LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
NOVA-SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called The Bible Society of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz:—To encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary and Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the design of this Institution, benefactions and Subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually One Pound, or at one time a donation of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a Member of this Society.

V. A general meeting of the Members of this Society shall be held every year, during the sitting of the Legislature, before which shall be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expences, shall be remitted annually, in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every Member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments, at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet, for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society, as often as may be necessary.

SEVENTH REPORT
OF THE
NOVA-SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

AT the Seventh Anniversary of the Nova-Scotia Bible Society, held at
Mason Hall, March 11th, 1822,

The Hon. Judge STEWART in the Chair.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Revd. James Robson, and the Report of the Committee having been read, it was, on the motion of J. G. Marshall, Esq. seconded by John Howe Junr. Esq.

Resolved unanimously, That the Report now read be received and adopted, and that it be printed under the direction of the Committee.

On the motion of S. B. Robie, Esq. seconded by W. H. O. Haliburton, Esq. it was

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be given to His Excellency Sir James Kempt, the President, for his continued patronage of this Society.

On the motion of the Hon. James Fraser, seconded by William Fraser, Esq. it was

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Hon. Chief Justice Blowers, Vice President, for the continuance of his services to this Society.

On the motion of the Revd. Mr. Martin, seconded by Thomas Roach, Esq. it was

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Gentlemen who compose the Committee, for their attention to the business of the Society.

On the motion of S. G. W. Archibald, Esq. seconded by J. W. Nutting, Esq. it was

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be presented to the several Branch Societies, which have continued their exertions in support of the objects of this Institution.

On the motion of the Revd. James Knowlan, seconded by W. A. Chipman, Esq. it was

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Revd. James Robson, the Secretary, for his assiduous and persevering attention to the business of the Society.

The Hon. Judge having left the Chair, and the Hon. James Fraser being called to it, it was, on the motion of Samuel Head, Esq. seconded by John Starr, Esq.

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Hon. Judge Stewart, for his condescending attention to the business of this day, and his uniform and anxious endeavours to promote the interests of this Institution.

The meeting was concluded with prayer by the Revd. William Black.

difficulty of raising money, in these straitened times, by way of subscriptions. They have placed at the doors of the Meeting-House, boxes with holes in the covers, upon which the words *Bible Society* are inscribed; and into these boxes those who are not able to become subscribers have a weekly opportunity of casting such small sums as they may be able to spare. In this manner less or more is collected every Sabbath, and they expect that, by the end of the year, the amount of the whole will be considerable. Perhaps the same plan might be adopted with advantage in other parts of the Province.

Contributions to the funds of this Society from the Town of Halifax, still bear no proportion to its wealth and population. And although the Committee have again and again endeavoured to draw the attention of their townsmen to the claims which the Bible cause has to their consideration and support, their endeavours hitherto, though by no means nugatory, have been but crowned with very partial success. They have resolved, therefore, according to the common practice of other Bible Institutions, to appoint some of their number to solicit subscriptions personally from the Inhabitants of Halifax. Such a measure came under the consideration of the Committee soon after the first formation of this Society, but was never carried into effect; some having thought that it was liable to serious objections, and it having been conceived that other ways of procuring subscriptions would be found equally efficacious. But the experience of eight years, has clearly demonstrated that expectations of the efficacy of other ways of procuring subscriptions, were not well founded. Recourse, therefore must now be had to a measure which, though some may account it indelicate, has been followed by the most respectable Societies, and has been uniformly found highly conducive to their prosperity.

Since the last Anniversary, contributions to the amount of £252 12 9 cur. have been received, which, with former contributions from the commencement of the Institution, make the sum of £3242 17 11½ currency. The sum now in the hands of the Treasurer will be remitted without delay to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Since the last Anniversary, 200 Bibles and 350 Testaments have been received from the Parent Institution. 29 Bibles, and 87 Testaments have been distributed gratis; 195 Bibles, and 245 Testaments, have been furnished to Branch Societies; and 14 Bibles and 18 Testaments have been sold at reduced prices; and there now remain in the Depository, 146 Bibles, and 172 Testaments, chiefly in the Gaelic and Irish languages.

The last supply of Bibles and Testaments from home, was accompanied with a copy of the History of the first fifteen years of the British and Foreign Bible Society, by the Rev. Mr. Owen, one of the Secretaries, which has been kindly presented by the Committee of that Institution, and by the learned Author, to this Auxiliary Society, and for the use of its Members.

