The objects which are to be applied to a blind person are applied in any non-transparent material fluorescent screen. HAVE AGREEMENT

Russia to Recognize Japanese Interests in Korea.

Says the Japanese Minister to London-Cordial Relations Between the Two Powers.

London, July 28.-Viscount Hayashi, the Japanese minister here, in an interview, declared that the alarmist reports regarding the relations between Russia and Japan are baseless. He said that Japan is in exactly the same position as the other powers in the Far East, and has had no special disagreement with Russia. If she had such a disagreement it would doubtless be settled by arbitration. Japan is guarding her interests and Russia is guarding hers. In doing so both are necessarily taking measures which certain people interpret as preparing for war. Viscount Hayashi added: "It can be stated positively that there is no occasion for alarm. War is very far off. Japan would have to be greatly provoked before she would think of going to war with any power."

She also recognizes the right of the Japanese to the wood-cutting privilege at Quelpart. U. S. Railroads Kill 857 Persons in Three Months.

Washington, July 28. - The report of the Interstate Commerce Commission on railroad accidents in the United States for the three months ending March 31 last, shows that during that quarter 300 persons were killed and 2,834 injured in train accidents. The Flooded Nova Scotia Mines Are Pumped Dry.

Halifax, N. S., July 28.-Operations in the mining of coal were resumed at Dominion No. 1 colliery at Glace Bay yesterday, some 40 tons being raised from the bottom of the shaft. This pit fire broke out in it, which raged for over several weeks before it was get under control. It required 600,000,000 gailons of water to drown the flames. the water being procured by cutting sluice into the Atlantic Ocean. When the fire was ascertained to be the work of pumping this subterranean lake begun. There are now only a few million gallons remaining in the lower end of the pit, which the company expects to have out by Aug. 15.

Sacramento, Cal., July 27.-A dispatch from Folsom says: "Thirteen desperate prisoners, confined in the Folsom penitentiary, made a successful break for liberty at the breakfast hour today. After a fierce fight in the captain's office, during which Turnkey Cochrane was fatally stabbed, Guard Cotter was killed and Officer Palmer was cut in the head, the convicts seized arms and ammunition, and using the warden and other officials as shields, escaped. Tonight, it is believed, they are making for the Bald Mountains. State troops, ordered Slot Macuine Inflates Cushions at out by Governor Pardee, have gone

to the scene. The fight took place after the convicts had gone to the office of R. J. Murphy, captain of the guard, and Warden Wilkinson, his grand-Harry Wilkinson, Captain Captain . RADIUM IN ONTARIO

American Scientists Seeking for It in This Province.

Toronto, July 28.-Radium, the new metal which sends off waves of minute particles that will cure cancer and give flashes of light to the blind. She braved all these dangers in spite and which is expected to supersede and surpass X-rays, is being sought on the American market by scientists of several universities. Although this magical metal is many times more costly than gold or diamonds, and the French company which manufactures it is charging \$170,000 an ounce for it, the metal from which radium is extracted exists in Canada and in the United States, and a company has recentiv been organized at Buffalo to produce it for the various universities What radium has so far been discovered has been found in deposits of uranium and its compounds, which are also extremely rare, although, of course, their ocurence is commo when compared with the minute particles of radium that have been dis-

covered. Uranium compounds have been found in two localities in Ontario, and it is quite possible that radium may be discovered if diligent search i

Prof. Miller, of the Provincial Bureau of Mines, said today that at Point Maimanse, on the north shore of Lake Superior, a uranium compound known as coracite was discovered some time ago. It occurs in small quautities, and only in a streak about 2 inches wide between the trap and the syenite, two well-known rock formations. This coracite is an oxide of uranium, and resembles pitchblende, another oxide very closely.
