NEW FRENCH LINER NOW HOLDS ALL RECORDS IN TRANS-ATLANTIC TALK

Remarkable Achievement in Wireless Telegraphy by New French Liner La Provence --- She Was in Communication With Both Sides of the Atlantic at the Same Time.

NEW YORK, lapril 28—The World today says: It is a question whether the officials of the French line are prouder of the wireless telegraph fecord, or the speed record which their new ship, La Provence, established on her maiden trip across the Atlantic. She arrived off Sandy Hook at 1.15 p. m. yesterday, having made the run from Havre in six days, five hours, and ten minutes. The old record was six days, nine hours and twenty minutes. It was held by La Lorraine.

The wireless telegraph record was even more estisfactory than this. It having been the ambition of the Atlantic navigators to carry on communication with both shores of the ocean at the same time, but none of them could quite man.

The wireless telegraph operator aboard La Provence was in constant communication with poldhu, on the coast of Cornwall, from the time the ship got clear of Havre. The ship was 1,800 miles from Cape Cod at 2 o'clock last Wednesday morning. 



FINANCIAL DEMANDS

OF RUSSIA (New York Commercial-Advertiser.) The loan of \$440,000,000 which, on som the financial requirements of Russia. In an official communication, issued a few days ago, the government has given some that of these. A bid has been made for the investment of foreign capital by declaring that the convocation of the Russian parliament will mark the end of the vexatious restrictions heretofore existing upon the exploitation of Russia's resources. Siberia and Central Asia espectations upon the exploitation of Russia's resources. Sineria and Central Asia especially are pointed out as fields for material development. It is quite true that Siberia is the wealthiest part of Russia, and that under a good government it would soon become populous and highly prosperous. On the four million square miles of Eastern Siberia there are only about two million periods of whom many are

of government in Russia to a very severe strain.

In the official organ of the Russian Treasury this suggestive statement was made several years ago: "No correct judgment can be pronounced on the financial machinery of Russia unless this fundamental fact is borne in mind; the Russian State is the greatest landowner, the greatest capitalist, the greatest constructor of railways and carries on the largest business in the world." On all fours with this state of things is the position of the Bank of Russia. As the same publication pointed out, that institution has no other capital fhan that provided by the Treasury. While the sum of 100 million roubles does appear in the assets of the bank under the head of "non-interest bearing debt of the Treasury for bank notes issued," in the liabilities there may be found, say 356 million roubles as "Treasury account current." It is with roubles that the Bank of Russia carries on its loan and discount operations. Instead of advancing to the Government the

money of private persons, the bank lends to the Government the money of private persons. Under these conditions it is clear that the Government cannot rection on the bank to absorb its Treasury bills and that it must carefully avoid, not only overdrawing its balance, but even letting it fall below 200 million rouoles. In short, the whole fabric of government in Russia rests on a highly organized and centralized paternalism, and to allow free play to individual enterprise the national conception of the legitimate functions of the State must undergo a radical change. It may be confidently affirmed that no such change is possible unless it be preceded by the equally radical change of transferring to the representative assembly the power of the national purse. At present the Russian is the only government which can raise taxes for any purpose without consulting the representatives of the people. The Russian people are never asked whether they are willing to pay a certain tax or to approve of the purpose for which it is raised. They are apprised of the command and are expected to obey. It is hardly necessary to add that the Russians are the only civilized people who would brook such treatment, and that even they have found it too much for endurance.

Up to date the money thus raised has been spent in the maintenance of the largest army in Europe, on a navy which, before its destruction by Japan, came third, in the order of international strength, and on thousands of miles of commercially unproductive railways and strategical harbors around which have been built the most ambitious kind of towns for the use of future generations. The attempt to construct a network of railways mainly on strategical grounds has proved financially disastrous. Witte and said that the ability of the population to pay taxes has certain limits which cannot be transgressed without damaging the economic position of the country. That statement is no loss emphatically true today than it was in 1902, and circumstances have manifestly given it new force. The key to the future economic policy of Russia will be found in the recognition which the new representative body shall give to considerations like these and to its ability to give them practical effect.



He brought with him on this trip a 45,000 lot of ova which were almost ready for the emergence of the fry. He says that if a loss of five or ten percent, had occurred in transit from the hatchery to Loch Lomond he would not have been disappointed, but he was delighted to find, when he and Guardian Johnston opened the lot at the upper end of the big lake on Thursday afternoon, that in three out of the eighteen trays not an egg was spoiled, while only from one to even had "gone off" in the others—so that the loss was practically nothing.

Fifteen thousand of the eggs were planted in a spring brook, which runs into the head of the big lake within 100 yards of Mr. Johnston's house, where the completion of the hatching and advancing process for the first three of the fry tage may be under his daily observation and that of anyone else who may



LONDON, April 26—The two new Cunard liners, which are being built with the \$10,000,000 lent by the government are fast nearing completion, and will be launched in June or July of this year. Some remarkable figures regarding the two vessels are supplied by the Cunard company. Each vessel will have a gross tonnage of 33,200, while they are 60 feet longer than any other liners afloat. They are 88 feet in beam, and in this respect are the first to surpass the Great Eastern, which was 83 feet in breadth. They will each have accommoditions for 3,000 passengers and carry a crew of 800.
