MR. T. F. SHERRARD PASSED AWAY AT A RIPE OLD AGE

Moncton lost one of its oldest and most highly esteemed citizens about twelve o'clock Tuesday when Mr. Thomas F. Sherrard, Senior member of the firm of T. F. Sherrard and Son, passed away.

The deceased gentlemen had reached the mature age of 88 years and 5 months, and had always enjoyed exceedingly good health. Even when well past the four score mark, he was comparatively active, and only recently did he show signs of failing health.

The late Mr. Sherrard was born of Scotch parentage, at Strathadam Northumberland County, on October 15th, 1833. For many years he conducted a monument business at Point du Chene, Westmorland County which was moved to Moncton about thirty-four years ago. His business connections made him a frequent visitor throughout all the northshore counties where he had made a host of friends who will regret to learn of his demise.

Mr. and Mrs. Sherrard a few months ago, celebrated the 58th anniversary of their marriage. Mrs. Sherrard is still surviving as are also two sons and three daughters. They are W. Edgar Sherrard, Junior member of the firm of T. F. Sherrard and Son, Moncton; J. Henry Sherrard of Montreal; Mrs. Albert J. Welling, of Shediac Cape; Mrs. Hugh McKellar, of Moose Jaw; and Mrs. (Dr.) A. W. Montague, of Minnedosa, Manitoba. There is also one sister still living, Mrs. Jerome Roy, Newcastle. Mr. Will Sherrard, of Strathadam Northumberland County, and Dr. Wilbur Sherrard, of Crossburn N. S. are nephews.

The late Mr. Sherrard was a life-long Presbyterian. Prior to his removal to Moncton he was an elder in the Presbyterian Church at Shediac. At the time of his death he was Senior Elder in St. John's Presbyterian Church, Moncton. He was a man of sterling qualities and his life was that of a consistent Christian.

The funeral of the late Mr. Thomas F. Sherrard took place Thursday afternoon from his late residence, 257 Robinson street, at 2 o'clock. The service was conducted by Rev. A. J. Ramsay, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, assisted by Rev. J. V. Tilton, pastor of Central Methodist Church and Rev. Mr. Tomlins, pastor of St. Martin's-in-the-Wood, at Shediac. The choir of St. John's Presbyterian church, assisted by members of the choir of Central Methodist Church, rendered appropriate selections. The hymns rendered were "What a Friend He Have in Jesus," "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

The floral tributes were many and beautiful and included a wreath from St. John's Presbyterian Church, also a wreath from Simmons, Limited of Montreal, of which firm Mr. J. H. Sherrard, son of the deceased is manager, and many others from close friends of the family.

The pallbearers were Messrs Owen Cameron, William J. McBurn L. C.

Fredericton, N. B., March 10.—Mr. Justice Barry today issued an order.

on the action of the Minister of Health that the municipality of Northumberland pay a total of \$9,441.12 the total of assessments for public health purposes for 1920 and 1921. For 1920 the assessment was \$4,437.10 and for 1921 \$5,004.02.

Northumberland is the sixth municipality of the Province against which the Department of Health has been compelled to take action to force payment of health assessments.

PRAIRIE PROV- INCES TO RECEIVE RESOURCES

In a letter written to the Premiers of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister, outlines the proposal of the Government for returning the natural resources to these three Prairie Provinces and relinquish the subsidies which they have received in lieu of their lands, and receive resources. "The shortest and simplest way of settlement, the one admitting of quick results, would be to ignore transactions of the past and make a fresh start," he says.

The Prime Minister states in his letter that the question of returning the natural resources has been complicated in the past by objections raised on the part of the older provinces, who have claimed that if the requests of the Prairie Provinces were granted, new conditions would arise which would entitle them (the older provinces) to compensation. Speaking on behalf of the Government, he expresses the opinion that any claim on the part of the Eastern Provinces will probably be removed if it is understood that on receiving their natural resources, the Government, he expresses the opinion subsidies.

