





This chamber is 123 x 32, and in it are located two cylinders, each 105 feet long x 7 feet in diameter and each capable of handling a charge of 15,000 feet of lumber.

The lumber to be treated is piled in the yards and conveyed thence on cars along series of tramways to the cylinders. The cylinder doors are shut and the lumber is subjected alternately to steam pressure and vacuum effects. This process opens up all the fibres and tissues of the wood and renders it porous.
