





Haslett, be declared a trustee of one-half thereof for plaintiff; that defendants may be ordered to remove all encumbrances from said lands, or for a sale of said premises, and payment of plaintiff's infrom said lands, or for a sale of said premises, and payment of plaintiff's interest therein. At the trial plaintiff's action was dismissed as against defendant Haslett, and adjudging that if plaintiff desired to recover as against Taylor he may amend the claim and have reference to the master to take the accounts, etc., and if plaintiff does not desire to have the reference, dismissing his action, with costs. From the judgmest plaintiff now appeals by leave direct to the court of appeal. Judgment: Appeal dismissed, with costs, Meredith, J.A., dissenting.
