ESTHONIANS DECLARE WAR ON GERMANS BECAUSE THEY AIDED BOLSHEVIKI IN BALTIC AREA

Treacherous Attack Upon Esthonians by German Cavalry Under Orders From General Von Der Goltz Has Led To Declaration Against Huns.

London, June 9.—The Esthonian general staff considers itself forced to start military operations against the Germans, says a Helsingfors dispatch to the Mail. This action is in consequence of the action of the Germans in the Riga district in advancing behind the Bolshevik lines for the purpose of occupying the eastern frontier of Livonia, which, with a treacherous attack upon the Esthonians by the German cavalry under orders from Gen. von Der Goltz, commander of German forces in the Baltic region, it is said, "unmasked the Germans as accomplices of the Bolsheviki.

Sailors Lose Their Lives In Fighting Fire On Steamer

Towed to Port by Transport.

New York, June 9.—The story of a desperate battle with flames in midocean, in which two men lost their lives, was told yesterday by members of the crew of the British tanker Beech Leaf, which was towed into port by the transport West Haven.

The Beech Leaf, bound from Baton Rouge, La., to Ireland, took fire off the Azores Islands a week ago when an oil fuel line broke. The engines were quickly put out of commission by the flames, her rudder control disabled and her wireless sending equipment destroyed. The French steamer Chaleur stood by her and later the West Haven responded, and despite the rough weather the West Haven ran close enough to the helpless vessel to throw her a line. Ottawa, June 9.—It is positively stated at Liberal headquarters that A. R. McMaster, the chief Opposition financial critic, will close his speech on Sir Thomas White's budget this afternoon with an amendment. The nature of the amendment will not be disclosed until it is received in the House, but it is regarded as likely it will follow the line of the Liberal tariff resolution moved earlier in the session. This proposal goes further in the direction of free trade than the budget proposals, making provision for free foodstuffs and free agricultural implements.

Western Unionists were in caucus this morning to consider the situation created by the bringing down of the budget. While it is practically certain that a number of members from the other side of the Great Lakes will give their support to the McMaster amendnent, there is much difference of opinion as to how numerous this group will be. What this means may be exemplified if we assume, for the sake of comparison, that all kinds of corn varieties are being mixed, and the mixture thus obtained put on the market for seeding purposes. The comparison applies perfectly to red clover, for all red clover seed sold in Canada is a mixture of a large number of different types of plants. Some of these types are what is called winter hardy, that is to say, capable of coming through the winters without injury on account of their hardy nature. Others, however, are tender types, which in this climate are unable to stand the rigor of the winters.
