## Sadia Qollege.

Acadia Colleor was founded in 1838. Its location at Wolfville, Nova Seotia, is central to the populations of the Maritime Provinces.

The Charter of the College providen that the Trustees and Governons, together with the Fellows, shall be a body politic and corporate, in deed and in name, and have successors forever as " The Trustees, Governors, and Fellows of Acadia College." It confers on the Corporation power to have and use a common scal, to appoint and remove Professors, to make by-lawn apd ordinances for the regulation and general. management of the College, and to acquire, hold and apply all forms of property for the use and benefit of the same.

The "Body of the College" provided by the Charter, is composed of the Faculty, Bix Fellows, and twelve Scholars, upon whom are conferred the powers of a University, and who are designated " The Senate of the University of Acadia" The chief functions of the Senate are those of discipline, the phescribing of comrses of study and cext-books, the care of the Library and Museum, and the conferring of the learned degrees, or any such other degrees of literary, scientific, or technical honours as they maydesire, and certificates of merit. At the instance of the Corporation, or otherwise, the Senate may recommend Professors to fill any chairs becoming vacant and Professors to fill hew chairs, and present to the Corporation any member of the Faculty guilty of misbehaviour or neglect of duty. The senate is given power also to do, perform and establish every other thing and matter of a literary and scholastic character pertaining. to the University.

The Governors are apppointed by the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, one third of them being nominated by the Corporation of the Associated Alumni.

While no religious tests or subscriptions are required, Acadia is designed to be a positively Christian College, not

Many now occupying important positions in Soclely have freely seknowledged that earnest Christian views were developed or deepened in them while pursuing thefr stadies here In vlew of the fact'that forms of phillosophy allen to the Christiany faith are finding their platform in many educational institutions, it is of increased importance that the higher education should be available under positively Christian influences.

The attities of the Arto Course are comprehensive and thorough ; and it is the purpose of the Corporation and the Senate to maintain the College in suek a state of efficleney that it shail be able to raset the wanta of all young men who desise to obtain a liberal educetion. Theoretically, it might seem that the advantages of large central Univeraitios, where stadents in groat numbers could mingle in the puruit of knowielge, would surpass those offered by amaller institations. But it is believed that experience has elearly shown that all the advantages offered to undergraduates by the former are overbalaneed by the personal knowledge and daily contact of teacher and stadent in the class work of the latter.

In conneetion with the College buildings there are forty acres of land mont favourably situated for the various purpones that will be developed in the growth of the inatitution. The now College erected since the fire of 1877, affords excellent facilities for the purposes of instruction. Is lecture rooms are commodius, well lighted, and easily ventilated, and its Assembly hall supplies spacious acoommodation for all public Academic excreises.

Acadia graduated its first elass in 1843. A four-yenrs' course has always been required for the degree of B. A. Besides the large number who have been admittied as general stadents, over iive hundred, including the present enrolment have entered upon the fall undergraduate course, of whom 284 have received the degree of Bachelor of Arta.

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## Tjonar Wourses.

The following Courses, which are arranged for the advantage of students who may be able to do more than the assignments of their classes, will be open to the election of any undergraduate, provided he has first-class standing in the prescribed Course. The value of the work performed in these studies will be determined by examinations, and Honor Certificates, of the first or second class, will be given, according to the results of these examinations. Students will not be allowed to continue Honor studies, unless firstclass standing is maintained in the prescribed Course: Any undergraduate, even though not having first-class standing, may, by vote of the Faculty, be permitted to give special attention to a particular study. Such student, and also one whose standing may have required his discontinuance of Honor studies, shall be entitled to a certificate of the work done, from the Professor of the department. See also "General Students."

## Gxaminations, and \$tanding.

At the end of each Session all the Classes will be examined on the studies of the Session. These examinations will be conducted for the most part by written papers; but oral examinations will be introduced at the discretion of the Faculty. The results of these examinations will be combined with the record of the daily exercises to determine the standing of the student. An average of seventy-five per cent. of the maxmium must be made to admit a student to first-class standing.

At the close of each Session the standing of each student will be reported to his parent or guardian, if desired.

## 

The degree of Bachelor of Arts is granted to students who satisfactorily pass the prescribed examinations of the College course.

The degree of Master of Arts may be received at the expiration of three years after the first Degree-subject to the following regulation of the Senate.

