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# ANNUAL MEETING, February 17th, 1887.

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, Rev. T. Lafleur; It is moved and seconded and resolved, that it be prepared for publication by the Secretary, with the assistance of Messrs. G. B. Muir and D. Bentley.

The Financial Report was then presented by the Secretary-Treasurer, Joseph Richards. It exhibited a rather prosperous financial year.

Mr. A. A. Ayer begs to give notice, that at the next Annual Meeting previous to the election of the Board, a resolution be presented empowering the Society of La Grande Ligne to appoint an advisory Board of five, whose duty shall be to meet with the Directors on special occasions, to advise with them on the interests of the Mission.

The business of the year having been completed by the retiring Board.

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## ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## Evangelical Society of La Grande Ligne,

FOR 1886.

After a Jubilee year, after the excitement of preparations for a great anniversary, and the prolonged effort to create a renewed interest, to insure larger means, in order to carry on the work on a larger scale, it is natural enough that there should come a lull, a moment of expectation. Will God, through his children, increase our means for a much larger enterprise in His name, and for the advancement of His spiritual kingdom in our midst? Will His children see reasons, openings, success, promises, enough to justify a larger outlay of their means in this direction, when on all sides there are so many calls of pressing wants for the extension of some good enterprise?

It has often come to the mind of us all here, that it would need the help of but a few of Christ's disciples, rich in this world's goods, to put this work on a footing that would enable the laborers and their immediately active friends, to be in a position of strength and efficiency, relieving them of a constant anxiety unfavorable to steady and successful labor.

So far it has not pleased God to grant us that restful sense in our missionary enterprise. Is it with the providential intention to keep us more in the position of him who had no home of his own, no place to rest his sacred head! If we only knew that this is God's will, and not from any fault of our own, how peaceful and courageous we should be in just continuing in this poor, divine way. Or should we look at this want of means, of

larger co-operation on the part of our protestant brethren as a sign that they do not see the need of a larger expenditure on such a field as this.

That we have not as yet reached a larger number of persons, especially in the higher circles of society, may be owing to some radical defect in our mode of presenting the Gospel to our people; we have done the best we could and according to the best of our knowledge, but sincere christians and true laborers as we profess to be, we are not perfect in holiness, or knowledge of the word and ways of God, we have perhaps yet much to learn and something to unlearn, in order to penetrate to the heart, and mind, and conscience of this nationality. But who is going to tell us? God in his greatness is so silent in our day, speaking to us in the low voice of experience and the slow voice of history, happy when we hear distinctly the whispering of His spirit in our souls, even when it makes the conscience uneasy. Oh! for a voice of the apostolical age, saying from Macedonia: "Come here and help us," or a vision in the night saying, "Be not afraid but speak, for I have much people in this City." Or again for repression, the Holy Spirit telling us not to spend our strength uselessly in such or such place. That Satan the spirit of evil is often preventing us, as in the time of the Apostles, we know but too well.

Our prospect then in this land, and among this people, is to still work hard, to reap but sparingly for a time, but convinced that the influence of evangelical Christians, trained in the spirit of the Gospel, will ultimately be felt deeply in the heart of the nation. The priests know very well that we preach a purer Gospel than they do, and that sooner or later it will undermine their power in the mind of the truly religious portion of their charge.

The laborers here present, their reports show it, will tell you that they have worked honestly and earnestly to make the Gospel known, as colporteurs, evangelists, preachers, pastors, teachers and writers. Our aim has been to make Him known, He who is the way, the truth and the life. The results have not been all they wished, or even expected at times, but they have been encouraging nevertheless.

There have been fewer baptisms than during the two previous years, some twenty in all, but perhaps a larger amount of evangelistic work done in most of the stations. One has had more care in this respect than some others, we mean the field of St. Pie, which for years was visited only occasionally, but which has now an active laborer in the person of Mr. Lebeau.

Mr. Pullock has labored as a Colporteur and Evangelist in the field of Lapigeonniere, St. Constant, and St. Philippe, with encouraging success, as his report sufficiently testifies. Rev. A. 3t. James while having the pastorate of the English Baptist Church of Clarenceville, has devoted a portion of his time to French evangelization in the neighborhood of his charge, Brockville and Pike River, P.Q.

There have been some changes in two Missionary stations, Grande-Ligne and Montreal. Mr. Lafleur having resigned the pastorate of the Church in Montreal, Mr. Therrien was called to that charge on the first of May last. Mr. Godfroi Massé, after having taught two years in the Grande-Ligne Institute, as assistant to the Principal, was called to take Mr. Therrien's place as pastor of the Church at Grande-Ligne, and was ordained in the month of June. At the opening of the school last Autumn, Mr. W. H. Dalpé one of our former pupils, and a graduate of McGill, took Mr. Massé's place, which he has filled with great satisfaction.

#### AGENCIES.

Last Spring, Mr. Lafleur visited on a collecting tour, Boston, Springfield, Hartford, New Haven and New York; and in November and December last, made the collections in Montreal. Early in the Autumn Mr. Therrien visited the Maritime Provinces, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, where he met with great cordiality and a fair measure of success.

In the Fall Mr. Parent canvassed the Ottawa Valley and places east of Toronto, comprising Toronto itself, and found a hearty welcome. Mr. Lebeau, who in the Spring had visited a portion of Vermont and Troy in the State of New York, was allotted for the Fall, the western part of Ontario, which he canvassed pretty thoroughly with a most gratifying success, meeting with a hearty welcome by the ministers and churches.

Mr. Arthur St. James lately visited Buffalo, Cleaveland and Chicago.

Through the zeal and devotedness of our worthy President, Rev. Mr. Upham, the way of our young brethren was made more easy in Contario, and the collections in Montreal assumed a new feature, at least as far as the Olivet Baprist Church was concerned. Instead of the ordinary mode of soliciting contributions from individuals, a collection was taken up at the church service, by means of envelopes, and the result was that the ordinary sum was doubled.

