Two Heroes Return From Overseas

Driver Roy Morrison and Pte. Roy Dickison Have Done Their Share for to Win The War

Two Newcastle boys, Driver Roy Morrison and Pte Roy Dickison, returned home this week from overseas where they have been serving their King and Country, and are being warmly welcomed by their many friends.

Driver Morrison before enlisting was one of Newcastle's most popular young business men, being a member of the firm of Russell and Morrison, and made many sacrifices to serve in the army. He has been overseas for over two years, a large part of which time has been spent in France. He is on a three months furlough.

Pte. Roy Dickison, who is at present in Moncion, went overseas with the Medical Corps of 132nd battalion, and has been with that branch of the service in England ever since. An operation to his neck, necessitating his being invalided out of the service. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Dickison, and was one of the youngest soldiers to leave Newcastle.

Pte. Edward Gunderson who went over with the 132nd, and was severely gassed has also returned to Newcastle.

Chief of Police Resigns

F. Lucas has Received and Appointment with the Dominion Police

Town Marshall and Prohibition Inspector Fred Lucas, who came here from St. John succeeding W. H. Finley and proving a most capable officer, sent in his resignation on Monday, having received an appointment with the Dominion Police under Chief Rideout. Mr. Lucas's resignation being urgent was accepted by the Town Council Monday afternoon in committee of the whole, and the ex-chief left Wednesday for St. John to report for duty. His family remains here for the present.

Add to Lucas's resignation.

Mr. Lucas's resignation read as follows:

Newcastle, March 18th, 1918
To the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newcastle, N. B. Gentlemen,

I beg to tender my resignation as Town Marshall and would ask that it be accepted to take effect on the 19th March instant.

I would also ask that my salary be adjusted for the months of January and February as I have received only \$59.00 per month for these months and claim that under my agreement with the Town my salary would have been \$90.00 per month, as any resolution made on January 18th could not have taken effect before March 1st. I therefore feel that I am entitled to \$22.00 balance for the months of January and February.

In committee of the whole Council the matter of salary was finally adjusted in accordance with Mr. Lucas's claim.

Happenings in the Local Legislature

Workmen's Compensation Act, New Highway Act and Crown Land Bills Introduced

The N. B. Legislature resumed sessions on the afternoon of the 12th instant.

Hon. Robert Murray introduced a bill to amend the Towns Incorporation Act, to give Town Councils power to regulate the sale of coal, wood, straw, fodder, etc.

Premier Foster continued the debate on the address. He said that N. B., which last year produced 300,000 barrels wheat flour and consumed 1,500,000 had to feed herself this year. The Government had purchased 20,000 bushels seed wheat and 60,000 of oats. Improvements would be made in the Workmen's Compensation Act. He defended the recent borrowing of \$1,000,000 without asking for tenders for the same. Advice had been received from the Bank of Montreal and Brown Bros. of New York. The loan was the next best of the season to that of Ontario.

The address passed without division.

The report of John M. Stevens, K. C., appointed by the present government to investigate charges re the building of the St. John Valley railway was laid on the table. The commissioner does not find from the evidence that any members of the late government were personally concerned in the negotiations carried on with the various contractors. He finds that the methods employed to secure the contract by the Nova Scotia Construction Company, Limited, to build the uncompleted sections of the Valley Railway, were reprehensible as tending to prevent or stifle competition and offend against public policy, and points out the impropriety of George B. Jones while a member of the legislature being concerned with campaign funds in the manner disclosed by the evidence, he having signed a note for \$20,000 with Mr. Tennant which was for the purpose of raising campaign funds for use in the election of February, 1917, and of Mr. John D. Palmer, in handling campaign funds while a director of the St. John and Quebec Railway Co. Finally the commissioner recommends as a result of this enquiry, "the publication in the future of all election funds and expenses, together with the names of the subscribers, and the amount subscribed by each, and the taking of proper vouchers for every disbursement, and that the New Brunswick Elections Act be amended to include more of the provisions similar to those to be found in the Dominion Elections Act relating to corrupt practices and other illegal acts, than are to be found in the said New Brunswick Elections Act." Accompanying the report, which is dated February 21, 1918, are 699 typewritten pages of evidence.

March 13
The bill to enable cities, towns and municipalities to contribute aeroplanes to His Majesty's government was passed.

