

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### Goods Roads Money

The Ontario Government will introduce an important change in the system of granting aid to Provincial County Councils for the work of making good roads. Under the former Good Roads Act the sum of \$1,000,000 was apportioned for the purpose, to be distributed among the different counties in proportion to their population. Under a new Act, introduced by Hon. Dr. Reaume, the Government agrees to pay one-third of the cost of effecting good roads in various counties, the plans for which have been approved by the Governor-General-in-Council. The time limit within which counties are allowed to submit their application is extended for one year.

RUSSIAN NEWSPAPERS TALK OF PEACE TERMS.

If Indemnity is Too High it Will Pay Russia to Continue the War.

Delcasse Failed in Effort to Link France With Britain and Russia.

Small Body of Russians Repulsed and Made to Flee in Confusion.

A St. Petersburg cable: There is a significant change in tone on the part of some of the Russian newspapers...

"Even the revolutionists" the Russ adds, "are not traitors. They are fighting the present rotten bureaucracy..."

Universal regret is expressed in official circles at the retirement of M. Delcasse, until recently French Minister for Foreign Affairs.

"We know how to appreciate true friends. We have some of them."

The Russ and the Slovo consider M. Delcasse to be the victim of trying to play the impossible role of connecting link between two rivals—Russia and Great Britain.

A Russian Repulse.

Tokio, cable despatch says: Imperial army headquarters give out following: "At 11:30 o'clock on the morning of June 7th, a body of Russians, some 100 strong advanced from the direction of Sumiatso, about a mile and a quarter east of Ain-yipienmen, but were met and repulsed by us on an eminence lying north of that place."

MORE SKIRMISHING.

Tokio Reports the Repulse of More Russian Attacks.

A Tokio cable despatch: Army headquarters have given out the following: "A detachment of our forces which advanced from Lian-shichuan two miles east of Chenchangtsu, dislodging one company of foot and fifty horse of the enemy, holding the hills north of that place, and at three o'clock on the morning of June 7 occupied an eminence east of Chenchangtsu and four miles northeast of Chenchangtsu."

"At 6 o'clock on the same morning the enemy attempted an attack of Soufang-tao, ten miles north of Changtu, and on Taotun, five miles northwest of Changtu, and on Shih-tai, two miles north of Taotun. All attacks were repulsed."

THANKS FROM CZAR.

Rojevstsky Praised for His Bravery in the Fight.

A St. Petersburg cable despatch says: Emperor Nicholas has cabled the following message to Admiral Rojevstsky: "From my heart I thank you and all the officers of the squadron who have honorably done their duty for your unflinching work for the Fatherland."

DESERT SHEEP HERDERS.

Their Lonely, Drear Life Tends to Drive Them Crazy. Do you realize what it means to watch 5,000 sheep alone in the desert? You have read weird, gruesome stories of the horror of the solitary lighthouse keeper's life, but compared to the days of the Mexican shepherd those of the average keeper of the light are filled with gaiety and noise. Even with their one or two dogs the shepherds often go insane, and were it not for the company of their shaggy collies the lunacy among them would rise to an almost incredible percentage, if we are to believe those who have followed the sheep in the desert and therefore may be supposed to know. Once in old Santa Fe, N. M., I met a man who for twelve years had followed the sheep. His work was done. All day long he sat in a chair in the rear of a little dobe store, crouched over, gibbering to himself, bleating—an idiot. He still saw his sheep away like a great white wave among the sage-brush, and ever in his ears sounded the killing monotone of their bleats. One boy, though fifteen years of age, is mentally no further advanced than the average child of five. His father is a shepherd, his mother died when he was four years old, and his father took him out upon the range. All his life has been spent among the sheep. He is one with them today.

Northward, Ho!

The Iron Horse has made another advance into the cold regions of the north. On Saturday last for the first time the shores of Ontario and Huron were made resound by the shrill blast of the same locomotive. The morning sun shone out clear and cold as we moved off from the Bay street station, the thin air permitting a distinct view of the opposite shores of the lake. We soon reached Bell Bay, on the shores of Lake Simcoe, which, though yesterday reclaimed from the wilderness, is a place fast assuming the appearance of civilization and active business. In a short time we found ourselves at Barrie station, and here we must confess we were disappointed. Having never seen Barrie before except on paper, we had formed in our mind a picture, whose truthfulness the reality was far from bearing out. We were told, however, to suspend our judgment until we had seen it in summer, when its beauties are marvelous, and we took the hint. The road being in good order, we made up for the loss of time, running through the sandy plains of Sunnidale and other townships at a rate which would have astonished the primitive owners of the soil had any of them remained to witness the exciting scene. The only clearing we noticed on this part of the road is one which, we were told, is the nucleus of a youthful colony planted by the enterprising firm of Messrs. Jacques & Hay, who are about to erect a mill. Owing to the heavy snow which had fallen the previous winter, the workmen had been prevented from laying down the ties and rails on a short portion of the road, so that we had to dismount and traverse the remainder (to Collingwood) on foot. We all returned in safety, thanks to Mr. A. Brunel, after a very pleasant trip—a trip not intended as a formal opening of the road, but simply with the view of inspecting the line, which will not be practically in use until about new year. (The road, then called the Ontario, Simcoe & Huron Railroad, is now part of the northern division of the Grand Trunk. Mr. Brunel was the superintendent.)—From The Globe, of Dec. 5, 1854.