The First Church made its annual subscription as usual.

The Ladies Brooklyn Association have again shown their great devotedness and love for the mission in their collections, in their endeavors to raise friends on its behalf, and in writing encouraging letters to the missionaries whom they help sweetly and lovingly.

The Board of Directors have gone to the expense of printing Mr. Lafleur's historical sketch of the mission, with a view to make its claims better known. We trust it will help its interests.

Our aim is a spiritual one, it is to enlight in the souls of men by the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to ask the Divine Spirit to change and sanctify them, knowing that when the soul belongs to God, the Heavenly Father will take core of all that pertains to it.

Let us work for Him, with Him, in His might, and wa't patiently, as He does for the great results that are sure to come. Let us work while it is day, for the night cometh, when we shall rest, we don't know how long, but we know that we shall wake to be nearer to Him and more like Him, who, when He had risen from the dead, and before ascending to heaven said those comforting, inspiring words, full of wonderful and glorious import; "I ascend to my Father and your Father, to my Cod and your God."

#### GRANDE LIGNE INSTITUTION.

The object of this Institution is :-

1st.—To give a sound christian education to the children of our French Canadian Protestant families, too scattered, or too weak to support  $\alpha$  school by themselves.

and.—To give the same privilege to Roman Catholic children who may wish to secure a liberal education.

3rd.—To prepare teachers, colporteurs, evangelists, and ministers of the Gospel.

This is our record. Nearly 2,500 pupils have entered our school, a number which might have been easily doubled, had we had means or room to receive all those who did apply for admission. By far the greatest number of these have become Protestants, and fully one-third have been truly converted. Of these 2,500 pupils, sixty at least have become teachers or professors; twenty colporteurs or evangelists, and as many ministers of the Gospel, and quite a large number have occupied, or do occupy, respectable and even eminent positions in the world.

Rev. J. N. Williams, one of its former pupils, and now Superintendent of the French Baptist Missions in New England States, writes: "In this field of labor I am impressed with the importance of the missionary work in Canada even more deeply than when I was in the Grande Ligne Mission, for I am constantly finding in New England the fruits of that Mission occupying positions of influence here, forming in centres of French Canadian population a nucleus here and there, who are somewhat educated, having had the advantages of our mission schools, and who have thus been fitted to be fellow-laborers with me, and leaders in the mission work of the locality in which they live, being able to assist in singing, in prayer meeting, of which more recent converts know nothing about. Thus, thanks to these schools, we find as we lift up the Gospel banner in centres of French people a few experienced champions of the truth, who in our work occupy somewhat the position the West Point Graduates did in the army, and I am led to feel thankful that there has been for years past in Canada, such schools as Grande Ligne, Longueuil, and others."

Mr. Williams' testimony is strongly corroborated by that of Rev. Mr Hanna, lately supplying the Pulpit of the First Baptist Church, Montreal. In an address given only a few weeks ago, he declared, that for quite a number of years the additions to the membership of the Baptist Churches in Connecticut, and in the other neighboring States, has been largely drawn from former pupils of our schools.

But all the preceding testimonies might be left out and still the question: What are the *fruits* of these Institutions? would receive the most flattering answer from the most unexpected source. A Roman Catholic writing in the columns of *L'Etendard*, the organ of the ultramontane party in Montreal, grants that no less than 4,000 French Canadians have been converted to Protestantism in a portion of the State of Vermont. But, who has preached the Gospel in the State of Vermont, during the last 45 years? Almost exclusively pupils from our Institutions.

The fruits of our Institutions, and of the sister ones, supported by other Societies, may be seen in the extraordinary strides made in *Primary Education* in this Province of Quebec, within the last thirty-five years.

Thirty-five years ago Primary Schools were very few and mostly in the hands of old men, or old women who taught the little they knew in the way of reading and writing, together with catechism, and the repetition of Latin prayers. But the clergy seeing a large number of their children flocking to our schools urged the erection of schools of their own in every parish.

Hear what the Grande-Ligne Mission Register for 1851, writes on that very point: "It is worthy of remark that as soon as the priests see a Christian school opened, they are taken with an extraordinary zeal to open another in the immediate neighborhood. So that a good means of spreading abroad education in Lower Canada, is to establish Protestant Schools; there will soon be a rivalry which in the end will assure the well being, temporal and religious, of our poor Canadian people. For if they can read it will not be long before they will raise themselves to the level of the neighboring people, it being very sure that the Canadians are not wanting in intelligence, but merely in the means of developing it, owing to their moral servitude. May God, in his Providence, soon furnish these means."

That the influence of the institution is spreading among the Roman Catholic population is evidenced by the fact that out of 160 demands for admission received this year, 27 came from them. Of course, in many cases, priests, relatives and friends combined to keep the applicants away, and succeeded in their efforts, but

some did run the blockade, and we have 6 Roman Catholic pupils who have become Protestants, but whose families still remain under the bondage of Popery.

Since the opening of the Institution, October 18th, 87 pupils have been received, 77 of whom are with us, 62 boarders and 15 from private families; 41 young men, and 36 young women, coming from 27 different localities.

As will be seen by the Pastor's report, quite a number of our pupils were converted last year, and with one of the teachers, professed their faith in Jesus by baptism. We are happy to say that some of our present pupils have already given their hearts to God, whilst quite a number are evidently not far from the Kingdom of Heaven. Our happiness is enhanced by the perusal of letters such as the following: it is an extract from one written by the relatives of a newly converted pupil.

"I am truly glad to see L. under the roof of such an institution, for I can already see and feel the influence it has in that peculiar case." Oh Lord! exclaims another "what shall we render unto thee for the great blessing? O praise, praise the Lord."

