These data may be reduced to Charlottetown time by multiplying the hourly difference by the constant 4.208, adding or subtracting the result according as the data are increasing or decreasing.

For convenience of reference the sun's semi diameter for every day in the year is given in a separate table. From this the sun's horizontal parallax may be found by dividing the semi diameter reduced to seconds by the constant 107.44. Example:

For March 21, sum's semi-diameter, 16' 48" ______8.98.

^{107,44} The bearing of the moon at the times of full and changes are given for the purpose of assisting or testing weather forecasts; and the times of the moon's crossing the equinoctial and of its attaining its greatest declination are given as days of expected atmospheric disturbance. When these days fall on or near (within two days) of the time of the moon's changes or perigee the disturbing influence is proportionally increased. These cases are marked with ** or *** according as two or three of their influences are combined, and the closer these times agree the stronger and more certain may the disturbance be expected.

#### PLANETS.

MERCURY.—Apparent motion alternately direct and retrograde between the dates when he will be stationary to the east or west of the sun, namely March 18th E., April 9th W., July 24th E., August 14th W., November 13th E., and December 2d W. The most favorable time for seeing this planet is when at the time of his greatest angular distance from the sun, his declination is more northerly than the sun's. This will occur in the evening, about March 11th, and before sunrise abcut August 22. He will be in conjunction with Venus April 14th and May 19th; with Mars September 28th, November 28th and December 23d; with Jupiter February 28th and April 7th; and with Saturn May 6.

VENUS.—Apparent motion in right ascension direct throughout the year. She will be a morning star till her conjunction with the san, July 13th, afterwards reappearing as an evening star, becomes visible in the west in September. Besides those already noticed, her conjunctions will be—with Mars; September 7th (when at sunset the two planets may be s-en in the west); with Jupiter, April 16th, an hour before sunrise; and with Saturn May 1. She will be occulted by the moon November 4th.

MARS.—Apparent motion throughout the year direct. He will be an evening star during the first part of the year. Comes to the meridian at 8 p. m. and earlier every day till his conjunction with the sun, October 13th. Becomes visible as a morning star about the end of November. There will be two occultations by the moon—on March 17th and April 15th. The former alone will be visible to P. E. Island. The planet will disappear at the moon's eastern or darkened limb at about 24 minutes past 7 p.m.. reappearing on the western side at 44 minutes past 8.



## Occultation of Mars by the Moon, March 17.

JUPITER.-Motion direct till August 9th; retrograde till De-cember 4th; afterwards direct. He will be visible as an evening star from the beginning of the year till March, coming to conjunction with the sun on the 18th, reappearing before sunrise in April, and coming in opposition to the sun October 6th, being then on the maridian at midnight.

SATURN.-Motion direct till the 11th August and retrograde during the rest of the year. An evening star till the end of March, about 30° to the east of Jupiter. He will come to conjunction with the sun April 9th, reappearing as a morning star about the end of the month, and coming to opposition October

URANUS .- Motion retrograde till May 12th; direct till 'December 18; in opposition to the sun February 25; in conjunction on the 1st September.

NEPTUNE .- Motion will be direct from January 21st till August 16th and retrograde during the remaining part of the year. He will be in conjunction with the sun May 1; in opposition on November 4th.

### ECLIPSES.

There will be six eclipses during the year 1880--four of the sun and two of the moon.

I. A total eclipse of the sun January 11th. Instant of conjunction, 10h. 48m. 13.4sec. Greenwich mean time. Visible to North Pacific Ocean and west coast of North America.

II. A total eclipse of the moon June 22. Instant of opposition, 1h. 45m. 2.6sec. Greenwich mean time.


III. An annular eclipse of the sun July 7th, 1h. 34m. 34sec. Greenwich mean time. Visible only as a partial eclipse at the Cape of Good Hope.

IV. A partial eclipse of the sun December 1st, 15h. 19m. 1.9sec. Greenwich mean time. Only visible in the Antartic Ocean. V. A total eclipse of the moon December 16, 3h. 37m. 32sec.

VI. A partial eclipse of the sun December 31st. 2h. 5m. 41.25sec. Greenwich mean time, the only eclipse visible in P. E. Island, commencing just after sunrise at the sun's N W. limb 8h. 16m. 30sec., ending at the N. E. limb 10h. 0m. 30sec.. The greatest obscuration will be at 8 minutes past 9, when a little more than the sun's northern semi-diameter will be covered.

