

"If liquors are found in storage warehouses or other places except privated wellings and government bonded warehouses after Feb. 1, 1920, and report of their possession has not been made to the bureau of internal revenue, such liquor will be subject to seizure and the places where they were stored may be declared a public and common nulsance.



SAYS GERMANS

Polish Officer, Home to U.S., Declares There is Unbelievable Cruelty Inflicted.

New York, Jan. 15—German officers, arms and ammunition are used to a large extent by the Bolsheviki in their campaign against the Polish forces, according to Major Starzynski of Pittsb. 3h, cnief of the medical staff of General Haller's first Polish army, more than half of which is composed of Poles born in the United States. He has just returned to the United States after two years of campaigning on the Polish frontiers, where, he avers, the Polish soldiers are almost totally lacking in equipment necessary to match the effectlent German armament of the Bolsheviki.

"The enemy discipline is fairly good in battle," he continued, "but their excesses after they have taken a village are unbelievable. We saw evidence of their wanton cruelty everywhere. They confiscate and destroy and absolutely force submission by the people. Their general principle is to execute large numbers of the chief residents of any village they occupy for the salutory effect it will have, and then to permit excesses by their soldiers against men and women."

Fifty per cept of the Polish army to extent by the Bolsheviki in their cam-

Fifty per cent of the Polish army to-day is in civilian clothes, according to the major, while most of the soldiers are without shoes. This condition, he said, is shared by large numbers of school boys and girls, who are fighting side by side with the soldiers.

Moncton, Jan. 15—Registered nurses here apart from the hospital staff have served on the hospital board notice that practically amounts to a strike. The letter representing the views of fifteen nurses stated that after Jan. 15 registered nurses would demand \$21 a week for a twelve hour day. In effect this means that people engaging private nurses will have to pay \$42 a week for a twenty-four hour day. As the hospital board has no jurisdiction in the matter no action was taken.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

Fire on Saturday morning destroyed the shook mill at Port Elgin owned by Fred Magee, M. P. P., causing damage amounting to \$40,000. A chicken canning factory and freezer in which were about ten tons of chickens were also prey to the flames.







Chief Smith concludes his report as follows:—

I would recommend that twelve pairs of Peerless handcuffs, twelve Iver Johnson revolvers, forty flash-lights, six silent policemen and forty leather batons be supplied the department.

I would also recommend a high power automobile (runabout) for the benefit of the detective department, as it would enable them to get around much quicker in their investigations, especially in the outskirts of the city.

I would also ask the privilege of appointing another patrol sergeant, as I have had to keep one of the constables as acting patrol sergeant for the last year.

Increase in Arrests for Drunkenness.

The increase in arrests for drunkenness in the year 1919 is 345 over that of 1918, which fact, in my opinion, is largely due to the strictness of the provincial prohibition act, which compels the police to arrest all drunks found on the public streets, whereas under the license act many were assisted by former overseas officers and N. C. O.'s, made as much as can be in the form of an association of pals, with the element of club life entering to a large extent.