With such a large family under our charge, we are sure to meet with a very great variety of character and dispositions.

The progress of the pupils in regard to their studies is, in many cases, very satisfactory. The public examinations held in March and in December, 1886, did show that much work had been done and well done, by the great majority of them, in the honor list published by the *Canadian Baptist*, June 3rd, appear 57 names out of 73 present at the examinations, let us hope for the same, and even higher results at the examinations of March next.

The important changes that took place in this Station last Spring have deprived us of the sweet intercourse and precious services of Rev. A. L. Therrien, but we feel sure that he and his devoted wife still keep a warm place in their hearts for the fellow laborers who welcomed them here with so much joy, in May, 1881, they have also deprived us of the precious services of Mr. G. N. Massé, B.A. as First Assistant Teacher, but he remains with us as

Pastor, and his course of religious instruction in the school, and his preaching in the church are much appreciated by his former and new pupils. There is here for him and his young wife a great and blessed work, may they receive daily from our Father, grace and strength to accomplish it. We cannot speak too highly of the manner in which Mr. Dalpé, the present Assistant performs his many and arduous duties.

## GRANDE-LIGNE STATION.

We had dared to hope for better things to tell you, but as often happens, our hopes have not been fully realized. God, however, has not left us without proofs of his approbation. His spirit, which awakens and enlightens those who are dead in trespasses and sins, which rekindles the zeal and love of those who have grown cold, has visited us during the year. time after the last report was published, the blessed influence of His Holy Spirit began to reveal itself in our midst. Our prayer meetings became more lively, a larger number of christians took part in them, and soon we had the joy of seeing those unconverted rising to express their desire of becoming children of God, and to ask an interest in our prayers. The work went on, and finally twelve confessed their faith in Christ by baptism, the Sunday before the close of the school. What a sight to make angels rejoice, to see twelve young persons with faces radiant from inward peace, thus publicly showing their determination to follow Christ. All, so far as we have been able to follow them, from the youngest of twelve years to the oldest have continued in the good way.

Last May the Church had the misfortune to lose her beloved pastor, Rev. A. L. Therrien. His departure as well as the missing of his evangelical and practical preaching, is still deplored.

Mr. Massé, for two years teacher at the Mission, was requested to replace Mr. Therrien while the church was deciding upon some one for her permanent pastor.

Mr. Massé himself was called, and on the twenty-second of June, he was set apart to the holy ministry. It was not without some fear and trembling that he accepted this important and

difficult charge. How fill the place of such men as the venerable founder of this mission, Rev. Louis Roussy, and of his successor, Rev. A. L. Therrien! The thought that God asks of his children only what they are able to do, finally decided him to accept the charge.

The services during summer have been well attended as well as those on fine Sabbaths in Winter.

The Sunday School, under the superintendence of Rev. Mr. Roux, aided by Mrs. Roux and Massé, Miss St. James, Messrs. Massé, Dalpé and Bullock, is quite encouraging. The children's class is especially well attended. Kind friends in Montreal, and others here furnished a Christmas-tree for more than ninety of our children. Death has been in our midst, and has taken for his own, two children and one aged sister who more than fifty years ago took lessons of Mr. Roussy when teaching the district school a few miles from here during his first Winter in Canada. Several very pleasant hours were spent in religious conversation with her during her painful and protracted illness.

Our Roman Catholic neighbors tired of driving nine or ten miles to church, have erected a chapel this place this Fall. Repeated offers were made to our Protestant farmers to buy land from them upon which to build, but these either firmly refused their offers or asked them such high prices that they (R.C.) were forced to build on their own farms, in a spot not quite so central and lower than they would wish. We hope that this may work out for our good rather than our hurt. Our relations with those for the enlightenment of which we work are becoming more close, will likely incite our people to deeper study of the word of God, and the thought that their every movement is being watched, should inspire them to renewed watchfulness and greater fidelity, that their lives should do honor to the holy religion they profess.

The number of church members is ninety-six. The Sunday school is much larger in Winter on account of the Institute furnishing a good number, but has an average of fifty scholars, children and a few adults.

#### MONTREAL STATION.

The report of my work in this city can cover only eight months time, as it was only last May that, at the request of the Board, I came to take charge of our mission here. For many reasons which it is not necessary to mention, it was not without great diffidence that I yielded to the wishes of my brethren in this regard. I am happy to be able to say, however, that the anticipated difficulties have not, so far, proved unsurmountable, and that the hand of the Lord had evidently been with us to guide and to sustain.

The work, so far, has been encouraging, and the prospects are certainly favorable, to say the least. We hold four weekly services; two preaching services and the Sunday-School on the Lord's Day, and a prayer-meeting on Thursday evening, with now and then and extra meeting besides. Considering the scattered locations in which our people reside, we may say that each service is generally well attended. Quite frequently, though never in large numbers, we have Roman Catholics at our services. Two Catholic families have renounced Popery and joined us within the last six months. A few details regarding their acceptance of the truth cannot fail to interest our friends who sympathize with us in this our arduous work.

In the month of July, an intelligent and successful business man was seen, with a friend who, like himself, was a Roman Catholic, at our Sunday morning service. At the close of the service, he sought an interview with the missionary, which proved to be the first of a number of very interesting and profitable interviews. This inquirer had lived many years in the United States, and while there, had become negligent in the performance of his religious duties. But on his return to Canada he resolved to redeem the past and at once addressed himself, as he said, to the task of living the life of a good Catholic, going to confession, participating in the Holy Eucharist, doing penances, &c., &c. After trying this for a time and finding no relief nor satisfaction in his heart and conscience, and being more and more impressed with the shallowness and absurdity of the forms of religion he was required to subject himself to, he became, finally, disheartened and disgusted with religion as he had so far known it, and resolved

to throw the whole thing overboard, and trouble himself no more about it. Unfortunately, this is what takes place every year with hundreds of those brought up under the baneful influence of Romanism.

