he would have liked at times to have the courage to leave it there. Editorial Notes.

The ACADIAN wishes all its readers a bright and prosperous New Year.

What about the Board of Trade? Everybody is talking about it, why don't somebody act? Such an institution would be of immense value to the town.

A quantity of matter prepared for this issue has been unavoidably crowded out. Contributors will please have their matter in as early in the week as possible.

We commend to the attention of parents a letter elsewhere in this issue on the cigarette habit. The ACADIAN has referred to the matter before. The letter is timely and we trust may set some of our people thinking.

In another column we present the first half of a very full report of the late meeting of the Teachers' Institute at Hantsport. It will be completed next week. It occupies considerable space, but the subject is of sufficient interest to warrant it.

In the letter of Mr. A. L. Davison in last issue an error in composition made the word "delicited" "illicit." The mistake was such a glaring one as to be patent to the casual reader, but we make the explanation to set our correspondent right with the public.

Frequent complaint is made that the Dominion Atlantic railway does not make sufficient provision for an increase in accommodation to provide for the increase in travel on account of excursion rates. When the management offers special inducements to the public to patronize their road they should have faith enough to believe that their offer will be accepted. On Christmas day the cars were crowded as usual. An extra car or two would provide seating for the increase number of passengers and add to the comfort of patrons of the road.

The news that Wolfville is to have a new summer hotel on an elaborate plan will be received with pleasure by our people. It is reported that a strong company to be known as the Nova Scotia Hotel and Improvement Co., has been formed and that a hotel on a grand scale is to be erected at Wolfville in time for the 1898 tourist season. The site selected is on Highland avenue where a lot of 8 1/2 acres has been secured. Cost of construction is placed at \$25,500, with taxes, salaries, advertising, food for 100 guests, one season, etc., at \$8,700 more. The net revenue is estimated at \$11,550. We trust that the news is not too good to be true.

A Timely Warning.

DEAR ACADIAN—I wish to call the attention of your readers to a giant evil abroad in your fair town. I refer to the Cigarette Fiend.

I notice as I walk your streets, your homes are fair and lovely, your school buildings are a credit to the town, and no doubt you have a good and efficient staff of teachers. I gather from these as well as other signs you have the well-being of your children at heart. But, parents, I wish I could shout in your ears, a thief is stealing your boys, making wrecks of them mentally, morally and physically, while still in their boyhood.

Sir,—Circumstances connected with my recent visit to your town render it desirable to make clear certain facts bearing thereon. I refer to the paragraph which appeared in the Annapolis Spectator of the 10th inst., conveying the utterly baseless announcement that my visit was at the request of the Wolfville Town Council, the members of which body, having seen my report on Annapolis Sewerage, desired to see me as to the advisability of similar measures for Wolfville.

I made every endeavor, during the remainder of my otherwise most agreeable sojourn in Nova Scotia, to obtain an apology, in terms satisfactory to all the interests concerned, from the parties responsible for this unmitigated outrage. I have continued my efforts in that direction since my return home, not only without result, but without eliciting as much as an acknowledgment of a letter, dated 18th inst., laying the whole of the circumstances before the proprietors of the Company which professes to control the Spectator and its editor.

Under these circumstances, and as the matter affects the interests of prominent Wolfville residents, I solicit the use of your columns for the purpose of publishing the letter written to Mr. John B. Mills, M. P., immediately after my return from Wolfville to Annapolis. This gives a sufficiently comprehensive statement of the facts, and ought, in the opinion of those to whom it has been submitted, to have rendered all further correspondence unnecessary.

As it has not had this effect, I adopt the present as the first step towards fulfilling my own obvious obligations in a matter which has caused me infinite annoyance, and in which, through no act or omission on my part, many estimable people have been gratuitously involved.

DEAR SIR,—The Spectator of yesterday's date contains a statement to the effect that I had gone to Wolfville, on Thursday, at the request of the Wolfville Town Council, in order to confer with that body as to the sewerage of the collegiate town.

