So much did the French think of the Canadians that French civilians, about to leave their homes near Neuville Vitasse when the German pressure was at its most threatening stage, changed their minds when they saw the changed their minds when they saw the 2nd Division Canadian troops going into the fighting lines. Canadians had always trained for offensive tactics. Over-running an area defended by machine guns was especially emphasized in the training. morning the commons on a division of seventy-nine to fifty-six, a government majority of twenty-three, rejected D. D. McKenzie's motion demanding the appointment of a parliamentary committee to inquire into the manner of the taking of the soldiers vote at the last general election as well as into the sending of a code telegram under the signature of Hon. Arthur Meighen to Sir Robert Borden in regard to the apportioning of one thousand soldiers votes in Manitoba. The division, which was a straight party affair, was preceded by much excitement when Mr. McKenzie produced the original telegram, and Mr. Meighen, after looking it over declared that it was not in his hand writing and that he had not written it or initialled it.

Considerable cross-firing and confusion followed. Mr. McKenzie, who was exercising his privilege as the mover of the mover of the contest the petition.

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 2—Vice-Chairman F. Robinson, of the Workmen's Compensation Board for New Brunswick stated in the city today that since the act came into force on January 2 last, the board had paid out \$34,650 for temporary disability and \$4,376 in partial disability. The total number of accidents during the nine months was 1,750. The deaths through accident number twelve. The death claims allowed total \$37,648. These death claims are paid monthly until the total sum of \$3,500 is reached. The dominion government employes have just come under the operation of the act and also the woodmen or lumbermen throughout the province.

Customs return for September shows a falling off as compared with the corresponding month. \$22,777,13 was taken in collections for the past month. During the previous year collections in September were \$30,812.96.

No doubt in a primitive order of society
the word would be unknown and there
would be no conscious need of a definition. To have enough to eat, a place to sleep and a satisfactory amount of leisure, to enjoy fair health and to live for a reasonable span of years—that would be accounted success, although it would have no need of definition because it would be the negretal condition. would be the normal condition.
In civilized circles men have more de-

finite and more expansive aspirations.
Success varies according to the direction of their aim. In a loose sense it might be defined as the achievement of what one sets out to do. That fails to satisfy, because one might, and one frequently does, set out to do something unworthy, and while that may be called "success" in its immediate application it is not the real meaning of success. They are various measures that seem equally narrow, for strangely enough there are many whose ideas of achievement are really nothing more than an expansion of the views of savages who are content merely to live and follow out the cruder im-

The common tendency is to measure success in terms of money. The late James J. Hill once declared that no man could be called successful who did not regularly save something out of his income. Success to him was merely keeping the outgo under the income, and the measure of it was by the bushels or quarts or half-pints of accumulated sur-

But most of us realize that a man may spend less than he gets and still fail to rank as a success in life. One New Yorker in this symposium has quoted a professor who not long ago declared that "any man who has trained himself and is able to supply the public with any of those things that it demands may be termed a success."

By that definition we may judge that any compretent hardeners on honest say

By that definition we may judge that any competent barkeeper or honest saloon proprietor is a success, or was until an arbitrary nation put a stop to his laudable effort to supply the public with some of the things it demanded. It is easy to see that giving the public what it wants and asks for does not necessarily constitute success, for the people may want what is not good for it.

It would seem that there are narrow limitations to nearly all the definitions of success that have been offered. They are altogether concrete, and the true definition must be in a great measure abstract. To say that success is earning money and holding on to it, or doing this, that or the other thing, or achieving contentment, is like saying that happiness is living in a brick house with two servants and a washing machine and having leisure to go to the movies five times a week. And yet we do not doubt that there are women who cherish this ideal of happiness. ideal of happiness.



"It was thought that a wholesale dispensary controlled and managed by the government might be established whereby only those liquors of the best quality would be imported and sold to the retail vendors, and at the same time sold at fixed prices which would place the various kinds of liquors in the hands of the retail vendors at a less profit than now obtained. Because, however, of the uncertain conditions at present prevailing, due not only to the holding of a plebisciate which must necessarily take place shortly but also to the Dominion government order-in-council which is government order-in-council which is now in force under the War Time Measnow in force under the War Time Measures Act, which order prevents the importation or shipment of liquor from one province to another and which, unless supplemented by Dominion legislation, must necessarily expire with the declaration of peace, it is felt that until those two important question are determined, the government cannot wisely define its policy or embark on such a radical change as the establishment of a government dispensary would entail.