But if he had resolved to leave religion alone, God had not decided to leave him alone; nor had his conscience. Often times God visited him in his thoughts, and at times there seemed to be a voice saying to him, as to St. Augustine of old: " Take and read." He purchased for himself a Catholic version of the Bible, and read it earnestly. He soon became convinced of its divine origin and character. In my second interview with him he said, "I know this is no human book, because of the influence it has on me. I feel I am a different and better man since I read it." He continued attending our services, soon bringing his wife and children with him. For several months, until his business compelled him to take his abode in Massachusetts, they scarcely ever missed either preaching, Sunday school or prayer meeting. Before leaving, he and his wife declared their adherence to the truth, and when I spoke to him on the still more important step to take, of the necessity of accepting Christ, and resting on his finished work, he said, with tears in his eyes: "I feel here (putting his hand on his heart) that it is all right with me now." We have reason to believe that his amiable wife is not far from the kingdom of Christ, if she has not already entered it.

The other family is composed of a young man with his bright young wife, and a niece living with them. They, too, have been of late reading the Bible and become deeply interested in it. Slowly but steadily did the good Book do its work, and only last week did they declare their determination to follow its teachings. Their attendance at all our services is also very regular, and we believe that they will soon rejoice in the faith of Jesus Christ. The niece is as deeply interested as they are, and as determined to follow Christ; but she is anticipating great opposition and persecution when she returns home where Protestants are scarcely known. Christian brother or sister who read this, will you raise your heart to God in prayer for her?

Last Sunday evening we had the joy of leading into the baptismal waters, in the presence of a large congregation, five happy converts who thus confessed their faith in Christ. Two were converted in connection with another christian denomination, one through the influence of a faithful Sunday school teacher, one in Mr. Moody's meetings a year ago, and the other under Mr. Lafleur's ministry. We are expecting to have another such service before long, as others have expressed their desire to follow Christ's command, and others still are earnestly enquiring the way of salvation.

I must not close my report without saying something of a visit I recently made to one of our old and now almost deserted stations

#### ST. ISIDORE,

where emigation has been at work, until only one French Protestant family remains.

My visit to this place and this family was made in very sad circumstances; but I believe the Lord used them for a very good and gracious purpose. The head of the family, the eldest son of our old martyr, Mr. Poissant, who years ago died from the effects of blows he received on account of his faith, had been visiting a christian friend in a neighboring parish, and was awaiting at the Railroad Station a train which was to bring him to his peaceful home, when he dropped suddenly dead from an attact of appolexy. God's chariot took him to his heavenly home. Until the late hours of the night, the evening previous he had been conversing with his friend on religious matters, exhibiting a familiar acquaintance and deep interest in divine truth, although unable to read. It was evident that not only the light of faith, but also the light of a better and brighter world was shining upon him. I had been called to officiate at his funeral service, which I did; but, owing to a relentless storm which rendered the country roads absolutely impassable, we were kept two long days shut up in the house during which we held four services, which were attended by about thirty persons, nearly half of whom were Roman Catholics. These were evidently intensely interested in the services, and one of them, a fine young school teacher, said: "Oh! that I could hear more of such preaching." May God bless the seed sown there.

#### STE. MARIE DE MONNOIR.

If the brooklet on the mountain side succeeds in wearing the rocks on which it flows, how much more will the gentle, yet powerful wave of Gospel truth, though flowing in a narrow channel, succeed in wearing and undermining errors were they centuries old. Wherever the Gospel is preached some good must needs be effected in spite of all obstacles.

This is probably the most difficult of all our mission fields, and yet not a year elapses but some good is accomplished by the very power of truth. We say the power of truth, because, in many instances, our co-operation is quite indirect.

Some years ago there lived in the vicinity a family, the head of which was known to be very bitter against Protestants. Notwithstanding his contempt and hatred, he could not prevent his children from coming in contact with some of our people. From them they received the good seed. Having gone to the United States they felt free, not only to read the Bible, but also to attend Protestant services. This led them to abandon the Romish Church, and, what is more rejoicing still, some of them were truly converted. The eldest daughter, returning home last year, behaved so well and spoke with so much good sense, that she not only won her father's respect, but even succeeded in persuading him to attend our meetings. We never had a more attentive

hearer. Now two of his daughters are at the Mission School. As to the father himself he wants only courage to come forward as far as we can see.

We have also seen at our services a greater number of Roman Catholics than during the previous year. These were generally intelligent young men, who seemed to listen very respectfully and attentively.

It is often repeated in connection with the work of our missions, that besides the direct results seen on those who openly quit the Romish Church, there is an important indirect influence whose fruits will be seen later. Such a state of things is taking place here as elsewhere. A few months ago a Romanist was telling us about a certain individual whom he had met, going all over the country, and in the most unsuspicious manner was selling bibles; this Roman Catholic was glad of it.

From innumerable facts of this kind, we know that a large class of French Canadians would be happy to see our work prosper, but they do not feel strong enough so far, to pass on our side. Yet "he that is not against us is for us." Luke ix: 50.

Although the cloud has its silver edge, we are not altogether joyful, nay, our dominant note is a sorrowful one. Not a year passes but we have to reckon losses in our little flock, from emigration or death, or both.

One of the most active members of our Church has just gone to his rest. Converted from Popery a good many years since, he had to withstand a cruel persecution in the form of a boycott. For a time starvation stared him in the face, but trusting in his God our brother never flinched, he won the day. Since then he has been respected and admired even by his enemies. From the time of his conversion his zeal never flagged; he was always ready to put in a good word in favor of the Gospel, to do so in a good spirit, and with great tact. He was always a great terror to the priest of his parish. His influence moreover, was not only felt outside, but in his own family, and his children follow in his footsteps.