#### THE YEAR.

The length of the year is strictly expressed by the space of time required for the revolution of the earth round the sun-namely, 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, 49 seconds and 7 tenths of a second, for'to such a alcety has this time been ascer-tained. But for convenience in reckoning, it has been found necessary to make the vear terminate with a day instead of a fraction of one lumping the fractions to tained. But for convenience in reckoning, it has been found necessary to make the year terminate with a day instead of a fraction of one, lumping the fractions to-gether so as to make up a day among themselves. About forty-five years before Christ, Julius Cæsar, having, by the help of Sosigenes, an Alexandrian philosopher, come to a tolerably clear understanding of the length of the year, decreed that every fourth year should be held to consist of 366 days, for the purpose of absorbing the ruary, the sixth before the calends of March, (sextilis), was to be repeated in that fourth year; and each fourth year was thus to be bissextile. It was as if we were to reckou the 23d of February twice over. Seeing that, in reality, a day every fourth year is too much by 11 minutes, 10 seconds and 3 tenths of a second, it infourth year is too much by 11 minutes, 10 seconds and 3 tenths of a second, it in-evitably followed that the beginning of the year moved onward ahead of the point evitably followed that the beginning of the year moved onward anead of the point at which it was in the days of Cæsar; in other words, the natural time fell behind the reckoning. From the time of the Council of Nice, in 325, when the vernal equinox fell correctly on the 21st of March, Pope Gregory found in 1582 that there and been over-reckoning to the extent of ten days, and now the vernal equinox fell on the 11th of March. To correct the past error, he decreed that the 5th of October that year should be reckoned as the 15th, and to keep the year right in future, the that year should be reckoned as the 15th, and to keep the year right in future, the overplus being 18 hours, 37 minutes, and 10 seconds in a century, he ordered that every centurial year that could be divided by 4 (1700, 1800, 1800, 2100, 2200, &c.) extra day three times every four hundred years. The Gregorian style, as it was not adopted in Britain till the year 1752, by which time the discrepancy between the Julian and Gregorian periods amounted to *eleven* days. An act of Parliament was passed, dictating that the 3rd of September that year should be reckoned the 14th, and that three of every four of the centurial years should, as in Pope Gregory's arrangement, not be bissextile or lexp-years. # 1880.7 ALMANAC. 43 NOTES OF THE MONTHS.

#### JANUARY.

JANUARY was placed as leader of the months by Numa Pompilius, when he added two months (January and February) to the Alban Calendar, though it was not admitted to the same precedence in this country until a motion was made to that effect on March 18, 1750. The name is derived from Janus, the god of the year, in the Roman mythology.

The idol Janus was placed over the gate of a temple at Rome; and was represented with two faces, the one that of an old man, being typical of his retrospect of the past; and the other a youthful countenance, denoting prospect of the future. This ingress for the year should, in fact, convert every man into a Janus, that he may look back and survey the past year of his life, as well as look forward and contrive for that which is just begun.

The Romans sacrificed to Janus on the 9th day of this month, and to Jove on the 13th; and on the last or 31st day of the month they had a ceremony with their household gods, called deis penatibus. Janus presides over gates and avenues, thus symbolically he admitted the new year and attended the departure of the old.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. Circumcision. A festival in the Catholic Church, established about the close of the 5th century, and adopted in the Church of England 1550.

6. Epiphany. Instituted 813 to commemorate the manifestation of the infant Saviour to the wise men of the East.

13. Plough Monday. Always follows the Epiphany. Its origin is involved in obscurity; but it is believed to be associated with the first use of the plough.

13. Hilary. St. Hilary was a pious father of the Christian Church. He was a native and alterwards bishop of Poictiers. He was banished by the Emperor Constantinius to Phrygia in 365, and died at Poictiers in 368.

17. St. Anthony. Observed in Italy and Spain as a particular festival. St. Anthony is the patron saint of Tailors.

18. Prisca. In 275 St. Prisca was beheaded by order of the Emperor Claudius, after having been, in vain, horribly tortured to make her abjure the Christian faith.

20. Fabian. St. Fabian was the niveteenth Bishop of Rome. He was chosen to that office in the year 241, and after being Bishop thirteen years suffered martyrdom in the Decian persecution. St. Fabian sent St. Dionysius and other preachers into Gaul to perpetuate the Christian doctrine.

#### NOTES OF THE MONTHS,

21. Agnes. St. Agnes was a young Roman maiden, who suffered martyrdom in the reign of Dioclesian, 303. In several parts of England females are accustomed to meet together on St. Agnes' Eve to perform certain ceremonies, by which it is imagined they will be enabled to dream of their future husbands.

25. Conversion of St. Paul. Conveys its own explanation.

25. Septuagesima Sunday. During the Pontificate of Gregory three Sundays of preparation were appointed prior to the first Sunday in Lent, which bore the name of Quadragesima, meaning fortieth.

30. Charles. Formerly a festival of the Church of England to perpetuate a remembrance of the beheading of King Charles I., termed in the Book of Common Prayer "Charles the Martyr."

#### FEBRUARY.

FEBRUARY was made the second of the twelve months by Numa Pompilius. Its name was derived either from Februa, a title which the Romans gave to the Feralia sacrifices; or more probably from Februs to purify, because this being originally held to be the last month of the year, the people offered an expiatory sacrifice for their twelve months' sin. The Feralia. or feast in honor of the Ghosts, was held on the 11th—the Lupercalia, in honor of Pan, the god of hunters, shepherds and country people, on the 15th—and the Terminalia, or feast in honor of the Terminus, the guardian of boundaries or landmarks, on the 22d or 23d of the month.

#### FESTIVALS,

2. Candlemas Day. A festival of the Catholic Church, and a holiday in that of England. It commemorates the attendance of the Virgin Mary in the temple, forty days atter the birth of the Saviour. There is an ancient superstitious notion, universal in Europe, that if Candlemas be a sunshiny day, the winter is not half finished. The Germans say—The badger peeps out of his hole on Candlemas Day, and if he finds snow he walks abroad; if he sees the sun shining he draws back again into his hole. It is an ancient custom in Scotland for scholars on this day to make presents of money to their masters.

