

# ANOTHER BRITISH CRUISER, WITH 350 MEN

The Hawke Sunk by Submarine in North Sea and But Fifty of Her Crew Saved--Disaster But Three Weeks After Loss of Aboukir, Hague and Cressy

London, Oct. 16-The British cruiser Hawke has been sunk in the North Sea by a German submar ine. Out of a crew of 400 men, fifty were saved. The statement has been officially confirmed.

The Hawke was of 7,350 tons displacement. She was 360 feet long, of sixty feet beam and drew 23 feet of water. She was a sister ship of the Edgar, Endymion, Grafton, Theseus and Gibraltar, and was

Her armament consisted of two 9.2 inch guns, ten six inch guns, twelve six pounders, five three pounders, two machine guns and two torpedo tubes. Her complement is given as 544 men, but she may well have had fewer on board when she went down.

The Hawke was commanded, according to the British Admiralty list of September, 1914, by Cap-Has Been Strongly in Favor of tain Hugh P. E. T. Williams, and among her officers were Commander Bernard A. and with them some sixty British officers and 1,400 men went to their death While the Hawke was laid down in June of 1889, she was launched at Chatham on March 11, 1891.

The punishment of pressing to death—peine forte et dure—was reserved for prisoners who refused to plead at their trial. It was not abolished until 1772. The victim was tied down on the floor of a cell, and weights were piled upon his breast until he either consented to plead or died. In 1735 a man who stood dumb at the Sussex Assizes was sent to Horsham jail to undergo this torture, and we are told that he endured in agony a weight of 350 pounds, and greatest poet, Burns, mourned "Man's inhumanity to man," he may have had in mind the terrible savagery of the law, for in his time the law sanctioned the most awful punishments, often for comparatively trivial offences.

Until the year 1870 the punishment ordained for high treason was that the guilty person should be drawn on a hurdle to the place of execution, there to be hanged by the neck till he be dead; that his head be severed from his body; that his body be divided into four quarters; and that his head and quarters be at the disposal of the crown. In earlier days the victim was only partially hanged; he was to be cut down alive, and dismemberment and quartering followed. A woman traitor was burned alive.







KILLED 18 HIMSELF Ooh-la, Black Fighter From The

Senegal in French Line Paris, Sept. 29-(by mail to New York)-I am not allowed to give any

York)—I am not allowed to give any information to the German soldiers, but if you have any friends in the German army you'd better tip them off that if they see among the enemy a medium-sized black man with a big smile who answers to the name "Ooh-La," they'd better shoot first or beat it.

My friend Ooh-La, in spite of his smile and his ivory teeth, is one of the most terrible men I have ever known. Senegal is his home, and Ooh-La is as black as the ace of clubs.

Ooh-La came up from Senegal three weeks ago with thousands of his black brothers to help the Allies against the Germans. No one paid Ooh-La any particular attention for a long time. He fought at dozens of places, but his black brothers all fought about the same, so he didn't stand out anything extra. It takes superlative murderousness to make a fighter conspicuous in a crowd like Ooh-La's.