Application for the degree must be sent to the Secretary of the Faculty one year in advance of the time of conferring of the degree. The applicant will be expected to prepare a Thesis on some assigned subject, which must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Faculty before the first of March previous to the time for conferring the degree. Before the next regular meeting of the Senate, the Secretary will communicate to the applicant the report of the committee appointed by the Senate for the examination of such Theses.

The fee for the Honor Certificate is one' dollar ; for the Diploma of the Degree of B.A., four dollars ; for the Degree of M.A., six dollars.

These fees must be paid before the meeting of the Senate for voting the honors and degrees.

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## General Situdents.

The studies of the College are arranged with reference to the wants of students who intend to take the full course of four years ; but provision is also made to accommodate all who may wish to study for a shorter period in any department, if they are prepared to work with existing classes. Such students, on leaving the College, can have certificates of proficiency according to their attainments.

## Cxpenses.

Students occupying rooms provided by the College authorities, board with the Steward of Chipman Hall. They are charged $\$ 2.60$ per week, besides room-rent, which varies according to the location of the room. Board and lodging can be obtained in the village at reasonable rates.

## 1.-SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE ENDOWMENT FUND.

The Governors hold a few Scholarships, which can be assigned to needy and deserving Students. Scholarships held by individuals can also be used for payment of College fees on presentation of the required certificates.

## 2.-THE DeWOLF SCHOLARSHIPS.

There are five of these Scholarships-one of the value of $\$ 25.00$ a year, two of $\$ 30.00$, one of $\$ 40.00$, and one of $\$ 50.00$. The nomination to the Scholarships will be determined by the Senate on the three-fold principle of Scholarship, needs and general standing of appligants.

## 3.-MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND.

Students having the Christian Ministry in view, and approved by the churches of which they are members, may, in case assistanc $e$ is needed, reeeive an annual appropriation from the Board of Ministerial Education.

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## PUBLIC EXERCISES.

At the opening of the College in September, the Senate provides for the delivery of an Oration in the Assembly Hall.

At the close of the First Session the Junior Exhibition is held, when orations are given by members of the class.

On the first Thursday in June the Anniversary of the Gollege is commemorated, at which time the ceremonies connected with the graduation of students and the conferring of degrees, are observed by the Senate.

## LIBRARY, \&c.

The College Library, containing valuable works in the departments of Literature, Science and Theology, is accessible, under proper regulatious, to the students of the College and Collegiate Academy.

The income of the DeWolf Library Fund provides for yearly additions to the Library.

The College is provided with apparatus for experiments in Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Surveying, \&ec. ; also a Cabinet, well furnished with contributions from various parts of the world, illustrative of the departments of Geology, Mineralogy and Botany.

## SOCIETIES.

Acadia Athenarum.-The object of this Society is the improvement of the Students in discussion and public speaking. Besides its weekly meetings, arrangements are made for a course of Public Lectures during each College year. The laws and regulations of the Society are subject to the approval of the Faculty.

The Society has under its control a Reading Room, furnished with a selection of Newspapers, provincial and foreign, and other periodicals.

College Young Men's Christian Association.-A branch of this Society has been formed and is in a flourishing condition. At present there are about 90 Members,

Acadia Missionary Society.-This Society holds monthly meetings. Its aim is to cultivate interest in Missionary work, and especially to gain information respecting Christian Missions in foreign lands.

## PRAYER MEETINGS.

Prayer Meetings, conducted by the Students, are regularly held on Lord's Day morning and on Wednesday evening throughout the College year. These social services have been contiruously maintained, it is believed, ever since the founding of the College.

## REMARKS.

The officers of the College will seek in all proper ways to promote the moral and religious, as well as the intellectual, culture of the Students. All members of the College are expected to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath; and parents and guardians are requested to give instrctions as to the place of worship which they wish the Students under their care to attend. Religious services are held every Sabbath in the village in connection with the Baptists, Church of England, Methodists and Presbyterians.

All Students are expected to be present at Morning Prayers. Opportunity for uniting in Bible study on the Lord's Day will be provided.

Special rules will he announced by the Faculty, from time to time, as circumstances may require. Students will occupy such rooms and lodgings as are approved by the Faculty.

The use of spirituous or malt liquors by students is not permitted.

Inattention to study, or misbehaviour of any kind, will subject the offender to private or public reproof, a record of demerit in the weekly report, or suspension, at the discretion of the Faculty.