The Premier makes it clear that any arrangement arrived at is subject to the approval of Parliament.

A WARNING

Last Tuesday night, three young men from Chatham who came for the purpose of attending the carnival, placed their horse and rig in one of the local livery stables. When preparing to return to their home, one of the three young men appeared to have something under his coat which looked rather suspicious and told his comrades that he would meet them a little further along on the street. Chief of Police Ashford was informed the following morning of a new horse having been stolen from the stable, and he immediately got in touch with Chief Coughlan of Chatham and advised him of the above young man's actions on the previous evening. Chief Coughlan made an investigation, with the result that he found the horse and the same was returned to Newcastle. This is not the first occasion that similar happenings at the same stable has occurred, and the Newcastle Chief of Police wishes to inform all persons who are accustomed to picking up articles that are not nailed down or too heavy to carry, that in future he proposes to take the matter to the law courts where severe justice will be handed out all such culprits and they will not be so leniently dealt with as the party involved in this particular case has been. It is yet undecided whether or not further proceedings will be taken in this case.

Andrew Loggie, of Dalhousie; Robt. Loggie and Francis P. Loggie of Loggieville; John E. Dixon, of Tracadie, and Robert L. Johnson of Loggieville, have been incorporated as the Monarch Cold Storage Co. Ltd., with an authorized capital stock of \$199,000, and the chief place of business to be at Shippegan. The objects are to carry on the fishing business in all its branches and to carry on the business of cold and dry storage and refrigerator plants.

INDUCTION OF THE REV. HENRY ARNOTT, M. A.

The following is reprinted from "The Dalkeith Advertiser," under date of February 2nd, and will be of interest to many of our readers, who remember the Rev. Mr. Arnott, when pastor of St. James' Presbyterian Church here, during the years 1903-1906.

The vacancy in Newbattle United Free Church, caused through the transference of the Rev. J. N. Macpherson to Elgin, has been happily terminated by the settlement of the Rev. Henry Arnott, M. A., Alva West U. F. Church, in the charge. Rev. Mr. Arnott's induction took place on Wednesday last, when the proceedings were followed with keen interest by a large gathering of members of the congregation and friends. There was also a good turnout of members of the Dalkeith Presbytery.

During the earlier part of the proceedings the Rev. A. Renshaw Mackay, Temple, officiated, and preached an eloquent sermon from Galatians 3, v. 1.

Thereafter the Rev. Robert T. Jack, Penicuik, who acted as Moderator, ascended the pulpit, and read a narrative of the steps leading up to the induction. The members of the congregation, by holding up their right hands, signified their adherence to the call to Rev. Mr. Arnott, and promised to give him all dutiful respect, encouragement, and obedience, and undertook to contribute heartily to the maintenance of the Christian ministry and the furtherance of the gospel. Rev. Mr. Arnott having indicated his adherence to the acceptance of the call, the Moderator engaged in prayer, and there after declared Mr. Arnott to be inducted to the pastoral charge of the congregation, and commended him to the grace of God in the discharge of all his duties as minister of the gospel. The members of the Presbytery then extended the right hand of fellowship to the newly inducted minister.

Addressing the members of the congregation and Rev. Mr. Arnott, the Moderator said Mr. Arnott had had many years of experience in the work of the Church of Christ, and he (Mr. Jack) felt it would be presumption on his part to begin to lay down any rules for his guidance.

He urged Mr. Arnott to be true to himself; to be true to his God, who looked upon the work of His creation and found 'all to be

very good. With regard to the congregation, the Moderator said, of course, they all knew that there was nothing of greater importance than a full church. How were they going to have full pews lined up from end to end Sabbath after Sabbath by eager and anxious listeners? He would have them remember that it did not depend altogether on their minister. Minister and congregation were a working organization, and in order to have a successful church there must be team work. The team work must start at their own firesides. He wanted the fathers and mothers to take their children in hand and train them up in going to the Sabbath School and in learning the elements of the glorious gospel of Jesus Christ. Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it. Let the deacons and managers and elders recognize that they had a share in the building up of the Newbattle congregation. In conclusion, he urged young and old alike to throw their personal efforts into their support of their minister and if they did so in the spirit of their Lord, Jesus Christ, their minister might well be congratulated on his settlement in their midst.

