Miramichi's Fine Salmon Hatchery

News Man Has Interesting Visit to the
Hatchery on the North West
Miramichi.

A short time ago the News man had the pleasure of visiting the Salmon Hatchery on the North West Miramichi.

When we called Mr. William Sheasgreen, the genial assistant, was busy looking after his "small charges of large numbers" of salmon. The youngsters at that time were only twenty-four hours old and were there by the thousand.

The new hatchery was erected in 1907, is a fine building, 36x90 and is near the site of the old one, which was built in the late Hon. Peter Mitchell's time, and was erected in 1868, it being the first salmon hatchery to be built in the Maritime Provinces.

Mr. Isaac Sheasgreen, the head superintendent, was appointed upon the completion of the first building and has been in charge ever since. This speaks volu-

mes for this gentleman's care as well as his knowledge of the interesting work he is engaged in. He is ably assisted by his son, Mr. William S. Sheasgreen, he having charge of the inside work.

A weekly report of the work must be sent to headquarters at Ottawa.

The building and grounds are kept very clean and it is not only a pleasure but an interesting and profitable sight to watch the caretakers while they are at their work.

The building contains forty-eight troughs, each one having over thirty-five young salmon in it. They are supplied with water from a dam at the rear of the hatchery and comes from a never failing stream.

The parent fish are kept in a retaining pond near the hatchery. The eggs are

taken from them early in the month of September. The salmon for this purpose are caught in nets in the main Northwest Miramichi.

Last year 1574 parent fish six million and fifty thousand oval was taken and supplied to the the different hatcheries in other parts of Canada and waters of New Brunswick. When the eggs are gathered they are placed on trays and put in the troughs in the hatchery for that purpose. The natural temperature of the water hatches the fish and the water must be watched with the greatest of care. The eggs are about the size of a pea, and requires about six months to hatch.

The young salmon at first is about $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch in length with oil sack attached from which the young fish gets its supply of food for the first four weeks, after which they are fed with liver and other suitable food.

A Charlottetown paper says:

"Frank Hale, of the Hatchery at Southport, returned to the city on the eastern train yesterday afternoon from Morrell where he had been putting out Salmon fry in the Morrell River. Mr. Hale deposited three loads of fry in the Morrell River, there being about forty to fifty thousand fry to a load. The fry was secured by the fisheries department through Mr. Holyrod from Miramichi, N. B. and there have been ten loads deposited in P. E. I. inland waters this season. Four were placed in the Baker River, two in North River, one in Winter River, and three in the Morrell River. Eight more loads will be distributed; mainly through the western part of the province and some in rivers in Coleman and Free-town."

The people of New Brunswick should take more interest in the home of the young salmon. It is certainly worthy of a visit.
