times we have been somewhat actively opposed on the occasion of election contests, it has always been a pleasure to have such an opponent, because, while W. H. Thorne was directing or advising the forces of the game would be played with good spirit, according to the rules, and that, no matter how fast the fighting might be, it would be good, clean fighting, and there would be no stinging after the battle. Gentlemen, we have our politics in the place of the wars and civil wars they had in former days, and it is men like Mr. Thorne who help to make these political contests real tests of political sentiment, and to remove from them the worst features of party warfare.

"You will agree with me, I know, in saying that the government of this country is wise in recognizing the ability, judgment and high standing of our new Senator. There could be no occasion, no crisis in our national affairs, in which the counsel of our guest would not be of the highest value.

"And he goes to the Senate while he is still in the prime of life. He has been fortunate and successful in his private affairs. His ships are all safely in harbor. He is now in the pleasant afternoon of his existence, and one and all of his friends here, and his thousands of friends all over the Dominion, will very earnestly wish or him a long and happy period of usefulness in the Senate of the Dominion of Canada.

"Gentlemen, I will ask you to rise and drink with me (and let there be no hesitations) to the health of our distinguished guest of honor, William Henry Thorne."

The toast to Senator Thorne was drunk with enthusiasm, and the guests, after singing "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," gave three cheers and a tiger.

Senator Thorne's Reply.

Senator Thorne, on rising, was given a hearty reception, and it was some time before he was given the chance to be heard. When he was given a hearing, Senator Thorne said he did not know when he had been more embarrassed than at the present moment, not only because he was not a maker of speeches, but because he had to speak of his own appointment to the Senate, and of himself personally.

"I have," he said, "to thank my friends for making me this magnificent banquet as a token of your approval of my appointment to the Senate. I am gratified to think my appointment has been received with universal approval among my personal and political friends.

It is also most gratifying to know that my appointment has been favorably received by those who are not my political friends.

"When I was in the west I received many congratulatory telegrams on my appointment. These reached me when I have been the recipient of many congratulatory letters from friends in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Montreal.

"I cannot help," said Senator Thorne, "in these circumstances to feel a certain pride in the position I occupy, in the many kind things that have been said of me and my 'Friendships are of slow growth. As one grows older he appreciates friendship more than in his younger days."

Continuing Senator Thorne said that he was pleased to see in the gathering Mr. James Manchester, and Mr. Adams, a son of a friend of his youth, and gratified to have an exhibition of friendship that was independent of political considerations.

"To my left," said the Senator, "is a staunch political opponent, the competition in business has been keen between us, but we have been personal friends.

We have never seen eye to eye on political questions, but there is evidence that my friend is prepared to recognize the greatness and goodness of the present government.

"In regard to my appointment to the first news I received of it was in Vancouver or Victoria. Mr. Hazen had intimated that the position was independent of the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Ellis.

Succeeds Worthy Man.

"It is a matter of pride to me that I have succeeded a man like Senator Ellis, a man in a high and independent position in political and social life, and who in St. John filled a position second to none.

The Senator said that while in Victoria he had received many congratulatory messages on his appointment, none gave him greater pleasure than that received from E. L. Wainman, ex-Chief Justice of Saskatchewan.

Had Doubts About It.

"With regard to the Senate I had for a short time some doubts as to whether I should accept the position," said Senator Thorne. "Of late I have heard the Senate severely criticized and even abused. But I am glad to see that my friend Mr. McAvity approves of my appointment, and I can assure him that I accept my appointment as one of the first steps toward the reform of the Senate.

Continuing, Senator Thorne spoke of his recent trip through the West at the invitation of the Minister of Marine, and gave his impressions of the development of the country since his preceding visit. In the interior, Fort William and Port Arthur had grown rapidly; their elevator capacity being increased from a few million to 50,000,000 bushels. The growth of Winnipeg, Calgary and other cities in the West had been astounding and marvelous.

Everybody was optimistic and enthusiastic in the West, and it was amazing how easy it was to catch the western fever.

The speaker then referred to his trip up the coast to the Yukon district, and gave an interesting picture of the developments, and possibilities of the Northwest generally.

