Aid Only for One Railway C.N.R. Must Make Terms

Globe Newspaper Reflects Views of Senator Cox That the Grand Trunk is Trying to Force Mackenzie & Mann to Come into Line.

The news is trickling out from various quarters in regard to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. Mr. Morse, third vice-president of the Grand Trunk, has been to the west and has given out a statement on his return to the effect that work on the road will be commenced as soon as the necessary legislation is passed, and that it will be begun at four different points, namely, at North Bay, Prince Albert, Edmonton and the Pacific Coast, and even at other points possibly, so that the construction may be pushed as rapidly as possible.

Samuel Watson is in Jail For Slaying His Brother

Middleport Citizens Reveal Startling Story of Torture and Robbery as Explanation of Their Insane Cowardice in Shooting a Sleeping Man.

Brantford, Dec. 24.—(From World Staff Man on the Spot.)—In a frenzy of fright, Samuel Watson slew his brother Wesley yesterday. He thought he had discovered a burglar in the house. The distracted man occupies a cell in the County Jail to-night. He is charged with manslaughter, having been taken into custody in advance of the coroner's verdict, to prevent him doing himself violence. The tragedy was enacted on a farm near Middleport. The circumstances are most extraordinary, and reveal a degree of cowardice approaching lunacy on the part of Samuel and James Watson. Their victim was asleep in bed at the time he was killed, fully disrobed. Both men were armed with heavy guns. It was 9 o'clock in the forenoon. They thrust open the bedroom door with the muzzles of their guns. They were looking for burglars. The moment the reclining figure could be discerned, Samuel fired the contents of an old Persian musket into the head. Then both men fled. They learned the identity of the man they had killed when they brought the neighbors in. It was their younger brother, who had arrived unexpectedly from Detroit to spend the Yuletide with them.

WORLD DICTATE TERMS IN THE BY-ELECTIONS

Montreal Paper Sees a Splendid Chance for the Temperance People.

Montreal, Dec. 24.—The Witness thinks the temperance people should take advantage of the situation caused by the by-elections in Ontario. That paper says that the temperance element, not up to its average in some of these constituencies, is everywhere in great majority, everywhere more or less of a force, and a good deal alive at the present time. Politicians avoid liquor questions to the best of their ability, and the only tactics open to the temperance men are to force their hands in the denier resort of putting up a temperance candidate. Such a proposal, if the temperance forces are united, and organized to make it effective, would probably, at the present moment, bring one or both parties to terms, and establish the temperance party to dictate the platform of the candidates.

GAS EXPLODED IN CLUB PARTY WERE INJURED

Hot Springs Turf Exchange Wrecked and Several Wini Probably Die.

Hot Springs, Ark., Dec. 24.—By an explosion of gas or gasoline this afternoon in the cellar of the Turf Exchange, a clubhouse and poolroom, operated by Chambers & Walker, the building was badly damaged and 30 people were injured, 16 of them being in a serious condition. The most seriously injured are: R. C. Chambers, one of the proprietors of the Turf Exchange, both legs and both wrists broken, will die; William Helwig, blind man manager of a bathhouse, both legs broken; J. S. Meeks, Hot Springs, badly bruised and cut; Joseph Kinney, Hot Springs, both legs broken; Joseph Pace, Hot Springs, hotel-keeper, both legs broken; Finnegan, plumber, Hot Springs, both legs broken; James Cowen, Hot Springs, both legs broken; William Metzger, a boy, Hot Springs, both legs broken and skull fractured, will die; James Coughlin, plumber, Hot Springs, leg broken; G. G. Parker, Milwaukee, Wis., both legs broken; A. F. Hotchkiss, Hot Springs, knee fractured; Tozier, engineer, Hot Springs, both legs broken; H. George, New York, leg broken; F. Cranfield, Cincinnati, both legs broken, ribs crushed; Walter Powers, St. Louis, Mo., arm broken; Thomas Phelan, telegraph operator, Hot Springs, badly cut; Mr. Donnelly, visitor, residence unknown, leg broken, also badly cut. Twelve others sustained bruises and slight injuries.

TRIBUTE TO THE BRAVE

Monument to Be Erected to the Memory of Capt. Milligan.

Newtonville, Ont., Dec. 24.—The Milligan Memorial Monument Committee of this place have given the contract to Mr. Delany of Cobourg, for a monument to commemorate the death of the late Capt. W. P. K. Milligan, who was killed at Hart's Bluff on March 31. The cost is \$10,000, which includes the erecting. It is to be completed by May 22, next. The monument will be 17 feet high, and will rest on a solid stone foundation, 10 feet square and 10 feet high, making a total height of twenty-seven feet. The weight of the shaft will be about 11 tons. The unveiling will take place on May 24, and will be conducted by Sir John Borden, Minister of Militia, and others. It is expected to be one of the most interesting and important events in the history of this place.