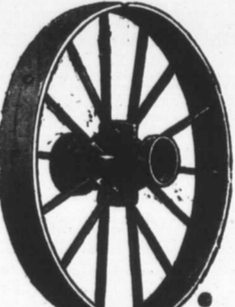

Day after day his eyes beheld only a brilliant turquoise sky, in which hangs a sun of brass; an ocean sweep of sage flecked sand and a slowly moving, compact mass of sheep. His ears hear no sound save the steady "Baa, baa" day and night, affecting him as the Chinese criminal of ancient days was affected by the regular tap, tap of a hidden drum.

And yet so long as the desert continues to provide food for the "bleaters" so long will shepherds go mad among the flocks, and for ten years the desert's greatest value to man has been the food it has offered the sheep, nor yet is the store depleted.—Pilgrim.

The regular meeting of the municipal council was held in the Council Chamber on Monday evening and transacted general business.

#### Township Roads

What Judge Meredith considered an important point in the law regarding the liability of municipalities to keep their roadways in a safe condition, was decided by him at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, in a suit against the townships of Minto and Normandy. The question was whether on raising the level of a road by means of an embankment, the municipality is bound to protect it by a guard rail, and on failing to do so, is liable in damages. Judge Meredith holds that it is so liable and assesses \$1,500 damages against the two townships for failing to provide the guard. The plaintiffs in the case are Albert Plant, a farmer, of Egremont township, and his wife. While driving this spring their horse bolted and took them over the embankment on a road on the line between the two defendant townships.

#### Spraying Potatoes

The American Agriculturist, in speaking of an experiment carried on last season by Vermont Experiment Station in the spraying of potatoes to prevent rot, says that in the Station's experience 8 per cent. of the crop on the sprayed area was rotted, while 80 per cent. of that grown in the unsprayed area was lost by rot. The net gain was 261 bushels per acre, as a result of spraying with bordeaux. The spraying was done August 9th and September 5th, with bordeaux-paris green mixture (six pounds copper sulphate, four pounds stone lime, 1-2 pounds of paris green, 40 gallons water); one-third was sprayed solely with paris green. The late blight (which directly or indirectly causes most of the loss from the rot of the tubers), was first seen on unsprayed potatoes August 21st. It spread very slowly, but, when the tops were killed by frost September 23rd, fully 90 per cent. of the foliage on the unsprayed rows was dead, being mostly killed by this disease. No late blight could be found at this time on the sprayed rows where fully 90 per cent. of the leaves were alive.

#### Control of Automobiles

The automobile people of Great Britain have done something which the motor drivers in Ontario might copy with advantage. The secretary of the British Auto Association has offered a standing reward of £100 for the identification of drivers of cars who cause injury to other road users, and then run away to escape the consequences. Auto drivers here have it in their own power to slay the feeling which has been aroused against them, and by applying the above suggestion one means can be found to this end. In the United States automobile drivers have gone to still greater extremes than they have here. One case is reported by the New York Tribune, in which a man actually had his machine geared so that it could not run at less than 25 miles an hour, even through the crowded thoroughfares. In another case a scorchler refused to submit to arrest, insolently declaring that he was employed by a millionaire, and would not stop for anyone. As a result of a number of similar cases the Tribune declares there should be more strenuous dealing with these impudent scorchers. Imprisonment, it says, would be a more fitting penalty than a mere fine.

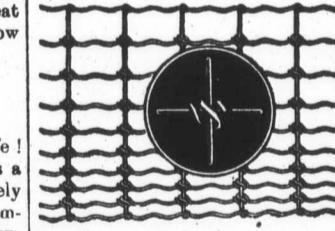

Standard Apple Box

Fruit growers and box makers should bear in mind the amendment to the Act regulating the size of fruit packages recently passed, legalizing a minimum standard box. This box has a minimum volume of 10 1/2 cubic inches in measurement. There is no specification as to the thickness of the material other than that it should be strong and seasoned wood. It is recommended, however, that the ends should be at least 1 1/2 inches thick and the sides at least three-eighths of an inch thick, and there should be no objectionable odor to the wood.