Then there is a young man of intelligence and good behavior, whom we expected soon to see enlisted in the army of the cross, who has been taken sick and has had to leave for a more sunny climate, that of Florida. May the sun of righteousness shine in his soul, for the sun of this world will never restore him as far as we can see.

P.S.—There have been at one time in this field two hundred and twenty-six Protestants; by emigration and death the number is now reduced to about one hundred, of which fifty are church members.

The families are so scattered, and with so few children in them, that it is next to impossible to form a Sunday School.

#### ROXTON POND.

One more year of work, with less precious fruit to show than I had expected from the amount of labor bestowed. It seemed to me that, from the discussions we have had during the year with Roman Catholics, after several interviews with the Parish Priest, and especially the work of evangelization among them, that it would have led a few to decide for the Gospel. But the year has passed and we are still waiting for the result of the precious seed thrown on this field of Roxton Pond. But as we are saved in hope, we must also evangelize in the sure hope that the seed sown will some day germinate and bear fruit to the glory of God. For, as Jesus hath said: "he who sows is not always the same who reaps. Though we do not see all those to whom we preach the Gospel, "come to Jesus," we should not, for t' at reason, cease to labor; others will reap some fruit of those labors, and we shall rejoice together in heaven.

I rejoice to say that, especially during the summer months, our little chapel is filled every Sunday to its utmost capacity, morning and evening. Before long our chapel will be too small to accommodate the congregation. Our Sunday School, under the care of my daughter, Mrs. Racicot, and myself, is quite

encouraging. Of all my duties those hours given to the Sunday School have been the happiest in my ministry, as I feel in instructing the young and watching over them, the time is well spent, as it prepares the congregations, the churches and even the Christendom of the future.

During the past year we have had five additions to our Church by letters, and we have also lost five members of our flock by death—taken away at different ages, from the child of four years to the old Christian of ninety, whose house and heart and purse was always generously opened to the missionary and his work. The death of three others in he prime of life drew a large number of Catholics to their funeral services, where, as always, we took occasion to show that the Gospel alone is the power of God for salvation, against the fear of death, and the means of eternal happiness.

Our little village has been lately incorporated; it has a population of seventeen Protestant families. It is with pleasure and gratitude to God that we are able to say that those seventeen families are all opposed to a public house having a license to sell intoxicating drink in this place, and that they are actively engaged giving their preponderating influence, in the midst of Roman Catholics, to have this tavern closed by the first of May.

The number of Church members is twenty-nine; Sunday School scholars, fifteen; attendance as a congregation, in favorable weather, one hundred.

#### SOUTH ELY.

About a year ago the Evangelical Society of the Grande Ligne Mission, at the request of the Church and Congregation of South Ely, thought proper to send me in this locality, instead of allowing me to complete my theological course.

The Baptist Church of South Ely numbers several years of existence, and its history is well enough known, so that I shall limit myself to saying a few words on its present state, or of my work in conection with it during the past year.

On my arrival here last year I found the somewhat old church of Ely considerably reduced by a division which had taken place

several years ago; several members had not only withdrawn, but secured the fortnightly services of ministers of another denomination. I looked at this state of things with as much calm as possible, while endeavouring to let it be known to all, that I had come with the intention pure and simple to do all the good I could, to all who would be willing to profit by my labors. The grace of God manifestly touched the hearts; for without my having put forth any special effort to influence the separatists, we soon had the happiness of seeing the principal members of the disruption come of their own prompting to ask publicly to be pardoned and reinstated as members of the church. ministers of another denomination came finally to understand that they really had nothing to do here for the cause of Christ, and entirely withdrew from the field. Indeed one of them went so far as to say in a sermon when I was present, that he did not see why he or another Methodist or Presbyterian minister should come here to preach where I was resident in the place, having the bulk of the congregation with me, and amply satisfying all wants of the field.

The church has not only recuperated in numbers, but has also gained in spirituality and virtue. The people show an admirable fidelity in attending church services. Besides the children, we have an average attendance of forty persons, all Protestants or the children of old Protestants, for it is a notable fact that for years there has been here no conversion from Roman Catholic ranks, owing in a measure, doutless to the bad conduct of some Protestants and to the seeming incurable indifference of the Catholics, to anything religious, with the exception of going to their church some time, purely as a mechanical habit.

The priest whom I have visited seems to show the same apathy. It is difficult to know how one should act to make an impression on that inert mass of ignorance and spiritual dearth. I might perhaps accomplish more by going farther than I can do now, without a horse or any other means of conveyance in this secluded place; and I find that my worn out limbs, by the residence and work of nine years among the Indians of the Pacific Coast, refuse often the service that my willing soul would engage in the work of evangelization. The present number of church members is thirty; Sunday School scholars fifty.

#### ST. JOHNS.

During the past year with but a feeble measure of health I have been able to keep up our service on the Lord's day, to but a small congregation it is true, but I have reason to know that it has been beneficial to a good many souls. Much of my time has been employed in visits to the sick, near and at a distance, and in evangelistic work in neighboring and neglected places. I have had thus many occasions to make the Gospel known, and indeed, to see it gladly received by parties who would not have as yet the courage to confess it in the face of opposition by the priest especially but when it has fairly taken root in their souls they will.

Situated as I am here in a centre of railway communication, I have many occasions to meet strangers and wayfarers to whom I can impart the Word of salvation, and sometimes make them sufficiently acquainted with the Gospel for them to desire to possess the precious volume, which I hasten to procure them to bring home with them as a safeguard for the journey of life. In some of my visits among the Protestants of the neighborhood, I have at times met with Roman Catholics who knelt down in prayer with us, and afterwards asked my prayers in their behalf.