5. St. Agatha. A female martyr, who was put to death by the order of Decius in 251. Her memory is supestitiously celebrated in Sicily.

14. St. Valentine. Was an ancient presbyter of the Church of Rome; and about the year 270. under Claudius II., was beheaded in the Via Flaminia. At Rome patron saints are chosen on this day.

24. St. Matthias the Apostle. A festival of the Church of England. St, Matthias was chosen by lot, after the crucifixion, in place of the traitor Judas.

25. Shrove Tuesday. The day previous to the commencement of Lent. It was formerly a great day for cock fighting; and in some districts a barbarous custom used to exist of tying a live cock to a stake and throwing sticks at it till it was killed. In Venice, Rome and other Catholic cities the carnival ceases on this day.

26. Ash Wednesday. The first day in Lent. Formerly the consecrated palm branches used on Palm Sunday in the preceding year were preserved and burnt on this day, and their ashes blessed and sprinkled by the priest over the heads of the people.

EMBER DAYS.—The Wednesday, Friday and Saturday which follow after the first Sunday in Lent are called Ember Days, and the week in which they occur Ember Week. On Ember Days our forefathers ate no bread but what was baked in a simple and primitive fashion under hot ashes; hence the name. The other Ember Days of the year are the Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays after the feast of Pentecost, Holyrood Day (September 14) and St. Lucia's Day (December 15).

#### MARCH.

MARCH, which with the ancients, ranked the first month of the year, was named in honor of Mars, the supposed father of the founder of Rome. Our anglo-saxon ancestors called in Lenet monath, that is. Lent or Spring month. Marriages in this month were seldom solemnized. as they were counted likely to become inharmonious and unhappy. March 15, or according to the Roman calendar, the Ides of March, was the Parricidium, the day on which Julius Cæsar was murdered in the senate house by Brutus and Cassius, with other conspiritors. The same day was also the feast of Anna Perenna, the sister of Dido, who fled into Italy to Æneas.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. St. David's Day. St David, the patron Saint of Welshmen, was Archbishop of Menevy. He was a man of considerable learning, and was reputed to possess the power of performing miracles. He died in 544, and was buried in the church of Saint Andrew; but his remains were aferwards removed to Glastonbury Abbey. On this day Welshmen wear a leek in their hats, a practice supposed to have originated from their countrymen in a great battle with the Saxons, fought in the adjacence of a leek field, having adopted that feather-formed vegetable as a military mark of distinction, by which they might distinguish each other from the enemy.

17. St. Patrick's Day. A grand festival of the Catholic Church; and on which every true Irishman considers it his bounden duty to make himself as happy as a Welshman does on the 1st of March. The Irish venerate St. Patrick as the introducer of

Christianity into Ireland. He is supposed to have been a Scotchman by birth, The shamrock. a species of three-leaved grass, is generally worn by the Irish on this day. The favor thus bestowed upon it, is said to have arisen from the Saint having used it as an instrument to explain the doctrine of the Trinity.

21st. Palm Sunday, Called in the English Prayer Book the Sunday next before Easter, also, sometimes called Passion Week, or the week celebrative of the sufferings or passion of our Lord.

25. The Annunciation of our Lady. This day is more familiarly known in England as Lady-Day. It is kept as a festival in the English church, in commemoration of the incarnation of Christ. In England it is one of the quarter days—on which rent and other dues are payable. The other quarter days are Midsummer day (June 24), Michaelmas day (Sept. 29), and Christmas day (December 25.)

26th. Good Friday. This day, as the anniversary of the Crucifixion, has been for ages solemnly observed throughout Christian Europe, the only exception being in Presbyterian countries such as Scotland.

#### MOVEABLE FESTIVALS.

Nearly the whole of the moveable feasts and holidays of the church, are determined by Easter Day, which is itself moveable, according to the following canonical regulations, viz: Easter Sunday always falls upon the first Sunday after the full moon after the 21st day of March. If the first full moon happens upon a Sunday, then the following Sunday is Easter Day. The first of these moveable feasts in the year is Septuagesima Sunday, and it takes place nine Sundays before Easter.

28th. Easter Day. Great Festival throughout Europe and all Christian countries, in celebration of the Resurrection

#### APRIL.

APRIL.—By the Saxons it was called Ostre monath, probably from the same word from which Easter is supposed to have been derived. The Dutch and Germans called it Grass month.

The name of this month is derived from the Latin word. Aperio, to open or disclose. The term applies to the opening of the year, or to the unfolding of the buds and flowers, by the influence of the genial warmth and moisture of spring. The reason why our months and many of our festivals, are to be ascribed to Roman designation and institutions, is the early footing which that people obtained in Britain, and the sanction that their customs received in consequence of the higher order of British youths being sent to Rome for education.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. All Fool's Day. This is a holiday, the origin of which cannot be traced, unless it be a travestie on All Saint's Day.

4. Ambrose. St. Ambrose was born about the year 340. He was son of the prætorian prefect of Gaul, and received his education in his father's palace. He composed the hymn of Te Deum, so well known in our Church, and he converted and baptized St. Augustine.

4th. Low Sunday. So termed from the church service beins somewhat abridged or lowered from the preceeding Sunday, Easter Day.

