Shocking Tragedy at Lambton Mills.

ONE BROTHER SLAYS ANOTHER.

The Deed Premeditated and Done in Cold Blood.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE OF THE MURDERER.

The village of Lambton Mills is situated on the west bank of the Elmer, about two miles north of the lake shore road, and six miles by way of Queen street from this city. It was its name to the large mill of the Messrs. Howland, which are situated on the river bank, in the valley, near the village. The number of its population is small, but more activity is noticeable in the place than in many villages of greater population. It is seldom that anything occurs out of the path of the ordinary hum-drum of country life to startle the inhabitants, but on Friday they were thrown into the wildest state of excitement by the preparation of a most bloody tragedy in the village.

THE MURDERER AND HIS VICTIM.

Three young men named De Courcier, the eldest twenty-four years of age, have lived at Lambton Mills for many years, in fact they were born and bred in the place, and were well thought of by their neighbors. They left a little property, which has been a source of contention with his boys ever since the death of the old folks. It is not known fully what originated the quarrel, but our reporter learned that the inheritance was divided in a way which was not satisfactory to one of the parties. It appears that Edward De Courcier, the murdered man, succeeded a young woman about two years ago, and the girl became known as the daughter of his brother, Robert, aged twenty-four years, who was engaged with him in the manufacture of soda water at Lambton, and asked her to marry him. RAILWAY SMASH-UP.

Two G. T. R. Trains Collide near Guelph.
