In the House of Commons, Sir Edward Grey, Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign of Office, made extended reference to the announced intention of the Hon. George N. Carson, Conservative member for the Southport division of Lancashire, to move the adjournment of the House in order to discuss the matter until further information should have been received. He promised that everything would be done by Great Britain to arrive at a pacific solution of the questions involved. It was imperative, he added, to keep distinct from the main issues certain allied questions, especially the question of Siamese independence. This statement evoked cheers. Continuing, Sir Edward said that all the questions required the closest and most careful consideration. The Government was fully alive to the need of security of British interests in Siam, and if more warships were required at Bangkok or elsewhere in Siamese waters they would be promptly dispatched. Sir Edward further said that France had informed the British Government that the French gunboat had ascended the Menam River without instructions to do so, but had added that the commanders of the warships had been provoked to this action by the Siamese. Sir Edward concluded by stating that he was able to assure the House that the Government had every hope that the affair would be settled in a peaceful and satisfactory manner.

Court-Martial in the Victoria-Cam-Dergown Case.

VALETTA, July 17.—The court-martial appointed to try Captain Hon. Maurice Bourke, Stafl Commander Hawkins Smith, and the surviving officers of the battleship Victoria, which was sunk recently in collision with the battleship Camperdown, opened to day upon the Hibernia flagship of Rear Admiral Richard E. Tracey, admiral superintendent of the Malta dock yard. The president of the court-martial is Vice-Amiral Sir Michael Culme-Seymour, of the cruiser Hawke, who succeeded the late Vice-Admiral Tracey is vice-president. Capt Alfred Leigh Winelee appeared as prosecutor. Capt. Bourke objected to Capts. Johnstone, Constance and Acland sitting on the trial, basing his objection on the fact that they had been present at the time of the disaster, and also that they had been summoned to testify in behalf of the prosecution. The court allowed the objection and the captains named were relieved.

Filter to Avoid Cholera.

A Berlin correspondent cables: Reports rom the various districts affected by from the various districts affected by cholera cause no anxiety in Germany at present. Arabia Turkey and even South France are too far away. There is, moreover, a strong quarantine at all Turkish frontier places. The unprecedented drought has had its advantages in preventing a wider spread of the cholera. There has been only one case in Hamburg, and that was not fatal. Here the most stringent regulations are in force. Prof. Koch has published a report showing that water is not freed of its chemical parts by filtration, but is almost completely freed of bacteria. It is sufficient, according to him, if the quantity of bacteria is diminished to 100 for every cubic centimeter of water. Prof. Koch urges rigorous inspection of waterworks, and a filtering speed of not more than 100 millimeters an hour. Purification is prevented by the freezing of the filter in winter and by the growth of microscopic plants in summer. He decides that, although insufficient filtration may not always be responsible for cholera outbreaks, it is the main cause wherever cholera has appeared. The professor advocates exclusive use of iron pipe wells, because underground water is almost free from germs. He entirely rejects the use of the present small domestic filters. The outbreak in the lunatic asylum at Metlebez he attributes directly to the filters that were in use. He notes that Altona has water of a dangerous quality, but it is purified and rendered harmless by excellent filtrations.

Grave International Difficulties. The events of the past week have brought bout a condition of relations between England and France which has no parallel in more than half a century. While war between the two countries is but the most remote possibility, it is proved this week that there is a clashing of interests at four points, each jarring sufficient in itself to cause a violent outburst of feeling. The most important of these four causes for irritation is the Siamese affair, which may have exciting developments at any moment. The next is the absence of Lord Dufferin from the post of British Ambasador at the French capital because of the malignant attacks of French newspapers. These attacks are based upon the belief that the English Embassy takes advantage of its position to do unfriendly spying upon France, a belief that is none the less firm because it lacks proof, and was only aggraved by the Millogove fisses. The next in importance is the conduct of the Khedive at Constantinon', where he was sent by the intrigues of Frenchmen at his court. 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