19. St. Alphage. A native of England, Alphage was first Abbot of Bath, then Bishop of Winchester, in the year 984, and, twelve years afterwards, Archbishop of Canterbury. After seven months' miserable imprisonment by the Danes, the good Archbishop was stoned to death at Greenwich.

23. St. George. St. George, the patron saint of England, a^S St. Patrick, St. David and St. Andrew, respectively, are of Ireland, Wales, and Scotland. He is said to have been born in Cappadocia, and was bred a soldier by profession. Having presumed to complain to the Emperor Dioclesian of his cruelties to the Christians, he was, in consequence, thrown into prison, and afterwards beheaded in the year 303. St. George is always représented on horseback spearing a dragon.

25. St. Mark. His gospel was written in the year 63. The order of Knights at Venice, taking his name, was instituted in the year 737. The custom of sitting and watching in the church porch on the eve of St. Mark, to see the ghosts of those who should die in the following year was kept up in some northern countries till very lately.

#### MAY.

MAX.—The Hebrews named this month of their calendar which is synonymous with the fifth of our own, Sivan, from a Sanscrit word, signifying "to rejoice." The Anglo-Saxons knew it as Tri-milchi, because their cows, stimulated by the fresh herbage, were so productive of milk as to enable the proprietors to bring them with advantage to the pail three times a day. The Romans offered sacrifices to Bona Dei or Maia on the first day of the month.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. *Philip and James.* Philip was born at Bethsaida; he was one of the first disciples and an apostle. James the less, called also James the Just, was the son of Joseph the carpenter, by a former wife, prior to his espousal with the Virgin Mary. St. Philip was stoned to death, and St. James thrown from a high

It has been celebrated from the earliest ages as a kind of nature's Lirthday, and notwithstanding the havoc which the march of science and the schoolmaster have made with the good old customs of our forefathers, it is probable that May Day will long continue its hold upon human affections.

2. Rogation Sunday. The fifth Sunday after Easter Day and the Sunday before Holy Thursday or the ascension of Jesus Christ. It was appropriated by the early Christians, with the three following days, as a period of preparation for the devout observation of our Saviour's ascension.

6. Holy Thursday. The Thursday in Rogation week, being the day on which our Saviour's ascension is commemorated. At the Reformation processions on this day were abolished.

6. St. John. Called the Evangelist, from bringing glad tidings. St. John lived to the age of 90, and died in the reign of Trajan. St. John. in his old age, during the persecution of Domitian, was sentenced to be thrown into a cauldron of boiling oil for preaching the Christian doctrine; but from which punishment he is said to have remained uninjured. This miraculous event occurred before the gate called Porta Latina, hence the letters A, P, L, being put after his name on this day.

16. Pentecost or Whit-Sunday. The seventh Sunday after Easter Day. It was on the feast of Pentecost (a great day of the Jews) that the Holy Ghost miracuously descended on the

apostles. 23. Trinity Sunday. Observed on the Sunday next after Whit-Sunday, in honor of the Holy Trinity. The observation of this festival was first enjoined in the Council of Arles, A.D. 1260.

26. Augustin. Commissioned by Pope Gregory to convert the Saxons. He was created Archbishop of Canterbury 596.

27. Corpus Christi. A festival of the Catholic Church, held on the Thursday after 'Trinity Sunday. It celebrates, as the name indicates, the doctrine of the transubstantiation, and is observed in Catholic countries with considerable ceremony.

27. Venerable Bede. Born on this day 673, at Yarrow, in Northumberland. His great work is the Ecclesiastical History of the Saxons. Bede has obtained the title of Venerable for his profound learning and unaffected piety, and Lot on account of any celebrity for any miraculous and angelic operations.

#### JUNE.

JUNE was the Thamur or Tamuz of the Hebrews, that is after their escape from the Babylonish captivity, for previously to that they had simply distinguished their months by aid of numeration. Thamur or Tamuz signifies continuance and perfection; alluding probably. to the almost uninterrupted daylight, maturation of fruit, etc., which occur during its continuance.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. Nicomede.--Was a pupil of St. Peter. and was discovered to be a Christian by his burying St. Felicula, a Martyr. in a very honourable manner. He was beaten to death with leaden plummets, on account of his religion in the reign of Domitian.

5. St. Boniface.—In 745 St. Boniface was created Bishop of Mentz. He was a Saxon presbyter, born in England and at first called Winifred; he was a friend and admirer of the Venerable Bede. While preaching Christianity at Utrecht he was set upon and barbarously murdered by the populace.

11. St. Barnabas.—His proper name was Joses; he was descended of the tribe of Levi, and born at Cyprus, but educated under Gamaliel at Jerusalem. He preached the Gospel with St. Paul in various countries for fourteen years. He suffered martyrdom at Salamis, his native isle, being stoned to death by the Jews.

17. St. Alban.-In 303 St. Alban suffered martyrdom; he was the first Christian martyr in England. He was converted to Christianity by Amphialus, a priest of Caerleon, Monmouthshire, who flying for protection from persecution was hospitably entertained by St. Alban at Verulam, in Hertfordshire, now called after his name St. Albans.

24. St. John the Baptist.—The nativity of St. John the Baptist, a holiday of the Church of England. He was imprisoned by Herod for preaching against his marriage with his brother's wife, and was afterwards beheaded by the arts of that enraged woman.

