



PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

In the absence of Mayor Shaw, Rev. Canon Cayley presided at the 48th Annual Meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home, held on Tuesday afternoon, the 6th of June.

The Secretary presented her report, showing that during the year 7.3 children were admitted to the Home, 30 girls, and 4.3 boys; 89 children left during the year, 39 of whom were girls and 50 boys; 60 of these children were taken by parents. There was an average attendance of 189.

Dr. Thomas spoke very highly of the work being done by the institution. The doctor stated that boys brought up in the Home turn out better men, in the long run, than boys who have their parents to look after them, for most of the latter have things too much their own way.

The Treasurer's Report showed that there is a substantial balance on hand. The milk and bread bills are large, while the bill for medicine is very small.

Dr. Sheard commented up in the Medical Report, which stated that not one case of diphtheria or scariet fever had been reported during the past year.

The retiring officers are:—Managers, Mrs. Andrew McKean and Mrs. Sterling; Medical staff, Dr. Graef; committee of Council, Major Bennett. Those appointed to fill their places are:—Managers, Mrs. Lister, Mrs. Allen Baines; Medical Staff, Dr. McConnell. A hearty vote of thanks was extended to the retiring officers.

Among a large number of friends and donors present, were Mrs. Cawthra and Mrs. Ridout, the latter of whom is now senior of the life members.

THE FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

The Lady Managers of the Protestant Orphans' Home, in presenting their Forty-eighth Annual Report to their friends and the public, desire in the first place to acknowledge with grateful hearts, the mercies and blessings vouchsafed to them by Almighty

God during the past year.

Foremost among these they would place the great blessing of good health, which has been almost the rule among the children under the care of the institution. In so large a family of little people between the ages of three and twelve, entire immunity from infectious or epidemic disease is remarkable, and witnesses to the blessing that attends a careful observance of sanitary laws, which are the laws of Him in whom "we live, and move, and have our being."

During the past twelve months 73 children have been admitted to the Home, 30 girls and 43 boys; of these 62 are natives of

Canada, 4 of Great Britain, and 7 of the United States.

By religious denomination—35 are Church of England, 18 Presbyterian, 17 Methodist, 1 Baptist, 1 Congregational, and 1 Lutheran.

89 Children left the Home, 39 girls and 50 boys; of these 8 girls and 10 boys were apprenticed; 60 children were taken by parents or relatives; two boys were adopted; one boy ran away the day after he was admitted; and two children died, a little girl from bronchitis, and a boy from meningitis. These two children had each been but a few weeks in the Home. Six children were transferred to other Institutions.

The average number of children in the Home each month has

been 189, and the average number of inmates, 202.

The Lady Managers, who week by week throughout the year take turns in visiting and inspecting the Home, are often struck by the good behaviour of the children. The sound of a crying child is rarely heard; but singing and laughter, and the voices of children at play, are the usual sounds that greet their ears when they enter the doors; just such a cheerful noise as should be heard in any happy home. At the same time the order and discipline necessary to the well-being of a large Institution, are also successfully maintained. The following unsolicited testimony from the teachers of the Orphans' Home School, was very gratifying to the Lady Managers:—

In a note dated October 24th, 1898, addressed to the Board of Managers, the Secretary of the Orphans' Home School Teachers' Association, says "It was agreed to send to your Board an expression of satisfaction with the general tidiness of the children's clothing and-persons, also the regularity of their attendance at school this Session."

Of the children who are still wards of the Home, but who are apprenticed to employers in various parts of the Province, the accounts are usually very satisfactory. It is with sincere pleasure that the Managers receive such testimony as the following:—

"You asked if M. was well, and doing well. He is both, I don't think you would know him; he is a great big fellow, getting almost 100 lbs.; and very reliable." and this from the employer of one of our girls who has just completed her term of apprenticeship, is good to hear: "E. has been a good girl; I could not speak too highly of her, she is worthy of it all. The children are fond of her like their own; I took good care of her as my own child. She was kind to me. She will stay another year with me."

It occasionally happens also that people whose homes have not been blessed by the presence of a little child, come to the Orphans' Home in search of one to supply the want that they feel in their lives. From one who some years ago thus took a little girl to adopt as her own child, the following account has been received:

"I am pleased to report that she has proven in every respect perfectly satisfactory. We are all delighted with our dear little

girl; she has grown to be a lovely child."

Gratitude has been unkindly described as "a lively sense of favours to come" So the Lady Managers, while gratefully acknowledging the various benefits and kindnesses received from many good friends of the Home, confidently hope for a continuance of the same.

The Treasurer's report will be found to contain an account of bequests to the Institution, and of donations received from time to time from Societies and individuals. Many gifts in kind have been sent to the Home, and treats provided for the children, both at Christmas and at other times during the year. Special mention may be made of Mrs. Carlyle's annual treat of ice cream, in July; and of an invitation, in the same month, from Mr. D. Lorsch to the older children, to spend a morning in riding his bicycles, which gave great pleasure. Mrs. Heintzman gave the children a strawberry treat, in June; and Mrs. Revell provided a very interesting entertainment, consisting of songs and readings, with lime light pictures, in February.

There was the usual free admission for the older children, to the Fair, in September: and an invitation was received from the Minister of Education, in February, for them to visit the Museum recently opened in that Department. All these pleasures were greatly enjoyed by the recipients. And by the kindness of Mr. Gunn, Superintendent of the Toronto Railway, the use of a car has

been granted to the Home when needed.

In enumerating gifts received from our kind friends, the neighbouring tradesmen, and the butchers of the St. Lawrence market must not be forgotten. The mute appeal of the "Orphans' Home" market cart, drawn by two small boys, is never disregarded, and week by week throughout the year it makes its regular journeys,

never returning empty.

Special thanks are due from the Managers to some kind friends who give the most costly of all gifts, their time, their energies, and their powers for the good of the children. Mr. Edwards, the Organist and Choirmaster of St. Jude's Church, has devoted two evenings a week during the whole winter, to the task of training a class of the elder boys to sing in his choir—with marked success. He has moreover shown the boys much individual kindness, and has led them to look upon him as a friend. Now that most of his pupils have left the Home, he is, with unwearied zeal, beginning again with a new set of boys. The Rev. H. R. Quinn also has taken a warm interest in these lads, and has prepared some of them for Confirmation.

Mr. Murray, the Solicitor to the Home, is a tried friend to whom the Managers can always turn with confidence in his ability

and good-will.

The Medical Staff have been, as ever, most kind and attentive, responding promptly to every call upon their time and skill. In conformity with the regulations of the Public School Board, all the unvaccinated children are being vaccinated in little companies of eight or ten at a time. The conduct of the school remains in the capable hands of Miss Armstrong and her assistants.

In the recent death of Major Bennett, the Managers feel that the Home has lost a true and tried friend, who devoted himself for many years to the interests of the Orphan children. They much regret that through an omission, none of the boys followed his remains to the grave. There was also a slight misunderstanding,

as he died at Midland and not in the city.

Finally the Lady Managers desire to express their hearty appreciation of the valuable services of the Matron, Miss Deacon, and of her staff, in whose kindnesss and faithfulness in the care and oversight of the Home and its inmates, they feel entire confidence.
