Brussels, May 4.—At the cabinet council yesterday afternoon, which asted two and a half hours, it was decided to recall to this city the three Belgian delegates whose presence is needed at a further council to be held in the Royal Palace at Laeken, which will be attended by all members of the government and state ministers. At this conference it will be decided whether or not the conditions offered Belgium by the reasonable. The Gatholic newspaper, Nation Belge, says it has information that Premier De Lacion's told his colleagues at the cabinet session that Belgium is to receive immediately 5,500,000,000 francs in gold and that the allies are to relinquish the advances made to Belgium thus far of about 6,000,000,000 francs.

CHINA'S FUTURE **SEEN BY CANADIAN**

Robert A. Jaffray, Home on Leave, Says International Board is Needed.

Rev. Robert A. Jaffray, son of the late Senator Robert Jaffray, and brother of the chief shareholder of The Globe, who has spent 25 years in the missionary field in South China, is at present on a visit to his brother in

Toronto.

Speaking to The World on the Chinese attitude towards the international situation, Rev. Mr. Jaffray said he was a fellow traveler on the same steamer with the Chinese delegate to the peace conference. The delegate had accepted credentials from the Canton government, and had been tendered the representation of the Peking government. In the course of an interesting conversation, Rev. Mr. Jafinteresting conversation, Rev. Mr. Jaf-fray had expressed the opinion that it would be good policy for China to accept an international commission in accept an international commission in which Japan would be represented, to undertake the opening up to world trade of China's resources and possibilities. The delegate replied that such a position would be a humiliating one for China to occupy in the new era upon which the world must now enter, but Mr. Jaffray, with occidental frankness, urged that if left to her own initiative China would be practically in the position she occupies today one hundred years hence, and that this is an impossible position for so large a division of the human race.

International Commission.

Mr. Jaffray further said that if the economic development of China did not come under an international board, the inroads upon her rights and commerce by the Japanese could not be

the inroads upon her rights and commerce by the Japanese could not be resisted, and in a few years the position would be much more humiliating than anything that an international commission could imply. Besides the international commission would be for a time only, until China had composed her internal questions and was able to assume capable direction of her own destiny and development.

"I do not know, of course," said Mr. Jaffray to The World, "whether the delegate will act upon my advise, but

ATLANTIC SUGAR

Spanish River and Several Other Issues Also Strong in Local Market.

Bullish sentiment in the Toronto market on Saturday manifested itself in a number of fairly substantial gains scored by specialties, with steels and utility stocks disposed to mark time for the most part. Spanish River, in which there was a brisk movement in Montreal, opened here at 20½ and moved up to 21½, transactions locally being 243 shares, as compared with nearly 1100 in Montreal. The Atlantic Sugar issues were buoyant, the common selling 34 up at 29¼, and the preferred 1¼ higher at 84½. A small lot of N. S. Car sold two points up at 13, and a broken lot of B. C. Fishing brought 49½, an advance of a point. Dominion Canners was active, but at 45½ showed no net change. Steamships preferred scored a high point for the year at 81¼, but eased to 80¾, unchanged from Friday's closing price.

Brazilian and Mackay were two firm spots in the utility group, the former being quoted 5½ higher at 54½ and the latter up ½ at 79. Barcelona was a shade easier at 10½. The steels were dull and steady, N. S. Steel at 66. Dominion Iron at 63 and Steel of Canada at 63¾ being stationary. The war loans were quiet and steady.

The morning's transactions: Shares, 2487, including 730 mining stocks; war loans, \$60,450.

Montreal, May 3.—The half-day in the stock exchange was relatively active. some 50,000 shares changing hands, as compared with a turnover of 60,000 for the full previous day. The general trend of the market was higher with only a few insignificant losses.

The Spanish River issues and the Atlantic Sugar issues were the day's features. Spanish River rose to 21½, a new high for the year, and a net gain of 1½ points. 