29. St. Peter's Day.—A high festival of the Catholic Church, and a holiday of the Church of England. It is celebrated at Rome with illuminations and magnificent ceremonials. In England, till a recent period, the bonfires and watchings of St. John's Eve were also customary on the eve of this festival. This is a great day at Rome. Among the most brilliant spectacles ever witnessed in modern times may be placed the splendid illumination cf St. Peter's Church and the magnificent girondola or fireworks from the Castle of St. Angelo.

#### JULY.

JULY, the fifth month of the Roman Calendar, received, in consequence, the name of Quintilis to denote its numerical position. It was sacred to Jupiter, and had in the Alban Calendar thirtysix days. Romulus took from it five days. Numa reduced it to

Our Saxon forefathers, who commonly named their months from certain appearances or events, denominated this month How monath, or Hey monath, since this was their hay harvest.

#### FESTIVALS.

3. This day commences what are termed Dog Days, which terminate on the 11th of August. The name was given in reference to the heliacal rising of Sirius, commonly called the dog star, which in Pliny's time was on the 18th of July. At Argos there was a festival expressly instituted for the killing of dogs during this season.

4. St. Ulric's Day.—On this day, in ancient Catholic times, the people brought fish to the altar to obtain the favor of St. Ulric, and one sat there selling the same back to the public for the benefit of the Church.

4. Translation of St. Martin Bullion.—Retained in the Church of England Calendar though not observed.

7. St. Thomas a Becket.—Commemorative of the assassination of this extraordinary man before the altar in Canterbury cathedral.

15. St. Swithin's Day .- Remarkable on account of a wellknown popular notion, that if it rain on this day, there will be more or less rain for forty days to come. St. Swithin lived about a thousand years ago. He was an eminently pious and learned bishop of Winchester and a priest to King Egbert. He was the deviser and originator of tithes in England. The story runs, that, being buried at his own request in the churchyard of the cathedral, the priests, a hundred years after, felt desirous of doing him greater honor, and commenced the work of translating his remains into the interior. This was on the 15th July. They were stopped in their work by a heavy fall of rain; neither could they resume their duty next day, for the heavy rain still con-tinued. In short this rain lasted forty days, by which time the priests became convinced that it was designed to stop them in a work which, though well meant on their part, was ill taken on that of the saint; and they gave up the point. Ever since then it has been held as a maxim that if there be rain on St. Swithin's day (the 15th of July) there will, as previously observed, be rain for the forty ensuing days.

20. St. Margaret's Day.—St. Margaret, an Italian virgin, was martyred in 278. The day has long ceased to be kept, although the name is still retained in the calendar.

25. St. James the Apostle.—The day has ceased to be observed. Formerly apples were blessed on St. James' Day by Catholic priests, and there was a popular belief that whoever eat oysters on this day, the first (old style) of their appearance in London, would not want money for the remainder of the year. The consequence, however, is no longer relied upon.

#### AUGUST.

AUGUST.—August derived its name frrm Augustus the Roman Emperor: it was called Sextilis, or the sixth month in the Alban Calendar, in which it had only twenty-eight days assigned to it. Romulus added two and Augustus a third, which number it has since retained. The Anglo-Saxons called it either Barn monath, alluding to this being the period when their barns were commonly filled, or Wood monath, clothing month, alluding to their fields being then clothed with corn, just as the Romans dedicated this month to Ceres, the goddess of harvest.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. Lammas Day .- Called also the Gule of August .- It is now only remarkable as a day of term for some purposes. It was probably one of the great festival days of our heathen ancestors and it is worthy of observation that it occurs exactly three months after another of these, Beltane. Cormace, Bishop of Cashel in the tenth century, records that in his time four great fires were lighted up on the four great festivals of the Druids, namely in February, May, August, and November; probably Beltane and Lammas were two of these. Lammas seems to have been held as a day of thanksgiving for the new fruits of the earth. It was observed with bread of new wheat; and there was a custom in some places, at no distant period, for tenants to be bound to bring in wheat of the new crop to their lord on or before this day. The most rational explanation of the word is that which derives it from the Saxons, [Half mass.) (loaf mass or loaf festival), the f being in time softened away on account of the difficulty pronouncing it before m. The Gule of August is probably from the Celtic Cul or Gul (a festival anniversary.)

6. Transfiguration.-Instituted by Pope Calixtus. in commemoration of Christ's transfiguration on the mount. It was observed with great solemnity by the primitive Christians.

7. Name of Jesus.—A festival of the primitive Roman Church; first dedicated to Alfra, afterwards to Donatus.

10. St. Lawrence.—Assassinated by the soldiers of the Emperor Valerian, and his body roasted on a gridiron. The church of the Escurial at Rome, dedicated to him, is built in the form of a gridiron. St. Lawrence is the tutelary saint of the Spaniards. In the reign of Constantine the Great a church was built over his tomb on the road to Tibur. It is one of the five patriarchal churches in Rome.

15. The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin.—A grand festiva of the Catholic Church, and a day noted in the calendar of th1 Church of England. It was instituted in 813, to celebrate the

ascension of the Virgin into Heaven. In Catholic countries this day is marked by ceremonies and processions.