The Why? of Another Victory Loan

WHEN, on the morning of November 11th, 1918, the guns were hushed and glad tidings flashed across the world, there followed with the Nation's Prayer of Thanksgiving, one yearning query, which found echo in the faster-beating hearts of wives, mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters and sweethearts.

THAT query was, "How soon will our boy be home?"

A ND, from France and Flanders, from Italy and Egypt, from Palestine and from far-off Siberia, there came an answering echo, "How soon, how soon, may we go home?"

CANADA caught the spirit of these longings, and at once resolved to satisfy them.

IT was an appalling task. Shipping was tragically scarce. The composition of the Army of Occupation had not then been settled. And other parts of

the Empire as well as Canada were looking for the speedy return of their men.

THE problem was this. The half-million men that Canada had overseas had taken more than four years to transport to the field of battle.

To bring them home in a few months was a gigantic undertaking—one to tax all Canada's ingenuity and resources.

CANADA solved the problem, but it meant crowding into a few short months, an expense for demobilization which it was impossible to foresee.

THEN, too, besides the sentimental aspect of the necessity for bringing the men home quickly, the economic side could not be overlooked.

THAT was, to transform efficiently and speedily the nation's army of fighters into a national army of workers.

Need Divides Itself in The answer to the question "Why does Canada need another Victory Loan?" divides itself into

Two Parts

(a) To finish paying the expenses of demobilization, and the obliga-

tions we still owe to our soldiers.

(b) To provide national working capital.

The payment of all soldiers still undemobilized. This includes more than 20,000 sick and wounded who are still in hospital, and who of course remain on the Army payroll till discharged.

The upkeep of hospitals, and their medical and nursing

staffs, until the need for them is ended.

These three items alone will use up at least \$200,000,000

Gratuities

There is also the gratuity which has been authorized, and has been and is being paid to assist soldiers to tide over the period between discharge and their re-adjustment to civil life. For this purpose alone, \$61,000,000 must be provided out of the Victory Loan 1919, in addition to the \$59,000,000 already paid out of the proceeds of the Victory Loan 1918.

Furthermore, soldiers who desire to become farmers may, under the Soldiers' Land Settlement Act, be loaned money by Canada with which to purchase land, stock and implements. The money so advanced will be paid back; meantime each loan is secured by a first mortgage. Up to August 15th, 29,495 soldiers had applied for land under the terms of this Act; and 22,281 applications had been investigated, and the qualifications of the applicant approved. For this purpose Canada this year requires

Vocational For this work which, with the Vocational Training and Soldiers' Service Departments, embraces the major activities of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, an appropriation of \$57,000,000 is necessary

These national expenditures are war expenses. They will be accepted readily by every citizen who gives thought to the task which Canada faced following the Armistice, and to the success with which she has met it.

National Working Capital

\$24,000,000.

Canada needs national working capital, so that she may be able to sell on credit to Great Britain and our Allies the products of our farms, forests, fisheries,

mines and factories.

You may ask "Why sell to them if they can't pay cash?"

The answer is, "Their orders are absolutely essential

to the continuance of our agricultural and industrial prosperity."

The magnitude of these orders and the amount of employment thus created, will depend upon the success of the Victory Loan 1919.

The "Why" Farmers and manufacturers (and that includes the workers on these orders) must be paid cash for their products. Therefore, Canada must borrow money from her citizens to give credit, temporarily, to Great Britain and

our Allies. Actually, no money will pass out of Canada. If Canada does not give credit, other countries will; and they will get the trade, and have the employment that should be ours, to distribute amongst their workers. And remember, we absolutely need these orders to maintain employment. If we don't finance them business will feel the depression, employment will not be as plentiful, and conditions everywhere will be adversely affected.

For Transportation

Money must also be available to carry on the nation's shipbuilding programme, and other transportation development work.

For loans to Provincial Housing Commissions who are building moderate priced houses.