Referring to the prairie section and his trip over the Grand Trunk Pacific from Edmonton to Winnipeg he said he was astonished to see vast grain fields stretching along nearly the

whole line. The increase in population, the development of agriculture, the mines and fisheries had been great the last ten years, but it would be greater in the next ten years.

Has Faith in East.

In the East progress might not be so rapid as in the West, but taken together the possibilities of the country were impressive, and nobody had greater faith in the East than himself.

The development of the country would bring great responsibilities, but he hoped that his efforts in discharging the duties devolving upon him would redound to the credit of the city where he had spent his life.

In conclusion, Senator Thorne expressed his appreciation of the tribute paid him by his friends.

As he sat down the gathering rose and sang, "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

An Old Friend's Tribute.

W. H. Barnaby, who spoke next, said he wanted, as one of the oldest friends of Senator Thorne present to say a few words. He referred to the fact that he had been connected in business with Mr. Thorne over 50 years ago, and had been associated with him in many ways since. He had always found Mr. Thorne a man of sound judgment, and he felt every body, irrespective of politics, was glad of his appointment. Mr. Thorne was sometimes slow to express an opinion, but when he did his opinion was always worth considering.

A. C. Skelton then sang "On the Road to Mandalay," with D. Arnold Fox accompanying.

The City of St. John.

His Honor, Judge McLeod, proposed the City of St. John, and spoke of the high spirit with which the city had faced misfortune. Today the city was having an era of progress, due he thought, to the fine class of business men here. He felt St. John would succeed. Mr. Thorne had told them of the growth of the West. But the East and West should grow together, and in time there would be business enough for both the ports of St. John and Halifax.

Mayor Frink's Reply.

Mayor Frink, in responding, took occasion to pay an interesting tribute to Senator Thorne, remarking that he remembered how Mr. Thorne after the great fire had started in a small shack on Market Square and how by industry and enterprise he had built up a great business that stood as a monument to integrity and honorable dealing.

With regard to the city of St. John his Worship spoke appreciatively of the way the present government had come to the assistance of the city, and declared that in the days to come they should settle their differences amicably, when matters concerning the interest of the port came to the fore, and that all should work for the city.

In conclusion he expressed the belief that Senator Thorne would well and efficiently represent St. John at the national capital.

The Board of Trade.

J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., proposed the toast to the Board of Trade, giving an eloquent description of the importance of trade to a community, stating that all the roads of traffic were leading to St. John, and pointing out that no man was better qualified to represent the trading interests of the city than the guest of the evening.

J. M. Robinson, president of the Board of Trade, in responding expressed his pleasure in being able to pay his tribute to the guest of the evening, a man who had done much to build up the permanent prosperity of the city of St. John.

"The Board of Trade," he said might not be making much noise, but it is trying to promote the interests of St. John. At present they were in correspondence with a man who wanted to establish a sulphite pulp mill, another man who wanted to start an oil refinery, a man who wanted to build an umbrella factory, another who wanted to start a furniture factory. Adam Shortt had said politicians were derived from the devil. He could only testify that politics played the devil in the Board of Trade, but he hoped citizens would, before long, place the interests of the city before party considerations.

Mr. Emil then sang a number of songs, which were received with enthusiasm.

H. A. Powell, who spoke next, said he had heard congratulations extended to the new senator, but that he felt the city and the country and the senate should be congratulated on the appointment of Mr. Thorne.

The chairman then proposed that the proceedings be closed by singing "God Save the King," and this was done with enthusiasm.

PRIEST CHARGED WITH MURDER NOW BELIEVED TO BE INSANE

schmide," were the only reasons he gave for his deed and added: "God in His own time will clear it up and God and Abraham know why I killed her."

Alphonse Koleble, Schmidt's attorney, indicated today that insanity would be his defense at the preliminary trial. On the other hand, however, the district attorney's assistants are preparing for a quick trial of Schmidt.

They declared, however, that previous to his arrest his acquaintances had never observed such mental deficiencies in him.