24. St. Bartholomew's Day.—A holiday of the Church of England. St. Bartholomew was an apostle, but there is no scriptural account of his labours or death. The legend of the Catholic Church represents him as preaching in the Indies, and concluding his life by being flayed alive by order of a brother of the king of Armenia. In memory of his death it was customary at our monastic institutions, in the middle ages, to distribute small knives amongst the people.

#### SEPTEMBER.

In the Latin and Roman Calendar this was the seventh month; and hence its name, for Septem, seven, Imber, a shower of rain, this being the commencement of the rainy season. It had only sixteen days assigned to it in the Alban Calendar; these were increased to thirty by Romulus, to thirty-one by Julius Cæsar, but Augustus reduced it to its present number. The ancient Saxons called it Berst monath, or Barley month.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. St. Giles's Day.—St. Giles was a native of Greece and became Abbot of Nismas in 715. He literally obeyed the Scriptural injunction by selling his patrimony for the benefit of the poor, and on one occasion gave his coat to a sick mendicant. who was cured miraculously by putting it on. St. Giles has thus become the patron saint of beggars and cripples. St. Giles's Church, Cripplegate, Londor, and the High Church in Edinburgh are dedicated to him; and he is the patron saint of the Scottish capital, as far as it can be said to have one.

8. The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin.—A grand festival of the Catholic Church; and still retained in the Church of England calendar. This festival has been held in honor of the Virgin with masses, homilies, collects, processions, and other ceremonies for upwards of a thousand years. According to the Catholic writers a religious contemplative every year upon the 8th of September heard most sweet music in Heaven with great rejoicing of angels. Once he asked one of them the cause, and was told that upon that day was celebrated in Heaven the nativity of the mother of God. The birthday of the Virgin being thus miraculously communicated to mankind, Pope Servius instituted this festival.

14. Holy Cross, or Holy Rood Day, the day of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross.—A festival of the Catholic Church still retained in the Church of England calendar. It celebrates the miraculous appearance of a cross in the heavens to the Emperor Constantine. The Wednesday, Friday and Saturday after Holy Rood Day are Ember Days, and the week in which they occur consequently an Ember Week. HAR

## NOTES OF THE MONTHS.

21. St. Matthew the Apostle.- A festival of the Church of England, and still observed.

29. Michaelmas Day.—A grand festival of the Catholic and English Churches, established 487 in honor of St. Michael and all the holy angels. St. Michael is singled out for peculiar mention as being the chief of angels or archangels. It is an ancient and extensively prevalent custom to have a goose for dinner on Michaelmas Day. Very curious and recondite origins have been assigned to this custom; but it seems to have arisen simply from the goose being at its best immediately after it has had the range of the reaped harvest fields. The theological character of Michael is obscure. Suffice it here to quote the remark of Wheatley, in his exposition of the Book of Common Prayer, "that the feast of St. Michael and all Angels is observed that the people may know what benefits are derived from the ministry of angels.

#### OCTOBER.

OCTOBER was called by our Saxon forefathers Wyn monath or Wine month. and sometimes Winterfylleth, from the approach of Winter. It was the eighth month of the Alban Calendar, in which it had thirty-nine days. Its name is derived from the Latin, Octo, eight, and Imber, a shower of rain. Romulus reduced it to thirty-one days; Numa, to twenty-nine. Julius and Augustus each added one, and this number has not since been altered.

#### FESTIVALS.

6. St. Faith.  $-\Lambda$  female martyr; tortured by the tyrant Dacian.

9. St. Denis.—The Patron Saint of France. St. Denis was put to death with some companions in the year 272, upon an eminence near Paris, since called, from the circumstance, Montmartre. (Mons Martyrum.) According to the legend, his head had no sooner been cut off than the body rose, and taking up the head walked with it two miles.

13. Edward.-Edward. King and Confessor, the founder of Westminister Abbey. He was the first Monarch who touched for the King's Evil.

18. St. Luke, the Evangelist.—A festival of the Church of Engand. This day was appointed to be St. Luke's festival, in the twelfth century.

23. St. Crispin and Crispinian. The name of St. Crispin is in the Church of England calendar. Crispin and Crispinian are said to have been two Roman youths of good birth, brothers, who, in the third century, went as Christian missionaries to France, and preached for some time at Soissons. In imitation of St. Paul, they supported themselves by working at the trade

of the shoemaker by night, while they preached during the day. They were successful in converting the people to Christianity until arrested in their course by Ricitus Varias, Governor under the Emperor Maximilan Herculcus. Butler, in his lives of the Saints says, "they were victorious over this most inhuman judge by the patience and constancy with which they bore the most cruel torments, and finished their course by the sword about the year 257." The two young martyrs were of course canonized, and a splendid church was built in their honour at Soissons, in the sixth century. The shoemaker craf throughout the whole Christian world from an early period regarded Crispin and Crispinian as their patron saints, but particu larly the first. They often celebrated the day set apart for these saints in the calendar with processions, in which Crispin, Crispinian, an Indian prince, and some other personages, whom tradition has associated with their history, are represented in splendid antique dresses. Sometimes a coronation is part of this ceremony, for their is a notion that he was a royal personage, and hence we find the shoemakers, in Scotland at least, assuming for their arms a leather knife surmounted by a crown, and styling themselves the royal craft.

28. St. Simon and St. Jude. a festival of the English Church. Simon. usually surnamed the Cananite, remained with the other apostles till after the Pentecost. It has been surmised that he visited Britain and there suffered martyrdom.