The British and Foreign Bible Society, still perseveres, with its wonted energy and munificence, its widely extended and continually extending labours, for the instruction and improvement of the human race; and is vigorously seconded in all its labours of love by a multitude of kindred Institutions throughout the world. It has now promoted the translation, printing or distribution, of the Scriptures, or of portions of the Scriptures, in 139 different languages and dialects: of which, 43 are re-prints, 8 are re-translations, and 88 are entirely new translations into languages into which the Scriptures had never before been rendered. At the last Anniversary, in May 1821, its nett receipts for the preceding year amounted to £89,154 16 sterling; and during the same period, there had been issued from its Depository, 104,828 Bibles, and 142,129 Testaments, making, with those issued at the expense of the Society from Foreign Presses 3,201,978 Bibles and Testaments, since the commencement of the Institution. The Society is still extending its influence from Province to Province, and from Kingdom to Kingdom, and proposes no termination to its benevolent progress, till the Earth be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

It is worthy of remark that, on the Continent of Europe, many members of the Roman Catholic Church are zealous promoters of the great object of

Bible Societies. One Clergyman of that communion, Leander Van Ess, Professor of Divinity in the University of Marbourg, is worthy of particular notice; This distinguished Ecclesiastic published, some years ago, a translation of the new testament into the German language; and of this translation, and chiefly through his instrumentality, 431,163 copies had been distributed among the Catholics in Germany, previous to the tenth day of October last.

It is pleasing, indeed, to observe how cordially Christians, of every denomination and of every rank, combine to promote the dissemination of the Scriptures. Protestants and Roman Catholics, Lutherans and Calvinists, Churchmen and Dissenters, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Independents, Baptists and Methodists, together with numbers of the Greek, Armenian and Moravian Churches here meet together on common ground, and embrace one another with fraternal affection. The most august princes, the most illustrious nobles, the most dignified prelates, the most eminent statesmen, the most renowned commanders, the profoundest scholars, the most learned divines, join hand in hand with multitudes of meaner, and of the meanest christians, in seeking the prosperity and enlargement of that Kingdom, which is righteousness and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost. This may surely be regarded as an earnest of those blessed times for which we are taught to look, and the arrival of which the labours of Bible Societies have so direct a tendency to accelerate, when there shall be one sheepfold and one Shepherd; when they shall teach no more every man his neighbour, and every man his brother, saying know the Lord, but all shall know him from the least to the greatest.

Who then would not wish to contribute according to his ability, to the resources and to the successes of the British and Foreign Bible Society? Who that is at all raised above a state of absolute indigence, would not be willing to relinquish a part of his substance, to impart wholesome nourishment to famishing multitudes? But how noble soever it may be to impart common food to the hungry, how much more noble is it to impart the bread of life to those who are perishing for lack of knowledge? To put the Scriptures of Truth, which are able to make wise unto salvation, into the hands of those who are ignorant of the character of the God that made them, of the relation in which they stand to him as guilty and depraved creatures, of Jesus Christ, the way and the truth and the life, by whom, and by whom alone, they can be restored to the enjoyment of his favour? In the one case we seek to ward off the stroke of temporal, but in the other, we seek to ward off the stroke of eternal death. In the one case, we may be instrumental in prolonging, for a season, that which is at best, a life of care, and of labour, and of sorrow; but in the other, we may be instrumental in opening up, to those who are the objects of our bounty, the infallible prospects of being, ere long, admitted to dwell forever in the regions of consummate and endless glory and bliss. The Committee trust, therefore, that no member of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Society will suffer himself to grow weary in this species of well-doing, and that many of their fellow citizens will yet come forward, with alacrity, to strengthen their hands and to encourage their hearts, and invigorate their exertions in this work of the Lord. If from love to God and to our fellow creatures, we contribute of our substance, as the Lord hath prospered us for this most excellent end, we may hope that the blessing of those who are ready to perish will come upon us; that our conduct will be pleasing and acceptable to that God, in whose hand our breath is, and whose are all our ways; that when the purposes of his providence and grace with regard to us are finished upon earth, we shall be saluted with these soul rejoicing words, well done good and faithful servants, enter ye into the joy of your Lord; and that, through the ages of eternity, we shall inherit the portion of those who turn many to righteousness; shine as the brightness of the firmament, and as the stars forever and ever.

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APPENDIX.

NEWPORT, DECEMBER 31, 1821.