Besides what I have been able to do in St. Johns and neighborhood, I have been called to visit Farnham, St. Pie, Roxton Pond, Ste. Marie, Burlington and Montreal.

A short time ago I was called to assist a dear brother in his last sickness. Twenty-five years ago I had the privilege to make him and his wife acquainted with the blessed Gospel of Jesus Christ, they were soon after converted and baptized. He died comparatively young, but not before having seen his six children converted and following the Lord like their parents. His sudden and unexpected death was a loud call to Protestants and Catholics, who came in large numbers to his funeral.

During the summer months several young people from the country, attending our meetings, began to show special interest in religious matters; it lead me to follow them with care, to instruct them and to lead them in faith to the Lord Jesus Christ. After serious inquiry two of them were converted and baptized in

Mission Church at Grande-Ligne. Rev. Messrs. Roux and Massé being present, took part in the service, and in kind and tender words encouraged the young converts to lead a holy life as a consequence of their profession of faith. They were listened to very attentively by a large congregation.

We are again very much indebted to our kind friends of St. James Church, and to their devoted Pastor for lending us a very comfortable and suitable room for our French services. I beg to tender them here my hearty thanks on behalf of the Mission.

The yearly collections were made this year in St. Johns and Iberville, by Miss Sarah Lore and Miss F. E. Riendeau. In spite of the bad weather, they accomplished their task bravely, encouraged as they were by the generosity and kindness of all the friends of the cause on whom they called.

#### ST. PIE.

This station has been left without a resident missionary for twelve or fifteen years, and that because of a lack of funds and workers. This sad state of things in what was an interesting station, drew the sympathies of the nearest missionary, Bro. Brouillet, of Roxton Pond, who came in spite of the cedar swamp and the long distance, more than occasionally to visit and to preach.

The field, though severely ravaged—first, by persecution, and later by emigration—has always been an interesting one, and at one time very prosperous. The young man did not see its best days, but those more aged tell me that, about twenty years ago, there was a large floating congregation of eager listeners and a Church membership of over eighty. Instead of that number now, we have a membership of twelve. Where are the others? In other parts of Canada and the United States. Yet the great blessings of the past encourage us to expect blessings upon our work in the future.

Last summer, after my return from a collecting trip through the New England States, I was appointed by our Committee to take charge of the St. Pie field. The first thing that claimed our attention was the repairing of our chapel, to the amount of \$60. The congregation increased and became more regular. Then, amongst ourselves and friends, and with the aid of our Bro. Brouillet, we were enabled to raise money enough to procure an organ from Mr. Karns, of Woodstock, Ont., at half price. Soon after this I was again called to go on another collecting trip to Ontario, leaving this field alone for two months and a half.

Lately a Roman Catholic father asked me if I would be willing to teach an evening school, as he was anxious to have his three sons and daughter attend, and thought there would be others who would also like to come. I was only too glad to be able to open a school of this kind, that a few of our Roman Catholic people might learn to read and write.

One night the father came and listened with wonder. After the school was closed, he said: "Oh! how beautiful is education; there is not half enough in the country." He is a Roman Catholic and I am a Protestant, but we thoroughly agree on this subject; but the priest knows what all this ignorance is worth to him, yet he is pressed to, and shamly praises education, saying: "acquire it, acquire it." Is it not striking to see how utterly he has failed! Does it not lead one to doubt his earnestness in this; he never fails in getting money from his people. I hope to teach these young people some truths that will drive out the falsehood which they have been brought up to believe, and I am glad to see that more and more are recognizing the falsehood.

St. Pie is trying to be a blessing to others. One of our members, a man full of zeal and love, is doing colportage work, going from house to house, trying to introduce the words of Jesus to a thirsty people. Strange to say, that not many take it for fear of the priests, although a great many of them are anxious to have a serious conversation. Those who have heard of the persecutions that our Colporteurs had to suffer years ago will say with me: "The Kingdom of God is at hand."

From the fact that this station has been for several years without a permanent laborer and no pastor, the number of Church members has been reduced to twelve, while the average congregation is fifty, and the Sunday School thirty.

#### CLARENCEVILLE AND BROCKVILLE.

It is with gratitude to God, and with thanks to our earthly benefactors, that we once more attempt to enumerate a few of the blessings bestowed upon us during the past year.

Clarenceville, last year, was reported for the first time as a French Missionary field. Then we mentioned that an effort was being made to unite French and English people under one missionary who could speak and preach in both languages. This we have done not to perfection, but with enough encouragement and success to justify us in following on the same amalgamation.

I was called to the work here last Spring, and commenced to labor permanently on the first of May. Before that the field was visited every other week by Mr. Lebeau or myself, who were then students in Montreal. Since we have regular services a good interest prevails. During the summer six were added to the Church, five by baptism, and one by letter, those additions brought our membership to twenty-five. Our number of last year the Lord has doubled. Along with the visible additions there is a good work in progress, that cannot be seen with the eye of the flesh, but that is real nevertheless.

Our Church suffered losses in the death of one of its members, and also the death of a faithful member of the congregation, and also by our absence from the field.

In Brockville and in Clarenceville there are six families where I have access, I read and talk to them about Christ every week, as regularly as possible. I preached in Pike River last summer to large and attentive congregations, the English people lent us their Church for worship in that place, but I had to discontinue there, having enough to do elsewhere. I also visited some families in St. Armands and Highgate, Vt, who received me very favourably, they profess no religion, still they listened with eagerness when we talked to them of the Gospel of Jesus. (A new convert accompanied me in those visits.) All the surroundings are open for Christian work. May God give us means and men that we may always keep a laborer in this region. It is unfortunate that necessity calls us from our labor, every year to go out and collect.

