ICE INDUSTRY AT BANFF



The winter season at Banff, Allowing a two-inch mark that is berta, gives opportunity for the promotion of an extensive ice-industry. It is unique as the only industry of its kind west of Selkirk, Manitoba. The ice-field on the Bow river is a hive of industry in the winter time. It is a tract two miles in length and is leased for ten year periods. Operations begin as soon as the river freezes over, in the care given to keep the space clear of season. The ice is marked by a line two inches deep into cakes 22 by 44 inches. An ice channel is made at one side of the river and the cakes at a floated dup to a bench for loading. 

Railway News in Brief

Vancouver, B.C. — The Canadian Pacific Railvay Company has called for tenders for the construction of a new bridge across the Coquitlam River to replace the oid one washed away during the heavy floods of November. The new structure, which will be built of steel, is to be about 300 feet long with concrete piers. The concrete abutments will be placed further apart than in the former structure to make more allowance for another possible swelling of the river. The new Coquitlam bridge, when completed, will be one of the most substantial examples of bridge construction on the Canadian Facilie Railway.

Vancouver. — The fifteen-storey bulk of the Hotel Vancouver is familiar to all visitors to Vancouver. But of all the people who pass it each day and the many who have staved in the hostelr, it is probable that not one in toonsands realizes just what a tremendous enterprise the hotel is.

hotel is.

To run the hotel—which has anproximately 600 nooms—requires a
year-round staff of about 400 employees. The comparatively small
matter of keeping paint work and
kalsomining in spotless condition
and cleaning the ornate plaster work
around the rotunda requires the continuous services of five painters and
ten helpers. Edith McWilliam, Martina Witzell,

tinuous services of five painters and ten helpers.

These men are hard but to it to keep ahead of the dirt which is brought into the hotel on the smokeladen air. While they are keeping the walls and ceilings bright no less than seven rotunda cleaners are at work each day keening floors and windows immaculate and seeing that worn-out electric light bulbs — no mean task in itself — are instantly ean task in itself -- are instantly

renewed.

But it is in the downstairs regions of the hatel, far from the gaze of travellers, that the majority of the large number of employees pass their days. In the engine-room where light-and power for the hotel are made there are five engineers: are made there are five engineers; a chief, three third-lass and one fourth-class. There are four stokers, four ashmen, two shovelers and two

truckmen.

Then there are basement cleaners, store-room men, four kitchen cleaners, two printers—for menus—a yardman, an iceman, five food checkers and three men on food control. ers and three men on food control.

It is the duty of the last named to see that every ounce of food which leaves the storerooms is tabulated, so that at the end of each day the profits on dining-room operation can be instantly checked.

The kitchen is the largest unit of

The kitchen is the largest unit of the hotel. Here there are a chef with forty-eight assistant cooks to serve the dining-room and grill. For the lunch counter there are three separate cooks. Two of the cooks do nothing but broi ing, three do nothing but frying, three cook vegetables exclusively and there are six pastry cooks. In addition, there are cooks for-boiling eggs, some who make tea, others for coffee, one man who spends his life making toast and another whose sole duty is to clean and open cysters.

who spends his life making toast and another whose sole duty is to clean and open oysters.

The quantity of food necessary to feed the guests in one day would appal the average housewife. No less than ninety dozen eggs are used daily. Between 3,000 and 5,000 lunch and dinner rolls are baked each day. To butter these, and for cooking, 190 pounds of creamery butter are used each day. Carrots are consumed at the rate of 100 pounds a day and between 800 and 1000 pounds of potatoes are used each twenty-four hours. Other vegetables are used in quantities of from fifty to 500 pounds according to how many guests there are in the house.

It takes from eighteen to twenty gallons of cream, fifty gallons of milk and from 175 to 200 pounds of poultry each day to satisfy the demands of the guests. Winter and summer the ice plant of the hotel turns out ten tons of ice each day.

Even buying at lowest wholesale prices, food alone costs the hotel from \$1500 to \$2000 daily.