New York, Sept. 15.—Announcement was made late tonight by Police Inspector Faurot that another man was under arrest here in connection with the murder of Anna A. Amuller, the crime with which Hans Schmidt, the priest is charged. Faurot, shortly after midnight, left police headquarters for a sub-station where, he said the man was held. He declared the new developments would prove fully satisfactory to the district attorney.

Inspector Faurot, as he left headquarters with detectives O'Neill and Connor, they were met by a man in Upper Manhattan, where they had under arrest in his own home a prominent physician.

Aachenburg, Germany, Sept. 15.—That Hans Schmidt, the priest who has confessed the murder of Anna Amuller in New York, intended to return to his home in Bavaria early date is indicated in a postcard which his parents received from him today or two ago.

In conclusion he expressed the belief that he would see them and Aachenburg soon again.

Both of Schmidt's parents and other relatives living here consider him abnormal morally and declare that there were numerous cases of insanity in the family. According to the records he was born in 1881 and was ordained in 1904. He showed no signs of abnormality so far as can be learned, before his twelfth year, and then his character appeared to undergo a strange transformation. He became unsocial and was unable to agree with his superiors.

He received a number of curacies during the three years following 1904, but remained only a few months in each place.

Schmidt, it is stated, took holy orders against his own wishes and only to satisfy the desires of his mother.

New York, Sept. 15.—Mayor LaGuardia late tonight arrested Dr. E. Mauret, a dentist of No. 301 St. Nicholas avenue, near St. Joseph's church, who was charged with the murder of Dr. Mauret is about 30 years old.

THE JUVENILE COURTS NOW A NECESSITY

Conference of Canadian Charities and Corrections in Annual Session in Winnipeg—System Doing Good.

Winnipeg, Sept. 15.—The Conference of Canadian Charities and Corrections opened its business sessions this morning, with a large attendance of delegates from all parts of Canada and the United States.

An able paper on the juvenile courts system was given by R. B. Chadwick, superintendent of neglected children for Alberta. He made the striking statement that forty-five per cent of the criminals of the continent were under 18 years of age, and advocated the probation system of dealing with juvenile offenders.

This system had been used in Alberta since 1907, and over 6,000 children had been dealt with under its provisions.

Owen R. Lovejoy, secretary of the Child Labor Commission of the United States, in the discussion that street traders were supposed to be supporting widowed mothers and to be on the way to the White House, but the truth was that most of them were learning gambling, cigarette smoking, the drug habit and all kinds of other vices.

He declared that boys were often made links between the densities of gambling dens, houses of prostitution and the low class of the farm, and thus the boys became familiarized with the worst forms of vice.

MAKING PROGRESS ON SYDNEY MURDER CASE

Dr. Lynch Returns from St. Stephen Where He Held Autopsies on Body of Supposed Victim.

Sydney, Sept. 15.—Dr. Lynch, the physician sent on from Sydney to attend the autopsy held on the body of the late Mr. Atkinson at St. Stephen, N. B., returned to the city yesterday morning, and has submitted his report to the crown prosecutor.

The stater gentleman when seen by your correspondent this morning refused to divulge the text of the report, but stated that the body was there and an autopsy had been held.

There have been no new developments in the case since the hearing Saturday. Calvin Steeves, charged with the murder of Atkinson, was held in custody and will have a completed case for the Friday sitting of the preliminary trial.

It is not known whether the defence will call any witnesses at this hearing.

JAPAN INCREASES NAVY OF THE CHINESE COAST.

Tokio, Sept. 15.—The Japanese government today despatched two cruisers and several torpedo boat destroyers to the Chinese coast. Japan's demands in connection with the killing of several Japanese subjects during the recent fighting at Nanking, have been agreed to in principle by China, but pending their actual settlement and the re-establishment of order the Japanese government feels that the presence of increased naval forces in Chinese waters is justified.

Returning Tourists.

The United States tourists and others who have been spending their vacations in different parts of the provinces are flocking back to their homes in the States and every train from the East brings hundreds of them from Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton. The travel on the Eastern Line steamers for Boston is very heavy.

