### UNCLAIMED MILLIONS.

Fortunes Dormant in Britain's Banks Which Depositors Have Forgotten.

Twenty million dollars lie unclaimed in the banks of Great Britain. This statement is made on the basis of the amount of unclaimed money in the coffers of the Bank of England alone. That institution a few years ago had more than 11,000 dormant accounts, 47 of which contained \$50,000 apiece, while one was written in six figures.

The banks, of course, are glad to be the depositories of the money, since they claim ownership after seven years. It is incomprehensible to some how to get a number of accounts allowed to become dormant by their rightful owners. There are several explanations. A man in business may, for some private reason open an account in another bank. He dies; his executors know nothing about the extra account; he has left no memorandum of it and it goes unclaimed. A depositor may die abroad or disappear, leaving no clue as to his whereabouts. A man may even forget that he ever had such an account. Incomprehensible as this may seem, it has frequently occurred.