THE expiration of another year imposes the pleasing duty of reporting the proceedings of the Harits Branch Bible Society. We have diligently investigated the wants of the community in this quarter, and have good reason to believe that there is scarcely a family in the County, in want of the Holy Scriptures who are anxious to obtain them. We have supplied such Roman Catholic families as are willing to accept of them. The people of colour on the Windsor road, have been liberal sharers of this charity. We have furnished eight Churches with Bibles, have sold some at reduced prices, and have sent into circulation in different ways, the number of 52 Bibles and 58 Testaments. They are scattered among the woods and wilds of Nova Scotia, preaching righteousness and salvation to the world, and when the great day of redemption comes, it will be seen how much good they have done. Our Treasurer William Fraser, Esq. has in hand and will remit to the Nova-Scotia Society by the first opportunity the sum of £49 1s. 9d. We owe to that Society and its office bearers, unfeigned gratitude for their kind attention and liberal supplies to our little Branch Society.

The people at Noel have not equalled our expectations, few of them have paid their subscriptions, most of them still keep at a distance from the Society and take but little interest in its fortunes. The active and rising Township of Rawdon however has displayed a better spirit, a respectable portion of its citizens have come forward with money in their hands, and added their names to our list. Our friends in Newport remain steady, there is every reason to believe that the friends of Religious ignorance are continually diminishing in this fine Township, and yet it cannot be dissembled that many are as careless about the Society as they are about the Institutions of Lycurgus, and perhaps as little acquainted with its History; some members have joined us in Falmouth. Our Society has at last attracted the favourable regards of the village of Windsor, and some of its most enlightened citizens have become Members. Our Members for the House of Assembly have set an example which will not be lost. Both Churchmen and Dissenters of different denominations are warm friends to the Institution, and the greatest harmony prevails in our councils, the day is hastening on when Religious Bigotry will be interred and have no resurrection.

John Allison, Esq. one of our most active Members, has since our last meeting been overshadowed with that night in which no man can work, but in death he bequeathed a spirit of kindness for the Institution, which still animates survivors and will outlive his tomb. The Society has still some real friends who are to proceed with unconquerable perseverance. It is honourable to the Society that scarcely any have withdrawn for the last year. Benevolent Institutions of all descriptions are chiefly supported by the most sober, and industrious and prosperous part of the community. The careless and the indolent and the indifferent, have nothing to give and they are generally haunted by poverty. It is the best part of our citizens, that put their hands to humane and merciful Institutions.—“The liberal mardeviseth liberal things.”

The selfish man has few joys.—There is no glory comparable to that of doing good to our fellow men; and of all the various kinds of good we can do each other, none is comparable to that which has respect to the spiritual good of mankind. This is to them good as to the present life, by securing to them eternal good in the life to come. Such are the high and holy aims of Bible Societies in every part of the world. In common with the rest of our countrymen, we rejoice that this great cause is rising to prosperity and importance. From us to the East to the West to the North or the South the cause is

vancing. We see the crescent, and the sword of this world; and the Holy Ghost.

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vancing. We see the Bible overthrowing the altars of paganism, subduing the crescent, and establishing throughout the Earth that kingdom which is not of this world; and the blessed fruits of which are righteousness and joy in the Holy Ghost.

Is there a British Christian who will not admit the affecting claims of the Bible Society and give it his generous support?

Is there a British Protestant who contemplating the proceedings of the Bible Society, as unconnected with partiality to the Religious opinions of any denomination of Christians, as founded on the rights and privileges of the British Constitution, and sanctioned by the authority of Scripture, that will not come forward and cheerfully maintain the cause?

Is there a Christian Minister whose cultivated mind and eminent station, enable him to take an enlarged view of the objects and efforts of this Society, and does not feel that it commends itself to his patronage and influence by every consideration, and is peculiarly impressive upon him as one who by his divine master is set for the defence of the Gospel?

Is there a number of Christians of any denomination, who are unimpaired of the moral darkness which covers the greater part of the earth, and will not use the means to deliver mankind from that darkness? We ought to reckon it an honour, that we are called upon in any way to promote the divine light in the world. We shall doubtless consider it an honour, when we shall see all nations assembled before the judgment seat of Jesus.

We are taught to expect a sublime state of moral felicity before the end of the world. This moral change is to be accompanied by the operation of christian principles, when the scriptures shall be widely diffused and effectually recommended to the understanding and consciences of men. The evils of our world shall cease; and whatever things are desirable and excellent shall revive and flourish. The unholy and destructive spirit of war shall give place to the heavenly spirit and fruit of peace — "Then swords shall be beat into plough shares."

