## To the Public of Lower Canada.

THE Public have already been informed, through - the ordinary channcls of intelligence, that the Board of Agriculture for Lower Canada have resolved to hold a GRAND AGRICULTJKAL and INDUSTRIAL FXHIBITION, in the City of Montreal, on the $27 \mathrm{th}, 28 \mathrm{th}, 29 \mathrm{th}$, and 30th SEPTEMBER next. The advantages which would accrue to the Province from the carrying ont of such a project, with due spirit and on a scale of sufficient magnitude, are so obvious that they scarrcely require to be formally stated, and the object which the Local Committce, appointed to carry out the intentions of the Board, have in vicw in issuing the present address, is, not so much to recommend the scheme or to enlarge on the numerous beneficial results likely to flow from it, as simply to make it universally known und bring it fairly under the notice of the whole body of our intelligent Agriculturists and Mechanics.

The Coinmittee observe with unmingled pride and satisfaction the continually accumulating proofs that the energies of the Province have of late years been thoroughly aroused, and it is with no small degree of pleasure that they are now permitted to congratulate their fellow-countrymen on the bright prospect opening up for Canada, which seems destined for the future to advance in the march of Progress and Improvement side by side with the most favoured nations of the earth. We have within ourselves-in our country and in our populationall the elements necessary to constitutea grcat nation. With our mingled population,-in which we have all the fire and vivacity of the French character - the sturdy independence and stout-heartedness of the

English-the patient cautious perseverance of the Scotch-and the bold sparkling genius of the Irish -with our almost unlimited amount of territory, our unexampled means of internal communication, our connection with the most powerful nation of the Old World and our proximity to the great and enter prising American Republic-with all these advantages, we have nothing to fcar and every-thing to hope, if we but prove true to ourselves and set our hearts and hands in right earnest to the glorious, though it may be arduous task of working out the destiny which Providence seems to have placed before us.
In considering the steps to be taken to add new force to the impetus by which our country is already being propelled in the path of onward morcment, the Committee believc that two opinions can scarcely be entertained as to the vast importonce of such Exhibitions as that to be held in Scptember, vicwed as a mcans of developing our resourecs, and of calling forth, and keeping in active exercise, the intellectual energies and the practical skill and ingenuity of our artizans and agriculturists, which might otherwise be allowed to remain comparatively dormant. They rely, therefore, with confidence, on the generous co-operation of all classes of the community, to enable them to execute their mission on a scale commensurate with the growing greatness of the Provincc, and in a manner fitted to secure to the fullest cxtent the objects aimed at by the promoters of the Exhibition.
It is intended that the Exhibition shall be on a basis sufficiently wide to admit of an adequate represcntation of the industry and skill of all classes of the population. But it is evident that, in order to the aecomplishment of this, the Committee must have ample funds placed at their disposal, to enable them to offer premiums, the number and amount of which shall be a sufficient inducem ent to competition. They are in hopes of receiving considerable pecuniary aid from the Government, through the Board of Agriculture, but the success of the undertaking, it is obrious, must mainly depend on the amount of support which it shall receive from the public gen. erally. That support, they confidently believe, will not be withhcld, if properly sought ; and they would, therefore, respectfully invite the immediate co-operation of public spirited and influential individuals throughout the Province, with whom they will be happy to enter into communication as to the best
means of furthering the objects of the Exhibition in heir respective localities.

The Cummittee cherish a confident hope that the Agriculturists, Mechanics, and Manufacturers of the Province, will so interest themselves in the undertaking, as to cause the Exhibition to come of with an eclat worthy of themselves and their country. On their efforts its success depends, and these efforts, the Committee believe, will be heartily put forth.

3. All articlesexhibited shall remain in the Hall until the elose of the exibibition, when they will be delivered to the contributors, unless otherwise directed.
4. The Judges shall have the discretionary power of ivith-holding premiums, if, in their opinion, the articles exhibited do not merit them.

ㄷ. In awarding premiums on plants in pots, special reference will be had to the beanty of the specimens, profusion of blom, and evidence of superior cultivation. II ferior specimens will be excluded by the judges from competition.
6. Gratuities will be awarded by the judges for auy new or rare fruit. flowers, plants, or other object of particular interest, and for which no special premium has been offered.
7. Parties will not be allowed to take more than oue prize in the same class.
8. It is also required that fruit, flowers. and vegetables, should be accompanied by brief observations on the made of cultivation, if peculiar together with any other remarks of utility.
9. No individual, except the judges, will be allowed to touch or handle any fruit, llower, or other ar tiele exhibited.
10. 'The decision of the judges, as regards the premiums, must be considered tirral.
11. The judges shall not be competitors in that class for which they are to award premiums.
12. No person allowed to be present while the judges are awarding the premiums.
13. Any deviation, more or less, from the exaet quantities or numbers specified in the sehedule will disqualify a competitor.

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signed by them, under the Judges directions, with the letters of the successful animal or lots, written in ink, and not in pencil. They will accompany the Judges, and point out the differcut sections and classes.
10. The Judges will not only report those animals entitled to Premiums but also those next in merit in each class, to meet the contingency of any challenge or objection which may be made to the awards. They will also specify the arimals which deserve to be specially commended, and then sign and deliver their reports through the member of the Managing Committce or Steward of the yard who accompanies them, to the sccretary, which cannot afterivards be altered.
11. Any competitor attempting to impose upon the Judges, by giving certificates of stock or other articles that are not strictly correct in every particular, shall be disqualificd.
12. Every article exlibited for competition, must be the growth, produce, or manafacture of the province of Canada, except section $X$ for foreign stock and implements. The live stock, with the above exception, must be the property of parties residing in Canada. All Premiums awarded for any articles, except live stock, must be to the producers or manu. facturers of such articles.
13. The Judges will be instructed to withhold the Premiums where there docs not appear sufficent merit in the stock or articles exhibited to justify an asward. Also, in the absence of competition, and no extraordinary merit in the animals or articles exhibited, the Juciges to exercise their own discretion, as to the amount of Premiums awarded, or whether there should be any.
14. Stewards will be appointed for each section of cattle, Sheep, Horses, Swine. Agricultural Productions, Implements, and for roreign Stock, and Implements, whose duty shall be to superintend each of thesc departments, see that the animals are secured in the proper places assigned for the several classes in which they are entercd, and that all other articles are in their proper places, and attend upon the Judges while making their inspection.
