## IMMIGRATION AMENDMENT LOST.

House Supports Contract for \$5 Per Head Immigrants.

Oftawa, July 13.-(Special.)-When the house was moved into supply to day, Mr. Osler (West Toronto) moved an amendment condemning the con-tract made by the government with that nebulous concern known as the North Atlantic Trading Company, whereby the company gets \$5 per head for ten years for every man, woman and child it brings from Central Eu ope The resolution also called upon take government to give notice terminating the contract, which cannot be done within four years. It was time the quality, rather than quantity, of our immigration should be regarded, a policy which could not be pursued un-der this arrangement, which looked, solely to the earning of the bonus.
R. L. Borden thought that efforts should be mainly directed towards se-curing immigrants from the British Isles.

Mr. Fielding said the reason why the North Atlantic Trading Company re-ceived \$5 per head for immigrants, while only \$1.75 per head was paid for bringing settlers from Great Britain, was because the company did all their own advertising and had to bear all the expense connected with the work

Mr. Wilson (Lennox) replied that the steamship companies in Great B-itain spent large sums in advertising and making Canada known to the B.itish working people. It should be the duty of the company to show how many per-sons were brought to Canada by their instrumentality. Mr. Wilson criticized the laxity of the government in fail-ing to deport undesirable immigrants who reach Canada. He quoted from past utterances of Mr. Oliver, who had declared that such immigration was a danger to the whole Northwest. Now that Mr. Oliver was minister of the in-terior, he was looking forward to a de-cided change in the immigration policy. The amendment was lost by 40 to 76.




