There is also a shoe room, where seven hundred pairs of restless feet may be supplied from the shelves, which reach from the ceiling to the floor all round the room. The chapel in each house is situated on the second floor. One thousand chilfren may be seated in each chapel. Up at the top of the house are the infirmary, the quarantine ward, where children with contagious disases are placed, and a complete and perfect drug store, presided over by ne of the sisters. Every opportunity for healthful play is afforded o the children. Besides the extensive grounds they have a large paved play court and an indoor playground. The children do not dress in uniform. and one of the prettiest features of the home is that each little girl has a pretty and becoming dress made for her by the Sisters, entirely different from the dresses of the other little ones. The asylum is under he care of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul. Sister Mary Martha is the superior of the boys house, and Sister Clothilde of the
