# TWO LITTLE GIRLS DISAPPEAR FROM TENTS AT WONDERLAND

Thelma Pritchett, of Wharncliffe Road, and Madeline Corbin, of Philip Street, Missing Since Sunday From Summer Home.

SEARCHING PARTIES OUT ALL NIGHT

But Quest Was Fruitless Till River Was Dragged and Remains Were Discovered at the Campers' Dock-Mothers Prostrated With Grief.

Thelma Pritchett, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. Bert Pritchett, 162 Wharncliffe road, South London, and Madeline, the six-year-old daughter of Mr. W. Corbin, 514 Phillip street, were found drowned in the river at Wonderland at 10:20 this morning, after a search lasting over 16 hours. They had evidently fallen in the river while playing.

Mr. Lou Bartleman, who was assisting a party dragging the river, came upon the bodies, drawing them to the surface with a rake. Thelma had hold of Madeline's arm, but they were shaken apart as the bodies were being drawn up.

#### Parents Heartbroken.

Bert Pritchett, as soon as he saw the body of the Corbin girl, immediately dived into the river, and seizing his drowned daughter carried her to shore. The grief of the stricken parents was heartbreaking.

The finding of the bodies was the culmination of a search of many hours duration. Every foot of the park and farms on both sides of the river, as well as almost every foot of the river between Wonderland and the pumping station was gone over to find the missing children.

#### Together Sunday Afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon they were last seen together shortly after half past 2 o'clock. Nothing was thought of it until after the evening meal, when the fact that the children were missing dawned upon the stricken parents, and with the assistance of fellow campers they searched the woods.



London, Aug. 16.-Unless Greece complies with the demand of Turkey and forces the people of Crete to haul down the Greek flag which they have hoisted the four protecting powers of Crete, Great Britain, Russia, Italy and France, will perform this act, using chequer, is one more example of the force if necessary.

This was the substance of a joint note signed by the four powers and presented to the Turkish Government today. In order to carry out this policy and to be prepared to use force f necessary to oblige the Cretans to haul down the objectionable flag, each of the four protecting powers decided today to send an additional warship to Canea, the capital of the Island of Crete, and at the same time expressed the hope to the Turkish Government that in view of the steps they had taken that Turkey will not think it necessary

The joint note of the powers to Turkey today is the direct result of a communication from the Cretan Government declaring that it was unable to force the hauling down of the Greek flag. This action of the powers followed sharply upon Turkey's note to Greece yesterday, demanding a formal declaration respecting her intentions to action.



> London, Aug. 16 - For three brief but glorious days Drury Lane has enjoved chean beer-beer at three ha'pence a pint. But vesterday the blow fell. At 3 o'clock the price went up to two pence-ha'penny and if you asked for a glass of ale you got a measure five of which go to a quart.

The landlord of one big public house in Drury Lane continued to sell beer at the old prices-"in spite of the budget" as the others put it. He flouted the decision of the Bloomsbury Licensed Victuallers to make the workingman pay more for his beer. This led to reprisals. 