This is not only absolutely untrue, so far as the reference to the Town Council is concerned, but is in direct contradiction to what I myself told your Mr. W. M. Alcorn on his informing me, last Wednesday, that he had written a "general" notice on the subject of my intended visit. That visit was made upon the invitation and as the guest of a Wolfville resident and former correspondent, wholly unconnected with the Town Council, and the appearance of the Spectator paragraph, freely distorted and canvassed in Wolfville on the evening of its publication, has not only placed me in a most invidious position but may not improbably entail far-reaching consequences of a still more serious character, due to antecedent circumstances connected with local sentiment on the sewerage question.

Having pledged myself to a public disclaimer as to the origin of this most unwarrantable interference with private affairs, and as a public disclaimer, I now call your attention to the paragraph in question, and in clearing the members of the Wolfville Town Council from any imputations arising from their alleged participation in a purely personal and un-official visit to a neighboring town.

As a matter of comparatively insignificant import, but as illustrating the notorious inaccuracy of assertion and flippancy of comment which have given rise to this unfortunate episode, I may refer to the nineteen-line report, in the same issue of the Spectator, of the Annapolis town meeting held on the 24th inst. It is therein stated that I strongly advocated sewerage, and that Mr. R. J. Uppack and others were very strong against the idea.

Both these statements are false. My functions at the meeting were limited to reading a letter addressed to the Mayor on the question of available water-power, not for sewerage, but for electric lighting, and to answering three questions put by the town council's consulting engineer, on points connected with my scheme of sewerage for the town. I confined myself strictly to these questions, and nothing which I said at the meeting could in any tortuous language be construed as advocacy, or the reverse. In the same way, Mr. Uppack's remarks were directed solely to the general questions of expediency and practicability involved in the electric lighting proposal, and the only comment which might be regarded as in depreciation of sewerage was made by Mr. James Corbett, who expressed some reliance upon existing private drains in and across certain streets named by him.

I exceedingly regret the necessity imposed upon me of calling your attention to these glaring instances of negligence and inaccuracy in the conduct of a newspaper published under your auspices. I feel, however, that my own interests demand a prompt, authoritative, and effective explanation of the Wolfville matter, and that the interests of others may possibly be safeguarded, in the future, by the greater degree of care which it is not unreasonable to hope may be devoted to ensuring the strict accuracy of news items bearing upon personal concerns.

Teachers' Institute.

The Teachers' Institute for District No. 5—Kings and Hants—was held in Hantsport on Wednesday and Thursday, December 22d and 23d, instant. One hundred teachers were in attendance. Prof. A. G. MacDonald, of the Normal School, Alexander McKay, Esq., Supervisor of the public schools in Halifax, and Prof. I. B. Oaks, Principal of Horton Academy, were present during all the sessions and contributed much to the success of the meetings. Besides these the Mayor of Hantsport, the town clergymen, and some of the other citizens, were present part of the time.

The first meeting was called to order by the President, Inspector Roscoe, at 10 a. m. After the enrollment of teachers and the appointment of Mr. Ernest Robinson to assist Principal Smith, as secretary, Principal N. J. Lockhart read a well prepared address of welcome to the Institute, in which he, in concise and impressive language, made all feel that it was well they came, and that the Hantsport teachers and the town's people were glad to receive those engaged in the noble work of teaching. The President replied, thanking Mr. Lockhart for the address of welcome and assuring him that the Institute most heartily accepted all the privileges thus offered. He expressed his pleasure in meeting so many of the teachers of his district at these meetings, thus showing their desire to improve every opportunity to better fit them for their work. He gave a very hearty welcome to our guests, Prof. MacDonald and Supervisor McKay. At this point a letter was read from Dr. McKay, Superintendent of Education, extending his best wishes for a merry Christmas and a happy New Year to all members of the Institute, with his regrets that he could not be present on account of a prior engagement to be at the same time with a more distant Institute, in a new locality, Tatamagouche.