Our new and extensive fields make no progress in our absence; we have learnt that it is only by prayer and continued earnest effort that success can be reached in these our difficult fields. Still we have much to praise the Lord for, and to thank all those who help us by their prayers and their means.

# MR. O. THERRIEN'S REPORT.

Mr. Octave Therrien furnishes us a detailed report of six months' labor in the work of colportage and evangelization among Roman Catholics, and of visits to scattered French Protestant families over a large portion of our missionary field, but during which his work was a good deal hindered by his impaired state of health. Mr. Therrien began by supplying the St. Pie station, holding meetings on Sunday, organizing a Sunday School, and emyloying a portion of his time in visiting Protestant and Catholic families between St. Pie and Roxton Pond, visiting also Beuce.

Afterwards he visited pretty minutely the wide field of St. Constant, St. Philippe, Lapigeonniere, St. Isidore, Douglas Corner and Napierville, meeting with a cordial welcome in Protestant and several Roman Catholic families. Having spent some time there, he was unable to continue without some rest. He then came to the Grande-Ligne station, and visited families in the neighbor-From there he went to Pike River, once an interesting missionary spot, where are still a few French Protestant families, the younger members of which understand the English language and attend English Churches, while old members feel neglected. He met there with several Roman Catholic families, who allowed him to speak freely on the subject of religion, and even invited him to pray with them. Then Mr. Therrien visited St. Johns, when, in company with Rev. Mr. Riendeau, he visited Canadians at the railway stations, going to the United States, and to whom they were enabled to show kindness, help, as well as to impart religious instruction of a durable nature.

#### ST. CONSTANT, ST. MICHEL, ST. PHILIPPE AND NAPIERVILLE.

On the 22nd day of May, after asking God to accompany me with His Holy Spirit, I set out on my journey from Grande-Ligne towards St. Michel. On arriving there, I at once went around among the different families, telling them that I had come to pass the summer among them as missionary, and that my desire was, with God's help, to continue the good work among them, which had been begun years before. I was well received by all; and, on Sunday morning, I had the pleasure of meeting twenty persons, who had gathered in the school house of the place. In the afternoon I also had the pleasure of meeting, at the school house of St. Constant, about thirty-five persons, who also welcomed me among them.

#### PUBLIC SERVICES.

One of my desires was to appoint the hour at which we might meet at the different stations on the Sabbath for our meetings. After a little I succeeded in this. With the exception of one or two Sundays, there was a meeting in St. Constant and St. Michel every Sunday; St. Philippe and Napierville every two weeks alternately. The meetings were generally well attended during the summer until the very last. There was on an average, including the different localities, from fifteen to forty persons present at the French meetings; and at the English meetings, which were held once a month at St. Constant, the average was from fifty to sixty persons.

We were also happy to see, nearly every Sunday, at the meetings, a number of Roman Catholics. At one time there was eight who were present at Napierville; six of them were men and women. On those occasions I put myself into the hands of God, trusting Him for help and words of instruction and consolation for those hearers, who really seemed seeking.

At St. Constant there were three Catholics who attended meetings very regularly all summer. One of them was a young man employed by a Protestant. The young man seemed to grasp every word that was said. One morning, as I was speaking on the return of the prodigal son, Luke xv. 11-32, tears were seen rolling down his cheeks. After meeting, he was asked how he liked the service.

"Oh!" said he, "all that was said, was said for me, for I am a prodigal son that has wandered far away from my heavenly Father."

The other two were young iadies from St. Philippe, their parents being Roman Catholics objected to their attending the meetings. Having taken a dislike to the church of Rome and its teachings, they had a craving thirst for a purer and holier religion than the one in which they had been brought up. Having a sister in St. Constant who is a Christian, and a member of the Grande-Ligne Church; these two young ladies might have been seen Sunday after Sunday coming through the fields (a distance of three miles) to visit their sister and to attend the meetings, which they seemed to delight in. One of those young ladies is at Grande-Ligne Mission School, and seems to be seeking Christ.

The last meeting in the field was held at St. Constant, Sunday, Oct. 17th. All expressed their regret of being deprived of the meetings during the long and cold winter months which are before them.

#### PRAYER MEETINGS.

About the middle of the summer, the few families of St. Constant and St. Philippe manifested a desire to have prayer meetings, which were held once a week, on Thursday evenings in St. Constant and St. Philippe alternately. Those meeting were never very numerous, but those present seemed to enjoy them, nearly all took part, they were really evenings of refreshment. The last of those meetings was devoted to thanksgiving to God; feeling the need of thanking Him for all that he had done for us.

## CONVERSATION WITH ROMAN CATHOLICS.

There are two families in St. Michel whom I visited once a month. I gave them New Testaments which they accepted; and had very interesting conversations with them, they seemed pleased to see me, and never let me depart without inviting me to come again. They have lost all faith in Romanism, and honestly admit that the teachings of the Roman Catholic Church are not the teachings of Jesus Christ and His Apostles, but simply a human invention. In my conversations with them, my special aim was to try and show them what Jesus and Apostles taught, and that

the Roman Catholic priests were not responsible for their souls as they thought they were, but that every person to whom God had given life and intelligence were responsible for their own souls. My last visit there was very short as I was only passing, but was a very impressive one. The mother in one of the families said to me as I was leaving. "I am very thankful for your visits and for all you have said to us, for I have been reading the book you gave me, and have found that all you said was there and a great deal more, and consequently the Church of Rome is not teaching us what Christ taught and commanded; if my husband would say as I do, we would renounce Popery and search for the truth in the Gospel." Oh! if they could only see the pure light and salvation and accept Christ instead of man, what a blessing it would be, both to themselves and to their children. I also had a number of conversations with different persons I met during the summer. I will now mention a few." " and and the first to any fraction and disting

