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CHARITY OF A SPANISH PRIEST.

A correspondent of the "New Orleans Picayune," writing from Puerto Rico, speaks of the charity of a Spanish priest on the island as follows:

"A striking case of self-abnegation and Christian charity was related to me as occurring at Arcebo, P. R. Father Barrios is the parish priest there. In his parish are very many poor people. The good father holds a levee twice a week for the poor people of his parish, when they assemble in large numbers in front of his church door to receive such alms as he may give them; Father Barrios having supplied himself with small change gives it out to them until the last cent is gone, when he retires and the crowd disperses. He has been known to give the clothes off his back to supply a poor, ragged being. He has also been known to take a book from his library and give it to a beggar, telling him to whom to go and dispose of it for a little money. Father Barrios lives in a little room in the rear of his church in order to save expenses, and of the \$100 per month allowance he gets he is said to give at least 70 per cent to the cause of charity. He is very uncontentious in his good works in this direction and is universally beloved by every one in his parish."

A RECORD FOR JOHN FLANAGAN.
