





HISTORIC DAYS IN CANADA

DIARY OF EVENTS

HISTORIC DAYS IN CANADA The first state visit of royalty to the Dominion of Canada began twelve pars ago today, when old quobee gave a glerious welcome to the Duke and Duchess of York and Cornwall. The streets of the ancient capital were easy with flass and the houses blazon-ed with banners bearing the French greeting, "bienvenue." The guns of four warships in the river boomed out a royal salute, and when the future ruler of the Empire set foot on Cana-dian soil he faced a vast assemblase, including the Governor-General, the Fremier, nearly all the cabinet mem-bers, and most of the leading men of the Dominon. There was a royal re-ham Out of respect to the memory of President McKinley, of the United States, the social receptions in Quebec and Montreal were cancelled. Que-bec's welcome was duplicated in To-rooto, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Caigary, Yan-couver, Victoria, St. John and Hall-from Hallfax on October 21st it was with the remembrance of an Imperial tour without precedent in history. September 16 is the birthday of An-

tour without precedent in interse-September 16 is the birthday of An-drew Bonar Law, British statesman, in New Brunswick, 1858; Lewellys Franklin Barker, famous physician, at Norwich, Ont., 1867, On this date the first organized ministry of the Pro-vince of Manitoba was constituted with Hon. M. A. Girard as premier, 1870; and Mar. Pleasis issued his famous "Mandement," urging French-Canadi-an loyalty to Great Britain, in 1807.

the country. Continuing, the Mail and Empire says: "According to the law she is a criminal, and at the present time has an unexpired sentence hang-ing over her. Her criminality, moreover, is of the most danger-ous kind, in that she shows no re-spect for laws or established gov-ernment. Mrs. Paukhurst is, in fact, an Anarchist, and as such ought to be unwelcome in any civilized country. She is coming to the United States and Canada, not for the purpose of advancing the suffrage cause in these coun-tries, but to collect funds for the renewal of her lawless campaign in England. On this account she has no right to expect any special consideration from Canadian and American women engaged in edu-cating the public to grant them the franchise. She has been the greatest enemy the cause of wo-man suffrage has ever had, or is ever likely to have, and it would be fatal to that cause if the public were given reason to believe that there is any identity of interest between the Bediam Suffragettes in the Old Country and the wo-men in the origin for the sat-frage. If the United States Fed-eral authorities should decline to permit Mrs. Pankhurst to enter, there would be no protest from Great Britain. Canada does not want ber any more than it wanted Harry Thaw."
