

BISHOP MILLS, OF KINGSTON, SCORNS ANNEXATION CRY

Distinguished Prelate Now in London Denounced Anti-Reciprocity Tactics in Charge to His Clergy—His Utterance.

One of the distinguished delegates to the Anglican General Synod now meeting in London is the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Ontario, the Right. Rev. William Lennox Mills, D.D., LL.D., D.C.L., of Kingston. in his charge to the Anglican clersy of the Diocese of Ontario, on June 13 last, Dr. Mills said:

"Whether reciprocity would be in the general interests of the country is a question for debate, and about which different opinions may be held. But politicians have not devoted their attention so much to the discussion of this question as in ringing changes on the cry that if reciprocity were adoptied, it would be the first step towards annexation, that the United States would be buying us, and we should be seiling ourselves. I think that is the greatest noncense that ever came from the mouths of supposedly same men; as a Canadian I resent it. I would think very little of my loyalty to the British crown if it depended on tariff schedules. Those who think the national spirit of Canada is such a poor and uncertain thing that her existence as a nation would be imperilled by an increase of trade with the United States, certainly do not know her. There is no part of the British Empire in which there is truer loyalty than in Canada, and she can be neither bought nor sold. The opposition to reciprocity is simply a political one. That there are men of both parties opposed to it simply means that men can be caught by a cry and can be led by sentiment. The thought of annexation makes many incapable of calmiy Judging the matter."





SOME OBJECTION TAKEN

Many Delegates Could Not See th Necessity for the Naming of the Committee.

The report of the committee on Prayer Book enrichment and adaptation was discussed at length at the afternoon session of the syned yesterday. Many diverse views were expressed on the subject, and the entire afternoon was given over to the discussion.

Hon, S. H. Blake objected strenuously to the use of the word "enrich-

Looking to Canada.

Canon Davidson said that the church in England was looking to the Canadian church to take some steps in revising the Prayer Boook, and in Canada both clergy and laymen were calling loudly for the revision.

Archdeacon Pentreath thought inaction at this time would be worse than a blunder: It would be a crime. The church that had not revised its services in 250 years was facing a serious problem, that was bound to become more acute.

Canon Scott wanted the assurance that nothing drastic would be done. The Church of England, he said, represented very different schools of thought, and all should be treated considerable.