Peace Societies have already been formed in London, Glasgow, and in many parts of America. Their aim is to maintain and promote the peace of nations, and to awake every Christian feeling against the aims and miseries of war. Should they be generally extended, they will be as guardian angels to all other institutions, and have a favourable influence upon the future destiny of the world. Unhallowed religious wars shall cease, keen contentions about opinions and forms with respect to religion, will give place to contention of a far different character. Bigotry and superstition, intemperate zeal and persecution, will be happily suppressed by that wisdom which is from above, and pure, then peaceable, gentle and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits. Jews and Samaritans will maintain friendly intercourse, middle walls of partition, between different denominations of Christians will be broken down; and the multiplicity of appellations among the professed adherents of the holy religion, shall be swallowed up in the most honourable and characteristic name of Christians. Idolatry and infidelity shall be exterminated, and the one true God through the one Mediator, shall be universally worshipped. Thus regenerated shall be our depraved and wretched world, when the scriptures shall be duly regarded and universally diffused, the paradisaical state shall be restored; the tabernacle of God shall be with men, and he shall dwell among them, and be their God and they shall be his people.

REPORT OF THE CUMBERLAND BIBLE SOCIETY, Jan. 2d 1822.

Since the last annual meeting, your Secretary, the Revd. John Liddell has been in the country and gone to Europe. In the month of August last (previous

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to his leaving the Province) your Committee met, and having received Mr. Liddell's resignation with his accounts and papers; they appointed GARIBOLD LEWIS, Esquire, to the office of Secretary to the Society. Mr. Liddell's accounts as then stated, were examined; from which it appeared that he had received the sum of £22. 17 6, and had remitted to the Treasurer of the Nova-Scotia Bible Society £22, leaving a balance of 17s. 6d. Your depository has lately received an addition to the stock of books on hand the last year, with a supply of the Seventeenth Reports of the British and Foreign Bible Society; and also a number of the Sixth Reports of the Nova Scotia Bible Society, and these reports are now ready for distribution. It appears by the accounts as stated by your depository, that books have been disposed of by sale and otherwise to the amount of £8 13 10, which after deducting those given gratuitously, leaves a balance in his hands of £6 9 4; and it further appears by his account, that including the books lately received he has now on hand in your depository, 87 Bibles and 77 Testaments. Your Committee cannot refrain at this anniversary of your Society, from calling upon its friends and members for their continued support and exertion in so good a cause. Altho' they are sensible of the pressure of the times, and of the great scarcity of money, yet they trust that each member and friend to this institution, will according to his ability contribute his mite to help forward a cause, which the good and the great, the rich and the poor, of all sects and parties in religion are helping forward. By the last report received from the parent Society, it appears that their exertions are redoubled; and that in nearly every quarter of the habitable globe, the scriptures of divine truth are disseminated.

REV. DEAR SIR,

Your favour of the 1st January did not come to hand till last week; I was sorry that I had not received it before the departure of Mr. Dickson, our Treasurer. From him and Mr. Miller I hope you will receive a complete answer to your request. The Bible Society of Truro was the first that was formed in the Province. It embraced at that time within its limits, the Districts of Colchester and Pictou, and a part of the County of Hants. A Society however, was formed in Pictou within a short time; Londonderry and Onslow also withdrew and formed Societies for themselves; Stewiacke likewise became a distinct branch, but still in connection with us. Our boundaries are now greatly circumscribed, our members being confined to our own township. The cause of the Bible has many friends in this place, but such is the pressure of the times and the scarcity of money, that the liberal heart cannot carry

liberal devices into effect. I do not think that you have any conception of the difficulty we have in procuring a single dollar. On this account a motion was made at our last meeting and carried into effect, to have Boxes put up at the doors of the Meeting House, with the words *Bible Society* incised, and a hole in the lid; that those who were unable to subscribe might have an opportunity of contributing their mite towards the support of the noble cause. Every Sabbath we collect more or less in this manner, and by the time the year comes round the amount will be considerable. This scheme I would recommend to the imitation of others. Being unable to do much in this glorious work, we had no inclination to obtrude ourselves on the public, and till you solicited it we did not send a list of our subscribers, but only the amount collected; and this will account for the omission of a collection from Onslow, referred to in a letter published in your last report. Onslow then belonged to our society, and although we did not mention what part of the funds was raised by them, neither did we say what part of them was collected in Truro. The aggregate only was forwarded. The object of the British and Foreign Bible Society, is grand and interesting, its labours abundant, and its success beyond all calculation. It has made discoveries which are both painful and delightful. It has formed a common centre for Christians of every name. There they can meet without suspicion, they deliberate without contention, they co operate without envy. Here the Prince of Princes has erected his standard, and from hence he sends forth his messengers of peace to the surrounding nations. Hail blessed aera! It is the commencement of a period which will have a glorious issue. The kingdoms of the world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of his Christ. The friends of the Bible are accelerating the event, and when it is fully accomplished, none of them whether on earth or in heaven, will regret any exertions they made to bring it forward. Blessed be the Lord God of peace and let the whole earth be filled with his glory, Amen.