Hon. Mr. Veziot introduced "An Act relating to Highways". By it the roads are to be divided into trunk and branch roads; branch road supervisors are to be elected by district ratepayers; statute labor will be optional with such ratepayers; and also optional on trunk roads; the property road tax will be 25 cents per \$100 instead of 20, and the poll tax \$2.00 instead of \$1.50; the Minister of Public Works may inaugurate a patrol system first spoken of by the late government. The change in the rule of the road is to be left to the Legislature.

March 14
The bill to enable local assessment for aid to Halifax was passed. The bill to appoint a commission of three lawyers to endeavor to secure uniformity of legislation in Canada, was passed, the members to work without salary.

Hon. Mr. Murray's bill to enable cities, towns and counties to regulate sales of certain articles was adopted.

The governors of the Boys' Industrial Home were authorized to collect \$200 per year per boy from the Municipalities; and the fee for a pupil in the Halifax Blind School which has been raised to \$150 a year was made chargeable to the Municipality.

March 15
Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced amendment to Workmen's Compensation Act. Three Commissioners will administer the Act, holding office for life, except removed for

cause. The bill strengthens the Act. It allows compensation for workmen's families up to \$3500 in case of death or total disability. The Act will apply to employers and workmen connected with the industries of lumbering, mining, boring, manufacturing, building, construction, engineering, operation of any railway, tramway, telegraph, telephone, electric light or power line, water works, gas works or sewerage plant or system, or other public utility; operation of refrigerator, storage or terminal warehouse, elevator or platform; operation of any passenger or freight elevator, or of any theatre or place of public amusement; scavenging or street cleaning, horse-shoeing, operation of any lumber or fuel yards, stovering or navigation and employment incidental thereto. The Act will apply to persons engaged as traveling salesmen or in clerical work or to those whose employment is of a casual nature. Neither will it apply to persons employed by a city or municipality as members of a police force or fire department. The expenses are to be paid by assessment on business firms.

Forestry Commission.
Hon. Mr. Smith introduced a bill to establish a Provincial Forestry Advisory Commission and also a bill for the prevention of forest fires. House adjourned until Tuesday, 19th.

SENDING PARCELS TO PRISONERS

Ottawa, March 16th.—The German Authorities have issued a memorandum to the effect that parcels for Prisoners of War interned in Germany must be addressed to the "parent" (or main) camps to which the prisoners belong and must not bear the names of any branch or working camps or of any other place to which the prisoners might be detailed for special services.

The memorandum states that Prisoners who have been detailed for services outside the "parent" camps have been enjoined by the German Authorities from the very first, to inform in this sense any relations or other persons from whom they expect to receive postal parcels. Parcels for Prisoners of War in hospitals also come within the meaning of these regulations.

In the interests of the Prisoners it is therefore essential that these regulations should be strictly adhered to as otherwise the German Authorities will not deliver the parcels to the Prisoners of War for which they are intended, and it is suggested that persons in Canada when writing to Prisoners in Germany should ascertain definitely the name of the "parent" (or main) camp so that they can comply with the regulations of the German Authorities in addressing parcels to Prisoners.

