LONDON, June 4—In a despatch to the Daily Express from Liverpool, Commander Frank Worsley, who was to have been second in command of the polar expedition of Captain Grettir Algarsson, the young British Columbia explorer, is quoted as having said that the idea of using an airship in a race to the North Pole this summer has been abandoned, as the airship cannot is be delivered in time to make the flight this season.

The expedition now proposes to sail from Ireland to Spitzbergen for geographical and scientific work northeast of Spitzbergen and to seek data for a flight in 1926.
