1st Canadian Contingent, British Expeditionary Force, 1st Infantry Brigade, 1st Battalion, No. 3 Co.

February 13, 1915. Dear Mother,-

It is now six months since I enlisted in Wingham. The letter I now write must be to the point and very brief. No means of location may be given or even mentioned, so you will pardon me if my letter seems blunt.

We landed safely on the continent a few days ago. The Germans never even got a smell of us, as we fooled them completely on our journey across the

We are now somewhere in France, about 14 miles behind the firing lines and we can hear the big guns booming quite distinctly, as they are not far from where we are billeted.

A month or so ago the Germans shelled a church and, as usual, the steeple was ruined. The whole structure, which was of autique design, was completely destroyed.

I am feeling fine and in good health, and if I am not detailed here to keep books I will be with the boys in the trenches before long, but we know nothing defi-

DIABOLICAL SCHEME

The Provincial Inspector Says When Cans Are Opened Explosive Takes Effect.

Is there a quiet and widespread scheme abroad in the Dominion for the destroying or damaging of public institutions and factories. and presumably many lives as well? This is the question that is occupying the minds of a number of London citizens at the present time. And that the provincial authorities have been warned of some such dastardly intent on the part of a person or persons yet unknown, seems to be proved by the following letter, received but yesterday by the superintendent of the Convalescent Home, 444 York street, from Dr. R. W. Bruce-Smith, provincial inspector of institutions and factories:

"Sir-I am Instructed to advise you that notification has been received from high authority that agents have been instructed to call on engineers and plumbers at different institutions and factories throughout the Dominion of Canada, asking the institution or firm to try a lubricant, of which they will leave a sample in a box. It is reported that this box, when it is opened, will explode with great power, and do damage to persons and buildings, as instead of being a lubricant it contains a very high and powerful explosive.

(Signed), R. W. BRUCE-SMITH. So far as is known, the agents spoken of have not been working in this city. A number of citizens are fearing the possibility of such a canvass, not only to institutions and factories, but to such public buildings as theatres and churches. Tiflis, Trans-Caucasia, March 3 .- Via Petrograd and London, 1:45 p.m.-Tim Russian army of the Caucasus, driving the Turkish forces before it, has reaches! the River Khopachas, the estuary of the Tchoruk, in Armenia. This advance by the Russians cuts the route of Turkish reinforcements and supplies from Constantinople to the Caucasian frontier, through Khopa, Turkish Armenia, and isolates a large section of Turkish territory

The isolated section includes the districts of Ardanuch, Ardahan, OM and Sarikamysh.

The Russian forces advanced from Batum, on the Black Sea near the Turkish border, and were opposed by the Turks at every step. Princess Shakhovsky, who recently went to the front as a military aviator, has sent back to the editor of the Bourse Gazette an account of her first flight over the enemy's positions. She had made three flights, the shortest an hour in length and the longest two hours, when the letter was written.

"As I found myself over the German lines I began to observe beneath me the small clouds which indicated that the enemy had opened fire on my machine. Somehow I did not feel afraid, even when the bullets came quite close to me. Some of them even pierced the wings, but fortunately did not touch any vital part of the machine. After half an hour of flight, one grows quite accustomed to the situation. Later I flew in such severe celd that my petrol began to work badly. Luckily this lasted only a few seconds, which rather resembled hours."