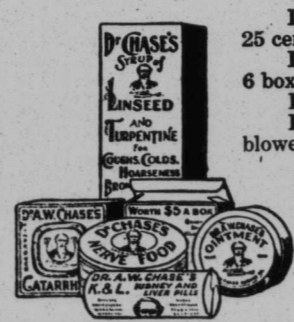

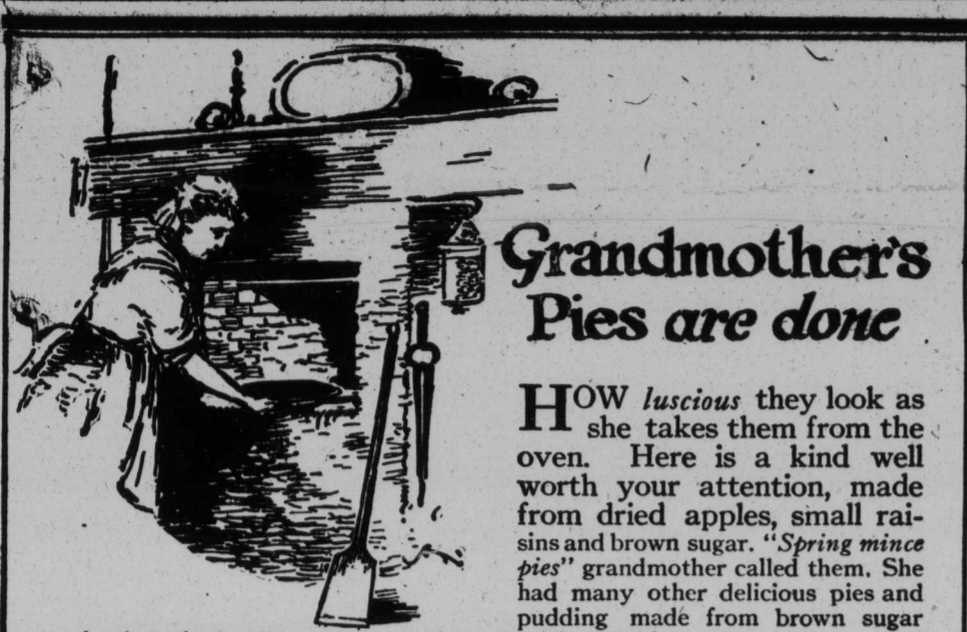

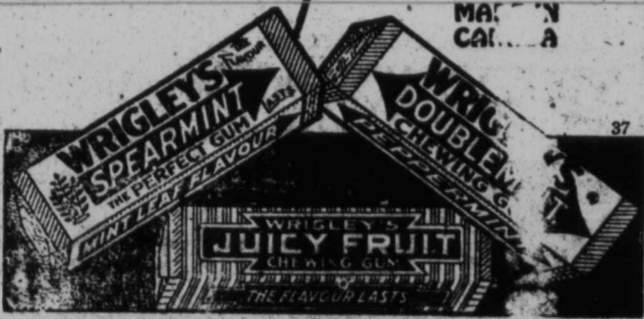

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made in certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter section as pre-emption Price \$3 00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts Price \$3 00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency), Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

ANOTHER GOOD OFFICER LEAVES

The departure of Chief of Police and Prohibition Inspector Frederick Lucas, who leaves to accept a more lucrative position with the Dominion Government, removes from Newcastle a good, capable, fearless officer whom it will be hard to replace. He did good work under the Scott Act, and under the Prohibition Act made it very difficult for anyone to violate the law.

May his successor be as satisfactory.

HELP THE HOSPITAL

March the eighth was Hospital Canvass day in Moncton and about one thousand dollars was collected for that institution. Everywhere the lady collectors were most courteously treated and their appeals met with a generous response. Too much assistance cannot be given to hospitals. A good hospital such as we have in Newcastle is one of the greatest blessings a town can have. The Miramichi Hospital has, during the short term of its existence, proved itself of the greatest value to the county and has so far fully realized the expectations of its benevolent founder and its energetic management. Thoroughly equipped and always at work, the hospital is under great expense, and some such movement as that which succeeded so well on behalf of the Moncton Hospital might with propriety be tried once in a while in Newcastle and vicinity. While the hospital's endowment is considerable and its revenue fairly large, yet a special effort would be in order at any time.

RUSSIA AND ROUMANIA YIELD

At the All-Russian Congress of Soviets, meeting at Moscow on the 14th instant, it was decided by a vote of 453 to 30 to ratify the peace treaty with the Central Powers, signed at Brest-Litovsk on the 13th instant.

This treaty cuts off from Russia the following territories: Finland, 143,000 square miles, with 3,500,000 people; Estonia and Livonia, 26,000 square miles, 2,250,000 people; Poland, 44,000 square miles, 12,000,000 people; Courland, 10,000 square miles, 1,350,000 people; Lithuania, 82,000 square miles, 9,000,000 people;

Ukraine, 200,000 square miles, 34,000,000 people; Bessarabia, 17,000 square miles, 2,500,000 people; and Armenia, about 25,000 square miles, 2,000,000 people. Finland is also to get Russia's Arctic Coast near Norway, the only coast she has on the North ice-free the year round. This will include at least 10,000 square miles more. Russia's total losses will thus be about 557,000 square miles, all of which except about 100,000 square miles of northern Finland is land of the very best quality, with a population of 66,500,000. Russia will be left with 8,000,000 square miles and 110,000,000 people, but of this the vast area of Turkestan, with 1,500,000 square miles and 10,000,000 people is almost completely Mohammedan and apt to declare at any moment for annexation to Turkey. Siberia, with 5,000,000 square miles and 10,000,000 people, mostly Russians, is in anarchy, while Russia's protectorates of Outer Mongolia and Northern Manchuria will probably revert to China, the rightful possessor of Manchuria and the most natural protector of Mongolia.