THOUSANDS AT OPENING BIG FREDERICTON FAIR

He congratulated the people of Fredericton on the success of their exhibition in the past and the management upon what looks to be the banner show of them all for this year. At the same time he spoke of the progress being made in New Brunswick along agricultural lines, declaring that the farmer had the most pleasant and at the same time the most remunerative of all. After Vice-president Bibler had expressed the appreciation of the exhibition directorate of the aid which had always been so generously given from both the provincial and federal treasuries to the Fredericton exhibition, City Clerk McCready in the absence of Mayor Hooper, welcomed the visitors to Fredericton which he declared was fast becoming the railway hub of New Brunswick.

That closed the speech making and Lieut. Governor Wood later made a tour of the buildings and grounds and will remain in the city tomorrow to inspect the live stock and other department.

Dr. Landry, Minister of Agriculture, arrived from his home at Buctouche this evening, but top late to be present at the formal opening ceremonies. He will remain until Thursday evening and was at the fair grounds this evening, much pleased with what he saw of the show.

Both the provincial and Dominion departments of agriculture have booths at the fair for the encouragement of the different departments of their work. In addition to the headquarters established for the Women's Institute work, the provincial department has a fine display in the horticultural department in the main building, while in the dairy department at which the latest and best methods for handling milk and cream on the farm will be demonstrated and the live stock branch had a tent for demonstration in the sheep extension work.

The number of live stock on exhibition is larger than ever before, the entries in the various branches being as follows: horses, 142; ponies, 75; sheep, 310; cattle, 315; poultry, 1,500. The poultry display is declared to be the largest in the history of the fair, and the number of sheep above figures not including the pet stock.

The outside free exhibitions are on the grounds and the cycle Desmond's proving great attractions while the number of concessions is almost double those at any previous exhibition here, there being more than twice as many fairs than in former years. The preliminary parades of live stock took place this afternoon in the show ring and the whole show was running in full blast for the opening day.

MAINE NOTES OF WORLD

HOW'S THIS FOR A HALIBUT? What is said to be the largest halibut on record was recently caught in the Pacific and landed at Seattle. The huge fish, which tips the scales at 408 pounds, was caught a few weeks ago off Cape Nome, Alaska, by Henry Fowler and William Kelley of the crew of the schooner Idaho. It required a struggle of an hour which nearly swamped the dory, to land this halibut. The dimensions are as follows: length, 7 feet 4 inches, width, 3 feet 9 inches, thickness, 10 inches. The fish was sold, together with the rest of the Idaho's cargo, at that port to the Chloepke Fish Company.

SABLE ISLAND OCEAN GRAVEYARD

The Most Feared Land in Atlantic Barren Spits of Land, Inhabited by Light-house Keepers and Life-boatmen.

The graveyard of the Atlantic! All have heard about it—that bank of treacherous sand that rises a few feet above the waves of the ocean, off to the east, though a trifle to south, about 200 miles from Halifax, whose history, from the first visit by white men, has been linked with shipwreck and disaster and death. It is Sable Island, upon whose desolate shores so many good men and true have laid their bones.

Before looking backwards let us glance at Sable Island of today. Then we will review one of the most remarkable stories of marooning ever enacted in any part of this continent.

Fairbairn, of Toronto, in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Ganong and others, who had extended their hospitality, said that he was glad to notice the progress which was being made by the Maritime Provinces in manufacturing. In seconding the resolution A. R. Clarke, of Toronto, stated that New Brunswick manufacturers were men of the highest type and were certain to make their mark industrially.

After a dance in the hotel casino, the special train left St. Andrews for Truro where it will arrive at nine twenty a. m. Tuesday. From Truro the train will go to Kentville to give the manufacturers a glimpse of the Annapolis Valley during the fruit season. After making brief stops at Wolfville and Grande Pre, the train will reach Halifax at three-thirty p. m. on Tuesday. The convention will occupy three days and the manufacturers will leave Halifax on Sept. 19th.

After visiting New Glasgow and Amherst, the excursion will go to St. John. It will stay until 1 p. m., Sept. 20th, and then the party will proceed to Fredericton by steamship.

OPENING OF THE ALBERTA LEGISLATURE

Is Expected That Session will be of Shorter Duration than Usual — Few Bills Advertized.