#### NOVEMBER.

The early Saxon inhabitants of England called this Blott monath or slaughter month, because, in those primitive days, winter food was so scarce in England that it was usual to kill and salt the greater part of their winter meat in this month; they also called it Wind monath, or Wind month, from the tempestuous weather with which it is commonly accompanied.

#### FESTIVALS.

1. All Saints.—There are many old customs associated with this day, which, in addition to its ceremonies, is sacred to Scotland by Burns' poem of Halloween.

land by Burns' poem of Halloween. 2. All Souls' Day, in commemoration of the Faithful Departed. A very solemn festival of the Catholic Church, which has masses and ceremonies appropriate to the occasion, designed in favor of the souls of all the dead.

5. The Anniversary of the Discovery of the Gunpowder Plot in 1605, and of the landing of King William III. in 1688. Used to be observed in the British Dominions as a holiday, but the day is chiefly noted by the triumph of school boys over the effigy of Guy Fawkes.

## NOTES OF THE MONTHS.

11. St Martin's Day, or Martinmas.—Popularly this is one of the most remarkable days of the year, especially in Scotland, where Whitsuntide and Martinmas are the two great terms for leases and engagement of servants; the latter being that at which the occupation of farms usually commences. Martin is said to have ben born in Lower Hungary about 316, and to have originally been a soldier. After a number of miraculous adventures he settled as a hermit in the hollow of a rock near Tours, in the South of France, where he was greatly venerated. He died Bishep of Tours in 897. When a few fine days occurred about this time of the year they were called St. Martin's summer.

13. St. Brice.-Bishop of Tours. Died 444. He was not a saint of any great mark.

15. Machutus-otherwise Maclovius.--Bishop of St. Maloes, in France, A. D. 500.

20. Edmund, King of the East Angles, -Murdered by Danes in the invasion of 870.

22. St. Cecilia.—Suffered martyrdom in the reign of Alexander Severus. St. Cecilia is regarded as patroness of church music.

23. St. Clement. - Clement is spoken of by St. Paul as one of his fellow laborers. He is said to have been thrown into the sea with an anchor fixed about his neck. St. Clement is held as the patron saint of the blacksmiths.

25. St. Catherine.—Condemned to suffer death by order of the Emperor Maximinus on a spiked engine made of four wheels—hence the "Catherine wheel." It is alleged that at the first stirring of the terrrible engine the cords broke asunder by the invincible power of an angel and, the engine falling to pieces, she was delivered.

28. Advent (literally the coming) is a term applied from an early period of ecclesiastical history to the four weeks preceding Christmas, which were observed with penance and devotion, in reference to the approaching birth of Christ. There are four Sundays in Advent, the first of which is always the nearest Sunday to St. Andrew's Day. November 30).

#### DECEMBER.

DECEMBER.—The month of December so named by the Romans from being the tenth. or last month into which they divided the year, has been denominated by the Saxons Winter monath. but after Christianity, they piously gave it the name of holy month, or High monath.

6. St. Nicholas.—Retained in the Church of England Calendar. St. Nicholas was Archbishop of Myra, in Greece, A. D. 302. He

is regarded as the patron saint of children and marinera, probably in consequence of his benevolent zeal in the protection of orphans and stranded seamen. Churches built near the sea are, in many instances, dedicated to St. Nicholas.

8. Conception.—A Catholic festival in rememberance of the Virgin Mary being born purified from original sin.

13. St. Lucia.—Retained in the Church of England Calendar-St. Lucia was a young lady of Syracuse, who retained a high character for a devout and charitable life, and died in the year 304 The last of the four series of Ember Days commences on Wednesday following.

16. O. Sapientia, so marked in Church Calendar. from an anthem sung on this day in the Catholic Church, bgginning, "O Sapientia."

21. St. Thomas. -A festival of the English Church. It was customary in England to go a-gooding on St. Thomas's day; that is they went about begging money, and presenting in return sprigs of palm and bunches of primroses, probably with a view to the decoration of their houses against Christmas.

25. Christmas Day. -Observed from an early period as the nativity of our Lord, and celebrated not only by the religious ceremonies from which the name of the day is taken, but by popular festivities of the most joyful kind. In England, Christmas Day is kept by the Church as a solemn festival, and is distinguished by the complete cessation of business—an honour paid to no other day besides Sunday and Good Friday. In many country places the celebration of Christmas begins in the latter part of the previous day—Christmas Eve. The house is first decked with holly, ivy, and other evergreens, and an enormous log, called the Yule Log, or Christmas Block. laid upon the fire. In the course of the night, small parties of song-sters go about singing what are called Christmas Carols.

27. St. John the Evangelist.-Observed by the Church of England, because John drank poison without dying. In consequence, it was supposed that those who put their trust in him were safe from all injury from that cause.

28. Childermas, or Holy Innocents' Day — Observed by the Catholic Church with masses for the children killed by Herod. It was considered unlucky to marry, or to begin any work, on Childermas-day. The learned Gregory says "It hath been a custom, and yet is elsewhere, to well whip the children on Innocents' day morning, that the memory of Herod's murder might stick the closer, and in moderate proportion to act over the cruelties again in kind."

