## Around Town.

SHIPPING.—The Herbar, Capt. Robinson arrived at Barbados on the 10th inst. The Sidiartha left Buenos Ayres for Boston about the 15th inst.

LA GRIFFE.—Influenza is very prevalent in this locality and in Amherst. There are several severe cases reported here and in Amherst there is an unusual amount of suffering. The attacks are as a rule lighter than two years ago.

## New Baptist Church.

In response to an invitation from a number of persons residing in Tidnish and vicinity, a Council, consisting of delegates from various churches in Westmorland and Cumberland Counties, convened at the place of worship Tidnish, on Monday evening last for the purpose of considering the propriety of organizing a Baptist church in that locality, and of ordaining Mr. J. A. Marple as pastor. The following churches were represented: Amherst, Geo. W. Christie and A. D. Taylor; Centerville, Wm. Fraser; Linden, John Mills; Oxford, Rev. E. R. Corey and G. O. Smith; Port Elgin, Stephen Tremblay, Deacon Copp and David Polk; Pt. de Bute, Rev. A. H. Lavers, Obed Tingling, Alfred Tingling and J. Dixon; Pigeon, Rev. C. Haverstock and S. M. Lower; Sackville, Rev. W. H. Warren, Dr. Sangster, Hiram Reed and Edward Keenan or two.

Rev. Isa. Wallace and a number of other persons were invited to seats. Rev. L. Wallace was chosen Moderator and Rev. W. H. Warren as Secretary of the Council. A letter was received from Rev. D. A. Steele intimating that owing to sickness in his family he was unable to be present.

The grounds on which the new church was sought to be constituted were fully explained and carefully inspected. It was decided by the Council that the proposed organization was feasible and desirable. The Church was accordingly formed and properly organized. Ephraim McKay, Chappell Brundage and N. Chappell having been chosen as deacons.

Mr. Marple, whose labors as a licentiate had been greatly blessed was chosen as pastor, and the same Council heard his statement in relation to his conversion, his views on the Ministry and his doctrinal views. This examination proving entirely satisfactory the Council concurred in the advisability of his ordination.

Rev. L. Wallace presided at the ordination. Rev. A. H. Lavers was chosen as secretary. Rev. W. H. Warren preached from an appropriate text to a very large audience, and at the close of the sermon Mr. Marple was set apart in the usual form by prayer and laying on of hands to the gospel Ministry. Rev. Mr. Haverstock gave the charge to the candidate, and Rev. A. H. Lavers pointed out the duties resting upon the church.

The exercises throughout were of high interest and character, and the organization with its new pastor began their ecclesiastical career under the most promising auspices.

He gave Sir Charles a record of 3,061 at Halifax and has driven him in some of his best races. A wife and two children survive him. It is understood that a donation is being prepared by his late friends for his widow.

ALMOST MURDER.—This is from the Woodstock Sentinel: On Monday night last, Mrs. W. L. Drier, being asleep beside her husband at their home in Simonds, was awakened by an unusual noise, and raised herself to ascertain the cause; she was immediately struck on the head and face with a hatchet by someone to her then unknown. Mr. Drier is quite deaf, but the disturbance made in the brutal attack on his wife awoke him and he leaped from his bed to grapple with the intruder, by whom, however, he was in turn attacked and badly cut. The would-be murderer then escaped, taking with him a few articles of domestic goods. The theory regarding the crime is this: Mr. Drier has had in his employ for a few months a young man, said to have come from Nova Scotia, named English. Mr. Drier is supposed to be, and is, wealthy; he kept what money he is in his house, with valuable papers, in a chest in his bedroom; this chest was fastened with a hasp and padlock, as we have learned. On the night in question the person attacking Mr. and Mrs. Drier—supposed to have been English—about midnight entered the chamber, and with a hatchet, endeavored to force the fastening of the chest; the noise made in this attempt awoke Mrs. Drier, and to prevent her arousing the murderous attack was made on her and afterwards, to secure escape, on Mr. Drier. Mrs. Drier's wounds, though serious and painful, are not likely to prove fatal, while those received by Mr. Drier are less severe.
