The Remains Will Rest in Lakeview Cemetery, Sarnia.

Timely Tributes to the Merits of the Departed Statesman.

TORONTO, April 18.—The funeral of the late Hon. Alex. Mackenzie will take place in the following order: After a short service at the residence, St. Albans street, at 12 o'clock on Wednesday, the remains will be taken to Jarvis Street Baptist Church, where a public funeral service will be held at 1 o'clock. The cashet, however, will not be opened at the charch. After the service the cortege will proceed to the Union station. The charch, a secompanied by the family, will leave about 3:30 by G. T. A. FREE TRADE ADVOCATE.

"Mr. Mackenzie's most memorable appearance in Toronto," said Mr. A. F. Jury in the course of a talk about the dead statesman, "was at the great meeting in the Adelaide Street Rink, at which he opened the campaign of 1878 by an address on the taril issues, with special reference to the interests of labor. I have taken part in amany political meetings, but never before or since has it been my lot to preside over one at which take deliberate attempt was made to intimidate a speaker or at which the mob was fought so successfully. The circumstances were peculiar. A at which the mob was fought so successfully. The circumstances were peculiar. A period of world-wide depression was at its worst, and Canada was not exempt from it. The National Policy cry had been raised with great effect in the industrial centers, and Mr. Mackenzie was asked to deliver an address before the workingmen of Toronto in defense of free trade. Admission was by ticket, but our opponents forged the tickets, and when Mr. Mackenzie rose to speak the entire front part of the hall was in possession of the obstructionists. For an hour they howled as only paid howlers can, and shock their fists and sticks in the

Premier's face. Dauntless he faced them, and waited until the storm had time to spend itself. Mr. Mackenzic at that time was a man of magnificent physique, with a frame of steel. Few could have stood the strain of such an occasion as he did. At length he secured a hearing and made a splendid address that formed the party platform in the election. He stood by the principles of free trade as the best for Canada, a principle he never swerved from till the end. This steadfastness was perhaps the finest trait in his fine character." It came out in the course of the negotiations that the army has from the first lost money in the woodchopping business, and that it is kept on chiefly to find work for the 4,000 men who nightly sleep in the Salvation shelters in London. Catastrophe at Hampstead.

LONDON, April 18 .- A terrible catasrophe took place at Hampstead Heath this evening, by which two women and six children were killed, and thirteen other

children were killed, and thirteen other persons were seriously injured.

Hampstead, which is a favorite holiday resort, about four miles from London, was visited by thousands of excursionists today, and as the day closed there was a great rush of people to catch the trains to return home.
In the crush somebody fell at the foot of

a staircase of the railway station, and in a moment hundreds of persons above were thrown into a struggling mass. The police at once closed the doors and set to work to

at once closed the doors and set to work to extricate the dead and injured.

Four of the dead have been identified as Emily Hamilton, aged 55; Annie Eaton, aged 40; John Connor. aged 9, and Thomas Longford, aged 14. The other bodies are those of boys of from 9 to 15 years. Many were injured.

SWINDLES THAT INJURE CANADA. The good name of Canada was dragged to the dust once more by the Canadian Pacific Colonization Corporation (limited), the doings of which have been laid bare in the High Court of Justice at London. Miss Knox, a monied spinster, had been induced to take stock in this "corporation" by the misrepresentations contained in prospectus issued by Canon Hayman and others, directors of the organizacover £300 paid in for stock. Hayman, the defendant, is a canon of Carisle Cathedral and an ex-head master of Rugby School; but it was in his quality as chairman of the Canadian Pacific Colonization Corporation, Limited, that the reverend gentleman was attacked. This company owned certain concessions which were sold to the Sweet Water Ranch Company for £3,000; this company sold out to the New Canadian Crown Lands Syndicate for £10,000, Canon Hayman being chairman. This latter company made a pretty

handsome profit, selling out to the defendaut company for no less a sum than £60,-000. How much of this splendid profit the reverend chairman got for selling his old company to his new one is not stated; but the new company has found the bargain such a poor one that it is in hopeless litigation. The company was registered in 1888, and in 1889 plaintiff received a prospectus stating that the capital of the com-pany was £500,000, the objects of the company being to found and colonize the town of Queenstown, in Northwestern Canada. The plaintiff applied for 30 £10 preference shares, on which a minimum dividend of 5 per cent. was guaranteed for two years, and paid £300 in respect of them. The

The Extravagance of Mud.

The Extravagance of Mud.

[From "Our Common Roads," by Isaac B. Potter, in the April Century.]

We have in the United States something like 16,000,000 horses and mules above the age of two years upon our farms, and at the moderate estimate of 25 cents as the cost of feed and care of each of these animals, we see at a glance that the aggregate expense of maintaining them is about \$4,000,000 per day. If, by a similarly moderate estimate, we say that they are kept in the stable in a condition of enforced idleness by the deep mud of spring and fall for a period averaging twenty days in each year, we may easily compute that the loss, in this respect alone, will amount to \$80,000,000 per year, a sum sufficient to build 16,000 miles of excellent highway. Of course, considering the great variety of conditions, and the consequent number of factors to be regarded, it is impossible by mathematical formula to compute the lose entailed on any community by the continued toleration of these dirt roads in their present condition; but the error in the result of any computation is more likely to tinued toleration of these dirt roads in their present condition; but the error in the result of any computation is more likely to show a loss smaller than actually exists, and in whatever way the matter be regarded, it is certain that with the imposed burden of extra help and extra draftanimals, loss of time, wear and tear of wagons and harness, the drawing of light loads, and the depreciated value of farmlands, we are pursuing a short-sighted policy in permitting the present system to continue. Besides the actual loss, which a moment's reflection will serve to show, we moment's reflection will serve to show, we moment's reflection will serve to snow, we are gaining nothing and saving nothing in that great department of agricultural industry to which the condition of the dirt road is of such marked importance.

By dwellers in cities the actual condition of these country roads during the wet season is scarcely known; while with farmers, to whom all roads are dirt roads, and who have never seen nor known of a highway better than that which they have used from boyhood, the dirt road is an accepted fixture, which long habit and use have impressed upon them as a natural and necessary adjunct to farm life. In the spring of 1891, in the State of New York, the country newspapers were printing long editorial complaints of the hopeless condition of the rural highways, and the consequent paralysis of country trade, while commercial reports were published from week to week in which business embarrassments and failures were charged directly ments and failures were charged directly to the impassible condition of the country roads. Half-loaded farm-wagons were stalled in deep mud almost in the shadow of the magnificent \$20,000,000 capitol at Albany, while, as if to show to what ridiculous ends the perversity of the human mind will sometimes lead us, the good farmers of Albany county were actually sending telegrams to the Legislature, asking for the adjournment of a committee hearing, because the roads of Albany county were to bad to permit them to get to town in time to oppose a bill which ments and failures were charged directly to town in time to oppose a bill which promised to make them better!

The plaintiff Jennings, who is a hotelkeeper, brought action to quash a bylaw carried on Feb. 15 last restricting the number of tavern licenses in the city of London to 34 and the number of London to 34 and the number of shop licenses to 6. The plaintiff claimed that the bylaw should be quashed—first, because the question was not submitted to the people at last municipal election, but was passed upon the petition of nore than 1,000 ratepayers; second, because the commisioners would refuse to grant more than 40 licenses upon the assumption that the bylaw limits the number of licenses to 40 under the Liquor License Act; third, that if the proper number of licenses are not issued serious loss will be sustained by those who may be refused; and fourth, on the ground that the passing of the bylaw are strictly legal. 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