At the close of the service the congregation were afforded an opportunity of shaking hands with their new pastor.

The Induction Tea

Following the induction a large and representative company assembled in the Church Hall for tea, which was capably served by a band of lady workers. The Rev. Robert Inglis, M. A., Ford, who acted as Interim Moderator during the vacancy, occupied the chair. Mr. James Taylor, Session Clerk, at the outset, read the following telegram from the Rev. J. N. Macpherson:—"Prosperity and happiness to minister and people.—Macpherson."

After the loyal toasts had been honoured, the Chairman, in proposing the health of Mr. Arnott, said he congratulated both Mr. Arnott and the congregation of Newbattle. If Mr. Arnott had got a good congregation, then the congregation had got a good minister. Since he came to Ford practically one-half of the members of the Dalkeith Presbytery had gone off elsewhere, so that other Presbyteries evidently recognized that they had distinguished men, and had taken them away. Mr. Arnott had gained much experience in varied fields—experience which would stand him in good stead in Newbattle. He came as a proved man. There was no doubt of the choice of the congregation when they met to elect a minister.

The toast was cordially pledged.

In reply, Mr. Arnott said he did not realize he was such a tremendous fellow until that day. (Laughter.) He really was a very ordinary individual. All he could say for himself was that he had endeavored to do what work he undertook with what vigour and power he possessed. He felt that if each in his appointed place did what he could and did it in

all sincerity and with devotion there would be no trouble about the results. He thought they could leave that with all safety in higher hands. He thanked them for their very cordial welcome and their very kind wishes, and he hoped that in the days to come he would at least do something to fulfil the high expectations they had formed of him. (Applause.)

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

There was a large turnout of the members of the congregation at the evening meeting, the chair being occupied by the Rev. Robert Inglis.

After tea had been served, the Chairman, in his opening remarks, congratulated the congregation most heartily on having obtained Mr. Arnott as their minister. At the night of his election he was persuaded that the congregation had acted very wisely. Mr. Arnott had a splendid congregation, a congregation that would call for the very best that was in a man, and there was a great wide field outside which was a challenge.

In making the presentation of the gown to the new minister, Mr. Jas. Taylor said Mr. Arnott was the choice of the congregation, and he asked him to accept the robe which the ladies of the congregation had provided. He believed Mr. Arnott would wear it with honor and would add dignity to it. (Applause.)

Mrs. Pryde, the Bryans, an old and highly respected member of the Church, then stepped forward, amid loud applause, and gracefully robed Mr. Arnott, who cordially shook hands with her.

On rising to speak Mr. Arnott received a great ovation. At the outset of his remarks he thanked Mrs. Pryde for the handsome garment with which she had kindly clothed him. He thanked those whom Mrs. Pryde represented—the ladies of the congregation—for the very kind feeling which prompted them to procure the robe, and he would like to feel on Sundays as he went into the pulpit that he was clothed with those warm wishes which she had expressed when she shook his hand and said—"Welcome to Newbattle." He also tendered his thanks to the congregation for the honour they had conferred upon him and the confidence they had displayed in him in calling him to be their minister. They had both taken very solemn vows that day. The pledges given by one who assumed office in the holy ministry were the vows taken by those who assumed the responsibility of calling a given preacher to be their minister. He would like to feel, and he might say he had very good hope in feeling, that it was not a question of Mr. Arnott entering upon a new phase of his ministry but of the congregation of Newbattle, in conjunction with Mr. Arnott, entering upon a new phase of the joint ministry of the congregation and the minister. The congregation had a very noble record behind them. They had been ministered unto in the past by very devoted, and in their own special way, very able ministers of Christ. One heard with great satisfaction of the apostolic zeal of the minister who was largely responsible for the formation of the