Russia is left with no ocean coast but on the White Sea and Arctic, only one province at the head of the Gulf of Finland and another on the Sea of Azov through which to communicate with the outside world, and the gates to all these avenues will be in German hands. Further, Russia must, for a term of years, afford the central powers the most favored nation commercial treatment, and pay a huge war indemnity.

The cession of Armenia and the declaration of the independence of Persia and Afghanistan opens a road from Germany to India far north of the British at Baghdad and Jerusalem, and shorter and safer than the Bagdad or Suez route. Rumania, deserted by Russia and surrounded by foes, has also been forced to yield. She yields her oil fields to Hungary and her lands south of the Danube to Bulgaria, and becomes an ally of the Central powers. It appears she may be granted, in compensation, the Russian province of Bessarabia, whose people are largely of Rumanian stock.

Sudden Death of Well Known Minister

Rev. F. C. Simpson, minister of the Presbyterian Church, at Bridgetown, N. S., died on Sunday as he was preparing for the service. Rev. Mr. Simpson had no pronouncement of illness but some time ago his physician had told him he was threatened with cerebral trouble. His wife who survives, is a sister of William Duff, member elect of the house of commons from Lunenburg and of the wife of Rev. J. A. McLaughlin of Dartmouth. Deceased came to Nova Scotia from Hull, England. He was then a member of the Methodist church but he entered the Presbyterian college, Halifax, was admitted to that church and became one of its ministers. Two children survive: William, a lieutenant in the depot battalion at Halifax, who has been overseas; and Miss May, on the staff of the immigration department at Halifax.

Rev. Mr. Simpson was well known in the Miramichi Presbytery, having been the beloved and successful pastor of St. Mark's Church, Douglastown, for several years. Along with Mrs. Simpson and children, he was a general favorite. He left Douglastown about five years ago to take a position with the Presbyterian Witness. Afterwards he returned to the more active work of the church. The bereaved family have the sympathy of many friends.

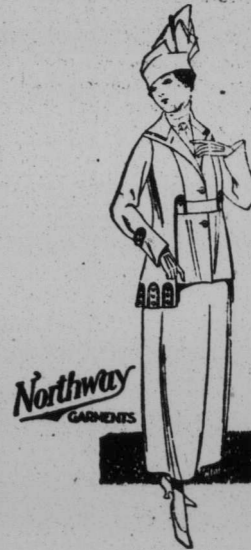

Board of Health Notice

We have received notice that at a meeting of the Provincial Board of Health held at Fredericton on Jan. 20th ult. it was ordered under section 39 of the Public Health Act of 1911...

ALL PERSONS ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED AND URGED TO COMPLY WITH THIS ORDER IMMEDIATELY

We also desire to call to your attention the following sections of the Public Health Act of 1911:

RULE IV.—Any householder in whose house there shall occur a case of Smallpox, Cholera, Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Tuberculosis, Typhus Fever or Measles, shall immediately notify the Board of Health of that district of the same.

RULE V.—When a physician knows or suspects that any person to whom he has been called is sick or has died of any of the diseases named in Rule 4, he shall immediately notify the local Board of Health of that district.

RULE VI.—Whenever a case of scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhus fever or smallpox exists in any house or dwelling, a notice or placard shall be posted on or near the door of such house, stating that such disease exists therein, and no person shall remove such notice or placard without the authority of the Local Board of Health of that district.

RULE VIII.—Whenever the existence of any contagious disease in a house or in any public institution has been ascertained, or if there is reason to believe that one of the inmates is suffering from any contagious disease, no occupant of such house or public institution shall change his residence without the consent of the Local Board of Health of that district.

RULE VII.—A rigid quarantine shall be placed upon any person sick of:

(a) Smallpox, Cholera or Typhus Fever, until such time as the Local Board of Health shall permit the quarantine to be removed.