The first paper was on "Time-tables," and was prepared by Mr. J. S. Layton, Principal of Maitland High School. In his absence and at the request of the President, Miss Elyberta Marchant read the paper. The paper set forth very clearly the necessity for carefully prepared time-tables as a means of securing the best, as well as the most work. The writer criticized the time-tables published in the Journal of Education. This admirable paper was discussed by Principals Robinson, of Berwick, and Smith, of Windsor, who regarded it a difficult matter to prepare a time-table for a whole year, for high schools. Prof. MacDonald thought it important to have a practical, workable time-table for the miscellaneous schools. He outlined one that had proved effective in one part of the United States. This made three divisions of the school life in common schools, viz: First, the initiation period, second, the observation period, and third, the thought period.

Supervisor McKay required time-tables posted in all his schools. He emphasized this view. The next paper on "A Review of the Superannuation Scheme for the Betterment of the Teachers of Nova Scotia," was read by Mr. John N. Sturk. He condemned the scheme presented at the Provincial Association, at Truro, but was in favor of the principle of superannuation on terms just to all. At a later stage, a lively discussion followed on this subject. This was introduced by Principal Robinson and participated in by a large number of teachers. At the conclusion of the discussion, the following resolution was passed with one dissenting voice: "That in the opinion of this Institute the principle of the superannuation of teachers is sound."

WEDNESDAY, P. M. The afternoon session began with a lesson to ten or twelve children of the primary grade of the Hantsport school, by their teacher, Miss Mabel C. Saunders. In this lesson she exhibited her method of teaching reading and number. Her method was interesting and original, and proved very effective. The lesson was favorably commented on by Supervisor McKay and others. The lesson was preceded and followed by a song from the class.

Mr. W. H. Woodworth then gave an illustration lesson in Mathematical Drawing. This was followed by a most instructive address on the same subject, by Prof. MacDonald. Drawings were put upon the board showing how to make and use the scale of chords, in the construction of figures, measurement of angles, etc., etc. The instrument needed were exhibited and the value of this kind of work commented upon. It was a valuable lesson to the teachers.

The subject "Public Examinations—their use and abuse" was next introduced by Principal Smith, who favored excursions on many grounds. Principal Lockhart, who had been asked to speak of the abuse of the examinations, thought that under present conditions examinations were a failure, and the time spent in them wasted. The subject was well discussed by Principals Robinson and

WEDNESDAY EVENING. The public meeting of the Institute was held in Churchill's Hall, at 8 o'clock. It was a grand and inspiring gathering. The President called the meeting to order and announced that, at his request, the Mayor, Dr. Margeson, would preside. Dr. Margeson made a short address of welcome to the Institute and then proceeded with the programme placed in his hands.

He dwelt upon the plan of uniting several sections under one Board of trustees, establishing a good central high school, and providing for the collection of pupils at these schools after the plan now adopted for collecting milk for creameries. He also advocated carefully prepared time-tables and well trained teachers as means of improvement. 3. A paper, "Is the Common School Satisfactory? If not why not?" by Supervisor McKay. This, as well as the last paper, was bristled with live thoughts. Nothing like justice can be done by reporting them in fragments. The Supervisor said we have as fine a class of pupils in N. S. as can be found in the world. Our text-books, equipment, course of study, and general school system are good. To advance at other countries are advancing, we must provide a system for training teachers similar to the best. In countries where teaching is made a life work and a profession, the time required for this training is from three to eight years. After three years are spent in preparation, severe tests should be submitted to, and those who cannot pass, required to retire. When the full term is completed and candidates, who are found equal to all the tests, are admitted to the profession by being licensed, an annual salary should be provided by law and thus the teacher ensured against want when age prevents him from teaching. With such teachers, he feels sure, that other matters connected with the schools will be put right and the advance made that we ought to expect.

He enumerated the points he had thought of dwelling upon and left some of them for the teachers to follow out. The address was in the doctor's usual style and most helpful to teachers.