congregation, viz, the late Rev. Mr. Hardie. (Applause). They had heard that day a good deal about a great minister and a successful minister. He was sure it was their wish—it was his wish—that in the years to come this joint ministry which began that day should be in the best sense of the word both a great minister and a successful ministry. It would be, it could not but be, provided they went forward, resolved that they should not fall in their parts, i. e., he, in his sphere attempting to be a faithful minister of Christ, striving to prove himself worthy of the confidence they had displayed in him in calling him to be their minister; and they, on their part, striving to implement the pledges they had assumed that day. There was another factor which went to the making of a successful ministry. It needed a faithful God. On that point they had no doubt, for "faithful is He who called you and He will be with you always" (Applause).

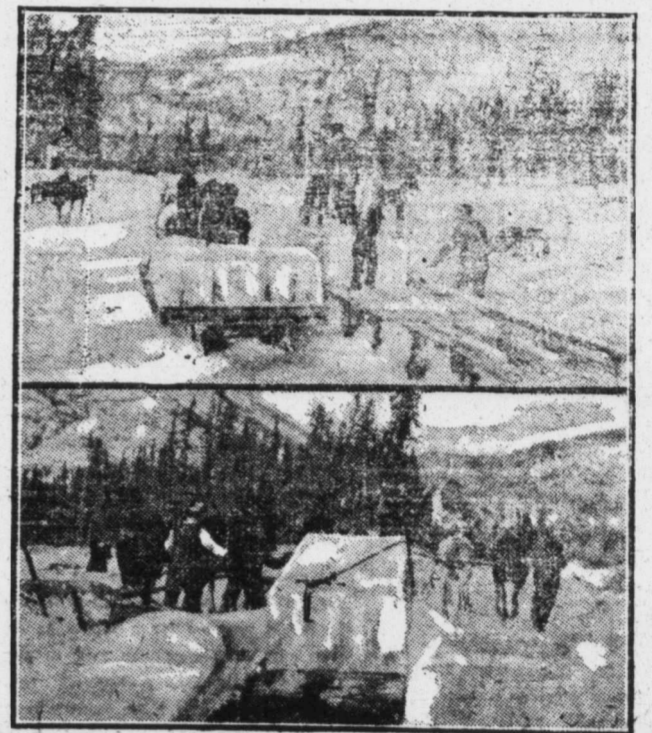

ICE INDUSTRY AT BANFF



ICE OPERATIONS ON BOW RIVER AT BANFF.

The winter season at Banff, allowing a two-inch mark that is made early in the season around each piece. An ice needle is used for splitting the blocks at the bench of its kind west of Selkirk, Manitoba. The ice-field on the Bow river is a hive of industry in the winter-time. It is a tract two miles in length and is leased for ten year periods. Operations begin as soon as the river freezes over, in the care given to keep the space clear of snow. The ice is marked by a line two inches deep into cakes 22 by 44 inches. An ice channel is made at one side of the river and the cakes are floated up to a bench for loading.

About 60 men are employed in the work each season and they use such implements as a splitting bar, a spike-pole for directing the pieces up the ice channel, an ice saw for sawing the cakes 22 inches down, fol-

To Save the Children



A group of Russia's starving children such as are being saved from death by Canadian contributions.

Russia's government may have sinned; but her little children have not. Russia's people, a vast horde, but dimly conscious, if at all, of social responsibility other than that which each man felt for his own immediate family, may have brought added trouble and disorganization to a war-shattered world. Her little children had nothing to do with it, and yet it is the little children of Russia that are faced with the hideous, over-powering brunt of it all. They are not facing it; it is too great for them. In millions they are tottering to the ground to end their short lives of unrelieved horror in one last agonized spasm.

In the famine-stricken provinces of Russia there are, or were, 33,000,000 people. Millions already have died of starvation; Nansen says ten millions more must die. That includes men and women, patient, humble peasants who have had no hand, no thought, in the making of the unspeakable conditions that have swept over their once happy land. These know they must die, are almost content to die, finding in death the end of suffering and the cessation of horror.