## COUNTY COURTS.

## JURISDICTION OF COUNTY COURTS.

The County Courts have not power to try any of the following actions, namely:

First—Detinue, replevin. ejectment, or any action where the title of land is brought in question. Or, Second – Actions in which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation, is disputed. Or Third, Criminal conversation or seduction. Or, Fourth—Breach of promise of marriage. Or, Fifth—Actions against an executor or administrator, but executors or administrators may bring actions in the said Courts. Or, Sixth— Actions against any Justice of the Peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office. Or, Seventh—Actions upon a Judgment in the Supreme Court.—(See Section 16, County Courts' Amendment Act.)

The County Courts have jurisdiction in all eivil actions both of debts and contracts, wrongs and damages, where the debt of damages claimed, whether on balance of account or otherwise, do not exceed one hundred and fifty dollars, and on all claims on Bail Bonds or on other Bonds, given under the County Courts' Act, or any Act in amendment thereof, whatever may be the amount sought to be recovered, and in all actions recoverable under any Provincial Statute, where the remedy provided by such statute is by suit before any Court of Commissioners for the recovery of Small Debts.—(See Section 17 County Courts' Amendment Act.)

Where the debt or demand claimed is a balance not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars, after an admitted payment, or set off of any debt or demand, claimed or recoverable by the defendant from the plaintiff, the Court shall have jurisdiction to try such action. (See section 18 County Courts' Amendment Act.

The plaintiff, in any County Court, cannot divide any cause or action arising out of a debt or contract, for the purpose of bringing two or more actions; but any plaintiff having cause of action, arising out of a debt or contract, may abandon the excess and can, on proving his case, recover to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars; and the judgment of the Court in such cases, shall be in full of all demands in respect of such cause of action. Provided that when any plaintiff shall have cause of action against a defendant for goods sold and delivered, and at the same time be the holder of promissory notes, made by such defendent and due and payable to the plaintiff, the plaintiff may sue for the amount of his claim tor goods sold and delivered, without being required to sue at the same time upon such promissory notes, or that he may sue for such promissory notes, without being required to sue at the same time for the amount of his account for goods sold and delivered. section 20 County Courts' Amendment Act.) BANKRUPTCY JURISDICTION .- The jurisdiction in matters of Insolvency is vested in the County Courts under the Insolvent Act of 1875 and Amending Acts. Under these Acts a Writ of Attachment may be issued out of the County Court against a trader who has committed any of the Acts of Insolvency set forth in the 2rd section of the Insolvent Act of 1875, at the instance of any unsecured creditor whose debt amounts to \$200 and upwards. The Insolvent Act of 1875 also provides that the estate of any trader may be put into Insolvency by means of a written demand on him at the instance of any one or more of his creditors for unsecured claims of not less than \$100 each, and amounting in the aggregate to \$500, requiring him to make an assignment for the benefit of his creditors. 

Letters as aforesaid posted in Canada, and addressed to places in Canada, when weighing more than half an ounce, and liable therefore to two or more rates of postage, will be transmitted by mail to destination, though not fully prepaid, if as much as one full rate of three cents has been prepaid thereon by postage stamp; and in such cases will be forwarded charged with double the amount of deficient postage not prepaid: Thus, if such a letter weighing more than 1/2 oz., and not exceeding 1 oz. in weight, be posted prepaid 3 cents only, it will be rated 6 cents unpaid—" more to pay"—and forwarded to its address.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it com monly known as "drop letters," the rate is 1 cent per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz., to be in all cases prepaid by postage stamp affixed to such letters when posted.

The charge for the Registration of a letter is 2 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

## CANADA AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

Letters for Newfoundland are charged at the rate of five cents per half ounce, and must in all cases be prepaid.

The Registration fee to Newfoundland is the same as to places within the Dominion, viz. 2 cents, to be prepaid by Registration statup.

CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES.

The rate of postage upon letters passing by mail between Canada and the United States is the same as to places within the Dominion, and must in all cases be prepaid by postage stamp.

The Registration fee to the United States is 5 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

### RATES OF POSTAGE.

Transient newspapers and periodicals addressed to Great Britain must be prepaid by postage stamp, Two cents per 4 ozs. each packet.

Parcel post to places in Canada, for each parcel weighing not more than 4 ozs. Six cents; over 4 and not exceeding 8 ozs., 12 cents; each additional 4 ozs. or fraction, Six cents.

Parcels intended to pass through the mails should not exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or twenty-four inches in length, or twelve inches in breadth, and should be marked "by *Parcel Post.*" Parcels may be Registered by affixing a 5 cent Registered Letter Stamp thereto, in addition to the Postage.

#### MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.

Books and Pamplets, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, etc.

#### CANADA AND UNITED STATES.

When posted addressed to any place in Canada or the United States, and not exceeding 5 lbs. in weight, 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in breadth or depth, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces in weight, and must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Such books, papers, returns etc., must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions. Bank notices, advices of goods in transit, and personal notices are liable to letter rate because intended for the information of a particular person. Post Bands with an impressed one cent stamp for this purpose, may be obtained at the rate of 4 or 5 cents.

### PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

### CANADA.

Patterns and Samples of merchandize, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of *One Cent* per 4 ounces, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an Order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by any private individual to another, which are not actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissable.

#### UNITED STATES.

Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, posted for places in the United States will continue to be subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, prepaid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.
