truly fraternal address. The cordial reception given to the beloved Brother who conveyed to you our greetings, has been highly gratifying to us. We rejoice that your field of labour, in common with the general area of Methodistic ground, has been "favoured with religious prosperity in its best and most desirable forms."

The patriotic sentiments which you have uttered, and the interests which, as fellow-subjects, you take in the welfare of the Dominion, have afforded us much pleasure. We

cordially co-operate with you in this matter. We are, moreover, fully persuaded that a truly Evangelical Ministry is designed and fitted to give every man a properly enlightened conscience, and thus to provide the best safeguard of the person, the character, the property, the rights, and privileges of our fellow-countrymen. We believe that the truth as it is in Jesus can more than any thing else promote that delightful union of personal freedom, with united submission to law, which is specially exhibited in the loved and honoured country that presides over us, and which foreign visitors have looked on with wonder and admiration.

We rejoice still more that your best energies are devoted to the spiritual and eternal interests of men. In these days of ceremonial eccentricity, of unenlightened rationalism, and other "childish things," it is peculiarly cheering to see the various branches of Methodist Christianity manifesting the ancient and apostolicul zeal for the promotion of the glory of God by the salvation of men; pointing them to a Divine Redeemer, a Divine Pardoner, a Divine Sanctifier, "that they may obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory." We, too, make the salvation of souls the grand end, and the Divine gospel plan the grand means.

By the liberality of our members we have been enabled to take up a new Mission in the Red River Settlement, and one to the savage tribe of Blackfeet Indians, near the Rocky Mountains. We are giving increased attention to the religious instruction of juveniles, under the deep and solemn conviction that the Christian Church has, in many places, lost, through negligence, from the families of her own members, more than the number of adults gained from the world by revival efforts. We have 810 Sabbath Schools, an increase of 89; 51,321 scholars, an increase of 3,126; of these, 7,518 are over 16 years of age, an increase of 1,600; and 4,311 meet in class, an increase of 705. Our Church membership is 60,400, an increase of 1,943. Our Ministers and Preachers number 553; of these, 21 have been ordained at this Conference, and 29 received on trial. Six preachers have been favored with permission to avail themselves for this year of the advantages of Victoria University. We regret that these do not yet include the tuition of a theological professor. We confidently expect, however, that the time is near when such a chair will be established. We congratulate you, dear brethren, on being in advance of us in this important matter. Our educational institutions in other respects, are, like yours, highly efficient and influential.

Our brotherly greetings will be borne to you by our highly gifted and greatly beloved President. We wish you, and we can scarcely wish you a higher favour, that you may experience blessings similar to those which we felt through the gracious outpouring of the Holy Spirit, in the Sabbath ministrations, and in the services and sessions of the present Conference.

"And the Lord make you to increase and abound in love, one toward another, and toward all men, even as we do toward you, to the end he may establish your hearts unblamable in holiness before God, even our Father, at the coming of our Lord J. sus Christ with all his saints." 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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

## OF THE

# CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA,

### TO THE

### MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

### DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

We gladly improve the opportunity afforded by our annual meeting, to address to you our accustomed words of pastoral greeting, counsel, and admonition. We devoutly rejoice, beloved, in the evidences of the Divine presence by which we have been sustained and encouraged in the toils and trials of another year. Amid the opposition of the world, the subtle and powerful assaults of a plausible infidelity, and the prevailing unbelief and enmity of unrenewed hearts, the message of life, which we proclaim at God's compand, still attests its divine power to enlighten and renew the sinful heart—to lift men up from the slavery and defilement of sin, into the glorious liberty of the children of God.

After supplying the losses occasioned by deaths, removals, and unfaithfulness, the returns from the Districts show an increase in our church membership, during the past year, of nearly 2,000. This increase, though affording no room for self-gratulation, we nevertheless take as an encouraging token that the Gospel of Christ is still the power of God to the salvation of every one that believeth; and the numerous proofs of the Divine faithfulness, so clearly seen in our past history, inspire us with joyful confidence that

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as long as we walk by the same rule and mind the same thing—as long as we honor God with the unfaltering trust of our hearts, and labor in unity of faith and prayer for the glory of Christ, God, even our own God, will be our defence and salvation.

This being the year for making returns of church property, we are able to make the gratifying announcement that the estimated value of the property possessed by our church amounts to the large sum of \$2,126,246; a sum that at once attests the rapid growth of our church in this country, and the peerless Eberality of our people, for which we render devout thanks to Him who puts it into the hearts of his servants to devise liberal things.