But their children—the parents are human beings; if they were mere animals the long protracted death agonies of their little ones would still be unbearable. To most of them there comes no help. The task of feeding their children first and then themselves is too great; they die and look.

Again, if they were animals it would be different, and easier. Instinctively they would know how to wrest a living from Mother Nature. But little children must be fed. They must have food found for them, and in Russia there is none, so they must die. Death is not the worst of it. If a peaceful death were all they suffered, it would not be so bad. It is the hideous horror of the drawn-out struggle, and it is helpless little children that are suffering. They are suffering to-day and must continue to suffer to death, unless—


Unless the civilized well-fed people of the world hear their awful cry for help, and give that help quickly, it will be too late for countless thousands of children. The call has come to Canada with evidence far too horrible to print. The photographs reproduced herewith merely suggest others, more dreadful, that cannot be published.

Will Canada, land of happy, healthy children, heed the call? The appeal is being made in the belief that she will. The "Save the Children Fund" has opened an office in the Elgin Building, Ottawa, and the Canadian people are urged to send their subscriptions now to Sir George Burn, treasurer of the fund at that address. One dollar will feed a child for one month; \$500 will feed one hundred children until next harvest.

Railway News in Brief

Vancouver, B.C. — The Canadian Pacific Railway Company has called for tenders for the construction of a new bridge across the Coquitlam River to replace the old one washed away during the heavy floods of November. The new structure, which will be built of steel, is to be about 300 feet long with concrete piers. The concrete abutments will be placed further apart than in the former structure to make more allowance for another possible swelling of the river. The new Coquitlam bridge, when completed, will be one of the most substantial examples of bridge construction on the Canadian Pacific Railway.

"MUM IS THE WORD"

So far as the present Government is concerned; the Electors who placed it in power, have gained but little knowledge, as to what is being done, or what is intended, as the result of the assembled wisdom of the Ministers. Silence and secrecy is the role adopted, the press and the people are kept in ignorance, and must wait for the meeting of Parliament to know what course their elected servants will adopt. We are gravely told that matters of National importance are being maturely considered and deliberated upon; but when the people demand the right of knowing what it is all about, there is a hush in the "Star Chamber," and the door is slammed with a bang, Mum is the word.

The Government is ruling now, although Parliament has not met, and the people should not have to wait for some knowledge of its policy, until Parliament meets. When Parliament is not sitting the people ask

no more than their right when they want to know all about Cabinet policy, and get some idea of their political intention and actions. The Council of an elected Government or Parliament, is not necessarily a secret organization, but it seemingly suits the erratic and versatile Autocrat now Premier to keep his mouth shut as to what his Cabinet, Council is doing, or deciding upon. He evidently wants us to know, that he is boss, with a big B. The people and their right to know, what their elected servants are doing, may go hang.

One part of Council work has, however, come to light, and Orders-in-Council have full swing, and we do not propose to be "mum" about it. With all the righteous indignation he could assume he damned such orders, on pre-election platforms and some of his Ministerial Satellites took the same course. No more Orders-in-Council for King and Company. Then he was seeking power, now he is in power; and the King of today, has lost his former features. His condemnation of Orders-in-Council was a well played farce, and a marked instance of political hypocrisy, all the more so if we admit, that he must have known, that Orders-in-Council, are a necessary part of the requirements of Constitutional Government, and their use, the only way by which Government can function when Parliament is not in Session.

If he did not know such to be the case, for a man seeking the Premier ship, his ignorance was colossal. That he at least knows it now, is evidenced by the fact that short time as his government has been in power, and even before his first Parliament has met, some hundreds of Orders-in-Council have been issued! Of course it was a terrible thing for Mr. Meighen to use such power; but it is all right for the benign Mr. King to exercise it. We must not condemn him. Oh no, mum is the word.

