The Upper Provinces Against the Gevernment's Proposal to Use Public Meacy is Surveying the Emetic.

Evidently the Upper Canadian people and the St. John papers are considerably agitated over the proposed survey of the Harvey-Salisbury route this summer, as the following. Ottawa despatch, taken from the St. John papers, would indicate:—"The proposel of the dominion government to use the public money in surveying the route of a gailway from Harvey to Salisbury is regarded, there as a most unconstitutional proceeding, in view of the fact that parliament has condemned the whole project and refused to vote money for such a purpose. It looks as if the government intended to waste public money in defiance of parliamentary authorate. They will ask the governor general to sign a warrant authorizing the expenditures of money upon the Harvey and Moneton line, but his excellency's attention will be directed to the fact that parliament has distinctly condemned the proposal. It is doubtful if the governor general has the right to authorise the expenditures of public money upon works which parliament has condemned. The application to the governor general for a warrant will be made by Mr. Foster, minister of finance, who will request his excellency to grant the money to build a railway, which is designed to side




