VISCOUNT GREY AGREES TO ACT **AS AMBASSADOR**

Former British Secretary of State To Go To Wash-

London, Aug. 13 .- Viscount Grey, former British secretary of state for foreign affairs, has agreed to represent the British BY Government at Washington. pending the appointment of a permanent ambassador.

Viscount Grey of Fallodon (Sir Edward Grey) comes to the United States to represent the British Government after a career as head of the British foreign office. For eleven years momentous in the political affairs of urope, he was secretary of state for foreign affairs from December 11, 1905, to December 11, 1916. On several occasions during that period it was the initiative of Sir Edward Grey that caused the gathering clouds of war to disappear. It was he who made the last effort to prevent the European war when he used the ambas addes of war when he urged the ambassadors of the leading powers to meet ald discuss the situation in an attempt to put off hostilities. His effort failed through the attitude of the German Government and

the German emperor.
Gladstone, under whom Sir Edward served in his youth, described him thus: never knew in a man such aptitude for political life, and such disinclination

for it."

Since his retirement from the foreign office, Viscount Grey has been living in retirement in Northumberland. The new ambassador's eyes began to trouble him in 1918, and at one time it was reported he was totally blind. This report was exaggerated, but the viscount has difficulty in reading, although his has difficulty in reading, although his eye trouble has improved somewhat.

GERMANS' TONNAGE LOSS WAS HEAVY

Four-Fifths of Foe's Cargo Space Taken or Destroyed.

Berlin. Aug. 12.—What Germany has lost in shipping through the war the Tages Zeitung expounds as follows:
"As is well known, we owned in January, 1913, a fleet of 4.850 ships of January, 1913, a fleet of 4,850 ships of every size with a gross register; tonnage of 4,935,909 tons. We have of ships up to 1,000 tons, 3,649 ships, with a total cargo space of 589,263 gross register tons, and of ships above 1,000 tons, 106,000 tons, and 106 ships with a total of 135,673 gross register tons. Altogether, therefore, Germany has 3,755 ships with 724,944 gross register tons.

"The net result is a loss of more than 4,000,000 gross register tons, that is record than four-fifths of our whole tons. 1.000.000 gross register tons, that is more than four-fifths of our whole ton-nage, which leaves us not quite enough to conduct our Baltic shipping with our own cargo space."

MARKS A YEAR

Mathias Erzberger Promises Bill Will Be Introduced

At Early Date. MUST CREATE FLEET

Germans Abroad Must Be Aided With State Advances.

Berlin, Aug. 13.—"We must proceed immediately to create a mercantile fleet and help Germans abroad with state advances," said Mathias Erzberger, vice-premier and minister of finance of the German Government, speaking before the National Assembly at Weimar yesterday. He promised the assembly that a bill carrying out these projects would be presented in a few weeks.

Herr Erzberger added that the loan situation must be given consideration, declaring that the German nation must raise 25,000,000,000 marks yearly in taxes in order to regain a healthy condition.

There are 200,000 persons who lost both their parents, and 300,000 more who lost one parent, according to statistics compiled by Red Cross workers from records in the Serbian educational department. Some towns of 10,000 inhabitants have between 2,000 and 3,000 orphans. The occupation of Serbia for three years by the enemy, and the subsequent deportations, combined with the great retreat in 1915, which carried half a million children in its wake, separated numberless children from their parents.

GRAND CHAMPION RETIRES 'AFTER LONG OF LITTLE ONES LEAVES OFFICE

Joseph Sanders Retires From Inspectorship of Children's Aid Society.

RECORD IS GRAND ONE

Esteem Shown by His Election To Honorary Vice-Presidency.

Joseph A. Sanders, for 25 years inspector for the Children's Aid Society, placed his resignation before the board of management at a meeting yesterday afternoon. The board accepted his withdrawal with regret, and in order that his services might not be entirely lost to the society, appointed him honorary vice-president.

Mr. Sanders' resignation was not entirely unexpected, members of the board stated, as he had frequently intimated to them lately that he intended to retire from the work. All the members testify to the high esteem in which Mr. Sanders is held and express regret that advancing years have made it impossible for him to continue the active part he has taken in the work of the society, practically ever since its inception. He has devoted the past 25 years of his life to the service of neglected and dependent children, and has become a familiar figure not only to the citizens of London but throughout the province.





The Prince Coming

This is a year of holidays, not to speak of strikes. One of the most interesting events of even this "annus mirabilis" will be the visit of the Prince of Wales in London next October.

He has just landed in Newfoundland and started on his grand tour of inspection. He has already made good acquaintance with our army in France. Let us line up and show him our best smiling duty here at home.

Elder London has pleasant memories of the prince's grandfather who was here nearly sixty years ago. In 1901 his father, then not yet Prince of Wales, drew a crowd from the city and its environs that had hardly standing room down town. Many an eager youth, now a sedate paterfamilias, grabbed a perch in the trees or on fences in the vicinity of Victoria Park. The present prince has advantages over his father of that time in his boyish youth and surrounded with the afterglow of the great war in which he played his part with readiness and spirit. He comes with the warmest feeling to a people whose devotion to the empire has been tested in the fire, and the Canadian people welcomes in him not only himself, but a symbol of the unity of our race which has been more solidly cemented by the dangers we have fought through.

The prince purposes to see the wilds as well as the people of this Dominion. He will have a spell of hunting and fishing up north, being, like his father, an expert with the gun. From all accounts the prince has had a thorough and manysided education, in college, court and camp, for the exalted functions that in due course he will be called on to perform.

In this he has, again, some slight advantage over the youth of his father. George was a until the death of his brother in 1892 did George to the throne of his grandmother. The present prince undergoes from the start the most intensiv training for the kingship.

Middle Class Unrest in Britain

A British correspondent of the New York Evening Post reports that the middle classes in Great Britain are showing a good deal of discontent with economic conditions. Industrial unrest is not the only trouble agitating the old country; there is also professional, clerkly, small gentry, and storekeeper unrest. It is unorganized and far less open as yet than the rebellious stir of the 'working classes," and it is hard for the middle class people to break away from their ancient tradition of conservatism or from their pride of reticence in regard to any financial straits. They hate to organize on the trade union plan, still ossessed with some snobbish superiority to the vulgar. All the more they writhe under the changed conditions since 1914, the high prices and the heavy taxation.







Glenn E. Plumb Says \$450, 414,000 Stock Bonuses Given Away.

OTTAWA. Aug. 12.—The price of hides for the manufacture of boots and shoes is rapidly falling in Canada, since the Government placed an embargo on exports of hides, skins and leather, at the advice of the cost of living commissioner. The embargo was announced on August 4. By August 6 country hides had fallen five cents a pound and advices received state that the price on hides dropped ten cents and on calf skins twenty cents on the Montreal market yesterday.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12. — Charges that eighteen representative railroads operating in all parts of the United States gave away stock bonuses aggregating \$450,414,000 from 1900 to 1910, and have paid millions in dividends on these bonuses, were made before the House interstate commerce committee by Glenn E. Plumb of Chicago, author to five roads. He demanded a thorough investigation by Congress.