They are busy in another direction also. In the few weeks of their existence, faithful workers, hangers

on; and patronage hunters of "the great Liberal party" have been placed in the haven of fat jobs. The axe has been used, to make way for the victors. Senatorships, Commissions and Judgeships, already been showered even the Soldiers Settlement Board, has had to lose one of its best solicitors, to make room—in Cumberland Co. N. S.—for another, to please the Liberal party, or its Representative in that County. All this notwithstanding the "holy horror" expressed by Mr. King in reference to party appointments, patronage and other Tory tricks of the terrible Conservative Party. Every reader of the Advocate knows, and every elector who happened to be—within hearing of Mr. Kings voice knows how during the campaign; his utmost indignation was hurled against Mr. Meighen for making similar appointments, and his promise to abolish all such tricks of the terrible Conservative party. Every reader of the Advocate knows, and every elector who happened to be within hearing of Mr. Kings voice knows how during the campaign; his utmost indignation was hurled against Mr. Meighen for making similar appointments, and his promise to abolish all such tricks of patronage, and usurpation, should he be returned to power. The Electors put him there, and now his fine promises, holy horror and indignant Oratory; all seem to have vanished, like a morning dew on Parliament hill, when perhaps they are buried among the "silence and secrecy" of the Council Chamber. The Electors may know before long, just how far Premier King will go to prove the worthlessness of his election promises.

Government Appointments, and orders-in-Council, easily become public property. The deliberations of Council, the measures they adopt, and their every Governmental action; their policy, should be equally known to the public. We presume they will be known, during the session of Parliament, that is, if the wind is favorable. The present secrecy is all wrong, first knowledge of Government policy should not be confined to the assembled Parliament. The Electors, who are the makers of Parliament, take a deep interest in knowing just how their Government is moving. They want to express an opinion, to criticize, to examine proposed measures. It is their right, to know just where they are every time; and not to have measures spring upon them in the House of which they had no previous knowledge. It is plain such an honest open course does not suit Mr. King, and "the end is not yet. We notice too, that even the New Secretary of State, the Hon. A. B. Copp is under the spell, for on last Wednesday evening he had to inform a Moncton Audience assembled to do him honor, that "he would have been delighted to give out the policy of the Administration to them, but was unable to do so, as the Hon. MacKenzie King had stated it must first be given to Parliament; through them, to the people." Whatever Mr. Copp may think about it, the general public view it as a humiliating position for a Minister of the crown to be placed in. It is something new and undesirable in Canadian Governmental practice.

"Mum" is a useful word. Two men-one has a secret to tell, or tells something as such, telling the other to keep mum. It is a name given to a certain toilet article, said to be useful in keeping down bodily odors, in the crowded concert hall, or ball-room. It might even be used in the Council rooms of Parliament, when the members perspire from brain fog. But the Mum we refer to just now, is an attribute of the King Cabinet, which means "Keep it all to yourselves" Mum is the word. Such is Liberal rule in 1922.

FILES 14 CLAIMS FOR GOLD ON THE NORTH SHORE

Fredericton, N. B., March 8—Harry McLaughlin of St. John, who spends the autumn and winter trapping on the Southwest Miramichi and its tributaries, this morning filed fourteen claims at the crown land office for the mining of gold on a tributary of the Taxis river, which runs into the Southwest Miramichi river a short distance above Boiestown.

McLaughlin is a middle-aged man who comes from Ontario. He says that he spent some years prospecting in Northern Ontario in the vicinity of mining camps. While hunting, trapping and guiding in the Miramichi country he also prospected and says that he discovered gold last autumn. He says he found gold-bearing quartz and also traces of the precious metal in the bed-rock of streams and in sand, also in the stream beds. He intends to work his claims during the summer.

Officials of the Department of Lands and Mines are sceptical of the discovery of gold in the region named. Soil tests have been made there by the forest survey without any traces of gold being found. The Taxis lies entirely in the parish of Stanley, York County. The tungsten deposits at Burnt Hill, which were worked during the war, are to the north. Zinc and lead were discovered at Winding Hill, between Burnt Hill and the Taxis, several years ago by W. H. Griffin, of Stanley.