One was with a pump-maker, who came to pass the night at the house where I was boarding. At about nine o'clock, as usual, the Bible was brought for family devotion. I opened the Book at I John, I chap., and a few verses in the 2nd. After reading those few verses in the Word of God, prayer was offered. After prayer the stranger remained silent a few minutes; then he asked me if I would sit up with him a while longer. "Those words," said he, "that you read were beautiful, and I would like to have you read some more." I was glad to get the opportunity to read to him. It was twelve o'clock when we retired that evening. Next morning, after breakfast and prayer, we went out and sat upon a log, which was lying not far from the house. We sat there until half-past eleven, conversing on religious subjects. I tried to show him by the Word of God that the teaching of the Romish Church was not what the Bible taught us. I again read to him different portions of the Holy Scriptures, to which he listened with the greatest attention. After listening very attentively, he said: "truly that book is the Word of God, because there is no human intelligence able to write such a book as that without being really inspired; I have heard a great deal of the Bible, but had never heard it read until last night, nor never dared to buy one from those who passed selling them; the next one I meet who has those books to sell I shall have one." Fortuately I had a few

New Testaments, so I gave him one, which seemed to please him very much. May God bless the few grains of seed which may have been sown in his heart.

At another time, as I was going from one station to another on foot, I was overtaken by a man who drove a horse and buggy. As he went by he asked me to share his seat with him. The man proved to be a member of Parliament. He then began to question me as to my name, occupation, &c. When I had satisfied his curiosity, he asked me if I did not think that my labor was useless. "No!" was my immediate reply, for if I did I would not work another day. There is a host of work to be done, and God wants workers. I also related to him the details of my conversion, telling him all that God had done for me. We rode together about four miles. All he said during the journey was the question which he asked me at first, but he let me say all I had to say.

Again, I had found an opportunity to tell what Christ had done for the whole world. After speaking to him about Christ and what the Bible taught concerning him, about half an hour, we arrived at the place where we were to part I thanked him for his kindness, but he did not answer. What could have been the reason? Did he, perhaps, think that it was not worth while? Had I been telling him something that he did not believe? or had I told him something that had really made him thoughtful? I did not know.

On another occasion, as I was on the ferry, which crosses from St. Constant to Montreal, there were about twenty-five men on board; nearly all were farmers from St. Constant. They were talking about religion and about their priest, as all were Roman Catholics. This is about what they said: "Our priests are not desirous to see us saved, but their main object is money. We go to church Sunday after Sunday; we never hear a word about God; it is either a sermon on elections or on another subject of the same nature. I am tired of that; I will not go to church any more; my wife goes, but I will not." All the twenty-five seemed to have the same opinion.

There is work to be done among those discontented souls. I was told the week before I left the field to come here to school; that there were six Roman Catholic families in Hemmingford (a

distance of about twenty miles from St. Michel, and about the same distance from Napierville) that had lost all faith in Romanism, and were earnestly seeking the truth, and would be glad to have a missionary visit them.

Allow me to say, before closing my first missionary report, that I feel very thankful to God for what He has done for me during the past summer. Although I met with discouragements now and then, I am thankful to say that I was strengthened and encouraged many times, both by God and by the friends of the different stations.

On the whole, it was for me, one of the happiest summers that I have ever passed, because I was working for the Master. May God bless my few weak and imperfect efforts, and prepare me wholly for this work all the days of my life here below.

#### CONCLUSION.

The review of this year's labor does not tell, but only intimates against what gigantic power our small and feeble army of workers have to fight. If we were to enumerate the advantages of the opposing power we meet in our efforts to make the Gospel known in this French Catholic population, it might damp the zeal and weaken the heart of many friends of the cause. The numbers of the so-called faithful, the wealth of the clergy, their long-established authority, now more than ever cemented to Rome by the creation of a Cardinal; their numerous institutions; their huge convents, fortresses to maintain and perpetuate a superstitious and unhealthy, fictitious religious life; which, while professing to think and work only for heaven, amass immense wealth, while they impoverish

the mind and the peoples with whose money they rear them, are some of the great obstacles to the work of evangelization.

We might despair if we knew not a little of the history of Christianity, which is a spiritual power more mighty than all the fortresses, armies and governments of the world! Yes, or even a worldly form of Christianity. When Papal Rome was at the summit of her power and glory; when it was beginning the building of the most stupendous religious edifice in the world; a poor monk, in the poor little town of Erfurt, was wrestling in penances and soul tortures, under the influence of the almighty Spirit of God. Who but God could see what power would be evolved from that single soul that was to accomplish a work, a work for God and a work with God, in comparison with which the work of Bramante and Michel Angelo and Pope Leo X., is a mere heap of stone and figment of glory. Did not our Master once weep over Je usalem, whose ruins he foresaw? Did He not say to His disciples who admired the buildings of the temple: "See ye not all these things? Verily, I say unto you, there shall not be left there one stone upon another that shall not be thrown down." Did He not say also: "I shall build my Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." It will never be swallowed up by death; it is an immortal structure.

Brethren we are working with Christ in the building up of His Church, if like Luther we are enraptured by His Word, and inspired by his spirit, we shall be humble but fearless, knowing that our work will not be in vain in the Lord. The Lord may destroy human constructions in building up his own immortal edifice.

What is this little Province of Quebec all hemmed in by a girdle of Protestant Provinces and States, wide awake, active, progressive to do against this mighty surrounding influence, which transform her hundred thousand children who emigrate from her, and who honeycombs her resident population? Are we not also in her midst, we French Evangelical Protestants, a lever slowly but surely penetrating the whole mass. On several occasions lately our influence has been largely acknowledged by the French Catholic Press, which has been forced to quote from our articles, passages very damaging to the power of the clerical party in this land.