But we should never forget that our triumphs over "every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God," our progress and power as a branch of the Church of Christ, depend, not upon material progress, or increase of wealth, but upon our steadfast adherence to the same great essential truths, and the same living experiences of God's power to save from all sin, that have been our strength and joy from the beginning. When we begin to hold the truth with a feeble and temporizing hand, or cease to look for those practical results in the heart and life, that are the only true evidences of a scriptural and vital christianity, our glory and power will depart. Many sad examples teach us that a church may maintain, in its formularies and creeds, "the form of sound words," while destitute of that inner spiritual life, without which all tokens of external prosperity are only like flowers that bloom over decay and death. 1.2 E 10 . 8 1916

Since our last Conference the long-projected Confederation. of these Provinces has been carried into effect; and our

country has taken a higher position among the enlightened nations of the earth. This new political position imposes upon all true patriots important civil and religious obligations. You should, therefore, Brethren, rise above merely local and personal interests to a broad and earnest sympathy with all that promotes the true progress and elevation of your country. In the Providence of God its future destiny is largely committed to your keeping. By cherishing a loyal and intelligent attachment to the goodly land that the Lord our God has given us-by faithful efforts to disseminate the sanctifying truth of the gospel through every portion of this vast Dominion-by viewing the great questions of the day in the light of the teachings of the New Testament -by electing to our Legislative bodies men of integrity and moral worth-and, above all, by living upright, industrious, and godly lives, you will aid in lifting up our country to a higher moral altitude, and making her a centre of light and benign influences to brighten and bless future generations.

We would again commend to your serious regard the great subject of the religious education of the children of the Church. It cannot be questioned that the want of godly fidelity, in the early and susceptible years of childhood, has been followed, in innumerable instances, by the most deplorable consequences. While it is the duty of christian parents to co-operate to the utmost of their ability in sustaining and promoting the efficiency of Sunday School agencies, they should never forget that they cannot delegate to any agency whatever the obligation which God has clearly laid upon them to "bring up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Suffer us to say to you who are parents,—Let the religious welfare of your children secure

The highest earthly good is not worthy to be compared with this. If parents constantly show in their lives that wealth, social position, or worldly honor are regarded by them as objects of higher interest than personal godliness, it need not cause wonder if the children of such parents grow up with a low estimate of the importance of personal religion, and destitute of an experience of its power. The wisest words of admonition will have little practical influence, if not sustained by the consistent example of a holy life.

At the present time, when the influence of the press is so rapidly increasing, and publications, calculated to mislead and corrupt, are scattered broad-cast over the land, it is of the utmost importance that the minds of the young be enlightened and fortified by the study of a literature morally healthy, and scripturally sound. Many of the works of fiction, issued from the press of the day, as well as the tales which appear in the monthly and weekly periodicals, sneer at religion, and stealthily insinuate the poison of erroneous sentiments. Such works, in addition to the ordinary effect of creating a morbid and unhealthy mental excitement, have also an unquestionable tendency to pervert the judgment and corrupt the heart. Let such publications be rigorously excluded from your families, and only such literature supplied as will strengthen the intellect, inform the judgment, and improve the heart.

Our various Connexional Funds, representing important interests, so well sustained by you in the past, we again commend to your liberal support. The emergencies of the work have prompted us to send out three new missionaries to the Hudson's Bay Territory, trusting in your liberality to

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enable us to meet the increased expense of this extension of our work.

The position of our University, in consequence of the proposed withdrawal of the annual grant by the Government of Ontario, makes the present a trying crisis in its history. Its claims and interests will be brought before you through other channels; but we confidently hope, whatever may be the action of the Legislature, that the intelligent zeal and liberality of a loyal and united people will not suffer the overthrow of an institution, founded by the wisdom and piety of our fathers, and intimately connected, during its history, with the prestige and progress of our Church in Canada.

We rejoice to inform you, Brethren, that our Conference has been one of much harmony and peace. We retire from this annual gathering to our different fields of toil and duty with deepened convictions that our success in this great work essentially depends upon the presence of the Master; and we earnestly pray that God may so quicken and baptize us with the Spirit of power from on high, that we may preach the blessed gospel of peace, "not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power."

In conclusion, Brethren, we ask your earnest sympathy, zealous co-operation, and united prayers in our efforts to extend the Kingdom of our Divine Redeemer through every portion of our country. Keep yourselves in the love of God, that you may have power efficiently to labor for his glory. "Abstain from all appearance of evil." "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." "For so is the

Forget not, beloved, that you are stewards of the manifold grace of God. Be instant, therefore, in season and out of season, in seeking to lead the guilty and ignorant around you to a saving knowledge of the nying Saviour. "In due season we shall reap, if we faint not." And as your happiness, your us fulness, and your safety depend upon your personal holiness, continue to hunger and thirst after righteousness that ye may be filled. Pray without ceasing, that the God of all grace may enrich you with heavenly wisdom, and at last "present you faultless, before the presence of his glory, with exceeding joy."

"Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenan', make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever.
