It is estimated that 52 per cent of the crops and 20 per cent of the animal products will remain on The cash income of the farmers is therefore e mated at \$5,847,000,000.

There are 6,600,000 farmers in the U.S. The cash income of the farmer, on the average, is therefore \$886 per year.

#### Seventy-Five Workers Drowned

Angelo Pugliese recently applied for aid at the immigration offices, Winnipeg. He was suffering from injuries received in a wreck on the Fraser River, B.C.

giving the widows a small pension and allowing them to get some provisions at the company stores. When the strike was called, however, widows whose sympathies lay with the strikers were immediately thrown from with their children.

"The life of the drillmen is terrible. work on shifts of ten to twelve hours per day and are so isolated from their fellow men that in case of accident they are not found until the next shift comes on to relieve them. Accidents to these machines are not uncom mon, and very often the drillman is killed. The pay averages about \$2.40 per day.

"A system of employment which is discusting is in vogue there. When a miner a job he goes to a woman to whom he pays a fee ranging from \$50 to \$100. The woman gives him a ribbon, which he wears in his buttonhole, and the foreman, knowing the ribbon, gives him a job.



We, the Social-Democratic Party of Canada in convention assembled, affirm our allegiance to and support of, the International Socialist Movement.

By, virtue of the ownership of the means of production and distribution (natural resources, factories, mills, railroads, etc.) all wealth the workers produce, accrues into the hands of the capitalist class. This property the capitalist defends by means of the state (the army, the navy, the judiciary.)

The object of the Social-Democratic Party is to educate the workers of Canada to a consciousness of their class position in society, their economic servitude to the owners of capital, and to organize them into a political party to seize the reins of government nd transform all capitalist property into the collective property of the working class. This social transformation means the liberation not only of the proletariat, but of the whole human race. Only the working class, however, can bring it about. All other classes maintain their existence by supporting the present social order.

The struggle of the working class against Capitalist exploita tion produces a constant state of warfare between these two forces for the control of political and economic power.

As a means of preparing the minds of the working class for the inauguration of the Co-operative Commonwealth, the Social-Democratic Party of Canada will support any measure that will tend to better conditions under capitalism, such as:

(1) Reduction of hours of labor. (2) The elimination of child labor.

(3) Universal adult suffrage without distinction of sex or regard to property qualifications; and

(4) The Initiative, Referendum, and right of Recall