Edmonton, Alb., Sept. 15.—The first session of the third Alberta Legislature opens Tuesday and it is expected that the session will be of shorter duration than usual. Only a small number of bills have been advertised and it is not expected much important public legislation will be enacted.

A libel law will probably be introduced, such a measure was suggested for last year, but was shelved owing to pressure of other business. Hon. A. G. MacKay will probably signal his entrance to the Alberta Legislature by moving a Woodmen's Lien Act to protect the wages of men making ties for the railroad building in the West. This will have the support of the government.

Although no indication has been given one way or another, new railway bonds are likely to be guaranteed at the present session. The organization of the company is complete and twenty-three elevators will be ready to handle this season's grain, according to announcements already made. The government has undertaken to loan 85 per cent. of the cost of erection of these elevators.

Suggestions that the government bonds of municipalities is unlikely to be carried out at the present session, though closer co-operation between municipalities and the Department of Municipal Affairs may be arranged. It is thought that with the passing of the present financial stringency municipalities will be content to finance themselves without the assistance of the credit of the province. Close supervision of the expenditure of rural municipalities is regarded as desirable and stricter modes of audit will be adopted.

Changes are expected in the election Ontario.

TRAVIS NOW FACES CHARGE OF BREAKING INTO ESTEY & CO'S

New Information Sworn Out Against Prisoner by Deputy Chief Jenkins and F. A. Estey—Much Evidence Taken—New Turn Creates Surprise.

John Travis, who was arrested by Police Constable O'Leary on Saturday night, 6th inst., on the charge of wandering about and not giving a satisfactory account of himself, was before the Magistrate yesterday afternoon and was represented by Daniel Mullin, K. C.

When Travis arrived in court a new information sworn out against him by Deputy Chief Jenkins and F. A. Estey, was read, charging him with having broken into Estey & Company's, Dock street, with intent to steal. The prisoner pleaded not guilty. It was further stated in the information that Travis stole some scrip money from the premises.

After being sworn Deputy Chief Jenkins testified that on the night of Sept. 6th there was a fire in the adjoining premises to Estey & Co. The prisoner was arrested that night. On examination of the Estey premises, witness found entrance was effected from the rear, off Nelson street. The witness found a lead pencil inside a window in the Estey premises a flat below the offices. The window could be reached from a pole, or a ladder. The glass was broken inwardly. The cross-bar was broken off, being driven in and was lying just inside the building.

This yellow-colored pencil found had marks like teeth marks. To Mr. Mullin witness said that on Saturday night, when he made an investigation there had been no fire on the premises, but there had been one in the Robertson, Foster building. There is no connection between the two premises. From examination it was shown that an entrance had been made through a rear window of the Robertson-Foster building in the same manner as in Estey's.

George A. Henderson, police clerk, gave evidence that on the 9th, in cross examination of Travis, the latter made a statement in court.

To Mr. Mullin Henderson said: "I am in liquor license ordinances, companies ordinance and in the game law, in the form of statute amendment, but they will not be of a very far reaching character. The exportation of live foxes from Alberta will be restricted."


CANADIAN OFFICER IS HIGHLY HONORED

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

PROBATE COURT.
Estate of Elizabeth McGoldrick.
Return of citation to prove the will in solemn form. Stephen Busby appears for the executor; Amos A. Wilson, K. C., for two of the beneficiaries; and John B. M. Baxter, K. C., for John McGoldrick, a brother of the testatrix. The will having been proved in ordinary form by the two witnesses thereto, Mr. Baxter, who appeared, contra, raised the question that the power to dispose of property by will is dependent entirely upon the Statute, and that the Statute of Wills, the earliest being that of Henry VIII, and later down to the present time, were enacted when typewriting was not known, such Statutes using the word "written," which must at that time have meant writing with the pen and ink, and claimed that as the will in question is written entirely in typewriting it is not executed in accordance with the statutory requirements. Mr. Wilson and Mr. Busby argued that the fact that since typewriting came into use that mode had been adopted for drawing wills would be recognized by the courts as an established custom. Mr. Baxter not being ready to call other witnesses the Court adjourns for one week, when decision will be given on the above question which has now, it is believed, been raised for the first time.