RULE XV.—No person shall give or sell any articles, merchandise, products, milk, butter, bread, provisions, etc if such are coming from a house in which any of the diseases named in Rule IV. exists

SEC. 80 (1) Before entering any child upon the register of any public school, or admitting such child to such public school, there shall be produced by such child, or by its parents, or guardian, or some person acting on behalf of such child, a certificate, to the satisfaction of the teacher of such school, or in case there are more teachers than one of any such school, to the satisfaction of the principal thereof, that such child has been successfully vaccinated within three years from the time of such request for registry or admission; or if such child has been vaccinated within the said period of three years and the vaccination has not been successful, there shall be produced to such teacher or principal, satisfactory evidence that by reason of such child having been previously successfully vaccinated, that such child is immune.

PENALTIES SEC. 63 Any person who shall wilfully violate any of the provisions of this Act, or wilfully disobey or resists any lawful order of the health officer, or of any inspector appointed under this Act, or wilfully obstructs any person acting under the authority of this Act, or the execution of this Act, or wilfully violates any order or regulation, made and declared by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, or any by-law, order or regulation by the Provincial Board of Health, or any regulation by any Local Board of Health, or neglects or refuses to comply with such by-law, order or regulation or with the requirements of this Act, in any manner whatsoever, or pulls down, defaces or destroys any notice or placard put up under the authority of this Act, or of any by-law, order or regulation made hereunder, shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars

N. B. Labor Men Meet at Fredericton

Make Many Demands Upon the Provincial Government, and are Favorably Received

The N. B. Federation of Labor met at Fredericton March 12th to 14 instanc. Among the resolutions passed were: Demanding Woman Suffrage; demanding improvements to the Workmen's Compensation Act; Proportional Representation in all provincial, municipal and civic governing bodies; free tax; books and appliances for public schools up to Grade VIII; an independent commission to handle all matters relating to labor with the exception of Compensation; government recognition of organized labor by appointment of labor representatives upon public bodies; and permission of manufacture and sale of beer having two and one-half per cent of alcohol. It was also demanded that manufacture of ice cream and candy be stopped during the war to save milk and sugar. A delegation interviewed the government and was received favorably. J. L. Sugrue, St. John, was re-elected president, and the secretary is P. D. Ayer, Moncton. The formation of an Independent Labor Party was sympathetically discussed.

Income Tax Forms
Are now available
Returns must be filed on or before 31st March

THE Dominion Income War Tax Act requires you to fill in one or more of the five special Forms provided before 31st March, 1918. In order to assist the public to understand just what is required of them, information on each Form is given below. Read carefully, then get three copies of the form that fits your case and fill them in. Answer all questions fully and accurately. For making false statements, a penalty of \$10,000 or six months' imprisonment, or both, is provided.

Individuals.—All persons unmarried, and all widows or widowers without dependent children, whose income is \$1500 a year or more, must fill in Form T1. All other persons whose income is \$3000 or more, use the same Form. Where any income is derived from dividends, list amounts received from Canadian and Foreign securities separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4. Partnerships, as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created or organized, shall pay the normal tax on income exceeding \$3000. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Shareholders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Figures in every case are to cover 1917 income—all Forms must be filed by 31st March. For neglect, a fine of \$100 for each day of default may be imposed.

In the case of Forms T1 and T2, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two, with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.

Farmers of N. B. Meet

Important Resolutions Adopted—French Language to be Used in Future

The 42nd annual meeting of the Farmers and Dairymen's Association of N. B. met at Fredericton last week.

James Heman reported for Northumberland. A late spring retarded seeding. Hay crop was good. Grain harvesting was under difficulties. Wheat and oats were poor. Potatoes had poor yield but increased acreage yielded many potatoes for export. Turnips were a fair crop. Vegetables were good. Live stock was not up to the average on account of the scrub areas. Sheep not increasing, dogs being the cause. Poultry not given much attention. Seed wheat has been bought by the county council to the extent of two carloads. Farmers opposed to Daylight Saving.

The Convention asked both governments to guarantee the farmers twenty cents a lb. for pork the next two years; and the local to grant a bonus of 25 per cent on gang plows, or tractors, bought, and regulate the running at large of bulls and dogs; opposed the daylight saving scheme; favored admission of the French language to the Convention; asked for restriction of the sale of oleomargarine; requested more advanced vocational instruction in the schools.

The potato report showed that in Highland 474 bushels of Cobblers had been raised to the acre, with lowest yield \$71. In Chatham the Cobblers yielded 285 to 215 bushels per acre.