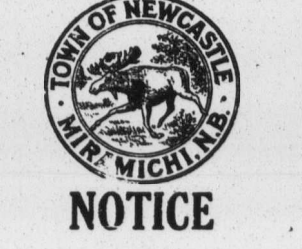

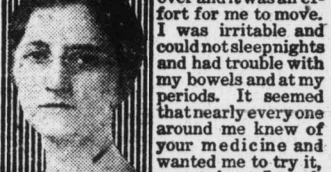

DRINK BUTTERMILK

Very few people realize how valuable buttermilk is as an aid to good health, I would like to make a list of some of the many uses of this inexpensive drink.

If you are reducing drink buttermilk. The caloric value of a glass full is only 80. It has the same amount of nourishment as a glass of skim milk, but it contains acids which are beneficial to the system.

If you have a muddy skin drink buttermilk. The acids mentioned above stimulate certain organs in the body so that the skin will become clear and fresh.

If you are trying to gain weight and can not drink whole milk as in the case with so many women drink buttermilk with cream added. To make this drink fattening, you should add four or more tablespoons of cream. It will give the buttermilk a richer taste.

If you have indigestion drink buttermilk, which will aid you in digesting other foods and is itself one of the most easily assimilated articles of nourishment.

If your skin has become tanned or freckled use buttermilk externally. It bleaches the skin and gives a soft fine feeling. It will not, of course, completely eliminate all the freckles, but it will help to do so.

If your skin has become rough or chapped, rub it with buttermilk. for this will keep it soft and in good condition.

If you want an unusually good bleach, scrape two tablespoons of horseradish into a cup of buttermilk, massage this into the arms or the neck. If you use it on the face be careful not to let any of it get into the eyes.

DR. McMILLAN DEAD IN KOREA, NATIVE OF JACQUET RIVER

Campbellton Graphic: On Friday, March 3rd, the Presbyterian Foreign Mission office at Ottawa received a cablegram announcing the death in Ham Heung, North Korea on Feb. 25th of Dr. Katherine McMillan, who had been in charge of the Presbyterian mission hospitals there.

Dr. McMillan was born at Jacquet River, N. B. in 1867. After graduating from the New Brunswick Normal School she studied medicine in Baltimore and went to the foreign mission field where she has labored ever since with untiring fidelity.

Since becoming attached to the Presbyterian Foreign Mission Board Dr. McMillan made three visits home and on each occasion was warmly welcomed by her numerous friends in Campbellton and vicinity. Thus the news of her death will be heard with deep regret in this section of New Brunswick where she was so well known and so highly respected.

Some six years have elapsed since Dr. McMillan left her post in the mission field to enjoy a well-earned furlough home and during that time her unflagging efforts among the unenlightened Koreans have been productive of much advancement for the cause which she so nobly defended. Only last week Mrs. D. J. Bruce received a letter from Dr. McMillan in which she said she found the stress of the work telling on her strength, but expressed the hope of being some what relieved in the future as additional help was to be given her. She also mentioned that her next leave of absence would be granted her next fall.

The late medical missionary leaves two brothers to mourn their loss, Wm. R. McMillan, of Jacquet River and Archibald in the West.

MIGHT ADMINISTER THE WEST INDIES

London, March 10—Canadian Press (Cable)—Lord Beaverbrook, speaking in London today, advanced the interesting suggestion that the Dominions should be entrusted, in certain cases with the responsibility of helping the development of the Colonial Possessions of Great Britain, thus permitting the Imperial Government to conserve its energies for new development fields. The Dominions, he said would thus be enabled to appreciate the problems and difficulties which Great Britain had handled during long years of administration for the colored races.

Lord Beaverbrook suggested that Canada might administer the West Indies. He said he believed the experiment would have a wonderful influence on the relations between the West Indies and Great Britain. He pointed out that the West Indies were in the area subject to the Monroe Doctrine and would not operate so heartily against Canada as it might against Great Britain.