People With the Princess Say Prince Tormented Her

Runaway Leaves Written Confession and Says She'll Not Return. Berlin, Dec. 24.—The sympathy of the people of Dresden seems wholly for the Princess, who is at a cheerful, pleasure-seeking disposition. The Crown Prince vowed to torment her. To-night, Zola and Nitzsche, one day the Crown Prince saw her reading one of Nitzsche's works. He jerked the book out of her hands and tore it to pieces. Professor Andre Giron is described as an idealist of the extreme type. It is related that his family once considered the question of confining him in an asylum because he refused a legacy of 500,000 marks. "The Crown Prince beat the Crown Princess," according to an editorial statement in the Deutsche Zeitung, one of the most careful newspapers in Berlin, which adds: "Their disagreements reached this crisis in June, after Professor Giron became the children's tutor. The Princess at that time confided seeking a divorce to Giron, her best friend, the Princess Theresa of Bavaria, who dissuaded her. The Princess, however, after returning to Dresden did not resume marital relations."

MUST BE ALL CANADIAN TARTE SAYS OF G.T.P.

Else Why Should Parliament Vote Twenty Millions for Construction of the Road.

Montreal, Dec. 24.—Hon. Mr. Tarte gives his opinion in La Patrie to-day, of the Grand Trunk project before parliament. "We are not among those," writes Mr. Tarte, "who declare that the Grand Trunk scheme does not merit public discussion. We believe that the project will be carefully discussed, and its merits and demerits weighed with a jealous care before receiving the definite sanction of public opinion. In the first place, we must have the assurance, not in words, but in facts, that the new transcontinental line will be essentially Canadian. The most persistent efforts have been made in the past, and are now being renewed, to divert the traffic of the West from the St. Lawrence route. At different times, attempts have been made by American capitalists and by the kings of finance in the United States, to secure control of the Canadian Pacific Company. What good, therefore, would it be for us to vote twenty millions for the construction of a new line, if we do not have the most positive guarantee that it will be and will remain a Canadian road."

CAPITALISTS CONVINCED OF MARCONI'S SUCCESS

Company Seeking Federal Incorporation With Capital of \$5,000,000.

Montreal, Dec. 24.—"The American capitalists are convinced of the success of the Marconi experiments," remarked Mr. J. N. Greenfield, K. C., solicitor for the Canadian Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company, who returned from New York to-day, where he has been in consultation with American capitalists interested in the scheme. Mr. Greenfield is accompanied by Mr. J. P. Opp, an English capitalist, who will organize the incorporation of the Canadian company. "Speaking of the next move," said Mr. Greenfield, "we have already secured incorporation from the Ontario government. The first application was made in Ontario to expedite matters, inasmuch as the legal formalities are of quicker solution there than elsewhere. We are now seeking incorporation from the Federal government, with a capital stock of \$5,000,000, and we are now going right ahead with the work."

PROPOSAL OF ALLIES BEFORE THE PRESIDENT

His Acceptance of Arbitration Duties Depends on Nature of Restrictions. Washington, Dec. 24.—The President and Secretary Hay were in conference for some time to-day over the proposals from Great Britain and Germany that the President arbitrate the issues involved in the Venezuelan claims controversy. They went over the communications very thoroughly, considering the subject from every view point. The acceptance or declination of the proposals by the President is believed to hinge on the nature of the restrictions the allies have imposed on the arbitration. If any conclusion was reached at the conference between the President and his Secretary of State, the fact was not made public. Inquiries at the White House regarding the President's intentions were referred to Secretary Hay, and the latter sent word to newspaper reporters who called on him that there was no news to be given out on the subject to-night.

NEW LOAN EFFECTED BY LAKE SUPERIOR CO.

Directors Meet in Philadelphia and Announce Raising of \$3,500,000. Philadelphia, Dec. 24.—The directors of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company met here to-day, and after the meeting the announcement was made that the company had effected a loan of \$3,500,000. Vice-President Search announced that arrangements have been made with Messrs. Speyer & Company of New York, and associated banks and trust companies of Philadelphia, Pa. The loan is to be repaid in six equal installments of \$583,333.33 each, beginning on January 1, 1903.

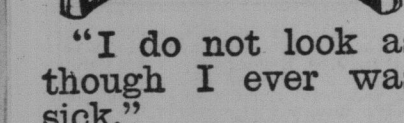
